Foul play was suspected Saturday when the abandoned, bloodspattered car was found at Big Lake. A break came Sunday when lawmen found a collection of papers belonging to Robineau about 8 miles west of Eldorado on Highway 29.

The search was continued and widely publicized until Monday night when the body was found in cotton field about a mile west of Wall. He had been shot at least once in the right side of the neck.

Also late Monday Odessa police errested a man believed to have been riding with Robineau. The man is being held on an AWOL charge from Ft. Sam Houston, the same Army post where Robineau was discharged Friday.


Next National Jamboree Set For 1969 In Idaho

Farragut State Park, Idaho, has been tentatively approved as the site for the Boy Scouts of America 7th National Jamboree (set for the summer of 1969). The 5,000-acre park on Lake Pend Oreille was the site of the XII World Jamboree last August.
