Another Month Needed To Complete Pipeline Project

"They have been hiring everyone that wants to work," said D. J. Hebert, material clerk at the Northern Natural office in Eldorado this week, as he commented on the construction of a new pipeline from Hulldale gas plant to Northern's compressor station.

Years ago an 8-inch pipeline was laid from Sinclair's Hulldale plant to the compressor station, but it has lately proved to be too small to carry the volume of gas produced. To solve the problem another 8-inch line is being laid on the same right-of-way and parallel to the first one.

The distance is 12.9 miles and contract was awarded to Flint Engineering & Construction Company of Billings, Montana, who have a regional office in Odessa. Frank Kreie is chief inspector.

Construction has been under way since the first of June and it is estimated another thirty will be Welders needed for completion. and supervisory personnel have been imported by the company and have filled up most of the available rent facilities. State Capital News

The first called session of the 60th Legislature adjourned sine die at 12:45 p.m. on Wednesday, July 3 The mini-bottle bill advocated by

the Governor went down in defeat in the Senate and the general feeling among members of the Legislature was one of relief since this bill had been amended so many times and in such a manner that it was probably the sorriest piece of legislation that could have been foisted on the people of Texas.

There was one bill that did pass that, in my opinion, is a good bill and one that I supported. This was House Bill 16 which makes the carrying of guns, knives and other weapons by a person other than a commissioned peace officer into a place where alcoholic beverages are served for on-premises consumption a felony. In my opinion, this bill will discourage and reduce the number of murders that are committed each year in Texas because of a hot afternoon, a pint

of whiskey and Southern pride. A tax bill was passed which will increase the State sales tax by one cent effective October 1, 1968. This bill carries out my predictions of last week that instead of affecting a savings of \$50 million, it will increase the tax burden on the people of this state by approximately \$50 million. In other words, it total of \$100 million.

The appropriations bill was an example of no economy in government and I felt that it should be educed by many millions of dol-

This special session should point out to the people of Texas that annual sessions are not desirable and one-year appropriations are doubly costly to the taxpayers of this state.

I am looking forward to returning to my district and plan to travel throughout every county between now and this coming January. During this time I will be seeking your opinions and advice on what you think the next regular session of the Legislature should







Questions Answered On Social Security

Questions that pop up frequently at the San Angelo Social Security Office are: "Do social security benefits for children stop at age 18? "Do student benefits continue during the summer vacation?"
Ted F. Moellering, District Man-

ager, said until 1965 a child's benefits were stopped at 18 unless the child was severely disabled.

Since 1965, benefits have been available to a child of a retired, disabled, or deceased worker who is a full-time, unmarried student between the ages of 18 and 22. Mr. Moellering added that this not only applies to high school and college students, but also to those attending approved vocational or trade schools. Examples are barber schools and schools of nursing.

Student benefits continue during the summer vacation if the student meets two additional requirements. The period of non-attendance must not be more than four calendar months, and the student must intend to be a full-time student immediately following this period.

When a child who is receiving benefits reaches age 171/2, a notice is sent to the adult who receives the benefits for the child. The notice tells the adult to contact the social security office immedi ately if the child will be a fulltime student at age 13.

Failure to contact the office will cause his checks to stop the month before the child is 18.

Student benefits are terminated when a student marries, dies, is no longer a full-time student or

Tax Man Sam Sez:


TOPIC: Paying Estate Tax. If we have accumulated a few thousand as the years go on, we start to worry about how much tax our children will owe when we die. There is an inheritance tax in the State of Texas, and a federal estate tax to consider. On the federal tax you do not have to file an estate tax return unless your estate amounts to more than \$60,-000. If you own community property this goes up to \$120,000.

Publication No. 448, a Guide to Federal Estate and Gift Taxation is available for 25c from the Government Printing Office. A 25c investment could help you avoid a lot of problems for your heirs.





3. Mowing too closely weakens the grass and mowing too high builds up dead grass into tatch and may cause diseases.

4. Use a sharp well adjusted mower, which does a better job and makes for prettier grass.

Use as little fat as possible in gravies and sauces. Fats have a tendency to separate, but if used in smaller proportions, they will recombine when heated.

Use seasonings sparingly as some of them change during storage. Pepper gets stronger. Cloves may become stronger and discolor fro-

zen fillings. Garlie becomes stronger during storage and onions gradually lose flavor. Green peppers, sage and pimientos increase in strength.

It is important to cool cooked fcods promptly to prevent continued cooking. Foods lose flavor rap idly when held at high tempera tures. And warm foods invite bacteria growth, says the Texas A&M University nutritionist.

You can move the baking dish directly from the freezer to the oven with little danger of breakage, says the specialist.

You can freeze almost any type of creamed dish except those containing hard-cooked egg whites Avoid overcooking and cool rapidly in pan of ice water. Don't store longer than two to four months, advised Miss Reasonover.

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
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
