## Funeral Held Monday For Grace O'Harrow

Mrs. Grace O'Harrow, 91, of San Angelo, a member of a pioneer Schleicher county family, died at 8:40 p.m. Saturday in Baptist Memorial Hospital.

Services were held at 2:30 p.m. Monday in Eldorado Methodist church with burial in Eldorado cemetery directed by Johnson's Funeral Home.

Mrs. O'Harrow was born Dec. 25, 1876 in Iowa and came to Texas as a child with her parents. She spent her early life in Young and Parker counties. She attended college in Denton and was a former school teacher.

She was married to J. H. (Hamp) O'Harrow Dec. 5, 1897 in Baylor county. The couple moved to Schleicher county in 1907. Mr. O'Harrow died Dec. 5, 1924. Mrs. O'Harrow remained in Schleicher county until five years ago when she moved to San Angelo.

Survivors include two daughters, Mrs. A. L. (Lee) Ahrens of San Antonio and Mrs. Luke (Mary) Robinson of San Angelo; two sons, Jim O'Harrow of Eldorado and W. H. O'Harrow of San Angelo; a brother, Jim Parker of Seymour; a sister, Mrs. Ruth Roebuck of Olton; two grandchildren and four great-grandchildren.

Mrs. Jim Taliaferro, 68, died at 1:00 a.m. Saturday at her residence in Eldorado after an apparent heart attack.

Mrs. Taliaferro was born Nov. 16, 1899 in Straford, Okla. She was married to Jim Taliaferro in Ardmore, Okla., Aug. 28, 1918. She had been a resident of Eldorado four years, after moving here from Odessa.

The governor's race presents a problem, since there are ten names on the ballot and most people admit they are confused. "Don't know about any of them!"

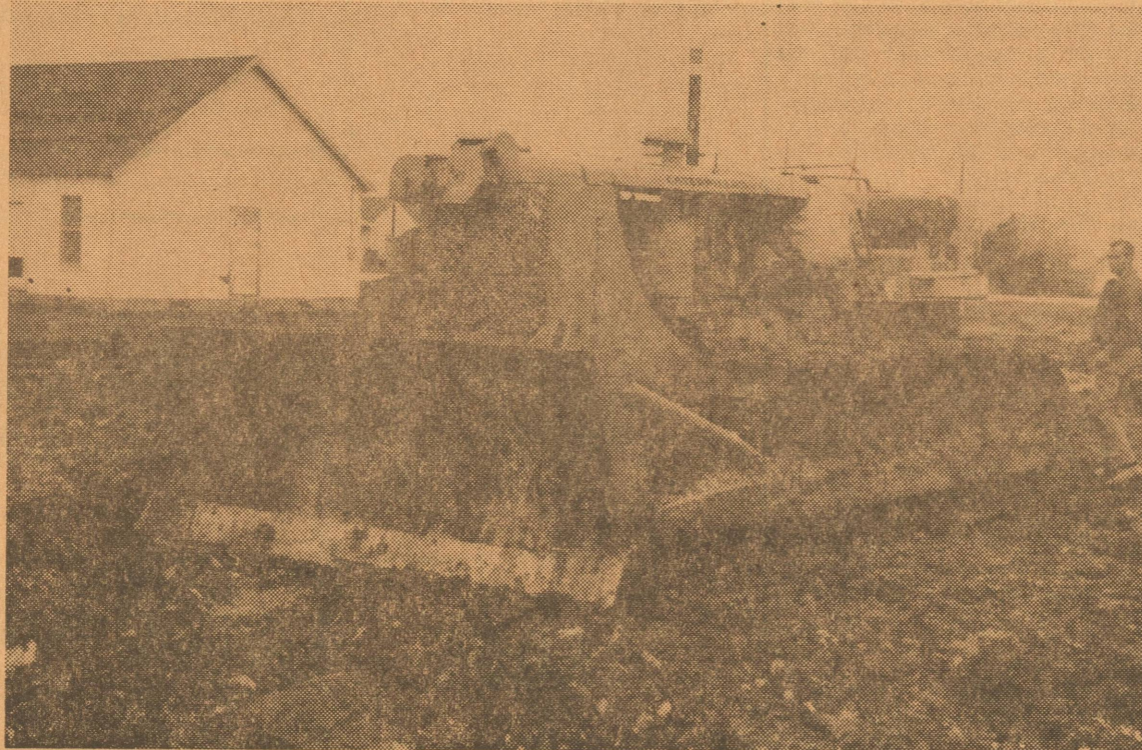

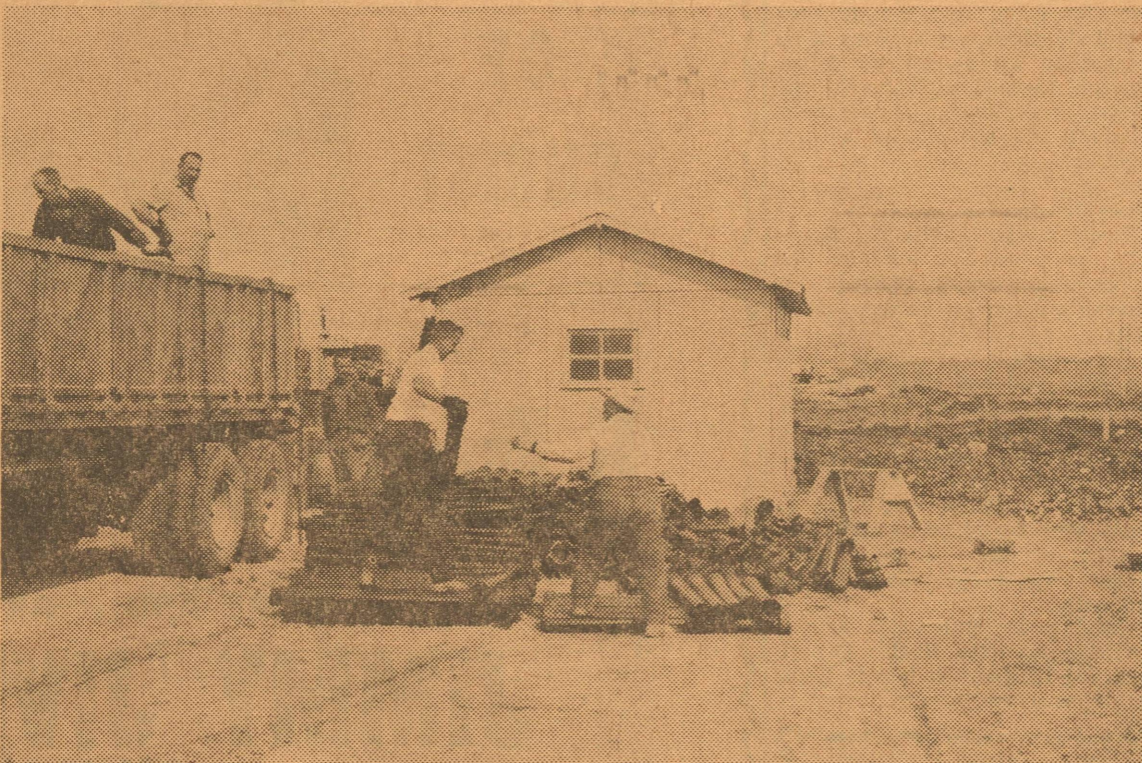

## Eagle Thin-Clads Set Three Records At Andrews Meet

Eldorado's Regional Qualifiers, led by John Mayo, set new records in the shot put, discus, and mile relay at the Mustang Relays held annually in Andrews for regional qualifiers in all classes. Eldorado was in Division IV along with all other Class A & B schools. Division III was for AA schools, Division II for AAA schools and Division I was for the large 4A schools.

Mayo moved up in the state ranking in the shot put to 3rd place with his best toss of the year of 60' 11 1/2" to break the old record of 58' 8" set in 1953 by Howard Van Loon of Rotan. John also won a 1st place needed in the discus and set a new record here with a toss of 165' 2 1/2". This bettered the existing record by 12 feet.

In the track events, all entries in the finals were drawn by places in the prelims. No preliminary races were timed. You had to be 1st or 2nd in your heat to qualify for the finals. Wayne Doyle was his best in the 100 yd. dash against his stiffest competition of the year. In the finals, Doyle won the event with a time of 10.1. Larry Funderburg of Rankin was 2nd with a time of 10.15 and Kensey Hoover of Spur was 3rd with a 10.2. This was a very narrow victory for Doyle. He will be running these same boys again this week at Lubbock in the regional meet.

R. L. Lozano and Paul Page won their heats in the open quarter. As in the weeks past, the stage was set for another one of their duels in the finals. In the district meet, Paul nipped Lozano. At Andrews, Lozano beat Paul by a very close margin. Both received an ovation from the crowd for their performance. Lozano clocked a 51.0 and Paul had a 51.1. This is their best times this year.

The Eagles' only other entry in the relays was their fine mile relay team composed of Doyle, Lozano, Paul Page, and Bob Page. The record in this event was 3:29.8. After the race was completed, Eldorado had lowered the time to 3:29.3 for another record, their 3rd for the day. Doyle ran a 52.5 on his lap, Bob Page ran a 55.4, Lozano had a 50.8 and Paul Page anchored with a 50.6.

The Eagles came away from Andrews with 5 first place medals, 1 second place medal, 3 new records, and 68 points. These same boys will be competing against the same schools plus schools in the Panhandle at Lubbock this weekend for the Regional Meet. The winners here will qualify for the state meet in Austin on the 2nd, 3rd, and 4th of May.

The boys will leave Eldorado Thursday morning about 9:00 and stop in Snyder to work-out. They will be staying at the Village Inn in Lubbock. The preliminaries will be Friday and the finals are held Saturday afternoon.

**Highlights and Sidelights FROM YOUR State CAPITOL**

Austin, Tex.—Gov. John Connally has accepted invitations of supporters to actively seek designation as Texas' favorite son Democratic presidential candidate.

Sen. Ralph Yarborough also has been urged by anti-Connally and pro-Robert Kennedy & pro-Eugene McCarthy forces to make a fight against the governor in precinct conventions for the favorite son role. Although critical of Connally, Yarborough has not responded to the call.

Labor leaders were among those pushing Yarborough as favorite son, but AFL-CIO Committee on Political Education failed to place its stamp of approval on this recommendation. COPE administrative committee opposed commitment of the Texas delegation to Connally as favorite son, and recommended Yarborough for vice-president.

Issue may set off a major fight in precinct conventions May 4, only place where the average Texas voter will have anything to say about the choice of a presidential nominee.

**Courts Speak**

Law enforcement officers are sweating out the potential far-reaching effect of a new federal court decision here declaring Texas' disturbing-the-peace law unconstitutional.

Atty. Gen. Crawford C. Martin will file a motion for rehearing and take his appeal to the U. S. Supreme Court if necessary. He called the decision by a three-judge federal panel in the case which originated with Vietnam war protesters displaying signs during a speech by President Johnson in Killeen "a tremendous blow to law enforcement."

Federal judges stayed their mandate pending an opportunity of the state legislature to redefine "disturbance" offense within their guidelines.

They concluded that the existing law, providing fines up to \$200, is "impermissibly and unconstitutionally broad."

Martin said if the decision stands police will find it "exceedingly difficult to maintain law and order in various communities of our state."

Actually, charges against the anti-Vietnam group had been dropped before the hearing because the alleged offense occurred on federal property. Therefore, the state maintains that the court had no authority to test the statute's constitutionality. Martin says dismissal of the original charges rendered the federal court case moot.

Further, Attorney General argues, Texas law prohibits specific actions which are breaches of peace and do not fall within prior decisions of the U. S. Supreme Court which invalidated some disturbance statutes.

In another federal court case, a San Antonio mother of six sued to collect aid-to-dependent children, though she did not meet the state's one-year residency requirement. She maintained that, since 76% of

the welfare money for that purpose came from the federal government, she was entitled to benefits.

Again, a three-judge panel agreed with the plaintiff in a decision that could extend to all welfare, since federal money is everywhere. Attorney General Martin indicated he will appeal this decision to the U. S. Supreme Court.

A woman who lost her hair after using a home permanent liquid cannot collect damages from Procter and Gamble Company because she failed to follow directions, State Supreme Court has held.

A Houston lawyer disbarred for failing to file lawsuits after accepting legal fees lost his appeal to the high court.

Supreme Court will hear arguments May 8 over former State Savings and Loan Commissioner's denial of application by Oak Cliff Savings and Loan Association for a branch office in Fort Worth. District court struck down the commissioner's ruling.

Liquor Control Board had authority to cancel a Monaville (Waller county) grocery store's wine and beer permit, Supreme Court agreed.

**Teacher Pay Raise Planned**

Governor's Committee on Public School Education will recommend "large and substantial" teacher pay raises with built-in cost-of-living escalation plans, Chairman Leon Jaworski says.

Jaworski indicated the Committee also will recommend (by August 31 deadline) free public kindergartens, summer schooling, expanded vocational training, new course programming, tax equalization among districts and school district reorganization.

Committee will hold a public hearing here April 26 to preview some of its findings in areas of enrollment projections for the next decade, school dropout study, analysis of school courses and service offerings, evaluation of Texas Test for Educational Development and results of an adult and teacher opinion poll.

Jaworski also announced that the Committee contracted with a Dallas company to produce a filmed version of its report and recommendations to the Legislature in January, 1969.

**Budget Board Votes**

Legislative Budget Board recommended a \$2.2 million special session appropriation to help build and equip new vocational and technical training facilities at Odessa College. Board also approved \$86,900 and \$46,255 requests of Angelo State College and Midwestern University for associate science degree offerings in nursing.

Members went along with request for \$150,000 supplemental appropriation to help build new facilities at Washington-on-the-Brazos State Park and \$10,000 for Higher Education Coordinating Board participa-

tion in a study on college education opportunities for Negroes.

Passed over for the time being was a request of the Liquor Control Board for an additional \$2.3 million.

**Bets Land Policy Changed**

New veterans land policies have been ordered to limit veterans' purchases to no more than 10% of any one sub-division.

Land Commissioner Jerry Sadler said interest in the revived program—through which qualified veterans can buy land on long-term, low-interest rate arrangement—has been "overwhelming," but too many applications have been coming in on sub-divisions.

"We cannot spend all our money in a few isolated areas," said Sadler in announcing new restrictions. "We have large subdividers that have put prices on their land far above market value in the area. All veterans (should have) a chance to buy throughout the state and not spend our money in a few large subdivisions."

**New Formulas**

Coordinating Board, Texas Colleges and Universities has adopted new formula rates for submission to the Legislature for the state fiscal years 1970-71.

Board also approved a second election for creation of a junior-college district in Jefferson county, adopted criteria for the creation of such districts, approved a uniform financial reporting system for junior colleges and okayed a \$50,000 research project by the University of Houston on continuing education.

**Pollution Study**

State Health Department's three-year-old solid-wastes survey has been completed in 71 Texas counties that hold some 40% of the state's population.

Department will draw up a state plan based on information from the study about a year away from completion for solid-waste collection and disposal, with specific emphasis on regional planning commissions and councils of government.

**Short Snorts . . .**

Texas military units at Gatesville, Lampasas, San Antonio and Austin were among 24,500 U. S. reservists recently called to active duty.

State Auditor C. H. Cavness, who has held that job since 1942, announced his retirement, and Geo. W. McNeil, Cavness' first assistant, was named by the Legislative Audit Committee to succeed him.

More than \$99,000 worth of textbooks were destroyed by Hurricane Beulah in Rio Grande Valley schools, Texas Education Agency calculates.

Coral snake anti-venom now is available at State Health Department lab here and at labs in Hous-

ton, San Antonio and Corpus Christi.

State Comptroller reports that cigarette tax revenues for March were \$710,879 below 1967 level.

Attorney General Martin has held that the Texas State Board for Registration for Professional Engineers may pay travel expenses and office equipment bills of its investigator.

Texas Department of Public Safety warns that the April 15 deadline for obtaining the 1968 inspection sticker for your car is Monday.

Texas Highway Commission has approved a new 10.6 mile, \$6.3 million link of Interstate Highway 10 which extends from 1.4 miles west of Kent and a 9.1 mile controlled access highway serving the Dallas-Fort Worth regional airport area.

Texas Highway Commission has approved the 1968 Boat Ramp Program which calls for construction of 58 projects in 42 counties at a cost of \$624,400.

Ralph Waldron, vice president of the Golf Club, has asked that we have a Work Day on this Saturday, April 20th. The day will begin about 8:30 a. m., so if at all possible show up at the golf course about 8:30 and get your assignment for the day.

I have been told by a number of persons that a golfer must have positive thoughts in order to make positive shots. I do believe this—but I must admit I sometimes take a negative attitude; therefore my game does not improve as it should. However back to "they say"—the right frame of mind is very important in executing a successful golf shot. After all the amateur golfer plays to enjoy himself, relax, and go home in a good mood. A negative attitude toward shot-making produces sour results, frustrating scores and a dismal outlook.

The weekend amateur should think in simple terms and not have a hundred "don'ts" on his mind when addressing the ball. Your mental attitude should be 'straight' before starting on the physical faults of your game.

You will save strokes if you think positively. For instance the golfer who is frightened by a water hazard will often hit into it; instead think about positive results; don't think about the penalty for hitting into the water, but instead concentrate on hitting the green and getting down in par or less. A negative thinker will always be saying to himself, "I can't" while a player with a positive approach is believing "I can."

### Emergency Loans Since July Reported By Farmers Home Ad.

Emergency Loans totaling \$94,520 have been made by the San Angelo office of the Farmers Home Administration since July 1, 1967, to help local farmers and ranchers recover from natural disasters, Trueman D. Murdoch, County Supervisor reported recently.

Murdoch said Tom Green, Crockett, Schleicher and Cutton counties were designated by Secretary of Agriculture Freeman as areas in which emergency loans could be made by the Farmers Home Administration to eligible farmers and ranchers because of the recent drought years.

One hundred and ninety-three counties have been designated by Secretary Freeman as areas needing an emergency credit source. As of Dec. 31, 1967, over 2,300 emergency loans for nearly \$14.25 million have been made in Texas.

In fiscal year 1967 over 4,100 emergency loans for around \$27 million were made in Texas.

The program provides a standby source of credit for farmers and ranchers who cannot obtain emergency credit elsewhere. Repayment schedules vary according to purposes for which funds were advanced.

The San Angelo office, serving this area, is located in Room 510, 7 West Twohig Bldg. An office period is held in the County Courthouse in Eldorado on the first and third Wednesday mornings.

### Methodist Notes

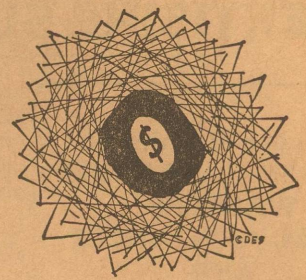
The renovation work at the Methodist Church is now complete except for two items. The sanctuary will be carpeted and a bronze cross is to be erected on the front of the church.

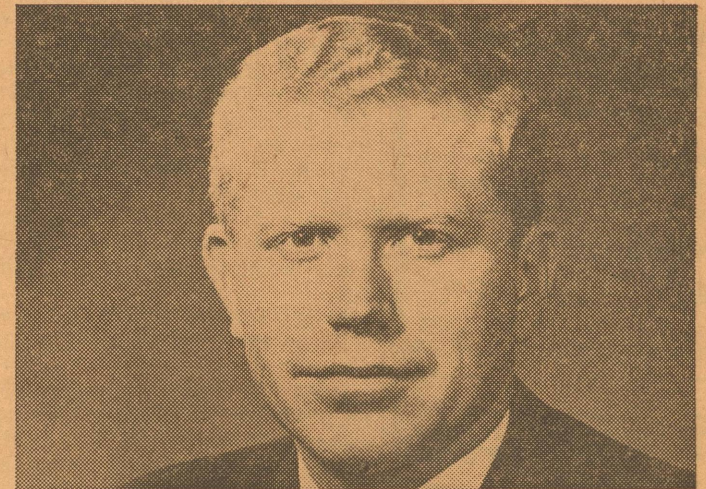

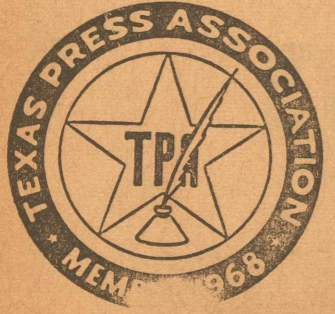

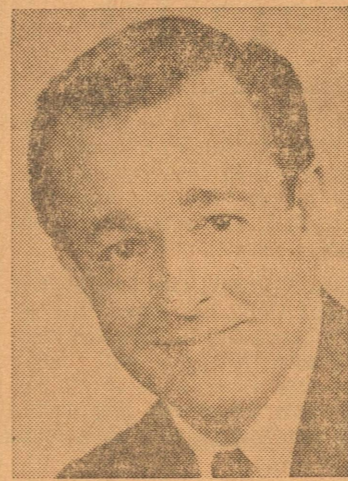

## COUNTY AGENT'S COLUMN

Specially selected farmers in Schleicher county will find a very important document in their mailboxes in the next few days.

It's the annual spring Acreage Survey of the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service, a cooperative effort of USDA's Statistical Reporting Service and the Texas State Department of Agriculture.

Carey D. Palmer, agricultural statistician in charge, said that forms will be mailed to Schleicher county from Austin on May 29th.

Crop reports for more than 100 years have been important aids to farmers in planning their production and marketing activities. By responding promptly to the questionnaire, farmers can increase the accuracy of our next crop report and make it even more valuable to them.

Statewide, data are collected primarily from voluntary reporters, including 40,000 farmers and ranchmen, 6,000 agricultural businesses and 250 county agricultural agents.

Up to 25% of the producers in each county, generally the larger operators, will receive the Acreage Survey form.

The cotton fleahopper is one of the major cotton pests in Schleicher county. Each year the fleahopper prevents cotton plants in many fields from maturing a bottom crop. The bottom crop usually is the cotton producer's best cotton.

This insect overwinters in the egg stage in the stem of croton weeds or other wild host plants as well as in cotton. In the spring, the fleahopper feeds and reproduces on horsemint and other spring weed hosts. After cotton has reached a stand, fleahoppers migrate to the cotton fields. The adults and the nymphs suck sap from the tender portions of the cotton plants, including small squares. The feeding by the fleahopper on the small squares and terminal growth causes blasting and shedding of small squares and a reduction in the number of fruiting branches.

By limiting the number of breeding and feeding sites, the number of fleahoppers in a particular area can also be limited. Weeds should be destroyed around cotton fields before cotton is planted. This type of control for fleahoppers is most effective in areas where there are only a few sites such as fences and turn rows where weeds build up. Even in these areas, fleahoppers can still migrate to the cotton fields but populations early in the growing season will be reduced.

Control of the common hornfly is an item often overlooked by many cattlemen.

The hornfly is an important pest of beef cows. The time of the year is at hand when hundreds of the small black flies can be noted on the backs, shoulders, horns and on extremely hot days along the underline of beef cows.

The flies are a constant worry to the cow and prevent her from properly feeding; and thereby, she loses weight and her milk production falls off.

Research has shown that cows protected from hornflies produce 10 to 20% more milk than those not protected, and wean heavier calves.

The use of some of the newer, longer-lasting insecticides provides effective control from two to four weeks. Several methods can be used in applying the needed insecticide. They include the use of a small hand sprayer, power sprayer or a backrubber.

Cotton seedling disease can greatly affect total yield from your acreage. Organisms associated with cotton seedling diseases are fungi, bacteria, and nematodes. They are most damaging during periods that favor their development but unfavorable for plant development.

Preventing disease from affecting seedlings can be accomplished only by following the proper combination and use of control practices.

It is important to bury all surface trash below the planting level and plant the seed on beds to allow proper drainage. Shaped beds and precision planting can greatly aid in the control of seedling disease.

Seeds should be treated with a chemical fungicide to control seed surface-borne organisms and prevent seed rot.

The seed should be of good quality and should give a high germination of normal seedlings at 65 degrees in seven days. Lower quality seeds require higher temperatures and longer to germinate.

To test the seed quality before planting, construct an incubator from an old refrigerator that will cool to 65 degrees. An electric light bulb controlled by a thermostat may be used to raise temperatures to 65 degrees.

After seven days at the 65 degree temperature, high quality seed will germinate and have a straight root about 1 1/2 inches long. Low quality seed will have poor germination and roots which are coiled or nubbed. Any mold growth on the seeds will indicate deterioration.

To assure a satisfactory stand it may be necessary to apply an in-cropping fungicide when seedling disease has consistently been a problem. Sprays, dusts, or granules may be used and they should be thoroughly mixed with the soil used to cover the seed in the furrow.

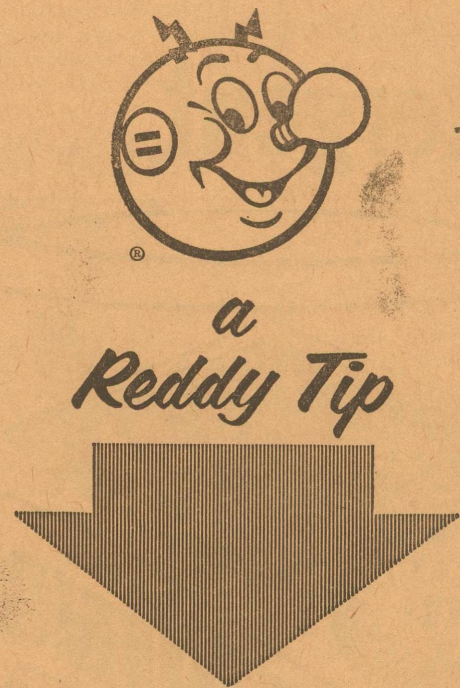

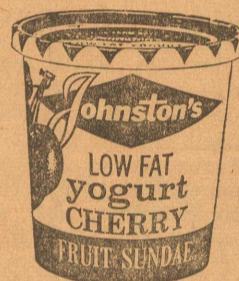

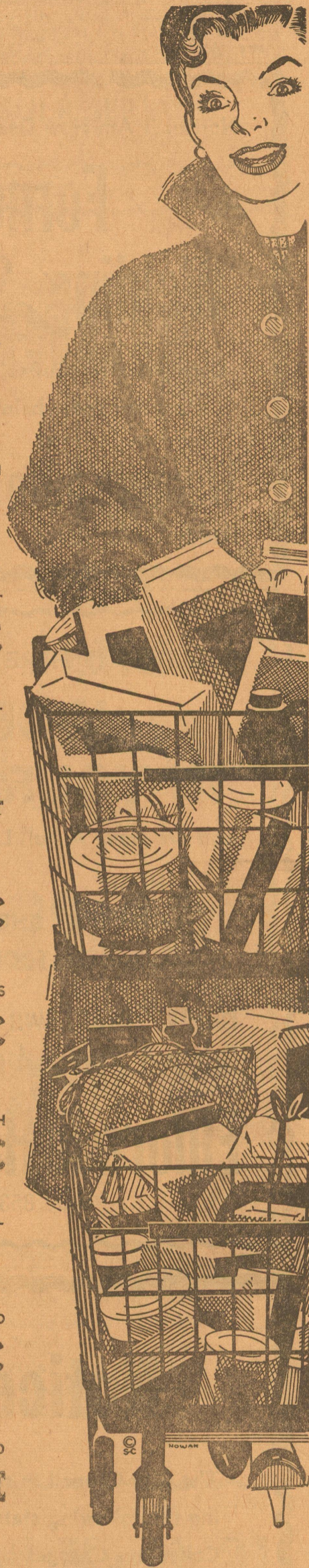
