



Level closed end terraces and farming on the contour were two of the practices that received top priority by nearly all farmers priority by nearly all farmers.

conjunction with level closed end terraces, started paying dividends in Schleicher county from the time the first system was put in use. Rows on the true contour held all the water from some of the rains. Level terraces properly planned, designed and laid out by the SCS, constructed to the needed height and width, held water that was not held he centeur rows. Water that held by contour rows. Water that was once lost from the field, was held where it was needed for crop use. Low lying lakes, that in times past were too wet to plant and drowed out in many years crops were growing in them, were

being utilized to better advantage. Some of the major benefits of applying and maintaining the needed conservation practices is, water received is kept where it is needed for crop use. Lake fields become the most productive part of the farm, after the problem of crops being destroyed by too much water has been eliminated. "Too dry to plant on the hill and too wet to plant in the lakes" was how one farmer described the conditions on his farm before his cropland was

Crop yields in the district will continue to be affected by the amount of rainfall received. However, more important than the amount received, will be the amount kept on the land for crop use. Maximum potential yields can be attained only when all the needed conservation practices are applied and maintained.

### **New System Needed** For Appointment Of Sup. Court Justices

By Congressman O. C. Fisher An awareness of the need for a change in the method of choosing members of the Supreme Court has become apparent during considera-tion by the Senate of the Fortas-Thornberry confirmations.

Out of it has come several proposed changes in the Constitution, designed to remove such appointments from the realm of political favoritism. In recent years such choices have become patronage plums, with little thought being given to judicial qualifications of

hose appointed. One U. S. Senator proposes that vacancies be filled from a list of live—chosen by a conference of all the chief judges of all the states' highest courts and the chief judges of all 11 U.S. Courts of Appeals. The President would then have to pick one of the five, and the Senate would have to confirm.

This is an excellent approach, I introduced a resolution to accomplish about the same plan several years ago. Such a method would go far toward removing such appointments from politics and fav-

Another sound proposal would require each member of the Supreme Court to be reappointed and confirmed every 10 years. That would prevent members from becoming autocrats, and would allow their official conduct to be scrutinized and reassessed periodically

In any event, it is now generally admitted that the Supreme Court has in recent years played havoc with constitutional government. That fact was recognized by the chief judges of all the states' courts at a meeting not long ago. They accused the high court of 'making new laws", rather than interpreting them.

But changes in the Constitution are extremely difficult to come by. The knee-jerk liberals always oppose such changes. They are committed to the concentration of power in Washington-and the Supreme Court has in recent years advanced that concept.

What is needed is a sensible, acceptable remedy which the American people can support—a remedy which can be identified and crystallized. The great aroused power of American public opinion could then be exerted. Unity of purpose and unity of action are essential if this tragic condition is to be corrected before it is too late.






