Sulfur Test In Huldale

Louisiana Land & Exploration Co. of Midland filed application Tuesday to drill a 2,300-foot sulfur core test in Schleicher County. This is the first announced test for this county.

The probe is 7/8-mile east of Pennsylvania reef oil production in the Huldale field and 11 miles northeast of Eldorado.

Location of the test on a 640-acre lease is 1,980 feet from north and 2,051 feet from the west lines of 41-M-GH&SA survey.

Oldest Citizen Returns

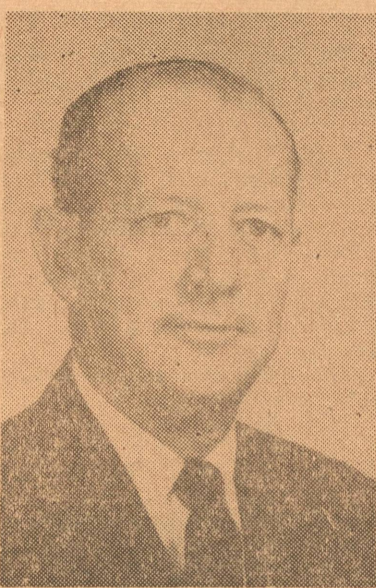

Assembly Monday Morning to Launch New School Year; Crowd Expected

The usual capacity crowd is expected to throng the school auditorium next Monday morning at 9:00 for the traditional assembly which will launch the 1968-69 school year.

The returning as well as new members of the faculty will be introduced, there will be a short program, and then school will take up for a short-period day, turning out at 2:30 p.m. Classes opening day will run about half an hour.

After the assembly, the high school and Jr. high classmen will go to their home rooms to have meetings and elect officers and Student Council delegates to serve this year.

Women who wish to serve as room mothers will meet in the auditorium following the assembly, and they will be selected on the same basis as last year.

C. T. Humphries, superintendent of schools, will welcome all pupils and parents and give pertinent announcements.

Guy Whitaker, high school principal, registered the Jr. High and High School students Tuesday of this week and reported 34 members in the Senior class. He will introduce the high school faculty members Monday morning.

Mr. Wallis will introduce the elementary faculty members.

The regular schedule of classes will get under way Tuesday morning. Classes will be held mornings from 8:10 to 12:02; then lunch period; afternoon classes will be from 12:42 to 3:35 when school turns out each day and buses run.

The kindergarten, or Pre-School For Five-Year-Olds, was held last year for the first time. Mr. Humphries stated that plans are under way for it to be held again this year starting about mid-September and continuing until April 1st. It will be operated by one teacher and one assistant with one group coming mornings and the second group in afternoons. Further details will be announced later.

When queried about Eagle strengths and weaknesses, Coach Barker remarked that with a probable squad roster of 18, the Eagles would be somewhat hampered for reserves, being two deep only in quarterback, halfback, and fullback positions. He remarked that a perplexing problem was the development of tackles but he was complimentary of the potential overall squad speed.

The full coaching staff will probably end the first week's training with a brisk scrimmage session Saturday, August 24.

A sobering thought for the '68 season is that not only Eldorado grew this past year.

Eagles Shaping Up For Big Football Season

About 40 Eldorado lads under new mentor Coach Sherwood Barker began two-day workouts this past Monday as did other members of District 8A in preparation for the 1968 season. Eagle schedule differs this year as a change has shifted Ozona, Rankin, and Iraan to another University Interscholastic League football district and has included the following schools in "rowdy" 8A: Mason High School, a newcomer; Eden, up from Class B; and three former opponents: Junction, Sonora, and Menard, along with Eldorado.

The 1968 schedule is as follows: Nonconference contests—Bronte in Eldorado, Sept. 13. Ozona in Ozona, Sept. 20. Robert Lee in Eldorado, Sept. 27. Iraan in Eldorado, Oct. 4. Wall at Wall, Oct. 11.

Conference play begins Oct. 1 and is as follows—Mason in Eldorado, Oct. 18. Eden in Eden, Oct. 25. Junction in Junction, Nov. 1. Sonora in Eldorado, Nov. 8. Menard in Menard, Nov. 15.

It is an occasionally quoted truism in small high school football that the usual 18-year-old boy can ordinarily take the measure of younger boys and that the team with the most 18-year-olds usually wins. This has operated against Eldorado the past two years; but the 1968 season sees the Eagles move up to possibly 17-year-old status which gives reason for brighter prospects. This year's Eagle squad consists of 8 Seniors, 11 Juniors, 13 Sophomores, and only four Freshmen to date.

Coach Barker said this week that the full squad would eventually be divided into a varsity and a "B" team, the varsity to include about 18 boys.

He continued that principal offensive stance for the 1968 Eagles would be "Wing T" with a 5-man front defensively. He said that Coach Norman Roberts would be the first assistant and would coach both offensive and defensive lines.

Does anyone know where people who live beyond their incomes get their moeny?

Household insects are munching, biting and possibly spreading disease at all hours of the day and night.

Any home and its surroundings harbor some form of insect life. Some insects feed on fabrics, contaminate food and attack dwellings, while others annoy humans by biting. Insects carry diseases and cause possible secondary infections and are general nuisances.

A new leaflet published by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service entitled "Texas Guide for Controlling Household Insects (L-311)" gives recommendations for controlling every kind of insect from moth to mosquito and from tick to termite.

Sanitation and good housekeeping are important in controlling or keeping most pests away, but even well-kept homes sometimes become infested.

Certain pests may be found outside and controlled before they enter the home. However, some insects live entirely within the home where they must be controlled by applying insecticides as sprays, dusts or baits. Fumigation seldom is necessary—if a house must be fumigated, it is wise to rely on a qualified company to provide this service.

The leaflet contains descriptions of the many types of available equipment which can be used for insect treatment and insecticidal formulations are discussed at length.

It's almost time for you to begin shutting off doing your Christmas shopping.

Cattle producers have received credit for 943 head of cattle marketed this year and gone to slaughter under the brucellosis program. Cattle over 2 years of age are tested at slaughter for brucellosis. The results have been 941 testing positive and 2 reactors in the county.

The county comes up for recertification in November of 1969.

It is the duty of all producers to see that all cows going to market and especially slaughter are tagged. This is usually taken care of by the commission or auction company. A county can automatically re-certify itself by having at least 15% of the total cows by population tagged and going to slaughter.

Few people listen to the voice of experience. They heed her only when she kicks them in the pants.

The Big Bend and Trans-Pecos areas are showing alarming build-ups and a number of South-Central and South Texas are reporting heavy infestations of screwworms. Extreme large case tallies show 3-10 times more cases reported in Old Mexico in the states of Sonora, Coahuila, Tamaulipas and Nuevo Leon.

Samples sent by Jim Thornton and Hensel Matthews from this county were not screwworm cases, (NSW). This is the only way to be sure and to secure a drop of sterile flies should the case be a screwworm case.

West Texas Dove Population Good

San Angelo, Texas.—Game management officers continue to be pleased with the outlook for this year's dove season. The population of doves is good, and there seems to be adequate food to hold the birds in the West Texas area thru the September 1 opening day.

Texas Parks and Wildlife Department offices and most license deputies have free maps available for the convenience of the hunters in both North and South Zones, and there is a reminder included that the state is currently on Daylight Saving Time. The starting hour each day will be 1:00 p.m. until reversion to Central Standard Time on October 27 when it will start at 12:00 noon.

From various sections of West Texas, management officers report that sunflower, ragweed and croton seeds are beginning to fall. A few areas have cut maize, some have already plowed stubble, but most grain fields will be ready to cut about the time bird season opens and grain should be on the ground to draw in the birds.

The dove has proved to be one of the most difficult birds to hit as indicated by the national average of one bird in the bag for each

five shotgun shells expended in its direction. So, if you bring in five birds per box of shells be happy, and consider any over that amount as a bonus.

Home Demonstration Agent's Column

You heard it right the first time—that was a school bell. Seems like an awfully short summer but they tell me that they are going to get shorter than this after a while. There is no 100% consensus of opinion about who is ready for school to start; usually the students and teachers are not and the mothers are.

It is a little hard for a family to shift suddenly and easily from the carefree days of summer to the hard, unrelenting system of letting the clock rule the household and there in many a jolt occurs.

Remember these things, make rules if necessary, but by all means make the transition as painless as possible for you, the mother-manager, and as a matter of fact the whole family.

—A sleepy child is not a good student. It is up to you to see that bedtime comes earlier; the getting up certainly will.

—A hungry child is not a good student. You know that as a practiced truth and dozens of tests and studies have proved that many F's stand for failure to eat breakfast.

—A hurried child does not think straight. If, "I'm going to be late" upsets a child it takes hours for him to settle down and feel secure about being at school at all. Help him to be on time.

—An unprepared child is not a

good student. Establish regular study hours before supper if you eat late and immediately after supper if your family eats early. Homework is not to be ignored. —A child which is threatened, nagged or fussed at is not a good student. Learning comes the easiest to the happy, uncomplicated child. You are the parent which makes you the boss and totally responsible for your children. It's up to you to help them form good habits of living, eating, playing and studying and if anything different exists at your house—make some kind of move to improve the situation now! You will be happier if you do.

Breakfast For Fitness
Roughage is one essential of an adequate breakfast. This is often overlooked by the quick cup of coffee—glass of milk—or other liquid breakfast drinkers.

"In a balanced diet, bulk occurs in the form of whole grain breads and cereals, and the skin and fibrous parts of fruits & vegetables," as Dr. Frederick J. Stare pointed out in his book, *Eating for Good Health*. Sufficient bulk is needed to prevent irregularity.

The first step to a sound diet comes at the beginning of the day with breakfasts planned for extra vitality. The best breakfast includes servings from at least three of the four food groups in the Daily Food Guide. One built around a recommended pattern of fruit, cereal, milk, bread and spread includes servings from three of those four food groups. In addition, it provides necessary bulk in the

fruit, cereal and bread.

Whole wheat flake muffins, peanut butter flavored and bacon crisped, make a grand bread for the back-to-school contingent during Better Breakfast Month.

They are a fine start toward an adequate breakfast. Just flank the hot muffins with orange juice, cereal and milk.

The muffins may be baked when you have time. Set in the breadbox. Then reheat before serving.

Peanut Butter Cereal Muffins
1½ cups sifted flour
3 teaspoons baking powder
½ teaspoon salt
½ cup creamy or chunk-style peanut butter

¼ cup butter or margarine
1/3 cup brown sugar, packed
1 egg
1 cup milk
1½ cups whole wheat flakes, crushed to make 1 cup crumbs
4 slices crisp bacon, crumbled, optional
½ teaspoon cinnamon.

Sift together flour, baking powder, and salt. Beat peanut butter, butter or margarine, ½ cup brown sugar and egg until creamy. Stir sifted dry ingredients and milk, alternately, into creamed mixture. Add cereal crumbs and bacon, if used, and mix just until dry ingredients are moistened. Spoon into greased muffin pans (2½ x 1¼").

Combine remaining brown sugar and cinnamon; mix well and sprinkle over muffin batter. Bake in hot oven (400 F.) until done, 18

to 20 minutes. Yield: 12 muffins.

Enough for the young folks, and a passing thought for the millions of us who are not young, except in heart.

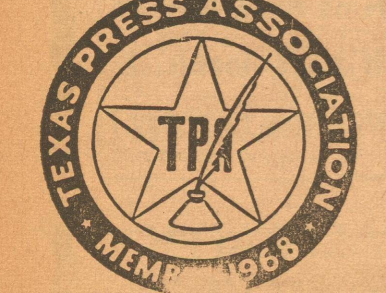

Back To School Time Is Significant To All

Here it is back-to-school time, but for many children and parents it's "first time to school." Occasionally, the first-time experience can be nerve-racking, but it is always important.

TSTA provides the following series of tips and information to help ease the first-time school experience, and make it more productive.

Registration Procedure Any child who is 6 years old on or before September 1 of the school year may be admitted to school. The child's birth certificate must be presented at the time of enrollment.

Some schools, in the interest of good health, require the child to be vaccinated against smallpox before enrollment. Also required may be immunization against diphtheria and whooping cough and tetanus.

Other information which may be needed is the name of the father, his occupation, where he works, and his phone number. The name and telephone number of the family doctor may also be requested.

Also helpful can be the address and telephone numbers where parents can be reached in an emergency.

But such details are only part of the picture, and the parents form an important partnership with teachers in getting the child off to a good start.

How Parents Can Help It will help if the child has opportunities to be away from his mother for short periods before he starts to school.

The child should be taught the safest way home from school. Also teach him to go directly home from school without loitering on the way—and remind him not to go with strangers.

Children should learn that law officers are their friends, and can give them help when needed.

A child should have definite duties to perform at home, and it will be helpful if he can learn good listening habits.

He should get enough sleep. A good breakfast each morning will help start the school day right. So will making certain that he is happy before he leaves for school.

A child should learn to dress himself properly. He should be expected to respect the property rights of others, and should learn to do as much for himself as he is able to do.

Habits of promptness, obedience, and respect for authority are also helpful.

Parents should show an interest in what the child has to tell about his work and play at school. Children need to be praised frequently, and to be made to feel successful.

They should be encouraged to have playmates.

It is vital for the child to have confidence in his teacher. Remember that your attitude toward the school will be observed—and copied—by the child.

Do not criticize school or teacher in the presence of the child. If there is a difficulty—conflict with another child, a difficult activity, a school rule—the

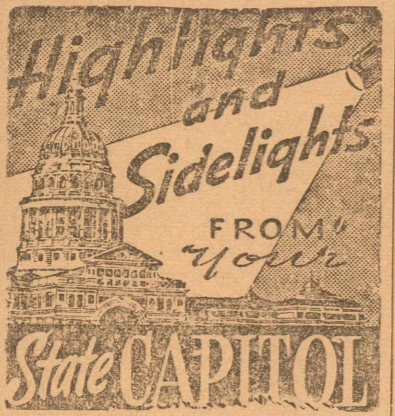

Austin, Tex.—Texas Democratic party politics are in the national spotlight again—this time at Chicago during the national Demo convention.

Hearings were scheduled Wednesday (Aug. 21) before the convention credentials committee on a liberal group's demand that the Texas delegation led by Gov. John Connally be reconstituted to insure proportional representation of ethnic groups.

Texas Democrats for An Open Convention also asked for scrapping of the unit rule under which all the state's delegates are bound to vote as the majority determines. Delegates were instructed at the state convention in Dallas June 11 to vote for Connally as favorite son candidate for president until he releases them. After release, all 104 votes under unit rule probably will go to Hubert Humphrey.

TDOC, in a brief filed with the credentials committee, demands 50 seats—48% of the delegation. Proportional representation is asked for Negroes, Mexican-Americans and non-conservative loyal Democrats who have always supported the party. Delegation now includes six Negro delegates and 11 alternates and five Mexican-American delegates and five alternates, but TDOC claims they are "unrepresentative of their communities."

Most active TDOC members are supporters of Sen. Eugene McCarthy for president. McCarthy backers also have filed challenges in Alabama, Connecticut, Indiana, Louisiana, Michigan, Minnesota, Mississippi, North Carolina, Oklahoma, Pennsylvania, Tennessee, Georgia and Washington.

Decision of the committee will not be known until next week, and challenges likely will go to the convention floor. Connally forces maintain the Texas delegation is representative and was selected at a fair state convention which they controlled 2,835 votes to 499.

Texas Republican Party Politics

Despite the fact that only two Republican presidential nominees have ever carried Texas, Richard Nixon's chances appear to be as high as 50-50—depending largely on whom the Democrats nominate.

First successful Republican in Texas was Herbert Hoover in 1928, carrying the state by 367,000 votes to 341,000. Dwight Eisenhower was the only other GOPer to win a majority of Texans, in 1952 and 1956.

However, there are several factors which could shake up Texas' habit of going with the Democrat. One is the fact that, in 1960, Nixon missed carrying the state by a slim 48,000 votes—and with Lyndon Johnson the Democratic vice-presidential nominee.

And since Hubert Humphrey—almost certain to be the Democratic nominee—is known as being even more liberal than John F. Kennedy and Johnson, Texas' traditionally conservative-to-moderate voters could easily find Nixon more attractive.

This should be especially true

since Nixon picked Maryland Gov. Spiro Agnew for the No. 2 spot on his ticket, and the two appear to be running a "law and order campaign" to offset the influence of American Party Candidate George Wallace.

Also of course, Nixon will have the challenger's advantage of being able to attack the incumbent administration on touchy issues—in this case, the war in Vietnam, the monetary crisis and the racial situation in big cities.

On the other hand, Humphrey will have several plusses in his column when Texans go to vote in November. One could be his vice-presidential pick, who many people think Governor Connally has a good shot at.

Another will be Wallace's candidacy. As an extreme right-winger, Wallace will probably draw considerably more votes away from Nixon than from Humphrey, and some estimates of Wallace's vote are as high as 50% in West and East Texas and 30% in Central Texas.

Appointments . . .

Governor Connally named Judge Tom Reavley of Austin to fill out the term of Associate Justice Jas. R. Norvell on the Texas Supreme Court. Norvell, who did not seek re-election, resigned effective October 10, so Reavley can begin his work at the start of the new fall term. Reavley is the unopposed Democratic nominee for the high court post.

Connally appointed Abilene Attorney Tom Gordon to succeed W. D. (Bill) Noel of Odessa as chairman of the State Liquor Control Board.

William Neal Blanton Jr. of Houston is Connally's selection to serve out the unexpired term of the late Judge Ben Moorhead on the 11th district court in Harris county. Blanton is the Democratic nominee for the job and unopposed.

House Speaker Ben Barnes appointed Rep. Dick Cory of Victoria, chairman of the House State Affairs Committee, to chair an interim committee to study the relationship between vending-machine operators and taverns. Legislation may be needed to control the takeover of liquor establishments by money-lending vendors, he said.

Barnes also appointed a special committee to study the legal, ethical and moral aspects of human-organ transplants, with an eye to recommending changes in Texas law. Members are Rep. Jack Ogg of Houston, chairman; Dr. Robert D. Bloodwell of Houston; Philip R. Overton, Austin; Dr. Charles A. LeMaistre, Austin; Wyatt H. Heard, Houston; and State Reps. Lamoine Holland, San Antonio; D. C. Howard, Uvalde; Fred Orr of DeSoto and Carl A. Parker, Port Arthur.

Attorney General Rules

Senate's failure during special session to confirm appointment of J. C. Looney, Edinburg, to the Public Safety Commission did not invalidate his appointment. Atty. Gen. Crawford Martin has held. Martin said Looney remains a member of the body, since the Senate didn't act one way or another on the governor's selection.

In other recent opinions, Martin concluded that:

—Rio Grande City Independent School District can issue tax bonds to finance part, but not all, of a new assembly hall-library-classroom and clinic complex with federal Economic Development Administration aid.

—Property owners can't cut the fence of another to gain access to an alleged county road unused for 20 years, except where egress and ingress have been denied to one living in enclosure of fencing. Public roads remain as such although unused, unless rights of public are cut off by county commissioners court, adverse possession by land owner or common law abandonment.

Sewage-Treatment Grants

Eighty-five Texas cities have filed applications totaling \$12,235,000 for \$10 million worth of federal grants to help local governments build sewage-treatment facilities. Most of the grants will be for 33% of the total project price, with the local governments furnishing the remainder of the funds.

Texas Water Quality Board administers the program for the U.S.

Oil Allowable Cut

Railroad Commission again cut oil allowable, to 41.3% of potential for September.

Factor will permit maximum production of 3,213,193 barrels daily, compared with 3,414,999 in August under 44.8% allowable. Eight of 14 major purchasers of Texas crude requested less oil next month than in August. Four asked no change. Two requested increase.

Community Action Agencies

U. S. Office of Economic Opportunity will continue to recognize the seven local community-action agencies which Attorney General Martin says are illegally constituted until legal action is taken to disqualify them.

County commissioners courts participated in the organization of the seven agencies and Martin's opinion said Texas law would not allow counties to take official part in such activities.

Obscenity Law Stands

U.S. District Judge Adrian A. Spears has held valid the Texas anti-obscenity law, which uses the "contemporary community standards" of "the average person."

Spears upheld the Constitution-

ality of the law. He said he felt there was no federal question involved, so he dismissed the suit attacking the law.

Attorney General Martin, whose office defended in the San Antonio suit, said he will ask the

next Legislature to strengthen the law, removing exceptions for foreign films and films in interstate commerce. He wants also authority to get injunctions to stop the showing of films which might be offensive.

PUBLIC NOTICE Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER ONE ON THE BALLOT (SJR39) SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION No. 39 proposing an amendment to Subsection (a) of Section 62, Article XVI of the Constitution of Texas, relating to establishment of a retirement, disability and death compensation fund for officers and employees of the state, so as to create an agency of the State of Texas the Employees Retirement System of Texas, investing the general administration and responsibility of the proper operation of said system in a state board of trustees to be known as the State Board of Trustees of the Employees Retirement System of Texas, authorizing said Board to invest assets of said system in various obligations and subjects of investment, subject to certain restrictions stated therein and such other restrictions as may hereafter be provided by law; providing that contributions of members and the state shall not exceed at any time six per centum (6%) of the compensation paid to each such person by the state; providing that such Amendment shall be self-enacting; providing for the necessary election, form of ballot, proclamation, and publication; and declaring legislative intent that the adoption of this Joint Resolution shall constitute repeal of Senate Joint Resolution No. 3, previously adopted by this the 60th Legislature, so that the proposition as set forth in this Resolution may be submitted to the voters of this state in lieu of the proposition contained in Senate Joint Resolution No. 3.

PUBLIC NOTICE Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER SEVEN ON THE BALLOT (SJR32) BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Article VIII, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended by adding a new Section 1-e to read as follows: "Section 1-e. "1. From and after December 31, 1978, no State ad valorem taxes shall be levied upon any property within this State for State purposes except the tax levied by Article VII, Section 17, for certain institutions of higher learning. "2. The State ad valorem tax authorized by Article VII, Section 3, of this Constitution shall be imposed at the following rates on each One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) valuation for the years 1968 through 1974: On January 1, 1968, Thirty-five Cents (35¢); on January 1, 1969, Thirty Cents (30¢); on January 1, 1970, Twenty-five Cents (25¢); on January 1, 1971, Twenty Cents (20¢); on January 1, 1972, Fifteen Cents (15¢); on January 1, 1973, Ten Cents (10¢); on January 1, 1974, Five Cents (5¢); and thereafter no such tax for school purposes shall be levied and collected. An amount sufficient to provide free text books for the use of children attending the public free schools of this State shall be set aside from any revenues deposited in the Available School Fund, provided, however, that should such funds be insufficient, the deficit may be met by appropriation from the general funds of the State.

PUBLIC NOTICE Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER TWO ON THE BALLOT (SJR41) BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Section 51-a of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended, and the same is hereby amended, so as to read as follows: "Section 51-a. Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER THREE ON THE BALLOT (HJR20)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 11a, Article VII, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows: "Section 11a. In addition to the bonds enumerated in Section 11 of Article VII of the Constitution of the State of Texas, the Board of Regents of the University of Texas may invest the Permanent University Fund in securities, bonds or other obligations issued, insured, or guaranteed in any manner by the United States Government, or any of its agencies, and in such bonds, debentures, or obligations, and preferred and common stocks issued by corporations, associations, or other institutions as the Board of Regents of the University of Texas System may deem to be proper investments for said funds; provided, however, that not more than one per cent (1%) of said fund shall be invested in the securities of any one (1) corporation, nor shall more than five per cent (5%) of the voting stock of any one (1) corporation be owned; provided, further, that stocks eligible for purchase shall be restricted to stocks of companies incorporated within the United States which have paid dividends for five (5) consecutive years or longer immediately prior to the date of purchase and which, except for bank stocks and insurance stocks, are listed upon an exchange registered with the Securities and Exchange Commission or its successors. "In making each and all of such investments said Board of Regents shall exercise the judgment and care under the circumstances then prevailing which men of ordinary prudence, discretion, and intelligence exercise in the management of their own affairs, not

in regard to speculation but in regard to the permanent disposition of their funds, considering the probable income therefrom as well as the probable safety of their capital. "The interest, dividends and other income accruing from the investments of the Permanent University Fund, except the portion thereof which is appropriated by the operation of Section 18 of Article VII for the payment of principal and interest on bonds or notes issued thereunder, shall be subject to appropriation by the Legislature to accomplish the purposes declared in Section 10 of Article VII of this Constitution. "This amendment shall be self-enacting, and shall become effective upon its adoption, provided, however, that the Legislature shall provide by law for full disclosure of all details concerning the investments in corporate stocks and bonds and other investments authorized herein." Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of the state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November 1968, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the constitutional amendment providing for investment of the Permanent University Fund by the Board of Regents of the University of Texas in certain types of securities within the prudent man rule." "AGAINST the constitutional amendment providing for investment of the Permanent University Fund by the Board of Regents of the University of Texas in certain types of securities within the prudent man rule."

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER NINE ON THE BALLOT (SJR4)

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION No. 4 Proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas, amending Section 48a of Article III thereof, so as to provide for contributions on the basis of the full salary of members of the Teacher Retirement System; providing for the submission of the proposed amendment to a vote of the people at an election and for proclamation and publication thereof.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 48a of Article III of the Constitution of Texas be amended so as to read as follows: "Section 48a. In addition to the powers given the Legislature under Section 48, Article III, it shall have the right to levy taxes to establish a fund to provide retirement, disability and death benefits for persons employed in the public schools, colleges and universities supported wholly or partly by the state; provided that the amount contributed by the state to such fund each year shall be equal to the aggregate amount required by law to be paid into the fund by such employees, and shall not exceed at any time six per centum (6%) of the compensation paid each such person by the state and/or school districts; and provided that no person shall be eligible for retirement who has not rendered ten (10) years of creditable service in such employment, and in no case shall any person retire before either attaining the age fifty-five (55) or completing thirty (30) years of creditable service, but shall be entitled to refund of moneys paid into the fund. "Moneys coming into such fund shall be managed and invested as provided in Section 48b of Section III of the Constitution of Texas; provided a sufficient sum shall be kept on hand to meet payments as they become due each year under such retirement plan, as

may be provided by law; and provided that the recipients of such retirement fund shall not be eligible for any other state pension retirement funds or direct aid from the State of Texas, unless such other state pension or retirement fund, contributed by the state, is released to the State of Texas as a condition to receiving such other pension aid; providing, however, that this Section shall not amend, alter, or repeal Section 63 of Article 16 of the Constitution of Texas as adopted November, 1954, or any enabling legislation passed pursuant thereto."

Section 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1968, at which election each ballot shall have printed thereon the following words: "FOR the amendment to Section 48a of Article III allowing contributions to be made on the basis of full salary of members of the Teacher Retirement System of Texas." "AGAINST the amendment to Section 48a of Article III allowing contributions to be made on the basis of full salary of members of the Teacher Retirement System of Texas." Each voter shall mark out one of said clauses on the ballot leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed amendment. If it appears from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast were in favor of said amendment, the same shall become a part of the state constitution and be effective from the date of determination of such result and the Governor's proclamation thereof. Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said special election and shall have the same published as required by the constitution and laws of this state.

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER EIGHT ON THE BALLOT (HJR49)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. Section 21 of Article 16 of the Constitution of the State of Texas is amended to read as follows: "Section 21. All stationery and printing, except proclamations and such printing as may be done at the Texas School for the Deaf, and paper, except that for the Judicial Department, shall be furnished under contract, to be given to the lowest and best bidder under such regulations as shall be prescribed by law. No member or officer of any department of the government shall be in any way interested in such contract." Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on

the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November 1968, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the constitutional amendment removing certain provisions relating to purchase of fuel and furnishing the rooms and halls of the Legislature and the requirement that the Governor, the Secretary of State, and the Comptroller must approve certain contracts of purchase." "AGAINST the constitutional amendment removing certain provisions relating to purchase of fuel and furnishing the rooms and halls of the Legislature and the requirement that the Governor, the Secretary of State, and the Comptroller must approve certain contracts of purchase."

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER FOUR ON THE BALLOT (SJR37)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article III, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended by adding a new Section 52e to read as follows: "Section 52e. Bonds to be issued by Dallas County under Section 52 of Article III of this Constitution for the construction, maintenance and operation of macadamized, gravelled or paved roads and turnpikes, or in aid thereof, may, without the necessity of further or amendatory legislation, be issued upon a vote of a majority of the resident property taxpayers voting thereon who are qualified electors of said county, and bonds heretofore or hereafter issued under Subsections (a) and (b) of said Section 52 shall not be included in determining the debt limit prescribed in said Section." The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1968, at which election all ballots shall

No Regular Session shall be of longer duration than one hundred and forty (140) days.

most direct route of travel, from a table of distances prepared by the Comptroller, to each county seat now or hereafter to be established; no Member to be entitled to mileage for any extra Session that may be called within one (1) day after the adjournment of the Regular or Called Session."

The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November 1968, at which election all ballots shall have printed on them the following: "FOR the constitutional amendment providing the members of the Legislature shall receive as salary an amount not exceeding Eight Thousand, Four Hundred Dollars (\$8,400) per year." "AGAINST the constitutional amendment providing the members of the Legislature shall receive as salary an amount not exceeding Eight Thousand, Four Hundred Dollars (\$8,400) per year."

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER THIRTEEN ON THE BALLOT (HJR16)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article VIII, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended by adding a Section 1-f, to read as follows: "Section 1-f. All merchandise, products, goods or wares in the temporary custody of a public warehouseman, who has no financial connection other than as bailee for hire with the owner, shipper, or consignee of the merchandise, products, goods, or wares, are exempt from ad valorem taxation if they are shipped to or from the warehouse by regulated or bona fide private carrier, are held by the warehouseman not longer than six (6) months, and have a predetermined out-of-state destination at point of origin. The books and records relating to out-of-state shipments covered hereby of such public warehouseman shall be available for reasonable inspection by

the proper taxing authorities. This amendment shall not act as a validation of any present statute or law, but only those passed specifically pursuant hereto; provided, however, that enabling legislation passed in anticipation of the adoption of this amendment shall not be invalid solely because of its anticipatory nature."

The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November 1968, at which election all ballots shall have printed on them the following: "FOR the constitutional amendment to exempt certain property temporarily stored in a public warehouse from ad valorem taxation." "AGAINST the constitutional amendment to exempt certain property temporarily stored in a public warehouse from ad valorem taxation."

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER TWELVE ON THE BALLOT (SJR14)

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION No. 14 proposing an amendment to Article III, Constitution of the State of Texas, by adding a new Section 52a to give the Legislature the power to authorize cities and counties to issue revenue bonds for industrial development purposes.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

The Legislature shall have the power to authorize cities, counties, and towns to issue revenue bonds for industrial development purposes, or in aid thereof; provided, that property acquired from proceeds of the bonds shall be subject to ad valorem taxes. Legislation passed in anticipation of the adoption of this amendment shall not be invalid solely because of its anticipatory nature. The tax revenue, the utility revenue, and the revenue from services of any county, city or town may not be used to pay any

bonds issued pursuant to this authority nor the interest thereon." Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November 1968, at which election all ballots shall have printed on them the following:

"FOR the constitutional amendment to give the Legislature the power to authorize cities and counties to issue revenue bonds for industrial development purposes." "AGAINST the constitutional amendment to give the Legislature the power to authorize cities and counties to issue revenue bonds for industrial development purposes." Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and this amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time as required by the Constitution and laws of this state.

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER FOURTEEN ON THE BALLOT (HJR22)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That the Constitution of Texas, Article 18, be and the same is hereby amended by deleting therefrom Section 18, and substituting in lieu thereof the following: "Section 18. No Senator or Representative shall, during the term for which he was elected, be eligible to (1) any civil office of profit under this State which shall have been created, or the emoluments of which may have been increased, during such term, or (2) any office or place, the appointment to which may be made, in whole or in part, by either branch of the Legislature; provided, however, the fact that the term of office of Senators and Representatives does not end precisely on the last day of December but extends a few days into January of the succeeding year shall be considered as de minimis, and the ineligibility herein created shall terminate on the last day in December of the last full calendar year of the term for which he was elected. No member of either House shall vote for any other member for any office whatever, which may be filled by a vote

of the Legislature, except in such cases as are in this Constitution provided, nor shall any member of the Legislature be interested, either directly or indirectly, in any contract with the State, or any county thereof, authorized by any law passed during the term for which he was elected."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state, at an election to be held throughout the state on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1968, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following: "FOR the constitutional amendment fixing the time during which members of the Legislature shall be ineligible to hold other offices." "AGAINST the constitutional amendment fixing the time during which members of the Legislature shall be ineligible to hold other offices."

If it appears from the returns of such election that a majority of the votes cast therein are for such amendment, same shall become a part of the Constitution of Texas.

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER SIX ON THE BALLOT (SJR24)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. Article 8, Constitution of the State of Texas, is amended by adding a Section 2-a to read as follows: "Section 2-a. (a) The Legislature may, by General Law, exempt from ad valorem taxation by the state and its political subdivisions all or a portion of any equipment, device or improvement installed or constructed on real property, which is designed to eliminate or abate the harmful effect of air emissions or water effluents on the air and water quality in this state, to the extent that the capital investment in such property is made to comply with or to exceed air or water quality standards established by law.

"(b) Legislation which may be enacted in anticipation of the adoption of this Section is not void because of its anticipatory nature." Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November

1968, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment giving permissive authority to the Texas Legislature to exempt from ad valorem taxation by the State of Texas and its political subdivisions equipment installed on real property to eliminate or abate the harmful effect of air emissions and water effluents, provided that the capital investment in such equipment complies with the air and water quality standards established by the State of Texas." "AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment giving permissive authority to the Texas Legislature to exempt from ad valorem taxation by the State of Texas and its political subdivisions equipment installed on real property to eliminate or abate the harmful effect of air emissions and water effluents, provided that the capital investment in such equipment complies with the air and water quality standards established by the State of Texas."

PUBLIC NOTICE

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER TEN ON THE BALLOT (HJR50)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article VIII, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended by adding Section 1-j to read as follows: "Section 1-j. Notwithstanding the provisions of Section 1 of this article, the Legislature may provide for the refund of the tax paid on the first sale of cigars and tobacco products in this state which are subsequently sold at retail within the corporate limits of Texarkana, Texas, or any incorporated city or town in Texas contiguous to Texarkana."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER ELEVEN ON THE BALLOT (HJR60)
