Don Yarborough Cites Small Towns' Needs

Waxahachie, Tex.-Democrat Don Yarborough said recently that Texas must stop the exodus of young people from the homes they love by providing more industrial and job opportunity in small towns.

"According to recent polls, 50% of the population want to live in small towns or rural areas but 70% of the population live on 1% of the land," the gubernatorial candidate said.

"Texas must place special emphasis on helping small towns obtain new industry to revive the economy of these corner stones of our society," Yarborough said.

"We can no longer shrug off the problem of the exodus of young people from small towns and say flet the cities worry about their new citizens.'

Lumber Prices To Continue Upward

Austin, Tex.—Lumber prices can be expected to continue their upward trend in the foreseeable future because of a triple pressure on the market, Joe Butler, Execu tive Vice-President of the Lumbermen's Association of Texas has advised the association's members. He stated that the three pressures causing the trend are:

1. Increasing demand for timber in the world market, especially in Japan where the economy is booming and building is far behind

2. The strong recovery of housing construction in the U.S., increasing domestim demand.

3. The fact that many lumber mills have never recovered from shortages of logs caused by the closure of forests last summer due to fire hazards.

"The export of logs from our Pacific Northwest has risen tre-mendously," Butler said. According to an industry reporting paper, Random Lengths, Pacific Northwest exports for November, 1967 were up 74% over November, 1966. Japan is responsible for most of

"Prices for dimension lumber in grades and species commonly used in construction are up 15 to 30% over a year ago," the lumber official reported. "This is one of the most rapid increases we have seen in lumber demand price. There is nothing on the horizon to indicate a leveling off of price or demand.'

Butler said he has advised Texas lumber firms who are members of the Association of the situation so they can warn customers of the existing conditions.





Vocational Training Urged

Need for improved vocationaltechnical education to train the unemployed for paying jobs is being spotlighted in Texas as never before.

Virtually all major candidates for governor are proposing this as one way to trim welfare rolls, raise more taxes, curb the danger of riots and reduce crime.

Both House and Senate committees are conducting hearings and studies on how best to expand training courses and improve tech-

Gov. John Connally gave job training facilities a major boost by endorsing an application of the Lower Rio Grande Valley Development Council for a \$9 million federal grant to build and operate a new technical institute at Harlingen Air Force Base.

Connally said he feels that most such training probably should be handled through the junior colge system. But he described area problems as so urgent that waiting for development of a system was not feasible.

He said he will recommend to the next legislature an appropriate state agency to run the new institute permanently. Meanwhile, he recommended that Texas A&M University and James Connally Technical Institute at Waco operate the Harlingen facilities.

Last year the legislature oppropriated \$5.2 million to buy facilities and equipment at James Connally Air Force Base to launch the state's first program of this kind.

Funds from the Federal Manpower Development Training Act will finance 90% of the Harlingen facility's cost—at least until June 30, 1969.

Barrera Named State Secretary

Roy Barrera, 41-year-old Antonio attorney, is John Hill's successor as secretary of state. Hill resigned last month to devote full time to his race for governor.

Governor Connally named Barrera to the \$24,000-a-year job. His duties include service as the governor's top liaison man and as the chief election officer.

Barrera is a member of the Texas State Historical Survey Committee, is a former chief prosecutor in the Bexar County district attorney's office and is ex-president of the board of trustees of Edgewood Independent School District.

Third Court of Civil Appeals reversed an additional workmen's compensation award to a Comal county woman hurt on the job because her lawsuit petition appealing the Industrial Accident Board decision was filed one day late.

Attorney General Rules Atty. Gen. Crawford C. Martin

has held that county commissioners courts may not legally sell to private concerns for commercial purposes duplicate copies of magnetic tape containing names of registered voters. However, Martin said that coun-

ty tax assessor-collectors and their deputies can prepare on their own time and sell copies of the registered voter list, providing that the "moonlighting" does not interfere with regular duties. In a separate opinion,


