Warmer Spring temperatures and continuing damp weather are providing near ideal conditions for fly increases. Stockmen need to be even more alert for possible screw-worm cases and to take worm samples from wounds found for transmission to the laboratory in Mission, Texas.

If you have lost or misplaced your vials, more are available at the County Agent's office.

The 1968 revision of recommendations for weed control in Texas is now available.

Good weed control can increase yields, provide better quality crops, and reduce weeds by preventing weed seed production. Herbicides can provide cheaper weed control than hand labor. In test plots, it was found that preplant or pre-emergence herbicides cost from \$2.50 to \$8.00 per acre, while hand labor averaged between \$12 and \$14 for hoeing. The herbicides protected the crops from weed competition during emergence and early growth, while the untreated fields were weedy all season.

One test of postemergence treatment with herbicide applied to control small careless weeds in grain sorghum showed an increase of 880 pounds of grain per acre. The income from the extra grain paid all costs and gave a nice net profit.

Certain mixtures of herbicides are available as preemergence treatments in grain sorghum, cotton and other crops in 1968.

The bulletin, B-1029, "Suggestions for Weed Control with Chem-

icals," is available from my office. It is a joint Texas Extension Service and Agricultural Experiment Station publication.

The recommendations of the 35-page bulletin also include suggestions for spray equipment, information on herbicide application on non-crop site and cropland in fallow and ponds and lakes.

Other things may be seized by might, but knowledge is to be gained only by study.

Is your cattle working day interrupted by corral fix-up?

Fence mending at this time can be a poor investment of your time and money. Several new plans for corrals, gates, chutes and allied facilities are available from county Extension offices.

Saving time and labor, and the reduction of injury to stockmen and animals are the important reasons for having adequate working pens.

Make plans now to build a corral system to suit your special needs. Spring is a good time to complete the construction and you'll be ready for working cattle prior to pasture movement or sale.

Included in the county agent's Catalog of Building and Equipment Plans are plans and descriptions of facilities for loading, sorting, confining, and weighing animals. The chances are good that a plan is available that will fit your operations.

Drawings for gates, gate latches, hinges, working chutes, and loading chutes are featured in plan number 5959 and plan 5996, a two men unit, especially adapted for smaller operators.

Stockmen may call at the local Extension office for a copy of the

catalog and assistance in planning a corral system.

Summer is exciting. The kids are just about through school, vacation plans are almost set, and the Highway Department is ripping up the roads to everywhere.

There's really no secret to producing peaches which are worm-free at harvest time. But if you want them that way, now is the time to take action.

The insects which produce the worms can be controlled if a good spray program is carried out. Once the insects get a start and worms get into the peaches nothing can be done.

To do an effective job of controlling peach insects, trees should be sprayed when 75% of the petals have fallen from the blooms. Then 10 days later when the shuck splits; then three more spray applications at two week intervals should follow the chuck-split stage spraying. This makes a total of five spray applications.

As for the spray, use either methoxychlor or malathion. These materials are readily available from feed and seed stores, drug stores or other firms which handle insecticides. Combinations of insecticides and fungicides may be used on fruit trees and make excellent sprays for use on peaches.

A control program for one tree in the backyard or many in an orchard is not only feasible but very practical. Persons interested in such a program may contact the office for detailed information on spray formulas. All insecticides should be used in accordance with label instructions and with care.

In a recent round table discussion it was decided that Eldorado Golfers might be interested in some of the rules of Golf Etiquette. After all if you don't know the rules you can't very well abide by them. Therefore I am quoting below a few of the rules from the 1968 Rule Book.

1. No one should move, talk or stand close to or directly behind the ball or the hole when a player is addressing the ball or making a stroke.
2. The player who has the honor

should be allowed to play before his opponent or fellow-competitor tees his ball.

3. No player should play until the players in front are out or range.

4. In the interest of all, players should play without delay.

5. Players searching for a ball should allow other players coming up to pass them; they should signal to the players following them to pass, and should not continue their play until those players have passed and are out of range.

6. Before leaving a bunker, a player should carefully fill up any holes made by him therein.

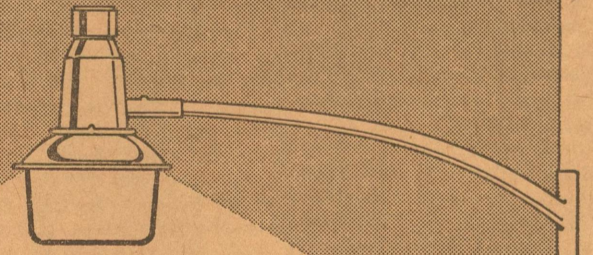
7. Through the green, a player should ensure that any turf cut or

displaced by him is replaced at once and pressed down, and that, after the players have holed out, any damage to the putting green made by the ball or the player is carefully repaired.

8. Players should ensure that, when dropping bags or the flagstick, no damage is done to the putting green, and that neither they nor their caddies damage the hole by standing close to the hole or in handling the flagstick or in removing the ball from the hole. The flagstick should be properly replaced in the hole before the players leave the putting green.

9. When the play of the hole has been completed, players should immediately leave the putting green.

Eldorado-Divide District News

The construction of 14,837 feet of level parallel terraces were completed on Edwin DeLong's place the 4th of this month. This brings the total amount of level parallel terraces constructed to 30,983 feet, on DeLong's two fields, Ed plans to construct the remaining terraces needed this fall or next spring.

Level parallel terraces are comparatively new in the Eldorado-Divide Soil and Water Conservation District as well as most parts of the United States. However, their popularity far exceeds the conventional level terraces that were not parallel. This is due to there being very few, if any, point rows between terraces in parallel terrace systems.

Point rows between terraces have always been one of the farmer's objections to terraces. Regardless of how close to parallel the terraces might run, there was always odd areas where the rows from each terrace came together. These areas sometimes were used as a twin row, therefore very few crops are grown. Also, rows would not come out even where they came together midway between terraces. These odd rows created a problem since it was hard to plant or cultivate one, two or three rows with four row equipment.

Some fields are easier to design, lay out and construct level parallel terraces on than others. This is due to the even topography of the field throughout the entire length of the terraces. DeLong's fields

complete parallel system in Schleicher county. Technicians of the Soil Conservation Service assisted DeLong in planning, layout and checking the terraces for completion. DeLong assisted as a rodman and chainman throughout all the planning and application work. Cost share assistance in constructing the terraces was received from the Schleicher County A. S. C. office.

18th Easter Pageant Set At Junction

Junction's 18th annual Easter Pageant will be presented Saturday, April 13, 1968, at 10:00 pm. on the eve before Easter Sunday, in a natural amphitheatre on the hillside below The Everburning Cross, one mile southeast of Junction. Presentation is by four-score Kimble county people, all laymen, women and children in colorful costumes, typical of the dress of Biblical times. Here they will reenact Jesus Christ's last Days on Earth, so timed that the Scene of the final Ascension will take place shortly after midnight on Easter morn.

This Holy Spectacle will be presented in pantomime, supported from a broadcasting booth by readers and background music. A dozen stages have been arranged among the rugged rocks of the hillside, and changes of scenes are effected by the shifting of spot and flood lights.

The production is entirely amateur and non-commercial. Members of the cast are all local people, with no professional or paid actors. The cast contains men and women from many walks of life; clerks, lawyers, barbers, ranch men, bankers, teachers, mail men, housewives, merchants, mechanics—who take time from their business for several weeks to participate in this consecrated service.

Mrs. Jack Reeves, accomplished ranch woman, directs the Pageant for the 18th consecutive year. In 1951, a group of about 20 inspired people enacted the first Pageant from a single stage. From year to year the Spectacle has grown, with changes and improvements in scripts, scenes, staging and props. Attendance has yearly increased, and last year over 6800 people came from far and near. The excellence of the production is perhaps attested by the ever increasing attendance. Many think there is nothing finer this side of Oberammergau.

The Pageant is sponsored by the Junction Men's Bible Class, a non-sectarian organization, who erected the Everburning Cross. The Cross sits high on Lovers Leap Mountain, and its lights are seen all year long by travelers who pass thru Junction on Highway U. S. 290. During Holy Week from Palm Sunday until Easter, the lights in the Cross burn red. At other times the lights are white.

Parking areas are provided from which the spectators may view the spectacle from the convenience of their car. Musical program will be

broadcast after 8 p.m. There is no charge for admission, for parking, nor for programs. Free coffee will be served after 4:00 p.m. throughout the evening from an old fashioned chuck wagon, which was furnished by the late Capt. Gully Cowser, of the Texas Rangers. Sandwiches and soft drinks will be dispensed on the grounds by local civic organizations.

This year a stand-by power unit will be there for use in case of electrical failure, so the program will not be interrupted.

The production of the Easter Pageant is a tremendous undertaking for the small community of Junction. Costs of staging are entirely furnished by contributions. Those who find the Pageant worthy of encouragement and support will be given opportunity to contribute.

New Road Map For 1968 Issued By Highway Department

Austin, Tex.—The year 1968 will be a big one for Texas, and this fact is reflected in the enlarged scale of the 1968 Official State Highway Map published by the Texas Highway Department.

To meet the need for additional information, it was necessary to increase the scale of the 1968 map and to use both sides to provide travel guidance.

Increasing the scale of the map by almost one-fourth also means it will be much easier to read. It should prove a valuable guide for the millions of visitors expected in Texas for San Antonio's HemisFair and four countless others who come to explore the many attractions in the state.

Featured on the cover is the Tower of the Americas, focal point for HemisFair. In his welcoming message on the map, Governor John B. Connally wrote, "This year . . . highways also lead to HemisFair, our Texas World's Fair in San Antonio. With this map as your guide, Discover Texas . . . and HemisFair . . . during 1968!"

Before the year is out more than a million maps will have been requested for use by the traveling public.

The 1968 Official State Highway Map is but one of a variety of services provided for the convenience of the traveler by the Texas Highway Department.

Texas motorists may order the 1968 map when registering motor vehicles. County tax officers have been provided with supplies of special order cards. The map will also be available at Highway Department District Offices and Tourist Information Bureaus.

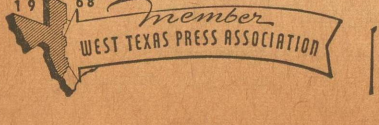
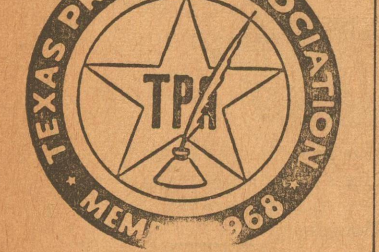

Schleicher County Hospital District Bill Signed By Governor One Year Ago



With dirt work having gotten under way last week on the hospital grounds, we were reminded that it was just one year ago that Governor John Connally signed the Schleicher County Hospital District bill, paving the way for voters in this county to endorse the proposition.

The Success reported signing of the bill in the Post-Script column the following week as follows:

I joined the group of "distinguished citizens" who went to Austin last Thursday to be present when Governor Connally signed our hospital bill.

We made the round trip in Mr. Spence's Buick; the other three being Pete Peters, A. G. McCormack and L. E. McCalla. Mr. Spence is familiar with Austin and he has made the trip many times. He knew exactly which route he would take and how long it would take. He called me the night before and said, "I'll call for you at 5 minutes to five!"

I set my alarm clock for 4:00 o'clock and was up, dressed and had breakfast—even shaved—well before the deadline. When the hands of my wall clock came to 4:55, I turned off the lights, stepped out in the pitch black darkness and walked

out to the street near my garage. A block away, up by Scottie's, were the lights of an approaching car. It was Mr. Spence, right on the dot!

Peters and Mack were already aboard and we picked up Gene by the variety store—and were on our way; the 200 miles to Austin lay ahead of us. It was dark all the way to Menard and several small deer were seen along the ditches.

From there we continued on through Mason and Llano and I wouldn't attempt to detail the rest of the route. Spence knew where he was going and at 5 minutes to 9:00 he let us out in front of the Capitol, while he drove around to find a parking place. The four of us entered the Capitol and went up to the second floor. We were just milling around, noticing all the good looking young women tripping around like they were real busy, with papers in their hands. I suppose they were secretaries to somebody.

Pretty soon Don McCormick showed up accompanied by Florence and Donna Beth, and a little later there was Tom Ratliff and his son, Shannon. They had driven down the day before. Then Spence rejoined the group—and we were all ready to meet the Governor. Along about then our

man, Hilary Doran, also joined the group and we entered the Governor's office.

It seems that this particular morning was a "bill signing" day and a big group lined up behind the Governor's desk while he signed a bill with three photographers snapping pictures. Then another group came up and went through the same process. Then it was our turn and Hilary waved us all to come forward and line up behind the Governor. We were all done in four minutes.

On Monday, April 17, county commissioners called an election for Saturday, May 20th, when voters could vote for or against the hospital district and the issuance of \$450,000 in hospital district bonds. In the election on May 20 the proposition carried by nearly three to one, and the commissioners after canvassing returns the following Monday, appointed the present seven directors, who have been carrying the ball ever since.

It has taken just about a year to get this far, but now the work is under way. The contractor says it will be about ten months the ball ever since.

Home Demonstration Agent's Column
By MRS. VIDA KREKLOW

It is called a bread, and it could be called cake, but by any name this is a delicious confection or bread or cake or a good thing to eat.

Fresh Carrot Bread is delicious served with cream cheese, butter or margarine.
3/4 cup butter
1 cup sugar
2 eggs
1 1/2 cups sifted all-purpose flour
2 teaspoons baking powder
1 teaspoon ground cinnamon
1/2 teaspoon salt
1 cup finely grated raw carrot
1 cup seedless raisins
1/2 cup chopped nuts.

Whip butter until fluffy and gradually beat in sugar. Add eggs one at a time and beat well after each addition. Sift together flour, baking powder, ground cinnamon and salt, and gradually add to first mixture. Mix in carrots, raisins and chopped nuts. Pour into well greased, lightly floured 9 x 5 x 3-inch loaf pan.

Bake in preheated moderate oven, 350 degrees F. for one hour. Cool bread in pan about 10 minutes before turning out on wire rack to finish cooling.

Eggs are cheaper now than they have been for months, and as a result of this situation I have had several calls asking about the freezing of eggs.

Frozen eggs will keep in good condition from 9 to 12 months. Eggs must be broken out of the shell for freezing. Freeze in quantities in which eggs are likely to be used at one time after thawing.

Whole Eggs
Break eggs into a bowl; stir with a fork enough to break yolks and mix them well with the whites. Do not beat. Strain through a sieve. This is important. To one cup whole eggs add 1/2 tablespoon white corn syrup. One cup of eggs is about five eggs.

Egg Yolks
Separate yolks from whites. Stir with fork to break. To one cup yolks (about 16 eggs), strain, and add one tablespoon white corn syrup.

Egg Whites
Strain through a sieve. Freeze without stirring. Do not add anything. Package and freeze immediately.

Thawing Frozen Eggs
Place containers in cold running water, in the refrigerator or thaw at room temperature. Mix egg mixture thoroughly before trying to use.
Plan to use thawed eggs within 24 hours. Do not refreeze.

Table Of Measurements
1 tablespoon yolk is equal to one egg yolk;
2 tablespoons whites are equal

2 cups cooked rice
2 tablespoons butter or margarine
2/3 cup chopped celery
1/2 cup onion
1/2 cup chopped green pepper
1 no. 2 can tomatoes
1 teaspoon salt
1 teaspoon monosodium glutamate
1/4 teaspoon curry powder (optional)
1/4 teaspoon pepper
1 egg, well beaten.
Mix rice lightly with butter, add celery, onion, green pepper and tomatoes. Stir with fork. Add seasonings. Mix in egg lightly. Spoon stuffing into turkey or chicken. Double recipe for turkey.

Orange-Pineapple Sherbet
1 six-oz. can froben (unsweetened) orange juice concentrate
3 1/2 cups cold water
1 cup non fat dry milk solids
1 six-oz. can frozen unsweetened pineapple juice concentrate
2 tablespoons Sucaryl solution or 48 tablets, crushed.

Put all ingredients into a two-quart mixing bowl in order given. Beat just enough to blend. Pour into ice cube trays if using refrigerator or into shallow pns if using freezer space. Freeze until half frozen, about 1 to 2 hours. Pour mixture into a chilled mixer bowl; beat on low speed until mixture is softened; turn mixer to high speed and beat until creamy but not liquid. Pour back into freezer containers and leave until frozen.

Makes about 15 servings of 1/2 cup each. Each serving contains 58 calories; if made with sugar the calorie count would be 113 calories or 232 per cup.

Applesauce Cookies
Makes 48 cookies of 39 calories each; if made with sugar each cookie would equal 60 calories.
1 3/4 cups cake flour
1 teaspoon cinnamon
1/2 teaspoon cloves
1/2 cup butter
1 egg
1 cup dietetic apple sauce
1 cup all bran
1/2 teaspoon salt
1/2 teaspoon nutmeg
1 teaspoon baking soda
1 tablespoon Sucaryl solution or 24 tablets, crushed
1/3 cup raisins.

Sift together flour, salt, soda, and spices. Mix butter, Sucaryl and egg until light and fluffy. Then add flour mixture and applesauce alternately mixing well after each addition. Fold in raisins and all bran. (I like to soak raisins in hot water 20-30 minutes before using. Makes them plump but be sure to drain them well.)

Drop cookie mixture by level tablespoonfuls onto greased cookie sheet; about an inch apart. Bake in a moderate oven (375 F.) for
