Over 400 Music Students From 36 Schools to Converge on Eldorado

On Saturday, January 6, Eldo-rado High School will be host for the All-Region Band of Region VII, Texas Music Educators Association. This is the time each year that the individual band students try out for places in the All-Region Band. The All-Region Band will be made up of 108 of the finest student musicians in this region. Of this group, 50 students will go to Area on January 20 for another tryout to determine those who will be All-State.

This is probably the first time Eldorado has hosted any large musical event. There are 435 entries from 36 schools which is the largest the Region event has ever 'been.

Saturday morning will be spent in tryouts which will be held in the High School building, Band Hall, and Auditorium. The noon meal will be served in the school cafeteria followed by the rehearsal of the All-Region Band. A public concert will be held in the Auditorium at 7:30 p.m. There is no admission charge.


