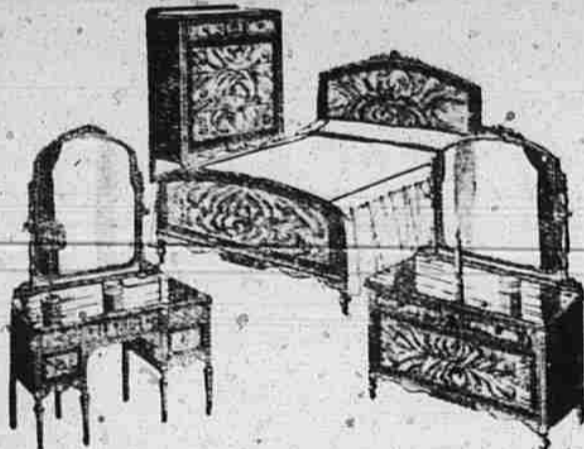

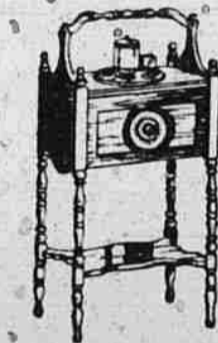

Milt Good Given 90-Day Furlough

AUSTIN—Governor Sterling has granted a 90-day furlough to Milt Good, serving 51 years as the alleged killer of two cattle inspectors, so he can make winter provision for his wife and eight children.

Good with Tom Ross, was convicted in Lubbock and Taylor counties in the killing of H. L. Robertson and W. D. Allison, inspectors for the Texas and Southwestern Cattle Raisers' association, who were investigating West Texas cattle thefts. The killings occurred in a small hotel at Seminole, where court was being opened and the inspectors were to appear as witnesses.

Good was released over protests of Dayton Moses, attorney for the Cattle Raisers' association, and by Robertson's widow.

The Ross-Good case were among one of the most famous ever been tried in West Texas. Big Spring citizens remembered the tragedies at Seminole, about ten years ago, when the inspectors were killed as they sat in the lobby of a small frame hotel.

The front door was opened a few inches, shots were fired and the two officers fell over dead as they sat in their chairs. Before Ross and Good could escape, Mrs. Robertson, who heard the shooting from the upstairs room, ran to a window and fired upon the pair, wounding Ross in the arm. His profuse bleeding made it necessary that he and Good give themselves up to officers.

The trials involved scores of witnesses for each side, including some of the most substantial citizens of West Texas and New Mexico both for and against the character of the defendants.

A prison break at Huntsville liberated the two, Ross escaping into Canada where he later was killed, reports said, by his own gun, and Good later being captured in the hills of Oklahoma.

In a recent rodeo at the Huntsville penitentiary, in which inmates participated, Good was the principal winner. Prior to the affair when involved him with the law, he had participated successfully in rodeos of this section, having been seen repeatedly in the local arena.

Liner Europa's Captain Undergoes An Operation Enroute Across Atlantic

NEW YORK (UP)—The liner Europa was due here this afternoon with her master, Captain Nicolaus Johnsen, recovering from an emergency operation performed at sea. The operation was Saturday night, and the patient is recovering but will be confined to ship's hospital while here.

Man Fatally Hurt On Snyder Ranch

O. W. Parramore, an elderly man, was injured fatally in a fall from a wagon on the Snyder ranch in eastern Howard county late Sunday, according to reports received here. No details of funeral arrangements were learned.

'Traveling' Hotel Of West Texas Oil Country Is Razed

The old Rig Hotel, at Hobbs, New Mexico, which was partially burned almost two years ago, is being torn down, after court fights which prevented the unsightly ruins of the old building from being molested. The Rig was owned by C. A. Jones and the fire which destroyed it was the major conflagration of the Hobbs boom.

The hotel, formerly known all over the West Texas oil fields as the "Texas," was originally built in Fort Stockton, apparently about the time the Pecos river was dug, according to available records, and was moved from that place to Big Lake when the boom struck there.

Another move was made, and the old hotel soon became known as the "wandering hotel" of the Permian basin. It landed in Poyte for the big boom there, and did a thriving business in serving oil workers and tourists who wanted to "see an oil field boom town."

When Hobbs broke loose as an oil boom town in early 1930, the "wandering hotel," by this time a confirmed boomer, arrived with the big crowd that rushes in pursuit of the flowing gold. During the erection of the building at that place a heavy wind came up after all the frame work had been put up, and the old boomer fell to the ground, killing one man and mauling a whole wing of the building.

When the building was razed, it was found to contain about 80 rooms. It is rumored that a settlement has been made between a mortgage company and the owners, which permitted the razing of the ruins.

Harry Woodring Of Kansas May Become Member Of Cabinet

WARM SPRINGS, Ga. (UP)—Discussion of the new administration's cabinet was revived with the announcement that Gov. Harry L. Woodring of Kansas would confer with President-elect Roosevelt. The former's name has been mentioned frequently in the speculation of Democrats believed in line for a post in the Roosevelt official family. He is regarded as an expert of the farm situation and as such, it was argued, would be capable of filling the position as Secretary of Agriculture.

Some of his friends were convinced the treasury portfolio would be offered Senator Carter Glass of Virginia and that of interior to Governor George Dern of Utah. James A. Farley, Democratic national chairman, was expected to become postmaster general.

Roosevelt will depart from Warm Springs tomorrow afternoon, going directly to New York City and from there to Albany. He will reach Albany Thursday, a day before the opening of the extraordinary session of the legislature.

1932 In Mexico Year Of Peace And Progress Publishers Are Told

DALLAS (UP)—The story of Mexico in 1932 as compared to former years is as important and one of peaceful progress, John R. Morris, manager of Mexico of the United Press told publishers at the annual meeting of the Texas Daily Press League here.

Morris said the old days when an American correspondent in Mexico was a war correspondent are gone. The spirit of adventure, he said, has had to make way for the spirit of peaceful progress.

Many of the leaders of armies whose battles once made front-page headlines in the United States now are busy with tasks which, while less spectacular, are equally important on both sides of the Rio Grande," Morris said.

Morris emphasized the necessity for closer relationships between Mexico and the people of Texas, that formation of "bonds of unity" would aid in development and enrich the people of Texas and Mexico.

Jim Says More Ought To Live Outside Town

Former Governor Speaks At Dallas Chamber Banquet

DALLAS (UP)—James E. (Farmer Jim) Ferguson, somewhat benign and fatherly in appearance, believes it will be "just too bad" for the nation, unless chambers of commerce work as hard to build up rural sections as they did in urban growth. "The chambers of commerce have passed so many resolutions to raise the population of cities that the resolutions have come true and hell's to pay. The thing to do now is to make a resolution for everybody that can move to the country," he gently told the Dallas chamber of commerce in annual banquet session last night.

Ferguson and his wife, governess of Texas, were ranking honor guests. Both former governors were cheered and applauded in their remarks. Mrs. Ferguson, in six sentences, acknowledged the honor she had received for her office with a promise to do more.

"Sweeping politics except to remember that when a man gets to the point where he can't run for office any more maybe he can render some real service," Ferguson talked informally on the part chambers of commerce played in bringing the nation to its present shape and the things he believes they should do now.

"We're beginning life over under worse conditions than our forefathers," he said. "We're all starting in debt. Chamber of Commerce will have to inform themselves on the new problems and conditions if we are going to get anywhere. Heretofore they've been doing the right thing as they saw it, accomplished a great work and left the country in quite a shape—but they did the best they knew how."

"We can't go on with the population half in town and half in country. It's ridiculous to think the farmer can make a living for himself and you fellows who live in town too. How long can Dallas hope to grow or stand when the people who produce the food and maintain are broke?"

"My conviction is that no town in the United States ought to concern itself with trying to increase its population. I think chambers of commerce ought to stop talking about building houses in town and start talking about building houses in the country. If you had been loping around the state like I have the last 18 years, my friends, you'd know the tragedy of it."

"You can drive in any direction

for 50 miles from Dallas and won't find one new house for every 20 miles. I'll give you a new hat for each new barn. I'll bet, yet, to see you can't buy two houses in 25 miles that won't cave in in ten years if left alone. "Half the families are out of doors—half of them climb up in the corners of their houses to keep from drowning like rats when it rains—all because you've talked the upbuilding of cities. If you don't talk building up the country it will be just too bad."

**How Would You Bid This Hand?**

In a previous article I showed  
you a hand containing a biddable  
suit and three high card (tricks), but  
one that should not be opened first  
or second hand. There are several  
three high card trick hands which  
must be passed in these positions.  
For example the following:

Spades—A-7-5-2.  
Hearts—A-K-4.  
Diamonds—5-3-2.  
Clubs—4-3-2.

This hand does not contain a bid-  
dable suit. The three high card  
tricks are not distributed in three  
suits, nor does the hand contain  
any tenace position, therefore it  
cannot be opened with one no  
trump and must be passed.

Spades—A-Q-5-2.  
Hearts—A-Q-5-2.  
Diamonds—5-3-2.  
Clubs—4-3-2.

Above is another three high card  
trick hand. In looking this hand  
over we find that it not only con-  
tains the required number of high  
card tricks, but also two biddable  
suits.

If we open with one spade and  
partner bids one no trump, what  
do we do? We cannot re-bid  
spades as we have only a four card  
suit. However, if necessary, we  
could bid hearts.

### Oklahoma City And Tulsa Enter Texas League, To Operate Coming Season As Circuit Of Ten Clubs

DALLAS—Tulsa and Oklahoma City officially have been admitted to the Texas League of Professional Baseball Clubs, it was learned Wednesday afternoon in a telegram received by The News from Robert S. Tarleton, business manager of the Dallas club, who is attending the annual convention of the minor leagues opening Wednesday in Columbus, Ohio. The same information was received by President Sol Dreyfuss of the Sters from his brother-in-law, Lawrence Pollock, also a stockholder in the club, who is with Tarleton.

The Texas League will be a ten-club circuit next year, Tarleton advised. It is understood that action, admitting the two Oklahoma cities to membership was taken Wednesday at a joint meeting between representatives of the Texas and Western Leagues. The latter circuit Tuesday relinquished its territorial claims on Tulsa and Oklahoma City to permit them to seek membership in the Texas League.

While the addition of these clubs or their substitution for two in the loop has been discussed annually, this is the first time since the 1927 convention in Dallas that the matter has been seriously considered. At that time they sought entrance but the Western League refused to grant them permission to leave its company.

A general reorganization is under way in the Western now, however, and its owners acceded to the wishes of the two Oklahoma managers, who have persistently expressed that their clubs would draw much larger crowds in the Texas loop. They have contended that their fans are sour on Western League ball and have affected a virtual boycott until they would be given Texas League status.

However, the two circuits come under the same classification, both being ranked as A leagues. In a test of their relative strength in 1922, the Tulsa team, winner of the Western pennant, defeated Mobile after that club had handed Fort Worth its only defeat under the management of Jake Atz in the Dixie series.

Tulsa has never been a member of the Texas League but Oklahoma City did operate in this loop for three years, 1910-11, 1912-13, and 1914-15. Oklahoma City had replaced Austin in 1909 and in turn was supplanted by Beaumont after the 1911 campaign.

In deciding upon a ten-club circuit for 1933, the Texas League will be more than an eight team fight for the first time in its history. It has been an eight-club organization

ever since 1906, the last season in which it operated with only six teams. The addition of the two Oklahoma clubs gives to the circuit two more experienced baseball men, Jack Holland, owner of the Oklahoma City team, is a veteran of many years in professional ball and is considered one of the shrewdest manipulators in the business. Art Griggs at Tulsa also is a veteran coming up from the playing ranks. Decision to operate as a ten-club circuit, including Dallas, Fort Worth, Houston, Beaumont, Galveston, San Antonio, Shreveport and the St. Louis Browns' farm which will remain in Longview or may be moved to Waco. A new division will be necessitated with the likelihood that Tulsa, Oklahoma City, Dallas, Fort Worth and Shreveport will be placed in the northern bracket with San Antonio, Houston, Galveston, Beaumont and Longview or Waco in the southern sector.
