New C of C Leaders Starting To Function

A start is being made by the re-activated Chamber of Commerce since their initial meeting of over a week ago.

One of the programs discussed at that meeting was ways to advertise Schleicher county as a virtually un hunted deer area in order to bring into the county its share of hunters.

Accordingly this week Director Toney McMillan oiled up his church's mimeograph machine and ran off about 150 letters to be sent to ranchers in order to secure a listing of all available hunting leases in the county. The letter contains a form to be filled out and mailed back to the C of C.

After this information has been compiled it will be used later in the season in an advertising campaign designed to reach those interested.

In addition it is planned to have leaflets printed pointing out facilities offered by the city and county which are to be left at those places where tourists and transients are in the habit of stopping—cafes, filling stations and package stores.

The new interim group is now just getting started and is more or less just feeling its way. Under consideration is a sort of "woman's auxiliary" which may be needed to prevent the organization from slipping into inaction. Pat Sykes and Elnora Love have already been appointed to the interim board of directors and other members are expected to be drafted.

Attend Firemen's Convention In Austin

The State Firemen's and Fire Marshals' Association 92nd Annual Convention was held recently in Austin. Some 1300 persons attended.

Credentials Committee reported a total of 426 voting delegates, officers and past presidents of the association attended the business meetings. Palmer West of Eldorado was recognized as one of the past presidents. Delegates represented 165 fire departments and district associations. Fire Chief Lum Davis was the voting delegate for the Eldorado Fire Dept.

Elevated to the position of President of the Association was Bob Murphy of Nacogdoches, replacing Hal H. Hood of Dallas County, president for the past year.

Mrs. Palmer West of Eldorado was recognized as one of the past presidents present. Mrs. Bill Hubble was the voting delegate from Eldorado. Mrs. Jimmie Harris gave the one minute report from Eldorado. In pumper races McAllen won the traveling trophy with a time of 15.0 seconds. In the ladies pumper races, La Marque women posted the lowest time at 16.4 seconds. 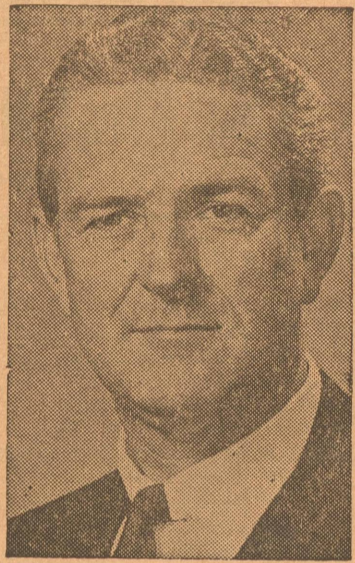

Connally And Party Visit Here Tuesday

Now serving in his final term as Governor of Texas, John Connally and his party of about 40 state dignitaries, arrived at 1:30 p.m. Tuesday for a 20-minute stop in Eldorado and a tour of El Dorado Woolen Mills.

Quite a crowd of local people turned out to greet the governor and his party, who were on a two-day tour of Texas Forts. They had lunch in San Angelo and were through here on their way to Fort McKavett and other historic points farther east.

The Governor was taken on a tour of the mill by a group headed by Raymon Mobley, chairman of the Chamber of Commerce; Eldon Calk, mayor of Eldorado; Tom Ratliff, county judge; and Penfield Barker, new owner and manager of the mill.

Governor Connally expressed interest in all operations he saw on his tour, took time to shake hands with most employees with whom he came in contact, and stated that he hoped to be back sometime for a more detailed tour of the mill's operations.

The gubernatorial party traveled in two large buses and several automobiles.

Their two-day loop through West Texas had the express purpose of promoting the Texas Forts Trail. Cities and towns included on the loop are Abilene, San Angelo, Eldorado, Fort McKavett, Menard, Mason, Brady, Brownwood, Mineral Wells and Jacksboro.

Some Reductions Set For Long Distance Rates

A reduction of long distance rates goes into effect for General Telephone Company of the Southwest customers August 1 as a result of the recent ruling by the Federal Communications Commission which ordered the American Telephone and Telegraph Company to reduce interstate long distance rates by \$20 million annually.

The reductions will be 5 and 10c from the charge for the first three minutes on daytime weekday station-to-station calls. These are calls placed between 7:00 a.m. and 5:00 p.m. Monday thru Friday.

This is the 23rd time interstate rates have been cut since coast to coast service began in 1915. During that time, the cost of transcontinental calls has dropped to as little as 75c (station-to-station between midnight and 7:00 a.m.) from \$20.70 in 1915.

Long distance rates have been cut in half since 1945 in contrast to 77% rise in the consumer price index.

Rail Hearing Set In Austin Saturday

Santa Fe's proposal to discontinue their depot here in Eldorado comes up at a hearing in Austin this Saturday, August 3rd. It is set for 10:00 a.m. in the Ernest O. Thompson building.

Santa Fe submitted their proposal several weeks ago and several Eldorado individuals and organizations protested, necessitating postponement of the formal hearing before the Railroad Commission.

The railroad is seeking to do away with their depot here and make this a "Prepaid Freight Station." If their proposal is approved there will no longer be a depot building here or a depot agent.

Santa Fe's line from San Angelo south has served the towns of Christoval, Eldorado and Sonora since it was put into service in 1930.

It is indefinite if anyone from here will attend the hearing Saturday in Austin in person. The matter was mentioned at the meeting yesterday of the Lions Club. The letters of protest which have already been filed will presumably be read at the hearing this Saturday.

12 Safety Rules To Prevent Accidental Poisoning

1. Keep all medicines and household poisons (cleaning fluids and insecticides) out of the reach of children.
2. Never refer to medicine as "candy" to your child.
3. Read all labels carefully and follow directions.
4. Don't take a medicine prescribed for someone else.
5. Never increase the dosage or the frequency of a dose of medicine—unless your doctor suggests it.
6. Throw out the contents of all old medicine bottles.
7. Keep internal medicines in one cabinet and external medicines and poisons in another.
8. Do not place poisonous liquids in soda bottles.
9. Throw out all unlabeled medicines and containers.
10. Do not take or give medicines in the dark—when you may be sleepy.
11. Protect your skin when using insecticides, solvents or cleaning agents. Remember some products can be absorbed through the skin; use as directed.
12. If someone takes a potentially toxic substance in your home, call a physician immediately. Don't wait for symptoms to appear.

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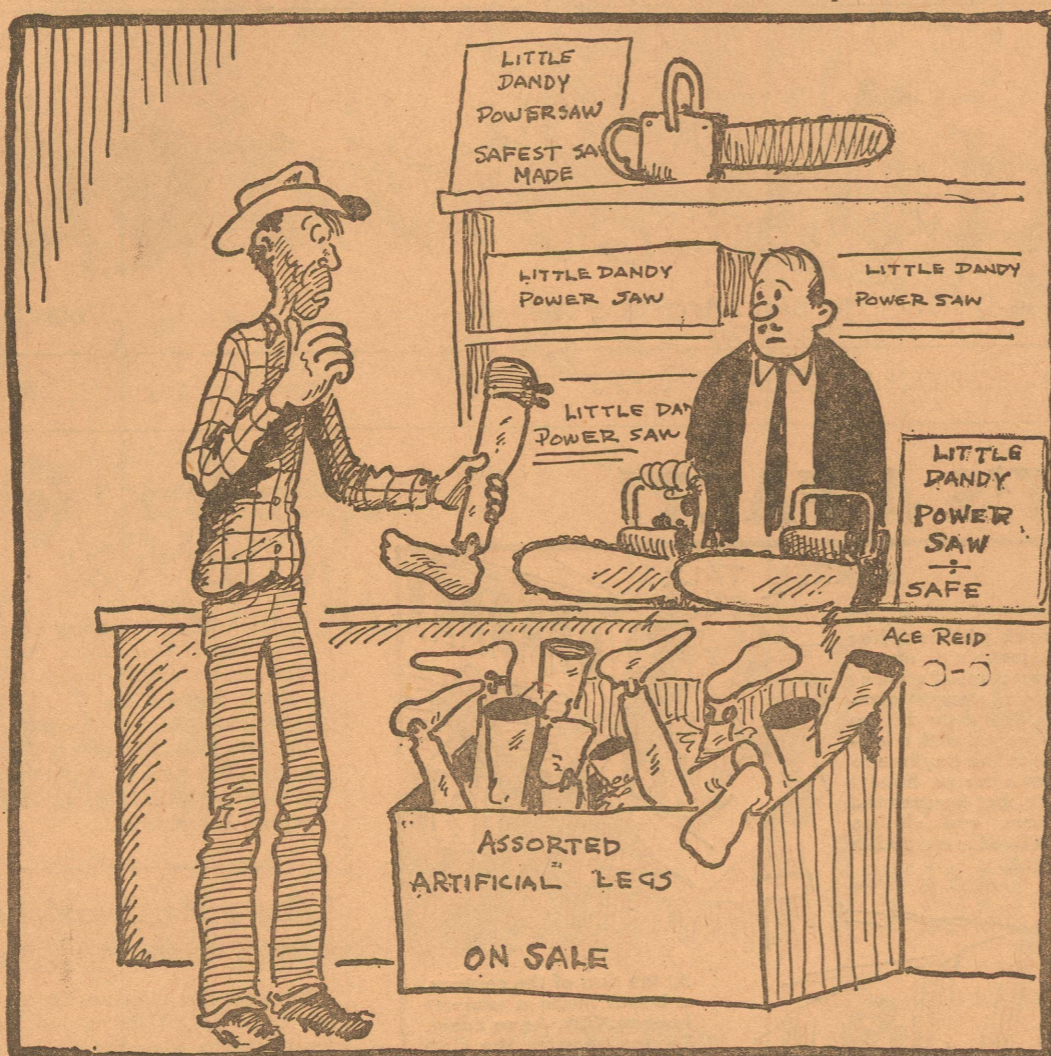

Famous Paper On Display At HemisFair

San Antonio.—Lafayette's famous farewell address to the United States—a priceless document done in his own handwriting—is one of the most treasured items on display at the \$10 million Institute of Texan Cultures at the 1968 World's Fair.

Gov. John Connally obtained the loan of the original manuscript from Count Rene and Josee de Chambrun after a visit to France before the opening of HemisFair to study priceless objects owned by Count de Chambrun, a descendant of Lafayette.

The manuscript, on display in the French section of the sprawling permanent structure, was prepared in longhand in 1825 by the famous French hero of the American Revolution to deliver in a farewell speech to the President and Congress.

The Chambruns, cousins of the Commissioner General of the French Pavilion at HemisFair, agreed to loan the manuscript and a personal book of Lafayette to the pavilion for the extent of the fair. This is the first time any of Lafayette's possessions have been removed from the castle.

Recently, the Chambruns also decided to allow one photocopy of the speech to be made, which was presented to be a permanent part of the collection at the Institute.

After the 1825 speech, Lafayette returned to France with a disease then believed to be tuberculosis. Doctors prescribed his castle be plastered with a certain dehumidifying plaster, which apparently saved his life. Also, the castle has stayed so perfectly dry that all of Lafayette's possessions are perfectly preserved.

Gov. Connally and his wife first met the Chambruns while attending a special French tea called a goeter, reserved for affairs of high society and diplomacy.

Mrs. Connally asked for permission to borrow something from the castle at that time and was denied. Later, the Chambruns reconsidered and sent the manuscript and the book, "Petite Guerre".

Time spent in readying the combine for harvest this year could mean the difference between profit and loss for grain sorghum producers in Schleicher county.

With heavier heads and more grain to harvest this summer, producers need to have their machines in top condition to get as much of the seed out in good condition as possible.

The concave clearances and cylinder speeds should be set according to the operator's manual—changes should be made to fit field conditions for best results.

A combine kept in top shape means less down-time, and less down-time in this year of unpredictable weather could avoid disaster.

Each morning before going into the field a minimum of 45 minutes to one hour is recommended to check all parts of the combine to make sure there will be a minimum of problems in the field.

—Checking all belts and chains.
—Making sure all air intakes are clean and free from dust and trash.

The air cleaner should be checked twice each day.

—Cleaning all grates and sieves to prevent buildups of trash. They should be cleaned to prevent "honeydew" or "syrup" from forming obstructions.

—Cooling system should be filled with water and the radiator screen cleaned.

—Following manufacturer's recommendations for cleaning, oil changes and lubrication. In the heavy, dusty fields, do NOT exceed operator's manual limits.

It is most important to keep the outside of the combine clean to restrict fire hazards. A dry or CO-2 fire extinguisher should be easy to reach at all times.

A notepad kept on the combine during operation is invaluable. By taking note of adjustments, trouble spots and part replacements, the process of readying the combine during the winter months is made much easier and more thorough.

By following a strict routine of checking the combine from top to bottom, and replacing worn parts, the producer may keep from losing a \$10,000 crop because of a 50c part which is difficult to replace quickly.

Secret: Something you tell one person at a time.

Small grain planting time is nearly on us, and the choice of variety can prove to be very important in obtaining satisfactory yields.

Variety choice is influenced by whether the crop is seeded on dryland or is to be irrigated, is to be grown under low or high fertility levels, and whether it is to be used for grazing or grain production, or a combination of the two. Disease or insect reaction is important, as is lodging and shattering.

According to recently revised recommendations, wheat varieties Caddo, Tascosa, and Bison are best suited for Schleicher county.

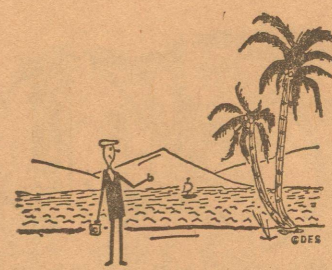
Oat varieties, Alamo-X, Ora, and Moregrain are recommended, but where forage production is the major consideration, varieties Mustang, Bronco, and New Nortex should be used.

Barley producers should use varieties Kearney, Cordova and Harrison to insure best yields.

Varieties of rye best suited for Schleicher county are Ebon, Gater and Explorer.

Participation in water sports continues to increase in Texas as do deaths from drownings and accidents.

Many of the deaths could be prevented, especially in the case of swimming, if the rules of water safety are always observed.

Suggestions for making swimming safer and more enjoyable:

Never swim alone, except in an emergency. Use the buddy system, and be sure, in the case of farm ponds, that rescue equipment is handy on shore if it is needed.

Swim only in areas that have been designated as safe. If hazards are present, you should know about them.

Never swim in ponds, creeks, rivers, or other bodies of water which are known to be unsanitary.

Never dive into a body of water unfamiliar to you and never force beginning swimmers into deep water, nor push them from the bank.

Learn to recognize your swimming and diving capabilities and keep within them and do not enter the water when overheated or tired.

It is not a good idea to jump or dive into cold water. This can pro-

duce a shock.

In case of trouble, remain as calm as possible and call for assistance. Never call for help unless it is needed. And remember that the swimming pool is no place for "horse play" and careless behavior. A thoughtless act can lead to tragedy.

You can tell when you are on the right road—it's upgrade.

Thirty-three cases of screwworms were reported Thursday of last week and 19 more on Friday. Total for the week 145. This compares to 171 cases last week, making it the second worst week.

There have been 1,303 cases reported in Texas in 1968—1,303 positive cases. No cases have been reported from Schleicher county.

Thanks to W. R. Bearce, former county judge, for turning in a case July 23rd. The vial was not screwworm, but does show vigilance. That is the only vial turned in in two weeks and the 3rd from the county in July; all, thank goodness, not screwworms.

Out-Of-State Visitors Helped By Texas Highway Department

Austin, Tex.—More people than ever before want to know what to see and do in Texas.

Most of them ask—and get the answer from—the Texas Highway Department.

In fact, 46% more visitors were helped by the Department in the first six months of this year than in the same period of 1967.

State Highway Engineer J. C. Dingwall reported today that travel services rendered to visitors from January through June this year were 502,326. In the first six months of last year, the total was 342,115.

This includes assistance to travelers given at Tourist Information Bureaus as well as inquiries answered by the Highway Department's Austin offices.

Altogether, nearly a million persons have requested and received travel services during the first half-year from the Texas Highway Department.

Comparatively, services rendered by the seven State-line Tourist Information Bureaus which were in operation in 1967 are up 30.4% for the first half of 1968. Included are bureaus at Anthony, Denison, Gainesville, Orange, Texarkana, Waskom and Wichita Falls.

Two new bureaus opened this year at highway gateways in Amarillo and Laredo. The Highway Department also operates the Capitol Information Center in Austin and a special HemisFair center in the Institute of Texan Cultures.

"Each of the Department's 11 centers are operating at near-capacity now during the peak of the recreational travel season," Dingwall said.

"Trained travel counselors greet and assist visitors with their travels in Texas," he said. "Our travel counselors strive to encourage people to see more of our State."

Austin, Tex.—Campaigns will be shaping up soon on 14 more amendments to the state constitution. All 14 of the proposed changes in the state's basic laws will be voted on at the general election November 5. Some are far-reaching, others routine.

Here are the amendments in the order in which they will appear on the November 5 ballot:

1. Revising provisions for management and administration of the state employee's retirement system and permitting investment in securities other than government bonds.
2. Raising the state's welfare spending ceiling from \$60 million to \$75 million.
3. Permitting investment of the Permanent University Fund by UT regents in certain types of securities, within the "prudent man rule."
4. Allowing Dallas County to issue road bonds on vote of property taxpayers.
5. Authorizing a raise in state legislators' salary from \$4,800 to \$8,400 a year and extending the per diem expense allowance of legislators (\$12 a day) to 140 days of a regular lawmaking session. (Present limit is 120 days.)
6. Allowing the legislature to exempt from property taxes equipment installed by industrialists to control air or water pollution.
7. Phasing out the state property tax after Dec. 31, 1976, beginning next year, except that portion for higher education institutions.
8. Eliminating the requirement that the governor, secretary of state and comptroller approve contracts for printing and paper.
9. Providing for contributions to the teacher retirement system on the basis of full salaries. (Contributions now are limited to \$504 a year.)
10. Allowing the legislature to provide for refund of state tax on cigars and tobacco products sold at retail in Texarkana.
11. Authorizing the legislature to permit consolidation of offices and governmental functions in El Paso and Tarrant counties.
12. Giving the legislature power to authorize cities and counties to issue revenue bonds for industrial development purposes and permit private concerns to operate plants

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thus financed.
13. Exempting from property tax certain property temporarily stored in public warehouses.

14. Spelling out that legislators will not be ineligible for other offices because their terms extend a few days into January.

GOP Off For Miami

Most Texas Republican delegates to the GOP national convention will be shuffling off to Miami Beach this week end. Opening session is Monday, August 5.

First caucus of the Texans (who have 56 votes in the presidential-vice presidential nominating procedure) is scheduled for 3:00 p.m., Sunday (Aug. 4).

Sen. John Tower and Mrs. Tobin Armstrong of Armstrong serve on the convention platform and resolutions committee. Douglas R. DeCluitt of Waco and Mrs. Malcolm Milburn of Austin serve on the credentials committee; Jim Collins of Dallas and Mrs. Richard M. Sowell of McAllen, permanent organization; Paul Eggers of Wichita Falls and Mrs. Basil E. Atkinson Jr. of Lufkin, rules and order of business.

Democrats Preparing Too

Democrats are getting ready for their own big pow-wow in Chicago starting August 26.

Gov. John Connally, Texas delegation chairman and favorite son candidate for the presidency, announced these appointments to convention posts:

Secretary of State Roy Barrera of San Antonio, delegation secretary; Cecil Burney of Corpus Christi and Mrs. Roland Boyd of McKinney, resolutions and platform committee; Will D. Davis of Austin and Miss Claudia Brummett of Amarillo, credentials committee; Tom Gordon of Abilene and Miss Julianan Cowden of Alvarado, rules and order of business; Mrs. Horace Botsford of Corpus Christi and M. J. Anderson of Austin, committee on permanent convention organization.

Also, Rhea Howard, Wichita Falls, committee to notify the presidential candidate of nomination; Mrs. Hilda B. Weinert of Seguin, committee to notify vice-presidential nominee; J. C. Looney of Edinburg, honorary convention vice-president; J. C. Martin of Laredo, honorary assistant vice-president; Ralph McCullough of Houston, honorary secretary; Hunter McLean of Fort Worth, honorary assistant secretary; and John Mobley of Austin, delegation sergeant-at-arms.

Connally Trims Budget

Governor Connally trimmed the 1969 state budget enacted by the special legislative session \$1.3 million and sternly decried lawmakers for setting up \$1.4 million in Agriculture Department appropriations as a lump sum item which he could not veto selectively.

Governor also vetoed seven controversial riders including those which sought to cut off funds for policing air pollution control by cotton gins and prevent use of state planes and helicopters to catch traffic law violators. Connally took veto axe to these spending items:

\$600,000 for temporary building to house the comptroller's department; \$275,000 for two new elevators in the capitol; \$187,500 for the Fort Lavaca causeway state park; \$90,000 for Somervell county state park land; \$91,000 for legal clerks in 13 courts of civil appeals; \$50,000 for insurance claim investigation; \$200,000 for Blinn College to operate Old Washington State Park museum; \$17,500 for a deputy administrator for the Liquor Control Board; \$16,500 for assistant executive director of state board of control; and \$13,000 for assistant director of auditing for LCB.

Court Speaks

State Supreme Court refused to hear John Robert McClelland's suit to force Harris County GOP Chairman Mrs. W. M. Palm and State GOP Chairman Peter O'Donnell to certify him as the Republican candidate for the House of Representatives in the November election.

McClelland got 6,659 votes to his closest opponent's 2,992 in the GOP primary race. But the county chairman refused to certify McClelland, claiming he would not have lived in the district for a full year prior to the November 5 election.

A Dallas golfer who injured his back when he was thrown from a golf cart at Dallas' Riverlake Country Club has won a new trial in his damage suit for \$134,000 against the club. High Court approved the move for George A. McRay after a Dallas court had ruled in favor of the club. McRay claims the club was negligent in allowing high grass to obscure a stump off the fairway on the 18th hole. Cart McRay was riding hit this stump and McRay was thrown out.

Court refused to order Land Commissioner Jerry Sadler to erase his forfeiture on a 5,524-acre West Texas sulphur lease claimed by Cobra Oil & Gas Corporation of Wichita Falls. When the Court heard the case on April 17, the state claimed that Cobra not only waited months too long to pay the first rental, but waited 300 days after filing the lease with Culbertson, Pecos and Reeves counties to file with the Land Office and 100 days is the limit.

Action Sparked

Faced with the January 1 deadline for a regulation prohibiting intrastate shipments of cattle from counties having no certification for brucellosis control, several counties are hurrying into action to secure certification.

Animal Health Department reports three counties—Hemphill, Orange and Starr—qualified for certification during June. Cameron and Hidalgo counties qualified for recertification.

Sixty-eight counties are in the process of testing initial certification.

Screwworm Danger

State and federal animal health experts are becoming worried at the increase in screwworm infestation cases being filed this year. To date 1,125 cases have been reported in 1968.

After the sterile fly program was inaugurated in 1962, the screwworm count fell below 300 cases by 1964.

The rapid increase in cases this year is blamed on extremely wet weather in South and West Texas which has made a climate especially suited for the worms and their parent screwworm flies.

Ranchers are warned to perform surgical operations (dehorning and castration) only if maximum safety precautions are taken to prevent fly infestation.

New Air Routes

Texas Aeronautics Commission has approved two new airlines for flights into Dallas.

Miller Aircraft won approval for flights between Waco and Dallas and Fleetway Airlines was approved for flights between Tyler and Dallas. Fleetway also won approval for flights between Texarkana and Longview.

Attorney General Rulings

Atty. Gen. Crawford Martin says that the Supreme Court's ruling that a disputed 305 acres in the Athey Oil Field (near Fort Stockton) is state land will mean recovery of a million dollars for the Texas school fund.

In recent opinions, Martin concluded that:

—Val Verde county commissioners can transfer Val Verde Memorial Hospital to county hospital authority.

—County hospitals can aid in mental health and mental retardation services.

Flavor Chicken With Herbs Three herbs that have an affinity for chicken are thyme, rosemary and marjoram. Sprinkle them over chicken when roasting it, or mix them with flour used for coating chicken to be pan fried. In the recipe here, the herb fried chicken is dressed with a pineapple sauce and served sprinkled with almonds.

Three Herb Chicken 1 large egg, slightly beaten 1 (3-pound) fryer, cut up 2 tablespoons milk 1/2 cup corn oil 1/2 cup sifted flour 1 (8-ounce) can crushed pineapple 1 teaspoon salt 1 tablespoon lemon juice 1/2 teaspoon pepper 1 tablespoon corn starch 1/4 teaspoon thyme leaves 1/2 cup water 1/4 teaspoon rosemary leaves 1/4 teaspoon marjoram leaves 1/4 teaspoon onion salt 1/4 cup toasted slivered almonds Combine egg and milk. Mix flour, salt, pepper, thyme, rosemary, marjoram and onion salt. Dip chicken pieces into egg mixture, then into seasoned flour, coating completely. Heat corn oil in skillet over medium heat or in electric frypan following manufacturer's directions. Add chicken and brown on all sides, turning as needed. Reduce heat, cover and cook slowly until chicken is tender, 40 to 45 minutes. Remove chicken and keep warm. Stir crushed pineapple and lemon juice into mixture in skillet increasing heat to medium. Cook 5 minutes. Mix corn starch and water. Stir into pineapple mixture. Stirring constantly, bring to boil and boil 1 minute. Serve pineapple sauce with chicken. Sprinkle with almonds. Makes 4 servings.

Completes Course At Job Corps Center

San Marcos, Texas.—Last fall, Armando Martinez, an eighth grade dropout and the son of Mrs. Rachel Martinez in Eldorado, thought being a janitor's assistant in the local high school was the only job he could maintain with his limited education.

Then he heard about Job Corps. Today, after less than 4 months at the Gary Job Corps Center, he became the NUMBER 1,000TH corpsman to pass the GED test (General Educational Development) and receive a high school equivalency diploma. With this goal accomplished, Martinez is now setting his sights on college.

"Martinez's progress, to those of us who have watched and help-

ed, is amazing," says Kent Finley, chairman of the GED program. "After preliminary testing in his first week at Gary, he was found to be extremely weak in many areas of the language skills and was immediately placed in basic education classes. It was here that his abilities brought him to the attention of staff members."

Even though Martinez barely met the reading requirements of 7.5, he was encouraged to enroll in GED classes. "We recognized his potential, but usually the odds would be about 50-50 for a student like Martinez to pass the complicated test in even six months," Finley said.

Despite the odds, Martinez knew he would succeed... and at an astonishing rate. Normally, students spend three hours a day in their academic classes with breaks for lunch, one hour in P.E. and the remainder of the day in vocational training. But not Martinez—he double-timed almost every minute of his daily schedule.

GED instructors found Martinez outside the classroom door ready to go to work long before others arrived. More times than not he worked through his allotted lunch hour and never took the 10-minute breaks between classes. Also, if the GED center was still open after he finished in the vocational shop, he would return for more study. "Actually he was putting in just as much time in class as the center instructors," said Finley. The steady effort did pay off with a four-year academic gain in barely four months, and a high school equivalency diploma for college entrance.

Corpsman Martinez is somewhat modest about his achievements. He credits this success to the Gary Center and "especially to a very nice teacher in my hometown who looked me up one night while I was cleaning floors to tell me about Job Corps." He applied the next day, was accepted and on his way to San Marcos within the month. Martinez says Job Corps "is the best thing that could ever happen to me or anyone, for that matter, who leaves school to become the family breadwinner and then has to plead for even the lowest paying jobs. I never thought an opportunity to better myself could be possible." As the son of a domestic maid and with three younger brothers depending on his income, Martinez carried the major financial burden for two years, and his future was uncertain until the Job Corps chance.

Besides being an outstanding student in his academic work, Martinez has also excelled in his vocational area of Retail Sales. Instructors find him to be a diligent student with a concrete goal in mind—that of completing every level in his occupation to pay his way thru college this fall with part-time work. His record of leadership is another asset to his credit. He serves as an assistant dormitory manager and is a member of the Gary Explorer Scouts.

In September, Martinez plans to enter Southwest Texas State College and major in Spanish. After receiving his degree, he hopes to become a border patrolman in California or on the Texas border.

Measures Approved Before Aug. Recess

On the eve of an August recess, the House worked overtime last week in clearing its decks of the so-called "must" legislation. A "gun" bill was finally approved, a higher education measure passed, the Federal highway program extended, and there was final approval of a mammoth Federal aid for housing program.

Following the recess, the Congress is to be called back for another session following the national conventions. This is to enable the Senate to catch up with its work and debate the confirmation of Abe Fortas and Homer Thornberry. Thus, by calling Congress back—chiefly to enable the Senators to deal with Fortas, the cost for another month of wrangling over the latest Supreme Court appointment will exceed a million dollars.

Also approved last week was a bill which gives labor unions the right to participate in the control of so-called "development funds." This is money collected and paid by management. The workers contribute nothing into the funds, which are used by industry (usually construction industry) to improve and promote sale of its products. I voted against this measure because it seems to me those who pay the money should control its use.

Cotton Aiming For Young People's Sales

A program directed toward selling cotton's qualities to those who influence great numbers of consumers is now under way in the Rolling Plains, according to Charles G. Bragg, executive vice president of Rolling Plains Cotton Growers, Inc.

Acting on the national statistic that 50% of the U. S. population is 25 years or younger, and that teen agers as a group have a discretionary buying power of \$12 billion annually, a program has been initiated to get cotton's story before the youngsters.

Through research and promotion program of the Cotton Producers Institute with funds provided by the \$1 per bale chipped in by the producers, special kits and films on cotton products are being supplied home economic teachers in both high schools and colleges and to extension home economists.

These teachers and extension agents will contact nearly six million teenage girls who spend more than \$1.5 billion a year on clothes. An average high school girl spends around \$240 a year for clothes and her college counterpart will average \$516 annually.

One of the major retail chains is being supplied films relating to the qualities of cotton. The chain, in turn, is getting these films into the hands of the home economics teachers and home economists.

It is estimated each teacher will have between 125 and 150 students a year in her classes. Multiply this by the number of home economics teachers in the country, conservatively estimated at 40,000 and in five years, 25-30 million consumers will have been influenced toward cotton.

On the local level, 50 special teaching kits have been furnished RPCG with the compliments of Tom McElroy, manager of Sears, Roebuck and Co. of Abilene. RPCG, in turn, will furnish the kits to area schools.

Developed by the National Cotton Council, the kit is designed as a complete teaching unit on cotton for the intermediate grades. It includes a detailed teaching guide, actual cotton samples as it moves in various forms from field to consumer, and supporting material.

"You can bet your bottom dollar," Bragg said, "Young people are being exposed to propaganda about nylon, dacron, orlon and the host of other fibers which have made the scene since 1943. If cotton is to maintain its competitive position, it is essential that we reach these young consumers who will be the nation's breadwinners and homemakers of tomorrow."

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT
NUMBER ONE ON THE BALLOT (SJR39)

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION No. 39 proposing an amendment to Subsection (a) of Section 62, Article XVI of the Constitution of Texas, relating to establishment of a retirement, disability and death compensation fund for officers and employees of the state, so as to create as an agency of the State of Texas the Employees Retirement System of Texas, vesting the general administration and responsibility of the proper operation of said system in a state board of trustees to be known as the State Board of Trustees of the Employees Retirement System of Texas, authorizing said Board to invest assets of said system in various obligations and subjects of investment, subject to certain restrictions stated therein and such other restrictions as may hereafter be provided by law; providing that contributions of members and the state shall not exceed at any time six per centum (6%) of the compensation paid to each such person by the state; providing that such Amendment shall be self-enacting; providing for the necessary election, form of ballot, proclamation, and publication; and declaring legislative intent that the adoption of this Joint Resolution shall constitute repeal of Senate Joint Resolution No. 3, previously adopted by this the 60th Legislature, so that the proposition as set forth in this Resolution may be submitted to the voters of this state in lieu of the proposition contained in Senate Joint Resolution No. 3.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
Section 1. That Subsection (a) of Section 62, Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to read hereafter as follows:

"Section 62. (a) The Legislature shall have the authority to levy taxes to provide a State Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation Fund for the officers and employees of the state, and may make such reasonable inclusions, exclusions, or classifications of officers and employees of this state as it deems advisable. The Legislature may also include officers and employees of judicial districts of the state who are or have been compensated in whole or in part directly or indirectly by the state, and may make such other reasonable inclusions, exclusions, or classification of officers and employees of judicial districts of this state as it deems advisable. Persons participating in a retirement system created pursuant to Section 1-a of Article V of this Constitution shall not be eligible to participate in the Fund authorized in this subsection; and persons participating in a retirement system created pursuant to Section 48-a of Article III of this Constitution shall not be eligible to participate in the Fund authorized in this subsection except as permitted by Section 63 of Article XVI of this Constitution. Provided, however, any officer or employee of a county as provided for in Article XVI, Section 62, Subsection (b) of this Constitution, shall not be eligible to participate in the Fund authorized in this subsection, except as otherwise provided herein. The amount contributed by the state to such Fund shall equal the amount paid for the same purpose from the income of each such person, and shall not exceed at any time six per centum (6%) of the compensation paid to each such person by the state.

"There is hereby created as

an agency of the State of Texas the Employees Retirement System of Texas, the rights of membership in which, the retirement privileges and benefits thereunder, and the management and operations of which shall be governed by the provisions herein contained and by present or hereafter enacted Acts of the Legislature not inconsistent herewith. The general administration and responsibility for the proper operation of said system are hereby vested in a State Board of Trustees, to be known as the State Board of Trustees of the Employees Retirement System of Texas, which Board shall be constituted and shall serve as may now or hereafter be provided by the Legislature. Said Board shall exercise such powers as are herein provided together with such other powers and duties not inconsistent herewith as may be prescribed by the Legislature. All moneys from whatever source coming into the Fund and all other securities, moneys, and assets of the Employees Retirement System of Texas shall be administered by said Board and said Board shall be the trustees thereof. The Treasurer of the State of Texas shall be custodian of said moneys and securities. Said board is hereby authorized and empowered to acquire, hold, manage, purchase, sell, assign, trade, transfer, and dispose of any securities, evidences of debt, and other investments in which said securities, moneys, and assets have been or may hereafter be invested by said Board. Said Board is hereby authorized and empowered to invest and reinvest any of said moneys, securities, and assets, as well as the proceeds of any of such investments, in bonds, notes, or other evidences of indebtedness issued, or assumed or guaranteed in whole or in part, by the United States or any agency of the United States, or by the State of Texas, or by any county, city, school district, municipal corporation, or other political subdivision of the State of Texas, both general and special obligations; or in home office facilities to be used in administering the Employees Retirement System including land, equipment, and office building; or in such corporation bonds, notes, other evidences of indebtedness, and corporation stocks, including common and preferred stocks, of any corporation created or existing under the laws of the United States or of any of the states of the United States, as said Board may deem to be proper investments; provided that in making each and all of such investments said Board shall exercise the judgment and care under the circumstances then prevailing which men of ordinary prudence, discretion, and intelligence exercise in the management of their own affairs, not in regard to speculation but in regard to the permanent disposition of their funds, considering the probable income therefrom as well as probable safety of their capital; and further provided, that a sufficient sum shall be kept on hand to meet payments as they become due each year under such retirement plan, as may now or hereafter be provided by law. Unless investments authorized herein are hereafter further restricted by an Act of the Legislature, no more than one per cent (1%) of the book value of the total assets of the Employees Retirement System shall be invested in the stock of any one (1) corporation, nor shall more than five per cent (5%) of the voting stock of any one (1) corporation be owned; and provided further, that stocks eligible for purchase shall be restricted to stocks of companies incorporated within the United States which have paid cash dividends for ten (10) consecutive years or longer immediately prior to the date of purchase and which, except for bank stocks and insurance stocks, are listed upon an exchange registered with the Securities and Exchange Commission or its successors; and provided further, that not less than twenty-five per cent (25%) at any one time of the book value of investments of said Fund shall be invested in Government and Municipal Securities as enumerated above. This Amendment shall be self-enacting and shall become effective immediately upon its adoption without any enabling legislation."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on November 5, 1968, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following: "FOR the Constitutional Amendment amending Subsection (a) of Section 62, Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas relating to the Employees Retirement Fund and the Employees Retirement System of Texas, revising provisions for investments of moneys and other assets of the Fund, and changing other existing provisions and making other new provisions with respect to the administration of the Employees Retirement System."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment amending Subsection (a) of Section 62, Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas relating to the Employees Retirement Fund and the Employees Retirement System of Texas, revising provisions for investments of moneys and other assets of the Fund, and changing other existing provisions and making other new provisions with respect to the administration of the Employees Retirement System."

Sec. 3. The Governor of Texas shall issue the necessary Proclamation for the election and this Amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT
NUMBER SEVEN ON THE BALLOT (SJR32)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
Section 1. That Article VIII, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended by adding a new Section 1-e to read as follows:
"Section 1-e.
"1. From and after December 31, 1978, no State ad valorem taxes shall be levied upon any property within this State for State purposes except the tax levied by Article VII, Section 17, for certain institutions of higher learning."
"2. The State ad valorem tax authorized by Article VII, Section 3, of this Constitution shall be imposed at the following rates on each One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) valuation for the years 1968 through 1974: On January 1, 1968, Thirty-five Cents (35¢); on January 1, 1969, Thirty Cents (30¢); on January 1, 1970, Twenty-five Cents (25¢); on January 1, 1971, Twenty Cents (20¢); on January 1, 1972, Fifteen Cents (15¢); on January 1, 1973, Ten Cents (10¢); on January 1, 1974, Five Cents (5¢); and thereafter no such tax for school purposes shall be levied and collected. An amount sufficient to provide free text books for the use of children attending the public free schools of this State shall be set aside from any revenues deposited in the Available School Fund, provided, however, that should such funds be insufficient, the deficit may be met by appropriation from the general funds of the State."
Sec. 2. That Article III, Section 51, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended so as hereafter to read as follows:
"Section 51. The Legislature shall have no power to make any grant or authorize the making of any grant of public moneys to any individual, association of individuals, municipal or other corporations whatsoever; provided, however, the Legislature may grant aid to indigent and disabled Confederate soldiers and sailors under such regulations and limitations as may be deemed by the Legislature as expedient, and to their widows in indigent circumstances under such regulations and limitations as may be deemed by the Legislature as expedient; provided that the provisions of this Section shall not be construed so as to prevent the grant of aid in cases of public calamity."
Sec. 3. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November 1968, at which election all ballots shall have printed on them the following:
"FOR the Constitutional Amendment continuously reducing State ad valorem property taxes and abolishing all State ad valorem property taxes after December 31, 1978, except the tax levied by Article VII, Section 17, for certain institutions of higher learning."
"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment continuously reducing State ad valorem property taxes and abolishing all State ad valorem property taxes after December 31, 1978, except the tax levied by Article VII, Section 17, for certain institutions of higher learning."

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT
NUMBER TWO ON THE BALLOT (SJR41)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
Section 1. That Section 51-a of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended, and the same is hereby amended, so as to read as follows:
"Section 51-a. The Legislature shall have the power, by General Laws, to provide, subject to limitations herein contained, and such other limitations, restrictions and regulations as may be deemed expedient, for assistance to and/or medical care for, and for rehabilitation and any other services included in the Federal legislation providing matching funds to help such families and individuals attain or retain capability for independence or self-care, and for the payment of assistance to and/or medical care for, and for rehabilitation and other services for:
(1) Needy aged persons who are citizens of the United States or noncitizens who shall have resided within the boundaries of the United States for at least twenty-five (25) years and are over the age of sixty-five (65) years;
(2) Needy individuals who are citizens of the United States who shall have passed their eighteenth (18th) birthday but have not passed their sixty-fifth (65th) birthday and who are totally and permanently disabled by reason of a mental or physical handicap or a combination of physical and mental handicaps;
(3) Needy blind persons who are citizens of the United States and who are over the age of eighteen (18) years;
(4) Needy children who are citizens of the United States and who are under the age of twenty-one (21) years, and to the caretakers of such children.
The Legislature may define the residence requirements, if any, for participation in these programs."
"The Legislature shall have authority to enact appropriate legislation which will enable the State of Texas to cooperate with the Government of the United States in providing assistance to and/or medical care on behalf of needy persons, and in providing rehabilitation and any other services included in the Federal legislation providing matching funds to help such families and individuals attain or retain capability for independence or self-care and to accept and expend funds from the Government of the United States for such purposes in accordance with the laws of the United States as they now are or as they may hereafter be amended, and to make appropriations out of state funds for such purposes; provided that the maximum amount paid out of state funds to or on behalf of any individual recipient shall not exceed the amount that is matchable out of Federal funds; provided that the total amount of such assistance payments and/or medical assistance payments out of state funds on behalf of such recipients shall not exceed the amount that is matchable out of Federal funds; provided that if the limitations and restrictions herein contained are found to be in conflict with the provisions of appropriate Federal Statutes as they now are or as they may be amended, to the extent that Federal matching money is not available to the state for these purposes, then and in that event the Legislature is specifically authorized and empowered to prescribe such limitations and restrictions and enact such laws as may be necessary in order that such Federal matching money will be available for assistance and/or medical care for or on behalf of needy persons; and provided further, that the total amount of money to be expended per fiscal year out of state funds for assistance payments only to recipients of Old Age Assistance, Aid to the Permanently and Totally Disabled, Aid to the Blind, and Aid to Families with Dependent Children shall never exceed Seventy-five Million Dollars (\$75,000,000)."
"Nothing in this Section shall be construed to amend, modify or repeal Section 31 of Article XVI of this Constitution; provided further, however, that such medical care, services or assistance shall also include the employment of objective or subjective means, without the use of drugs, for the purpose of ascertaining and measuring the powers of vision of the human eye, and fitting lenses or prisms to correct or remedy any defect or abnormal condition of vision. Nothing herein shall be construed to permit optometrists to treat the eyes for any defect whatsoever in any manner nor to administer nor to prescribe any drug or physical treatment whatsoever, unless such optometrist is a regularly licensed physician or surgeon under the laws of this state."
Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Monday in November 1968, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:
"FOR the Constitutional Amendment raising the limit on the amount that may be expended in any one year out of state funds for Public Assistance payments only to Seventy-five Million Dollars (\$75,000,000)."
"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment raising the limit on the amount that may be expended in any one year out of state funds for Public Assistance payments only to Seventy-five Million Dollars (\$75,000,000)."

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER THREE ON THE BALLOT (HJR20)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 11a, Article VII, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows:

"Section 11a. In addition to the bonds enumerated in Section 11 of Article VII of the Constitution of the State of Texas, the Board of Regents of the University of Texas may invest the Permanent University Fund in securities, bonds or other obligations issued, insured, or guaranteed in any manner by the United States Government, or any of its agencies, and in such bonds, debentures, or obligations, and preferred and common stocks issued by corporations, associations, or other institutions, as the Board of Regents of the University of Texas System may deem to be proper investments for said funds; provided, however, that not more than one per cent (1%) of said fund shall be invested in the securities of any one (1) corporation, nor shall more than five per cent (5%) of the voting stock of any one (1) corporation be owned; provided, further, that stocks eligible for purchase shall be restricted to stocks of companies incorporated within the United States which have paid dividends for five (5) consecutive years or longer immediately prior to the date of purchase and which, except for bank stocks and insurance stocks, are listed upon an exchange registered with the Securities and Exchange Commission or its successors.

"In making each and all of such investments said Board of Regents shall exercise the judgment and care under the circumstances then prevailing which men of ordinary prudence, discretion, and intelligence exercise in the management of their own affairs, not in regard to speculation but in regard to the permanent disposition of their funds, considering the probable income therefrom as well as the probable safety of their capital.

"The interest, dividends and other income accruing from the investments of the Permanent University Fund, except the portion thereof which is appropriated by the operation of Section 18 of Article VII for the payment of principal and interest on bonds or notes issued thereunder, shall be subject to appropriation by the Legislature to accomplish the purposes declared in Section 10 of Article VII of this Constitution.

"This amendment shall be self-enacting, and shall become effective upon its adoption, provided, however, that the Legislature shall provide by law for full disclosure of all details concerning the investments in corporate stocks and bonds and other investments authorized herein."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of the state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November 1968, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the constitutional amendment providing for investment of the Permanent University Fund by the Board of Regents of the University of Texas in certain types of securities within the prudent man rule."

"The interest, dividends and other income accruing from the investments of the Permanent University Fund, except the portion thereof which is appropriated by the operation of Section 18 of Article VII for the payment of principal and interest on bonds or notes issued thereunder, shall be subject to appropriation by the Legislature to accomplish the purposes declared in Section 10 of Article VII of this Constitution.

"This amendment shall be self-enacting, and shall become effective upon its adoption, provided, however, that the Legislature shall provide by law for full disclosure of all details concerning the investments in corporate stocks and bonds and other investments authorized herein."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of the state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November 1968, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the constitutional amendment providing for investment of the Permanent University Fund by the Board of Regents of the University of Texas in certain types of securities within the prudent man rule."

"AGAINST the constitutional amendment providing for investment of the Permanent University Fund by the Board of Regents of the University of Texas in certain types of securities within the prudent man rule."

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER NINE ON THE BALLOT (SJR1)

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION No. 4 Proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas, amending Section 48a of Article III thereof, so as to provide for contributions on the basis of the full salary of members of the Teacher Retirement System; providing for the submission of the proposed amendment to a vote of the people at an election and for proclamation and publication thereof.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 48a of Article III of the Constitution of Texas be amended so as to read as follows:

"Section 48a. In addition to the powers given the Legislature under Section 48, Article III, it shall have the right to levy taxes to establish a fund to provide retirement, disability and death benefits for persons employed in the public schools, colleges and universities supported wholly or partly by the state; provided that the amount contributed by the state to such fund each year shall be equal to the aggregate amount required by law to be paid into the fund by such employees, and shall not exceed at any time six per centum (6%) of the compensation paid each such person by the state and/or school districts; and provided that no person shall be eligible for retirement who has not rendered ten (10) years of creditable service in such employment, and in no case shall any person retire before either attaining the age fifty-five (55) or completing thirty (30) years of creditable service, but shall be entitled to refund of moneys paid into the fund.

"Moneys coming into such fund shall be managed and invested as provided in Section 48b of Section III of the Constitution of Texas; provided a sufficient sum shall be kept on hand to meet payments as they become due each year under such retirement plan, as

may be provided by law; and provided that the recipients of such retirement fund shall not be eligible for any other state pension retirement funds or direct aid from the State of Texas, unless such other state pension or retirement fund, contributed by the state, is released to the State of Texas as a condition to receiving such other pension aid; providing, however, that this Section shall not amend, alter, or repeal Section 63 of Article 16 of the Constitution of Texas as adopted November, 1954, or any enabling legislation passed pursuant thereto."

Section 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1968, at which election each ballot shall have printed thereon the following words:

"FOR the amendment to Section 48a of Article III allowing contributions to be made on the basis of full salary of members of the Teacher Retirement System of Texas."

"AGAINST the amendment to Section 48a of Article III allowing contributions to be made on the basis of full salary of members of the Teacher Retirement System of Texas."

Each voter shall mark out one of said clauses on the ballot leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed amendment. If it appears from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast were in favor of said amendment, the same shall become a part of the state constitution and be effective from the date of determination of such result and the Governor's proclamation thereof.

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said special election and shall have the same published as required by the constitution and laws of this state.

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER EIGHT ON THE BALLOT (HJR49)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. Section 21 of Article 16 of the Constitution of the State of Texas is amended to read as follows:

"Section 21. All stationery and printing, except proclamations and such printing as may be done at the Texas School for the Deaf, and paper, except that for the Judicial Department, shall be furnished under contract, to be given to the lowest and best bidder under such regulations as shall be prescribed by law. No member or officer of any department of the government shall be in any way interested in such contract."

"FOR the constitutional amendment removing certain provisions relating to purchase of fuel and furnishing the rooms and halls of the Legislature and the requirement that the Governor, the Secretary of State, and the Comptroller must approve certain contracts of purchase."

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER FOUR ON THE BALLOT (SJR37)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article III, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended by adding a new Section 52e to read as follows:

"Section 52e. Bonds to be issued by Dallas County under Section 52 of Article III of this Constitution for the construction, maintenance and operation of macadamized, graveled or paved roads and turnpikes, or in aid thereof, may, without the necessity of further or amendatory legislation, be issued upon a vote of a majority of the resident property taxpayers voting thereon who are qualified electors of said county, and bonds heretofore or hereafter issued under Subsections (a) and (b) of said Section 52 shall not be included in determining the debt limit prescribed in said Section."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1968, at which election all ballots shall

"FOR the amendment of Article III of the Constitution to provide that Dallas County may issue road bonds under Section 52 of Article III upon a vote of a majority of the resident property taxpayers voting thereon who are qualified electors of said county, and to provide that bonds heretofore or hereafter issued under Subsections (a) and (b) of said Section 52 shall not be included in determining the debt limit prescribed in said Section."

"AGAINST the amendment of Article III of the Constitution to provide that Dallas County may issue road bonds under Section 52 of Article III upon a vote of a majority of the resident property taxpayers voting thereon who are qualified electors of said county, and to provide that bonds heretofore or hereafter issued under Subsections (a) and (b) of said Section 52 shall not be included in determining the debt limit prescribed in said Section."

No Regular Session shall be of longer duration than one hundred and forty (140) days.

most direct route of travel, from a table of distances prepared by the Comptroller, to each county seat now or hereafter to be established; no Member to be entitled to mileage for any extra Session that may be called within one (1) day after the adjournment of the Regular or Called Session."

Section 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November 1968, at which election all ballots shall have printed on them the following:

"FOR the constitutional amendment providing the members of the Legislature shall receive as salary an amount not exceeding Eight Thousand, Four Hundred Dollars (\$8,400) per year."

"AGAINST the constitutional amendment providing the members of the Legislature shall receive as salary an amount not exceeding Eight Thousand, Four Hundred Dollars (\$8,400) per year."

PUBLIC NOTICE

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER THIRTEEN ON THE BALLOT (HJR16)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article VIII, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended by adding a Section 1-f, to read as follows:

"Section 1-f. All merchandise, products, goods or wares in the temporary custody of a public warehouseman, who has no financial connection other than as bailee for hire with the owner, shipper, or consignee of the merchandise, products, goods, or wares, are exempt from ad valorem taxation if they are shipped to or from the warehouse by regulated or bona fide private carrier, are held by the warehouseman not longer than six (6) months, and have a predetermined out-of-state destination at point of origin. The books and records relating to out-of-state shipments covered hereby of such public warehouseman shall be available for reasonable inspection by

the proper taxing authorities. This amendment shall not act as a validation of any present statute or law, but only those passed specifically pursuant hereto; provided, however, that enabling legislation passed in anticipation of the adoption of this amendment shall not be invalid solely because of its anticipatory nature."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November 1968, at which election all ballots shall have printed on them the following:

"FOR the constitutional amendment to exempt certain property temporarily stored in a public warehouse from ad valorem taxation."

"AGAINST the constitutional amendment to exempt certain property temporarily stored in a public warehouse from ad valorem taxation."

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER TWELVE ON THE BALLOT (SJR14)

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION No. 14 proposing an amendment to Article III, Constitution of the State of Texas, by adding a new Section 52a to give the Legislature the power to authorize cities and counties to issue revenue bonds for industrial development purposes.

"Section 52a. The Legislature shall have the power to authorize cities, counties, and towns to issue revenue bonds for industrial development purposes, or in aid thereof; provided, that property acquired from proceeds of the bonds shall be subject to ad valorem taxes. Legislation passed in anticipation of the adoption of this amendment shall not be invalid solely because of its anticipatory nature. The tax revenue, the utility revenue, and the revenue from services of any county, city or town may not be used to pay any

bonds issued pursuant to this authority nor the interest thereon."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November 1968, at which election all ballots shall have printed on them the following:

"FOR the constitutional amendment to give the Legislature the power to authorize cities and counties to issue revenue bonds for industrial development purposes."

"AGAINST the constitutional amendment to give the Legislature the power to authorize cities and counties to issue revenue bonds for industrial development purposes."

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and this amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time as required by the Constitution and laws of this state.

PUBLIC NOTICE

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER FOURTEEN ON THE BALLOT (HJR22)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That the Constitution of Texas, Article III, be and the same is hereby amended by deleting therefrom Section 18, and substituting in lieu thereof the following:

"Section 18. No Senator or Representative shall, during the term for which he was elected, be eligible to (1) any civil office of profit under this State which shall have been created, or the emoluments of which may have been increased, during such term, or (2) any office or place, the appointment to which may be made, in whole or in part, by either branch of the Legislature; provided, however, the fact that the term of office of Senators and Representatives does not end precisely on the last day of December but extends a few days into January of the succeeding year shall be considered as de minimis, and the ineligibility herein created shall terminate on the last day in December of the last full calendar year of the term for which he was elected. No member of either House shall vote for any other member for any office whatever, which may be filled by a vote

of the Legislature, except in such cases as are in this Constitution provided, nor shall any member of the Legislature be interested, either directly or indirectly, in any contract with the State, or any county thereof, authorized by any law passed during the term for which he was elected."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state, at an election to be held throughout the state on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1968, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the constitutional amendment fixing the time during which members of the Legislature shall be ineligible to hold other offices."

"AGAINST the constitutional amendment fixing the time during which members of the Legislature shall be ineligible to hold other offices."

If it appears from the returns of such election that a majority of the votes cast therein are for such amendment, same shall become a part of the Constitution of Texas.

PUBLIC NOTICE

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER SIX ON THE BALLOT (SJR24)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. Article 8, Constitution of the State of Texas, is amended by adding a Section 2-a to read as follows:

"Section 2-a. (a) The Legislature may, by General Law, exempt from ad valorem taxation by the state and its political subdivisions all or a portion of any equipment, device or improvement installed or constructed on real property, which is designed to eliminate or abate the harmful effect of air emissions or water effluents on the air and water quality in this state, to the extent that the capital investment in such property is made to comply with or to exceed air or water quality standards established by law.

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment giving permissive authority to the Texas Legislature to exempt from ad valorem taxation by the State of Texas and its political subdivisions equipment installed on real property to eliminate or abate the harmful effect of air emissions and water effluents, provided that the capital investment in such equipment complies with the air and water quality standards established by the State of Texas."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment giving permissive authority to the Texas Legislature to exempt from ad valorem taxation by the State of Texas and its political subdivisions equipment installed on real property to eliminate or abate the harmful effect of air emissions and water effluents, provided that the capital investment in such equipment complies with the air and water quality standards established by the State of Texas."

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER TEN ON THE BALLOT (HJR50)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article VIII, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended by adding Section 1-j to read as follows:

"Section 1-j. Notwithstanding the provisions of Section 1 of this article, the Legislature may provide for the refund of the tax on cigars and tobacco products sold at retail within the corporate limits of Texarkana, Texas, or any incorporated city or town in Texas contiguous to Texarkana."

"FOR the constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to provide for consolidating governmental offices and functions and allowing political subdivisions to contract for performance of governmental functions in El Paso and Tarrant counties."

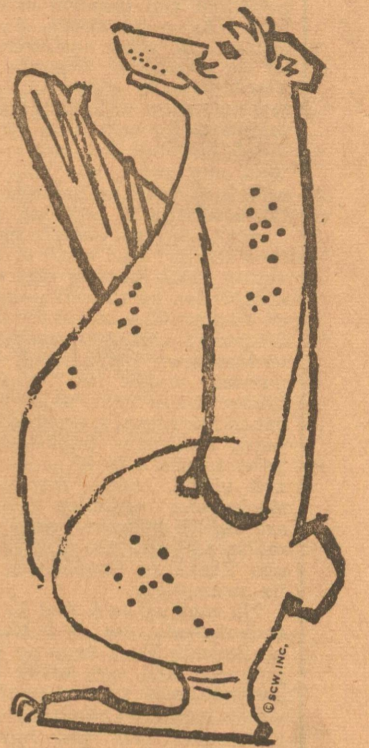

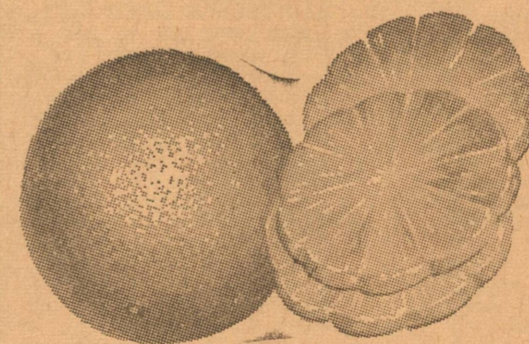
