## Hardeman Carries County But Loses to Snelson District-Wide

The incumbent State Senator Dorsey B. Hardeman carried Schleicher county 472 to 376, but lost on the District level to his challenger W. E. (Pete) Snelson of Midland.

The race was a hard-fought one all the way, with active campaigning by both candidates.

The same pair ran two years ago

and Hardeman won that time by a narrow 62-vote margin.

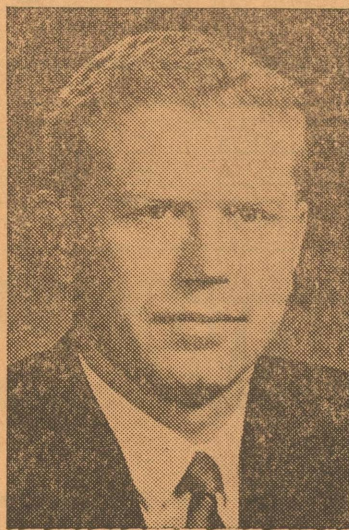
## Absentee Voting Starts May 22nd For Run-Off

## Barnes Tops For Lieutenant Governor

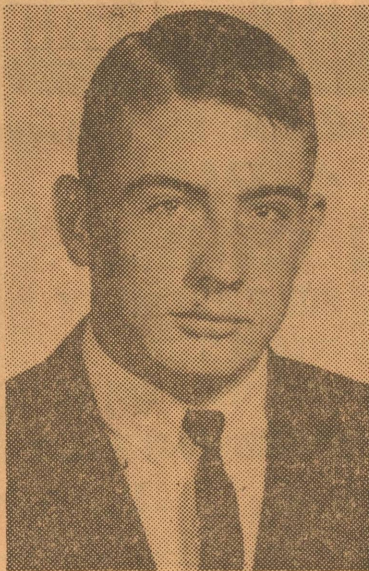

Barnes served as Speaker of the House in the State Legislature and during that time had Glenn Biggs, Eldorado native, as his secretary and administrative assistant.

## Mayo 2nd In State In Shot Put Contest

At the state meet held last week end in Austin, Johnny Mayo placed 2nd with his shot put distance of 59' 11". He hurled the discus 159' 10 1/2" for a fourth place.

The son of Mr. and Mrs. John Mayo, Johnny lettered in football four years and was captain this year, and was given the E-Club award as most outstanding football player.

He will play in the Texas All-Star football game in Fort Worth in August.

He is considering athletic scholarship offers from several colleges.

## Rain Last Week

About one and 2-tenths inches of rain fell in an hour's time last Thursday in Eldorado. Big black clouds carrying some small hail and driving winds dumped that much moisture around 6:00 o'clock p.m.

The hail was too small and too scattered to do any damage in town, but east of town James Williams reported it covered the ground at his new farm home.

One resident in Reynolds community reported only a light shower, and one farmer resumed planting as soon as it stopped.

## Post Script

The First Democratic Primary has come and gone, following many months of campaigning on the part of local and higher level candidates.

It seemed that this year there was more confusion about the voting than before. One person called the Success office and asked if it were possible to vote a split ticket. Another asked if George Wallace would be on the ticket.

Voters in all four precincts had to come in to vote. We no longer have any polling places in outlying parts of the county and some people were confused about where they were to go to vote.

Actually, of course, now as in the past the Democratic Primary simply names the nominees who will be in the Democratic column on the ballot in the General Election in November. Winning of the Democratic nomination in a state like Texas is "tantamount to election" because traditionally the Republicans have been unable to have their candidates win in the Fall, although that situation is gradually changing.

Preston Smith and Don Yarborough emerged tops in the Governor's race, and will be on the ballot in the Second Democratic Primary which comes June 1st. That is a straight division between a conservative Democrat and a liberal.

The only local race we will have on the ballot will be the run-off between Weatherly Kinser and George Williams for Commissioner of Precinct 1.

It remains to be seen how much interest develops in the local and state race in the weeks immediately ahead, and how many Democrats turn out to vote in the run-off on June 1st.

As is noted elsewhere, absentee voting for the run-off will start May 22nd and continue for just five days.

Traditionally, the voter turnout is lighter in the run-off Democratic Primary. By the first of June, summer vacation time will be on, a number of people will be away on trips, and others will be making plans for such trips and their minds will not be on politics as much then as has been the case the past several months. True, if they know that they will be away June 1st they could go by the Clerk's office and vote absentee any time after May 22nd, but it will take greater effort to do so. All in all, it looks like local candidates and boosters for either Smith or Yarborough will have to work harder to get voters to turn out.

About our hospital—

## Preston Smith, Don Yarborough To Be In Run-Off For Governor

Another photo-finish race is predicted in the run-off race for Governor of Texas in the June 1st Democratic Primary, with the emergence of Don Yarborough and Preston Smith as the top two of the 10 in the recent race. Voters flocked to the polls last Saturday and eliminated the other eight who ranged from perennial candidate Johnnie Mae Hackworth of Brenham, to Eugene Locke, to Pat O'Daniel, and to Uvalde ranchman Dolph Briscoe. Also Waggoner Carr, who failed in his bid for the U. S. Senate a year and a half ago, went down again in defeat.

The Yarborough-Smith contest coming up will pit veteran legislator Smith, a conservative, against the 42-year-old liberal Yarborough. Both have dedicated backers and promoters all over Texas.

Monday, the Dallas Morning News and the Fort Worth Star-Telegram endorsed Smith in his run-off bid coming up. But Yarborough's popular vote led that of Smith in the First Primary. It remains to be seen how the race develops during the coming three weeks, and how big a turn-out of voters develops for the first of June.

## Liquor Referendum Carries Over Texas

The referendum to legalize sale of liquor-by-the-drink was apparently the only one of the three on the ballot which carried over the state of Texas, as a few votes were still being tallied early this week.

Rejected were the proposals to allow pari-mutuel betting on horse racing, and establishment of a milk-pricing commission.

Schleicherites rejected all three proposals. Voting here was:

## Hospital Board In Regular Meeting

All seven members were present when the hospital board of directors met in their regular first Monday meeting at the court house.

After canvassing recent election returns, in which all seven directors were re-elected, the board re-elected Ratliff and Mittel as president and secretary for another year, and then went on to approve minutes of the last meeting, after which they read and approved a number of bills and ordered them paid.

Work on the hospital site is proceeding according to schedule except that the old church building has not yet been moved, which was delaying grading and drainage work. Mr. Ratliff had been assured this week that the Menard contractor would move the structure within a week. Repairs to his truck was given as a reason the building had not been moved earlier.

While construction of the building has been disposed of, this part of the job is no longer a concern of the directors, but they still have the problem and choice of equipment, such as furniture and supplies, office equipment, etc.

In a two-hour session they went over a great deal of these items and voted to issue purchase orders for many of them.

Incoming hospital supplies continue to be stored in the old Ford building on South Main street.

Surviving are his wife, four sons, three daughters, and three brothers, including Jess Ashmore of Eldorado.

## Half-Dozen Votes Cast By Republicans

There were six votes cast Saturday in the Republican primary held here.

In the Governor's race, Eggers got 3 votes; Sisk, 1; and Trice, 1.

In the referendum vote, the liquor proposal had 3 for and 3 against; pari-mutuel betting, 2 for and 4 against; and milk commission, 3 for and 3 against.

The election was conducted by Ford Oglesby Jr., county Republican chairman, with assistance of Mrs. Oglesby and Mrs. Donnie Gilmore.

## NO MAJOR CHANGE

## Kinser & Williams Face Run-Off June 1

## Funeral Monday For Charles Jurecek, 89

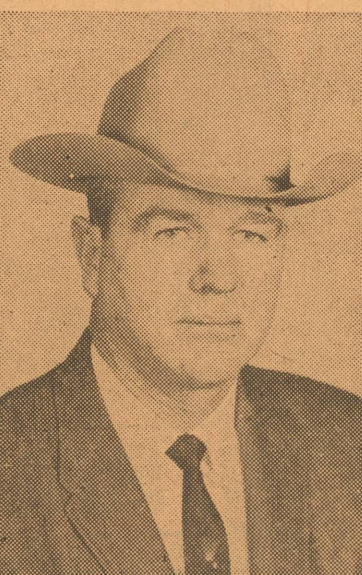
Charles Jurecek, 89, died at 1:00 p.m. Saturday at Park Plaza Nursing Home in San Angelo after a short illness.

money as well as assuring some fine eating is to buy and cook a turkey this week. Turkey does not necessarily have to be stuffed and served whole and roasted to be good; it comes out good in dozens of ways.

For instance—try this easy to fix—

**Turkey-Macaroni Salad**

- 2 cups elbow macaroni
- 3 tablespoons and 1/4 cup salad oil
- 1/4 cup vinegar
- 2 teaspoons salt
- 1 teaspoon dry mustard
- 1 teaspoon celery salt
- 1 teaspoon paprika
- 2 cups chopped cooked turkey
- 1/4 cup chopped pimiento
- 1/4 cup green pepper
- Mayonnaise or prepared salad dressing.

Cook elbow macaroni in enough boiling salted water to cover, adding 3 tablespoons salad oil to cooking water to keep water from boiling over and macaroni pieces separated. Drain macaroni and pour into mixing bowl. Combine salad oil, vinegar, salt, dry mustard, celery salt and paprika. Pour over macaroni. Add chopped turkey, chopped pimiento and green pepper. Mix well and chill. Add mayonnaise or prepared salad dressing as desired. Serve in crisp lettuce cups. Or for a buffet dinner, line serving bowl with lettuce and add macaroni-turkey salad. Garnish with green pepper sticks.

I made Turkey-Continental for Easter dinner from some left over frozen Christmas turkey and each of the 23 people who ate it said they liked it very much.

In fact three of them asked for the recipe.

I'll see that you get it next week.

I worked with the public speaking division, boys and girls, and both junior and senior classification.

These 4-H contestants not only delivered their speeches, but they wrote them, and were simply great speeches at that.

Tom Green county's Randy Rountree took the blue ribbon with his impassioned, throat tightening appeal to all Americans as they face a grave and decisive future.

Dave Gentry of Irion county kept the audience and judges chuckling and laughing as he delivered his "Ode To a 4-H Lamb."

Dave told about going to Oklahoma to buy a load of lambs in an old '59 pick-up. He said that when they got to a filling station they filled up with oil and added a quart of gasoline.

Brought from Prairie Mountain a good, good recipe and for, of all things, Kraut Salad. Tasted very much like a fine slaw and much easier to make.

**Very good with barbecue and beans. German Sauerkraut Salad**

- 1 cup sugar
- 1/2 cup vinegar
- 1 no. 2 1/2 can sauerkraut, drained
- 1/2 cup green pepper, sliced
- 1/2 cup onion, sliced
- 1/2 cup celery, sliced
- 2 tablespoons pimento
- 1 teaspoon dill seed (may be left out)
- 1/4 cup salad oil.

Bring sugar and vinegar to a full boil. Add other ingredients, except kraut, to hot sugar and vinegar mixture.

Pour sugar and vinegar mixture over sauerkraut. Place salad in covered container and let stand overnight in refrigerator. May be eaten sooner but the salad improves with standing. Yields 6 servings and keeps almost indefinitely.

I'm not joking—I've just remembered the recipe I promised to send Mrs. Eckert at Long Mountain: Lemon Chess Pie. I couldn't be more pleased that I have thought of the right recipe.

I had a pleasant surprise at the gathering of the community of Long Mountain in Mason county the other night; Clifton Hancock was the guest minister for the occasion. Clifton sends his best regards to all of you in Schleicher county.

If the end of school activities will quicken the pace of living at your house, why don't you do some

beforehand things before the storm breaks.

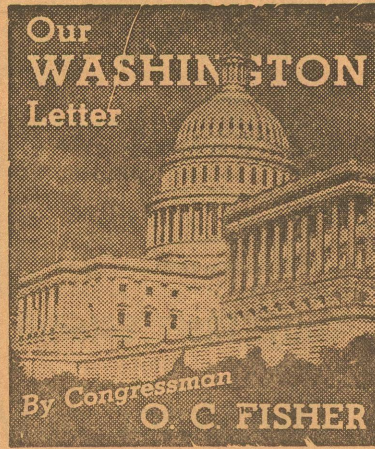

Like the merry-go-round at carnival time, the political wheel of fortune months ago was set in motion for the 1968 American sweepstakes. At all levels—from the office of the President down to the Justices of the Peace, contests attract an assortment of hopefuls, all offering a wide variety of solutions for the ills of the day. Then comes election day, with its rewards—and its disappointments.

In my own race, the results of the May 4 primary were, of course, most gratifying. One cannot serve in the Congress as I have, vote independently with a constant awareness for the public interest and the plight of the taxpayers, without arousing opposition from those who disagree with one's voting record.

With a 5-to-1 margin of victory, I am made to feel quite humble and, of course, most appreciative for such an overwhelming vote of confidence.

In recent weeks I have received hundreds of messages from every one of the 21 counties in our district, assuring me of support. But there were four critical letters, displeased with me and my voting record. I was, however, pleased to have the benefit of their reasoning. After all, we can all improve ourselves, and we should listen to the critics along with the others.

One critic—a young preacher—informed me that he was being kept busy urging his friends to scratch me on election day. He insisted that I was completely out of step with progress, still groping about—simply—in the 19th century, obviously unsympathetic with the mounting social needs of our people. He was very blunt about it and informed me that I reminded him of a Scotchman who maintained that nothing would ever be approved unanimously—so long as he was alive!

I graciously acknowledged his comment and told him that one member of my staff, a compulsive optimist, after reading his letter observed ruefully: "I think we'll have to mark him 'doubtful'!"

### Sugaring Off In Vermont

When the nights are still crisp and cold and the days become sunny and warm, the sap begins to run in the maple trees. The trees are tapped to remove the sap before buds form. Then the sap is boiled, evaporating the water and producing the bright, clear syrup.

A visitor to Vermont during March and April might be invited to a sugaring off party. Freshly made syrup is boiled to evaporate more of the water and then drizzled over clean snow forming a warm, shiny brittle. The rich brittle is then eaten with snow and doughnuts; followed by sour pickles to cut the sweetness.

Vermont cooks use maple syrup in all kinds of recipes. One of the most delicious is this golden frosted gingerbread.

#### MAPLE GINGER GLOW CAKE

- 2 tablespoons butter or margarine, softened
- 1 cup water
- 1 (14-ounce) package DROMEDARY Gingerbread Mix
- 1 egg, separated
- 3/4 cup flaked coconut

- 3/4 cup maple syrup
- 1/8 teaspoon salt
- 1/8 teaspoon cream of tartar
- 1 teaspoon lemon juice

Add butter and 1/2 cup water to mix. Blend; beat 1/2 minute on low speed of mixer. Add remaining water and egg yolk; beat 1/2 minute on low speed. Fold in 1/2 cup coconut. Pour into greased 6 1/2 cup ring mold or bowl with funnel in center. Bake in preheated moderate oven (350° F.) 40 to 45 minutes or until done. Cool 10 minutes in pan; turn out onto rack; cool completely.

Cook maple syrup over medium heat without stirring until 1/2 teaspoon dropped into 1 cup very cold water forms a soft ball when rolled between fingers. This takes about 10 minutes. Remove from heat while making test. Meanwhile, add salt and cream of tartar to egg white and beat until stiff. Add hot syrup, pouring in a thin stream while beating at high speed. Continue beating until thick, pale and fluffy. Beat in lemon juice. Spread over cake. Toast remaining 1/4 cup coconut and sprinkle over cake. Makes 8 (3-inch) servings.

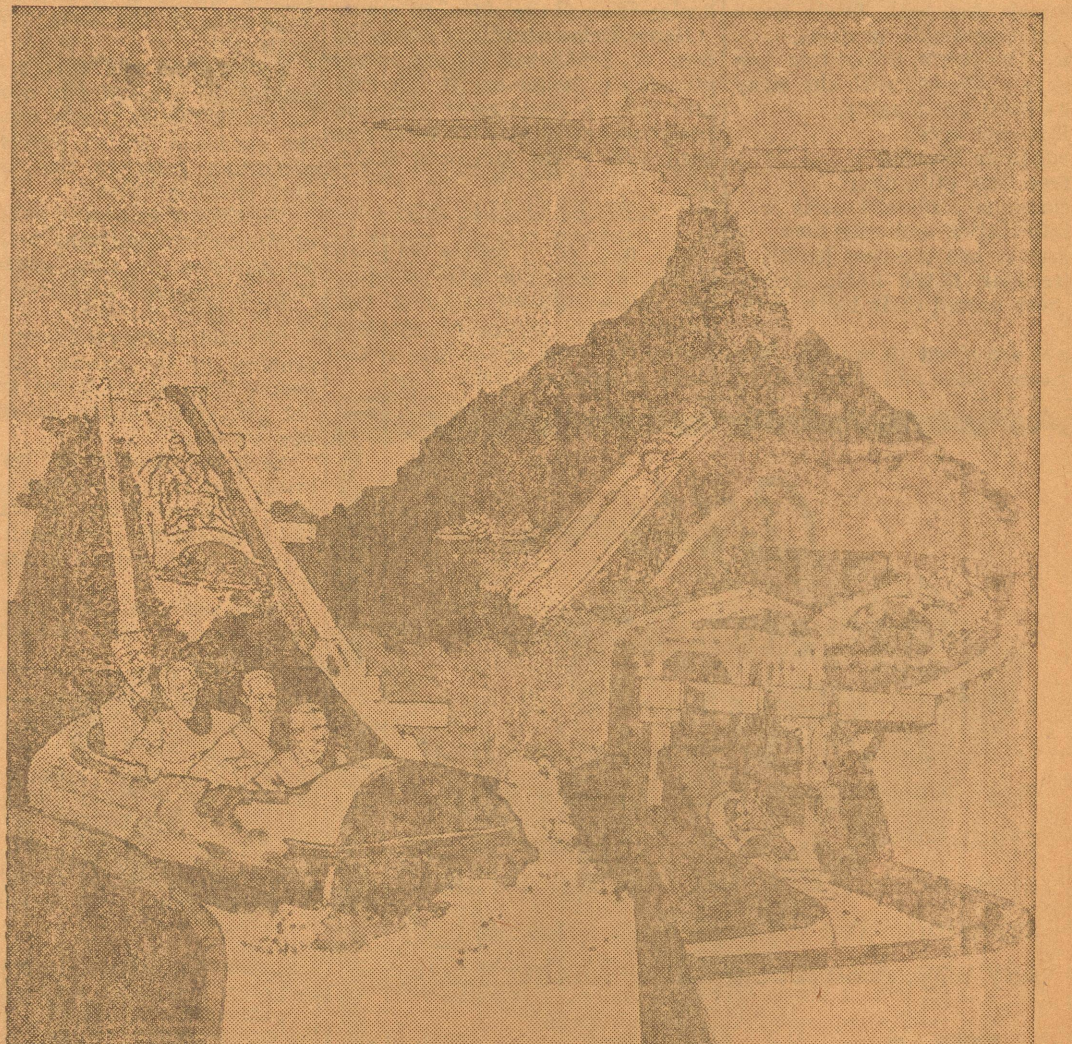

**Yarborough Cites Goals As Governor**

Fresh from his May 4th victory in the Democratic Primary which won him a run-off spot for the contest on June 1st, Don Yarborough continued to pledge his support of measures to make Texas tops among the states. He pledged an all-out drive for the Democratic nomination for Governor.

**Pledges Aid To Small Towns**  
Don Yarborough said one of the major goals of his administration as governor would be to help every small city in Texas obtain at least one new industry.

Yarborough said he would work to establish a special agency to work exclusively to help the smaller cities of the state attract industry.

His program, Yarborough said, would also include special "Industrial Recruiting Teams" to work with civic leaders across the state in telling their story around the nation to make new economic gains.

"These volunteer teams could open a new era of cooperation between management, labor, our academic community and our business people," Yarborough said.

Yarborough cited the work done by the Texas Industrial Commission in helping the state obtain new industry, but said its mission must be enlarged so that small towns have a separate organization to provide the critical help that is needed now.

"Many of our small towns are fighting sagging economy and a business depression because the industry of our nation has not discovered the potential of these cities," Yarborough said.

"Texas needs a realistic program to aid these cities in an economic revival and to open a new era of prosperity in the state," Yarborough said.

Yarborough said that if Texas obtains the new industry needed in its smaller cities it can cope with the exodus of young people from non-urban areas to the already over crowded cities.

"According to recent polls, 50% of the population want to live in small towns or rural areas, but 70% of the population live on 1% of the land," he said.

"We can no longer shrug off the problem of the exodus of young people from small towns and say 'let the cities worry about their new citizens.'"

"It is senseless to dry up small towns just to create urban population problems when the situation can be solved with imaginative leadership that is willing to find solutions."

Yarborough said he would call upon retired Texans to lend their

Projections based on a reasonable assumption indicate possible totals of 19.6 million persons 65 and over in the national population in 1970, 25 million by 1985, and more than 28 million at the beginning of the next century.

The 65 population continues to increase faster than the total population. Each day there is a net increase of 820 people aged 65, as approximately 3,900 65th birthdays are reached and more than 3,000 deaths occur in the older age group.

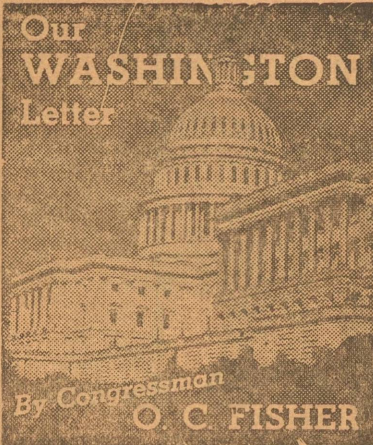

Austin, Texas.—Texas Liquor Control Board is heading for an early showdown test of its new get-tough policies on subterfuge private clubs.

In a surprise order, the Board outlawed cash sales in all bottle clubs.

Some club operators, who already were complaining mightily about an earlier LCB directive prohibiting manager-members from issuing guest cards to walk-in customers, were hard hit. One promptly filed a lawsuit here to enjoin the board's regulations.

Net result of the cash sale requirement will be to eliminate the casual guests, since operators would not want to run the risk of granting total strangers a month's credit for a highly-perishable commodity.

Hotel-motel clubs who expect to solve the problem by putting club charges on room tabs may find the Board's definition of a cash sale quite restrictive: "It shall be deemed that a cash sale has been made if payment for a service or commodity is made on the same date or within eight hours after the occurrence of such service or the delivery of such commodity."

Clubs also received a long list of new instructions for keeping records and running their affairs according to by-laws and through the boards of directors.

More rules are expected to be

forthcoming from the LCB. Times may be hard for all but strictly-private and proper clubs in the near future.

LCB Attorney Lynwood Elliott said he thinks the cash sale directive will restrict clubs: "I feel, quite frankly, that when you prohibit a club from making a cash sale it will be less inclined to serve the public at large and will start serving properly screened members."

Situation is expected to bring new pressure for liquor-by-the-drink legalization. Club owners claim they are being made political footballs.

#### Riot Control Training

All Department of Public Safety officers have undergone an intensive, accelerated riot control training program. Plans are drawn for maximum assistance to local authorities. State also is buying \$200,000 worth of anti-riot equipment for use of National and State Guards.

DPS reported it stands ready to make "major commitment" of personnel and equipment on request from a local law enforcement agency—although it hopes none will be necessary.

#### Courts Speak

Supreme Court held taxable natural gas used as fuel for engines that pump oil.

In a variety of other opinions, High Court ruled as follows:

—Lower courts were right in concluding that a Houston fireman was suspended improperly for buying two mink stoles and a color t-v set (believed to have been stolen) from another fireman. (Suspended firefighter denied any knowledge of stolen goods.)

—Women should be enjoined from operating an alleged house of prostitution near Brenham.

—American Travelers Insurance Company, Ltd., a Bahamas-based corporation, cannot do business in Texas without a state permit.

—A Refugio County woman who granted a pipeline easement across her property in 1943 is still stuck with the deal for future extension of parallel lines.

Thirteenth Court of Civil Appeals supported a Nueces county trial court view that voter registration applications cannot be submitted en masse.

Third Court of Civil Appeals held that a firm must pay \$11,556 in sales taxes, plus interest and penalties, on the cost of transporting materials to job sites.

Same court also ordered a new trial in a landowners' suit against the city of Temple for damages due to inadequate drainage of property; found the movie "Blood and Black Lace" doesn't have to be labeled "not suitable for young persons"; and gave Austin's Texas State Bank a go-ahead to move its quarters from the University of Texas area to the downtown district despite objections of neighboring City National Bank.

#### Attorney General Rules

Atty. Gen. Crawford C. Martin has held invalid an appropriations bill rider attempting to set up priority for restoring historical sites. This since the Parks and Wildlife Department is otherwise authorized to use its discretion in acquiring and rebuilding such sites.

In other new opinions, Martin held that:

—Proceeds received by the Army Board of the Texas National Guard in exchange for land near Camp Maxey must be deposited in the state treasury, and cannot be spent for purchase of land. However, other Board funds not in the treasury can be spent to buy land.

—County clerk of Parker county may accept for filing a city subdivision plat of property in an area overlapped by extraterritorial jurisdiction of two cities in the county if approved by the largest city's planning commission.

—Although dedicated for a 120-acre park in Colorado county, Hill Memorial Park Foundation is not exempt from ad valorem taxes.

#### Appointments

State Liquor Control Board named Homer M. DeGlandon of Austin as its chief of staff services and Donald R. Fishel of Boerne its director of special investigations. New LCB district supervisors are Haskell H. Hall, transferred from Amarillo to San Antonio; T. L. Baker, transferred from Beaumont to Amarillo; Henry C. Knowles, transferred from Austin to Victoria; and Doyle E. Davis, transferred from Wichita Falls to Beaumont.

Bruce B. Conway of Houston is the new director of manpower and communications for the Texas Department of Mental Health and Mental Retardation.

State Bar of Texas appointed Leon Jaworski of Houston and W. O. Shafer of Odessa to the governing house of delegates of the American Bar Association. Rupert N. Gresham of San Antonio was appointed to the ABA house for two years.

Before used for buying veterans land, money will be invested in short-term government securities to offset any interest costs accruing against the Veterans Land Board. Sadler said AAA bond rating and the excellent pay record of the Veterans Land Board made it possible to sell bonds below market.

#### Building, Business Drop Off

Both building and business activity dropped off sharply in March, according to the University of Texas Bureau of Business Research barometer.

Construction index fell almost 31 points from the previous month and

was 8% below March, 1967. However, the January-March overall average of index this year still is 12% above that for the first three months of 1967, due to the record February bulge.

March business index was 8% below the February value but was 3.3% above March 1966. Bureau reported.

Texas Aeronautics Commission certified King Flight Services, Inc. of Wichita Falls for scheduled service with Dallas.

Number of draft delinquency cases in Texas decreased from 1,028 to 970 in first quarter of

1968, State Selective Service Director Col. Morris S. Schwartz reports.

As a part of the new Texas Hill Country Trail, Texas Tourist Development Agency has arranged for President Lyndon Johnson's boyhood home, located 13 miles west of Johnson City, to be open thru June 9 from 1:00 to 5:00 p.m. Tuesdays, Wednesdays, Thursdays and Sundays except when the President is in residence at the ranch.

Water Development Board has contributed \$1,750 to an experimental project to be conducted by Dr. Horace R. Byers, dean of the College of Geological Science at Texas A&M University, to employ modern rainmaking techniques to storm clouds which develop within a 200-mile radius of the University between now and August.

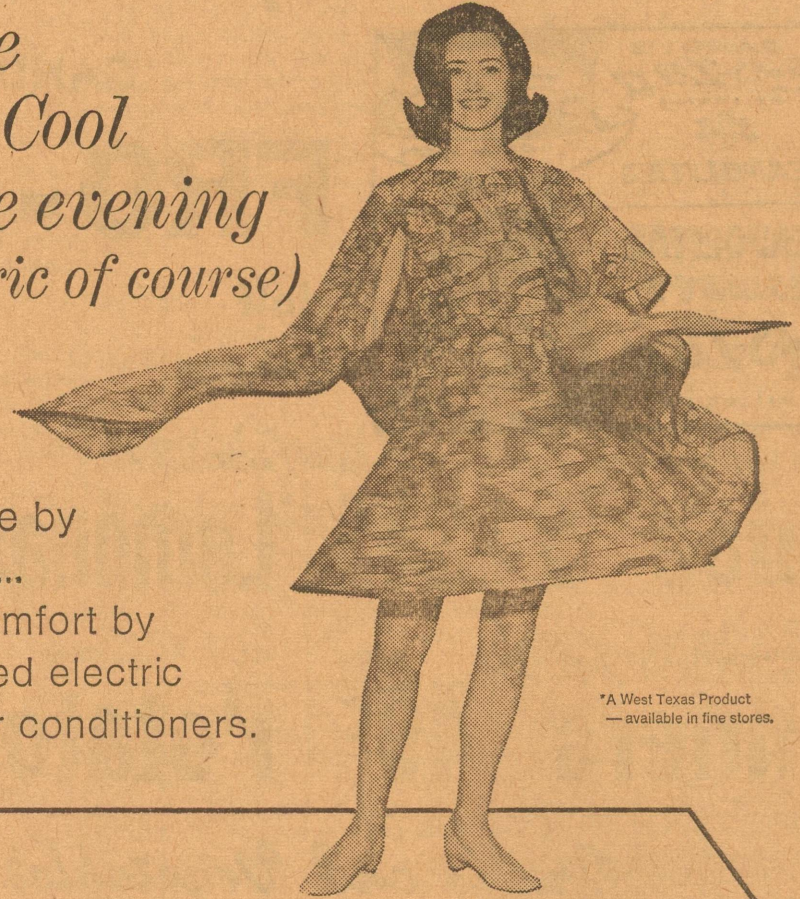

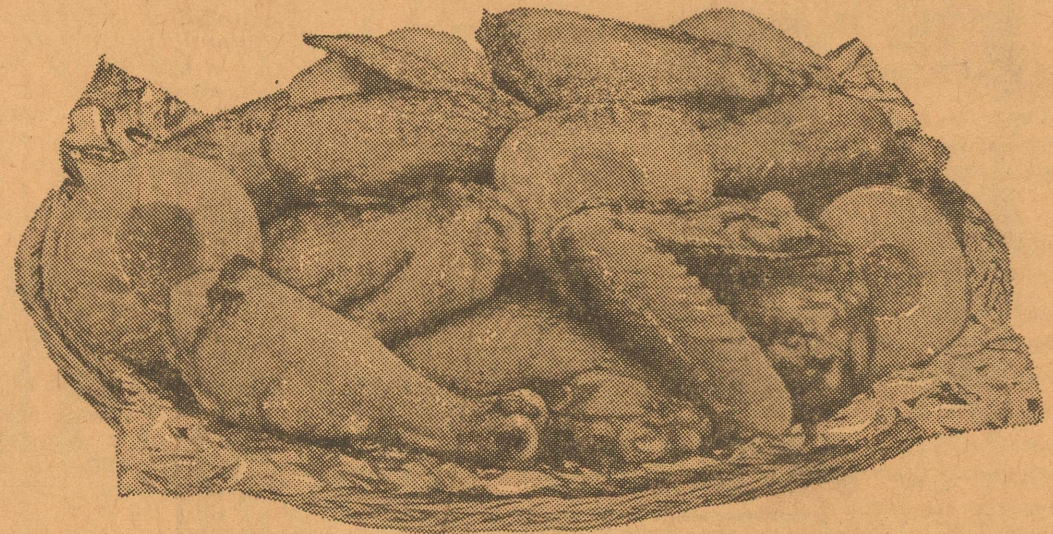
