

Surplus Commodity Program up to county

According to information from a member of the Commissioners Court, this county has been invited to participate in a "surplus commodity program" now being carried out in various counties by the Organization of Economic Opportunity.

Commissioners Court has taken the project under advisement.

From the meagre information given, it seems that the principle surplus items would be staple food, but possibly other items would be included.

The county's obligation would be to provide transportation of the commodities from San Angelo to Eldorado, and to provide storage room here during the period it was in process of distribution. Some articles probably would require refrigeration.

Distribution here would be under direction of the local O.E.O. office, which is headed by W. R. Bearce.

We have long been familiar with government programs to aid the farmer—the soil bank, the wool incentive, the soil conservation program—and many others. In contrast to this a clamor has often been raised over programs to help the needy.

There was indignation in Eldorado several years ago when the low-rent project was established. Now the advantages of it are being recognized—it has helped, not hurt, the community.

Now this "surplus" program is up to the County Judge and his four commissioners to participate or not to participate. One of the questions they will be asked is: "Why give free food to a lazy SOB who won't work?"

Good question. But what about the tired wife and small children of that improvident man? Do we charge his sins on his children?

We have a great deal of respect for our county leaders and we believe their decision will be guided by their feeling of compassion for the underprivileged, and we hope they will not be disappointed.

Just More Rain

Out in Bailey Ranch area people reported about 8-tenths of an inch of rain last Thursday morning. There was no precipitation in Eldorado.

About 4:30 a.m. Friday residents were aroused by loud thunder claps and drenching rain. Gauges in Eldorado showed 1.50, near the airport, but there was a big variation in other reports.

Lawrence Dannheim claimed 2.50 inches, while Andy Nixon came up with a mere 8-tenths.

Lightning struck an oil pipeline on University land in west part of the county resulting in a fire. A big column of smoke hung in the sky Friday morning. Eldorado Fire Department sent a truck out to assist in controlling the blaze.

Parker Bros. reported 2.40 rain at the estate place north of town and Whitten draw was running over the road during part of the morning. At Parker's Bailey ranch farm only one-tenth of an inch was recorded Friday morning, but then total rainfall for April and May came to an even 9 inches.

Mail Now Arriving 30 Minutes Earlier

Late last Thursday, Postmaster Bernard Carr received word that the mail carrier would be arriving in Eldorado 30 minutes earlier with the mail, getting here at 8:00 a.m. instead of 8:30 a.m. This is just another step in the Post Office Department's planning to give its patrons earlier delivery of the mails.

For those who have mail going to Sonora, you must have your mail in the Post Office before 8:00 a.m. each morning if you want it to get to Sonora that day. Also the rural carrier will be leaving the Post Office at 9:00 a.m. instead of the usual time of 9:30 a.m. All rural route patrons will be receiving their mail on the route 30 minutes earlier than usual.

The departure time of the outgoing mail in the afternoon has not been changed. So, as usual, have your out of town mail in the Post Office no later than 4:00 p.m.

Graduates of '69 To Receive Diplomas Monday

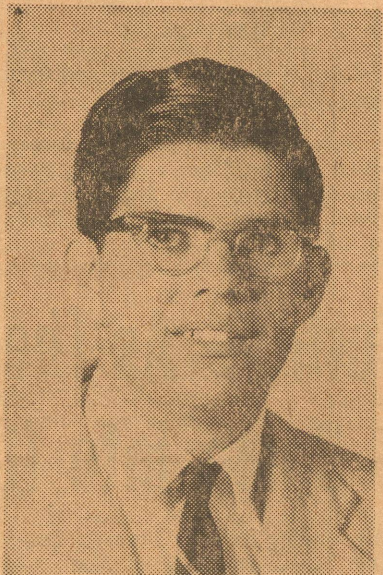


KATHY ROBINSON

Kathy plans to enter Baylor next fall.

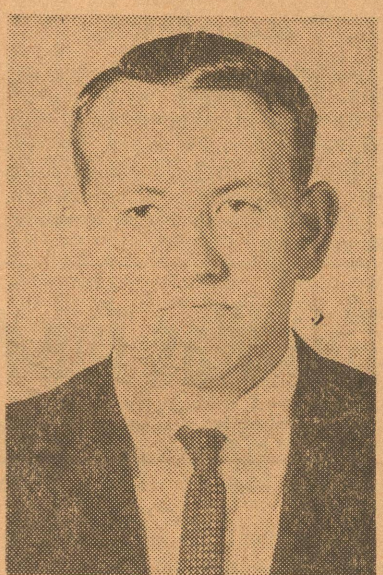


JIM MERCER

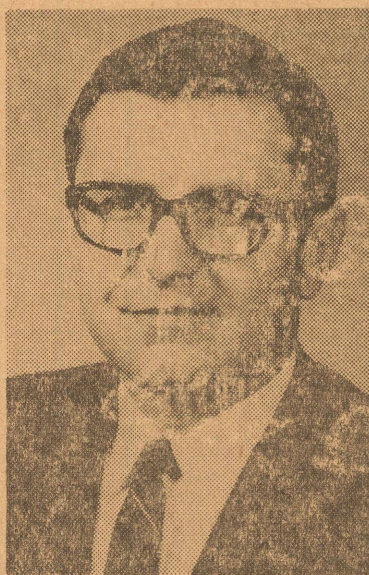

Eldorado Youth Drowns In Tank

Funeral services for Joe Faye Lozano, Eldorado High School student, were held in St. Luke Baptist church here at 3:00 p.m. Saturday. The 18-year-old youth drowned in an old rock quarry pond in the east part of town Thursday afternoon.

According to Schleicher County Sheriff Orval Edmiston, the boy and several companions were swimming in the old quarry, which has been dammed and converted into a tank.

The water, located on the eastern edge of the city, ranges in depth up to about 20 feet.

Witnesses said the youth apparently walked off an underwater ledge, falling into about 10 feet of water. He apparently could not swim.

The boy went under water, dragging another youth with him. The other boy, however, made it to the surface and went with his companions to summon aid.

Texas Department of Public Safety Patrolman Delbert Copeland and Deputy Sheriff Jack Jones rushed to the scene.

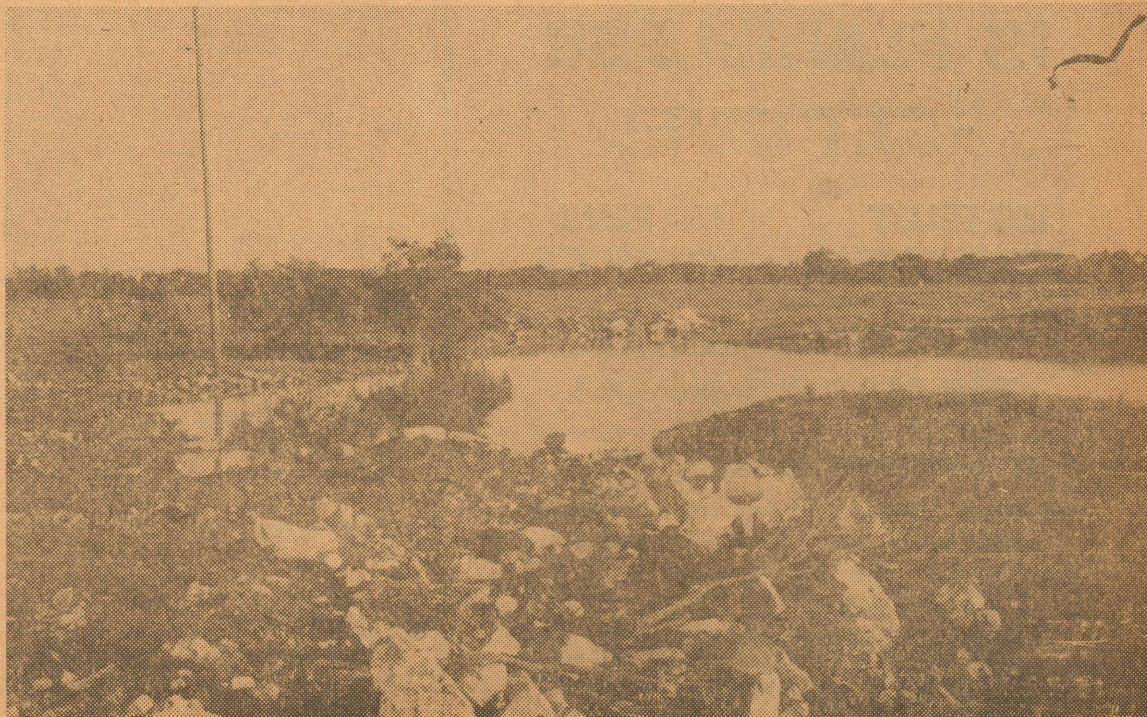
Lozano's body was recovered at about 6:00 p.m., around an hour after he went under.

He was born Dec. 30, 1952 in Eldorado.

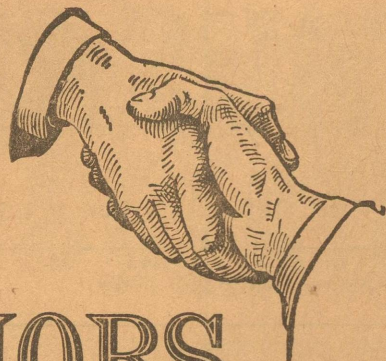

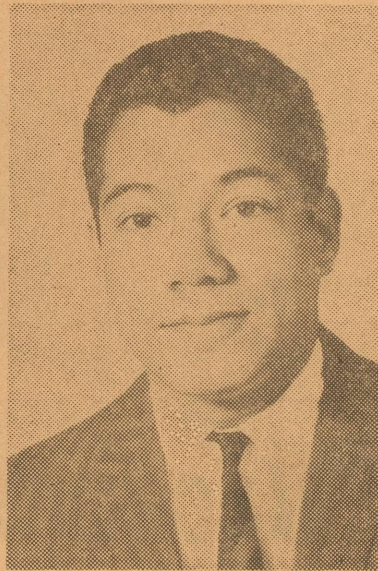

This Was The World - - As The Grads Of '69 Came Into It

The current '69 grads of EHS came into the world back in the Fall of 1950 and the first three seasons of 1951. PUBLIC NOTICE

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER NINE ON THE BALLOT (HJRS)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 5, Article III, Constitution of the State of Texas, as amended, be amended to read as follows:

"Section 5. The Legislature shall meet in regular session each year at such time as may be provided by law and at other times as convened by the Governor. When convened in odd-numbered years in regular session, the Legislature shall devote the first thirty days to the introduction of bills and resolutions, acting upon emergency appropriations, passing upon the confirmation of the recess appointees of the Governor and such emergency matters as may be submitted by the Governor in special messages to the Legislature; provided that during the succeeding thirty days of such session the various committees of each House shall hold hearings to consider all bills and resolutions and other matters then pending; and such emergency matters as may be submitted by the Governor; provided further that during the following sixty days the Legislature shall act upon such bills and resolutions as

may be then pending and upon such emergency matters as may be submitted by the Governor in special messages to the Legislature; provided, however, either House may otherwise determine its order of business during this session by an affirmative vote of four-fifths of its membership.

"Regular sessions in even-numbered years, commencing in 1972, shall not exceed sixty days and shall be limited to legislation on the subjects of providing funds for the support of functions and activities of the state government and emergency matters submitted by the Governor in messages to the Legislature. At each regular session, commencing in 1971, appropriations shall be made for the support of functions and activities of the state government for the next fiscal year."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on August 5, 1969, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment to provide for annual legislative sessions."

W. Pope Honored For Work In Conservation
A vigorous program of range management and brush control practices has won for Walter C. Pope III of Fort McKavett an award as outstanding conservation ranchman of the year. The Lions Club of Eldorado presented the award at their regular weekly club luncheon on Wednesday of this week.
Walter has been a cooperater with the Eldorado-Divide Soil and Water Conservation District since 1960. A conservation plan was worked out with the assistance of a Soil Conservation Service technician, Bill Rountree of Eldorado. This plan served as a guide for Walter to carry out a conservation program on all of his rangeland.
Walter's interest in conservation and concern about the invasion of brush on rangeland caused him to be among the first in the District to buy his own Caterpillar. He has spent most of his time in the past six years improving his rangeland.
The entire Pope family is interested in and concerned with conservation. Walter and his wife, Dorothy, not only put conservation to work on their rangeland, but they have also done a lot of missionary work for districts and soil conservation. The Popes have three children, two girls and a boy. The two girls, who are older, have already won numerous awards in 4-H Club work identifying range plants. In 1968 Janet was on the team that won first place in the state for the junior division 4-H grass judging contest and Cora, the youngest daughter, was an alternate on the team. This girls' team of which Janet and Cora are members won first place for girls at the Houston Fat Stock Show.
Since the beginning of conservation work on the Pope rangeland in 1960, they have built some 8 miles of cross fencing, controlled over 4,000 acres of noxious brush, added some six livestock water facilities, along with some 1,000 feet of pipeline for livestock water, and have successfully reseeded grass-scarce rangeland badly infested with brush. Now these acres have a good showing of sideoats grama, vine mesquite, Texas cupgrass, and several other species of good native grasses.
By cross fencing Walter has made large pastures smaller and has eliminated the uneven grazing to a large extent and it also permits more frequent and timely de-ferrals for each pasture.
All of the rangeland on the Pope ranch has improved to the point that it has moved up at least one condition class.
Walter is a district supervisor and has served as secretary to the district board for the past several years.
Walter and Dorothy are interested in the youth becoming soil, water, and plant conservation conscious. This is evidenced by the fact that for the past three years they have taken care of all the arrangements of holding the Eldorado Divide Soil and Water Conservation District range judging and plant identification contest for FFA and 4-H Club boys and girls. In the past few years they have traveled all over Texas carrying club boys and girls to plant identification contests.

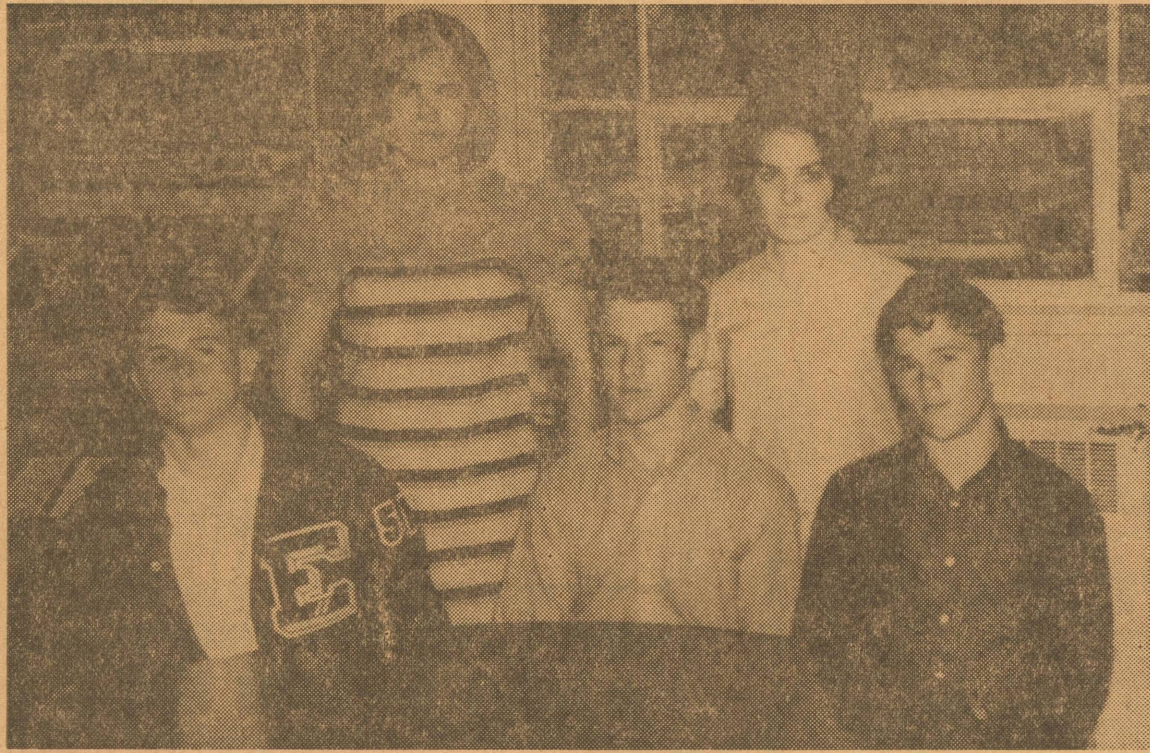

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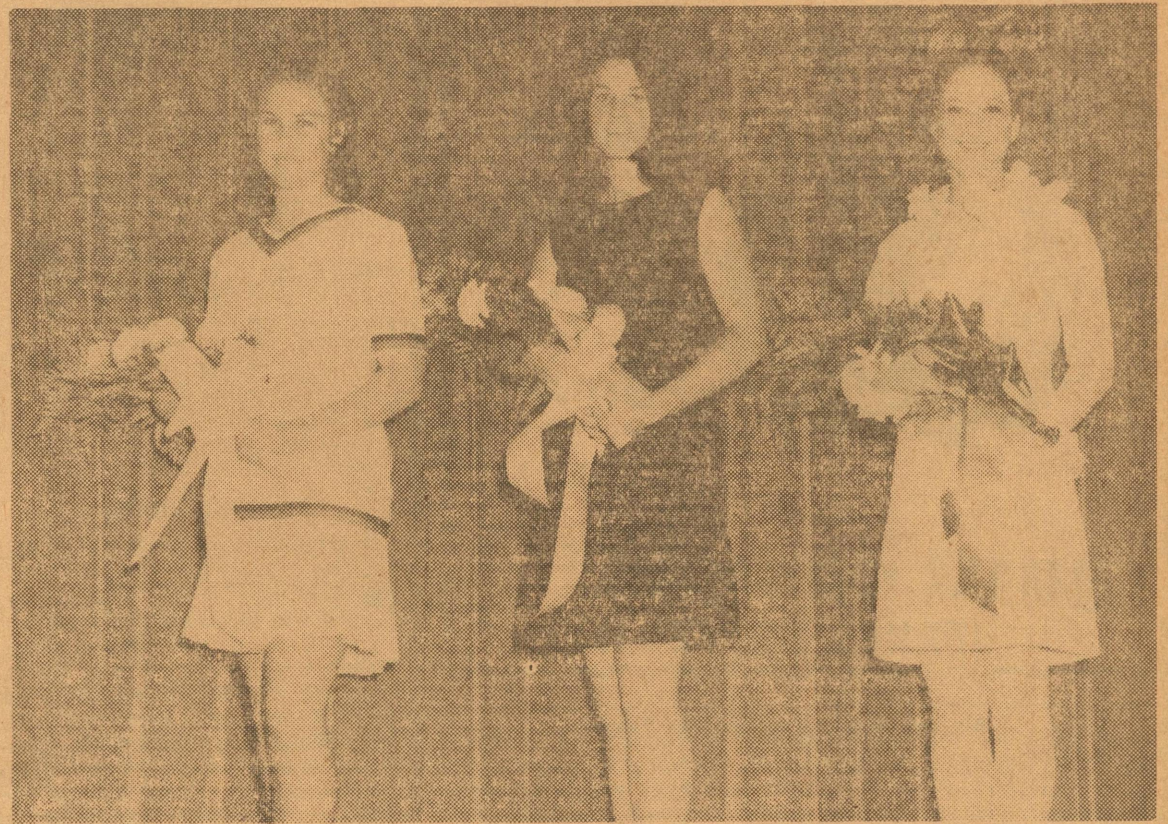

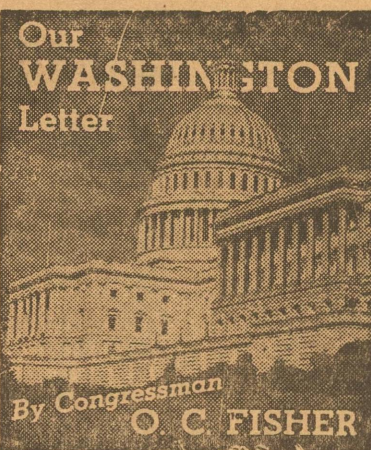
Mrs. Clark Dies

A sense of relief and expectancy gripped Washington as Justice Abe Fortes, under suspicion for indiscreet involvement in the affairs of the Louis Wolfson Foundation, decided to resign from the Supreme Court.

Who will President Nixon appoint? The type of men chosen to fill this and other vacancies which will soon occur can change the

course of our history.

As a candidate Nixon was quoted as saying: "I believe in a strict interpretation of the Supreme Court's functions . . . In essence this means I believe we need a Court which looks upon its function as being that of interpretation rather than of breaking through into new areas that are really the prerogative of the Congress . . ."

Thus, the President has a great opportunity to give the nation relief from a long series of decisions which have, under Chief Justice Warren, adversely affected law enforcement, stricken down anti-subversion and espionage laws, and engaged the Court in sociological and political policy-making actions never contemplated by the Constitution. For a decade and a half this Court has run roughshod over court precedents, as it has in many respects rewritten the Constitution and become another legislative body.

It is reassuring to know, by his own pronouncements, that Presi-

dent Nixon recognizes this development. By picking properly qualified men to fill the Fortes vacancy, and another when Chief Justice Warren retires soon, Nixon can bring order out of chaos and restore that court to its proper role in our tripartite form of government.

The present court is so constituted that the appointment of even two new men may tilt the scales in the right direction. And there will probably be more vacancies during the Nixon Administration. Justice Hugo Black is now 83, Douglas is 69, and Harlan is 68.

The Gallup Poll found that nearly two-thirds of the American people were critical of Supreme Court decisions. And the Chief Justices of the States branded a series of Supreme Court actions as being "without proper judicial restraint," and insisted that tribunal had been acting as a "policy maker" in national affairs.

Now, at long last relief is in sight.

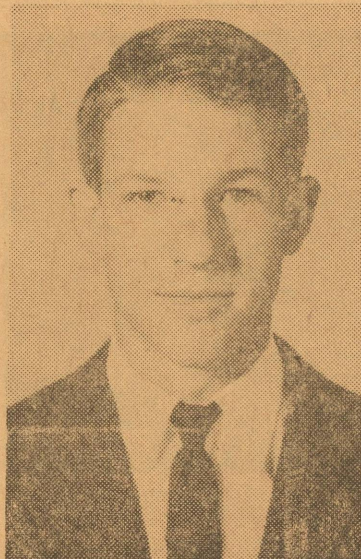

Hyman plans to attend Texas Tech.

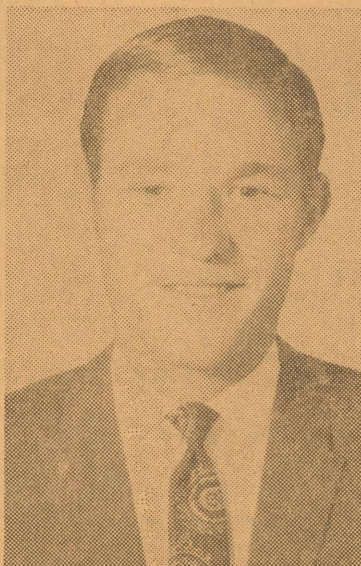

Pinkie has served as vice-president of this year's Senior class. He and his wife, Nan, plan to move soon to Odessa.

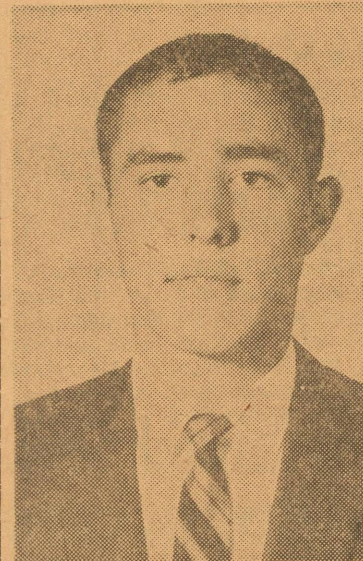

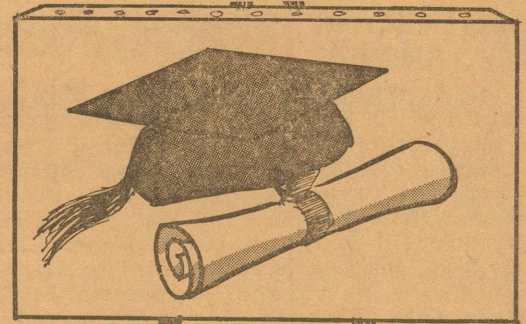

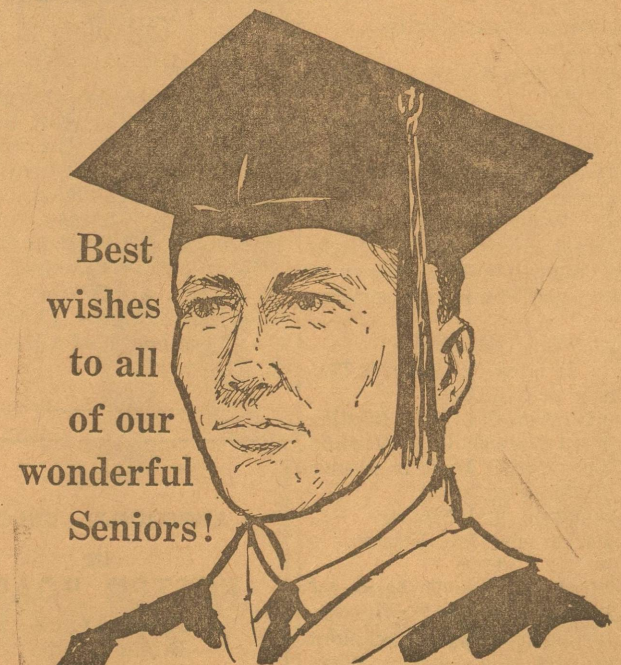

**Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT
NUMBER ONE ON THE BALLOT (HJR3)**

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Sections 42, 46, and 48 of Article III, Sections 3a and 7 of Article VII, Section 12 of Article VIII, Section 3 of Article IX, Sections 1, 3, 4, 5, 6, 7, 8, and 9 of Article X, Section 10 of Article XI, Sections 3, 4, 5, and 7 of Article XII, Sections 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, and 7 of Article XIII, Sections 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, 7, and 8 of Article XIV, Sections 3, 4, 7, 13, 29, 32, 34, 35, 36, 38, 42, 45, 46, 54, 55, 57, 58, and 60 of Article XVI, Constitution of the State of Texas, be repealed, it being specifically

understood that the repeal of these sections shall not in any way make any substantive change in our present constitution. Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in August, 1969, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment to repeal the obsolete, superfluous and unnecessary sections of the Constitution."

PUBLIC NOTICE

**Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT
NUMBER THREE ON THE BALLOT (SJR31)**

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Section 24, Article III, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows: "Section 24. The Lieutenant Governor and the Speaker of the House of Representatives shall each receive from the Public Treasury an annual salary in an amount to be fixed by the Legislature, not to exceed one-half the annual salary of the Governor. Each other member of the Legislature shall receive from the Public Treasury an annual salary to be fixed by the Legislature, not to exceed the annual salary paid to a district judge from state funds. Members of the Legislature shall also receive a per diem of not exceeding Twelve Dollars (\$12) per day during each Regular and Special Session of the Legis-

lature. No Regular Session shall be of longer duration than one hundred and forty (140) days. Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on August 5, 1969, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment providing that the Lieutenant Governor and the Speaker of the House of Representatives shall receive a salary fixed by the Legislature, not to exceed one-half the salary of the Governor; providing that the Legislature shall fix the salary of the other members, not to exceed that received by a district judge from state funds; and removing the 120-day limitation on per diem for regular sessions."

**Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT
NUMBER SIX ON THE BALLOT (HJR7)**

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Article III, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended by adding a new Section 64 to read as follows: "Section 64. BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Section 51-d, Article III, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows: "Section 51-d. The Legislature shall have the power, by general law, to provide for the payment of assistance by the State of Texas to the surviving spouse and minor children of officers, employees, and agents, including members of organized volunteer fire departments and members of organized police reserve or auxiliary units with authority to make an arrest, of the state or of any city, county, district, or other political subdivision who, because of the hazardous nature of their duties, suffer death in the course of the performance of those official duties. Should the Legislature

enact any enabling laws in anticipation of this amendment, no such law shall be void by reason of its anticipatory nature." Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in August, 1969, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the Legislature to provide for payment of assistance to surviving spouses and minor children of governmental officers, employees, and agents, including members of organized volunteer fire departments and certain organized police reserve units, who have hazardous duties and are killed in the performance of those duties."

PUBLIC NOTICE

**Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT
NUMBER EIGHT ON THE BALLOT (HJR50)**

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Article III, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended by adding a new Section 50b-1 to read as follows: "Section 50b-1. (a) The Legislature may provide that the Coordinating Board, Texas College and University System, or its successor or successors, shall have authority to provide for, issue and sell general obligation bonds of the State of Texas in an amount not to exceed Two Hundred Million Dollars (\$200,000,000) in addition to those heretofore authorized to be issued pursuant to Section 50b of the Constitution. (d) All bonds issued hereunder shall, after approval by the Attorney General, registration by the Comptroller of Public Accounts of the State of Texas, and delivery to the purchasers, be incontestable and shall constitute general obligations of the State of Texas under this Constitution. (e) Should the Legislature enact enabling laws in anticipation of the adoption of this Amendment such acts shall not be void because of their anticipatory nature." Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in August, 1969, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The Constitutional amendment authorizing the Legislature to provide for additional loans to students at institutions of higher education under the Texas Opportunity Plan."

County Extension News

Untreated wounds in livestock invite worm infestation. Even worse, every untreated wound that results in a screwworm infestation adds to the rapidly increasing problem in Texas.

You can help prevent screwworms by spraying your herds with a product that is recommended for that purpose on the label. Follow the directions carefully. Treat all wounds whether they are infested or not, using an approved smear (EQ-335 or Formula 62). Apply the pesticide to the wound and surrounding area.

Ask your veterinarian or County Agent for additional information about treatment of screwworms.

To help keep your livestock free from injuries, remove such hazards as protruding nails, rusty wire, and other sharp objects. Do not crowd the stock into small areas, where the chance of injury is more acute.

While livestock management requires many surgical operations, the danger these man-made wounds present can be reduced by proper timing, and by treatment of the wounds. Every cut should be treated with a proper smear. The same advice applies to the navels of newborn animals.

Never give screwworms a free ride, when you buy or sell livestock. Check to see that the animals are free of infestation, and observe all restrictions on shipping. Spraying herds at the point of origin is good insurance against screwworms.

Screwworm control is everybody's business. Give your personal, active support to the livestock committee of your county. Jo Ed Hill is County Committee Chairman.

Coming together is a beginning, keeping together is progress, working together is progress.

Farm animals, for some unexplained reason, seem to have a liking for small bits of wire, nails, scraps of hardware, screws and bolts. Many owners have been made aware of this fact through the loss of a valuable animal.

The damage is usually caused by irritation or puncture from swallowing the object. In most instances the loss could have been prevented by good "housekeeping" practices around the farm, especially barns and corrals.

Here are suggestions for preventing future losses.

Remove wire fences which are weak from rust before small bits of the wire drop into the grass and become a hazard to grazing livestock. After a construction job in the barnyard has been completed, it is worth the time and effort to sweep the area thoroughly or drag it with a sweep of permanent magnets.

It is difficult to detect and remove trash metal from ground feed and silage. But permanent or electromagnets placed in feed chutes between bins and feeders will remove a major portion of the trash metal. It is also important that some type of magnet be installed in home grinding mills and mixers.

It's the case again where an ounce of prevention is worth a pound of cure. In fact, it is possible to remove almost 100% of the trash metal from feed, pastures and barnyards just by following good "housekeeping" practices as a part of the livestock management program.

Opportunities do not come with their values stamped upon them.

Empty pesticide containers follow the spring season as surely as does summer.

Although empty for practical purposes, some material will remain in the container and regardless of the type it should be handled in the same manner as the newly purchased product.

Here are suggestions for safe disposal of containers:

Wrap empty glass containers in old newspaper and break the glass, puncture plastic containers, puncture and crush metal containers and bury each at least 18 inches deep in an area not frequented by people, livestock or pets. Paper and other combustible containers can be disposed of by burning but making sure that desirable plants, people, pets or livestock are not exposed to the smoke. The ashes should then be buried as suggested for empty containers.

As an alternate procedure, the broken, punctured and crushed containers including paper and other combustible containers and small quantities of leftover material can be disposed of at a sanitary landfill. Notify the landfill operator that the material consists of empty pesticide containers or leftover pesticides. Do not puncture or burn aerosol containers. Store all pesticides under lock and key out of reach of children.

Nothing worthwhile is ever lost by taking time enough to do it right.

**Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT
NUMBER TWO ON THE BALLOT (HJR9)**

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a new Section 49-d-1 to read as follows:

"Section 49-d-1. (a) In addition to Texas Water Development Bonds heretofore authorized to be issued by Sections 49-c and 49-d of Article III of the Constitution, the Texas Water Development Board is hereby authorized to issue \$3,500,000,000 in aggregate principal amount of bonds. No part of such additional bonds shall be issued prior to approval thereof by the vote of two-thirds of the elected members of both houses of the Legislature.

(b) The proceeds from the sale of such bonds shall be deposited in the Texas Water Development Fund.

(c) The bonds herein authorized and all bonds authorized by such Sections 49-c and 49-d of Article III shall bear such interest and mature as the Texas Water Development Board shall prescribe subject to the limitations as may be imposed by the Legislature.

(d) The Texas Water Development Fund shall be used for the purposes heretofore permitted by and subject to the limitations in said Sections 49-c and 49-d and in addition thereto for the purposes of developing water resources and facilities for the State of Texas, both within the State and without the

State of Texas. Provided, however, that financial assistance may be made pursuant to the provisions of such Sections 49-c and 49-d subject only to the availability of funds and without regard to the provisions in Section 49-c that such financial assistance shall terminate after December 31, 1982.

(e) Under such provisions as the Legislature may prescribe, the Texas Water Development Board may receive grants and, in addition, execute contracts with the United States or any of its agencies, other states of the United States, foreign governments and others, for the acquisition and development of such water resources and facilities for the State of Texas. Such contracts when executed may be secured by the general credit of the state, and if so secured shall constitute general obligations of the State of Texas in the same manner and with the same effect as Texas Water Development Bonds. If facilities are acquired for a term of years, such contracts shall contain provisions for renewal that will protect the state's investment. The aggregate principal amount of Texas Water Development Bonds authorized herein and in said Sections 49-c and 49-d shall be reduced by the aggregate of principal payments committed under such contracts constituting general obligations of the state. The provisions hereof shall not be construed to limit the authority of the Texas

Water Development Board to execute contracts or issue revenue bonds when such contracts or bonds are not secured by the general credit of the state.

"(f) Texas Water Development Bonds and such contracts secured by the general credit of the state shall after approval by the Attorney General, registration by the Comptroller of Public Accounts of the State of Texas, and delivery to the purchasers, be incontestable and shall constitute general obligations of the State of Texas under the Constitution of Texas.

"(g) Should the Legislature enact enabling laws in anticipation of the adoption of this amendment, such Acts shall not be void by reason of their anticipatory character."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on Tuesday, August 5, 1969, at which election all ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment broadening the powers of the Texas Water Development Board and the purposes of the Texas Water Development Fund; eliminating the interest limitations on Texas Water Development Bonds; raising the authorized amount of Texas Water Development Bonds by \$3,500,000,000; extending the maturity schedule on Texas Water Development Bonds; eliminating the procedures for curtailment and the curtailment date of financial assistance to be provided by the Texas Water Development Board."

PUBLIC NOTICE

**Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT
NUMBER FOUR ON THE BALLOT (SJR6)**

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 2, Article VIII, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows:

"Section 2. All occupation taxes shall be equal and uniform upon the same class of subjects within the limits of the authority levying the tax; but the legislature may, by general laws, exempt from taxation public property used for public purposes; all real and personal property owned by a nonprofit water supply corporation which is reasonably necessary for and is used in, operation of the corporation in the acquisition, storage, transportation and sale of water as authorized as its sole legal purpose; actual places or (of) religious worship, also any property owned by a church or by a strictly religious society for the exclusive use as a dwelling place for the ministry of such church or religious society, and which yields no revenue whatever

such church or religious society; provided that such exemption shall not extend to more property than is reasonably necessary for a dwelling place and in no event more than one acre of land; places of burial not held for private or corporate profit; all buildings used exclusively and owned by persons or associations of persons for school purposes and the necessary furniture of all schools and property used exclusively and reasonably necessary in conducting any association engaged in promoting the religious, educational and physical development of boys, girls, young men or young women operating under a state or national organization of like character; also the endowment funds of such institutions of learning and religion not used with a view to profit; and when the same are invested in bonds or mortgages, or in land or other property which has been and shall hereafter be bought in by such institutions under foreclosure sales made to satisfy or protect such

bonds or mortgages, that such exemption of such land and property shall continue only for two years after the purchase of the same at such sale by such institutions and no longer, and institutions of purely public charity; and all laws exempting property from taxation other than the property above mentioned shall be null and void."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in August, 1969, at which election all ballots shall have printed on them the following:

"FOR the Constitutional amendment to exempt nonprofit water supply corporations from taxation."; and

"AGAINST the Constitutional amendment to exempt nonprofit water supply corporations from taxation."

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election, and this amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time required by the Constitution and laws of this state.

**Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT
NUMBER FIVE ON THE BALLOT (SJR8)**

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 51-a of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended, and the same is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

"Section 51-a. The Legislature shall have the power, by General Laws, to provide, subject to limitations herein contained, and such other limitations as may be deemed expedient, for assistance grants to and/or medical care for, and for rehabilitation and any other services included in the federal laws as they now read or as they may hereafter be amended, providing matching funds to help such families and individuals attain or retain capability for independence or self-care, and for the payment of assistance grants to and/or medical care for, and for rehabilitation and other services to or on behalf of:

(1) Needy aged persons who are citizens of the United States or non-citizens who shall have resided within the boundaries of the United States for at least twenty-five (25) years;

(2) Needy individuals who are totally and permanently disabled by reason of a mental or physical handicap or a combination of physical and mental handicaps;

(3) Needy blind persons;

(4) Needy dependent children and the caretakers of such children.

"The Legislature may prescribe such other eligibility requirements for participation in these programs as it deems appropriate.

"The Legislature shall have authority to enact appropriate legislation which will enable the State of Texas to cooperate with the Government of the United States in providing assistance to and/or medical care on behalf of needy persons, in providing rehabilitation and any other services included in the federal laws

making matching funds available to help such families and individuals attain or retain capability for independence or self-care to accept and expend funds from the Government of the United States for such purposes in accordance with the laws of the United States as they now are or as they may hereafter be amended, and to make appropriations out of state funds for such purposes; provided that the maximum amount paid out of state funds to or on behalf of any needy person shall not exceed the amount that is matchable out of federal funds; provided that the total amount of such assistance payments only out of state funds on behalf of such individuals shall not exceed the amount of Eighty Million Dollars (\$80,000,000) during any fiscal year.

"Supplementing legislative appropriations for assistance payments authorized by this Section, the following sums are allocated out of the Omnibus Tax Clearance Fund and are appropriated to the State Department of Public Welfare for the period beginning September 1, 1969 and ending August 31, 1971: Three Million, Six Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$3,600,000) for Old Age Assistance, Two Million, Five Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$2,500,000) for Aid to the Permanently and Totally Disabled, and Twenty-Three Million, Nine Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$23,900,000) for Aid to Families with Dependent Children. Such allocations and appropriations shall be made available on the basis of equal monthly installments and otherwise shall be subject to the provisions of currently existing laws making allocations and appropriations for these purposes.

"Provided further, that if the limitations and restrictions herein contained are found to be in conflict with the provisions of appropriate federal statutes, as they now are or as they may be amended to the extent that federal matching money is not available to

the state for these purposes, then and in that event the Legislature is specifically authorized and empowered to prescribe such limitations and restrictions and enacts such laws as may be necessary in order that such federal matching money will be available for assistance and/or medical care for or on behalf of needy persons.

"Nothing in this Section shall be construed to amend, modify or repeal Section 31 of Article XVI of this Constitution; provided further, however, that such medical care, services or assistance shall also include the employment of objective or subjective means, without the use of drugs, for the purpose of ascertaining and measuring the powers of vision of the human eye, and fitting lenses or prisms to correct or remedy any defect or abnormal condition of vision. Nothing herein shall be construed to permit the amount of Eighty Million Dollars (\$80,000,000) for any defect whatsoever in for any defect whatsoever in any manner nor to administer any drug or physical treatment whatsoever, unless such optometrist is a regularly licensed physician or surgeon under the laws of this state."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday in August, 1969. At the election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting "FOR" or "AGAINST" the proposition: "The Constitutional Amendment providing for assistance to and/or medical care on behalf of the needy aged, the needy blind, the needy disabled, and the needy dependent children and their caretakers; establishing Eighty Million Dollars (\$80,000,000) as the maximum amount that may be paid per year from state funds for assistance only; allocating and appropriating additional sums supplementing current legislative appropriations for assistance grants; and authorizing the Legislature to enact such laws as may be necessary in order that federal matching money will be available for assistance and/or medical care."

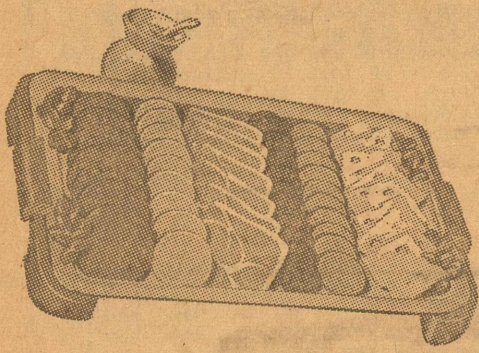

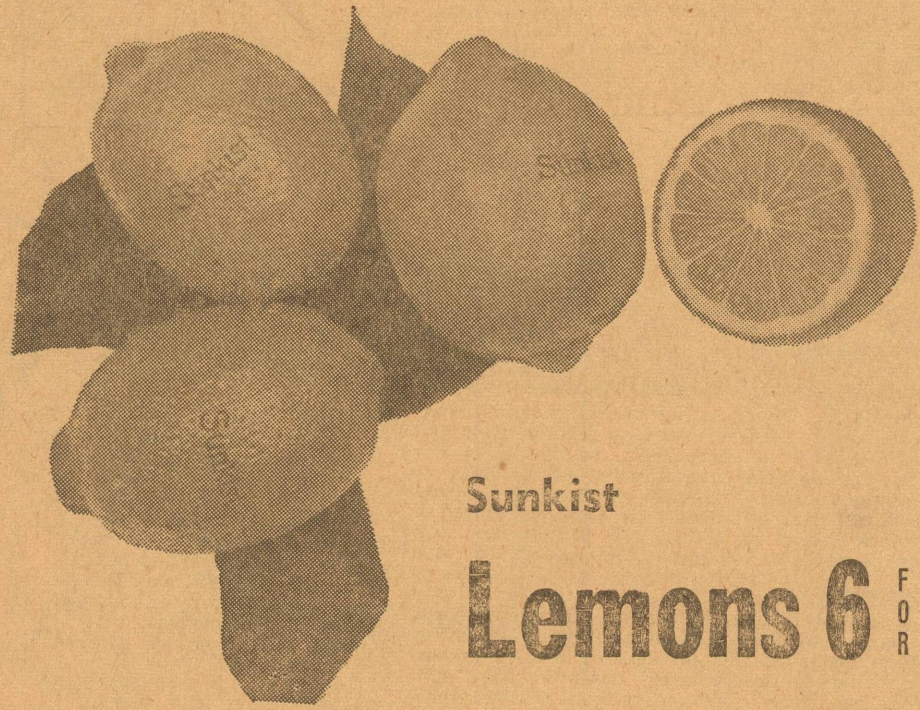

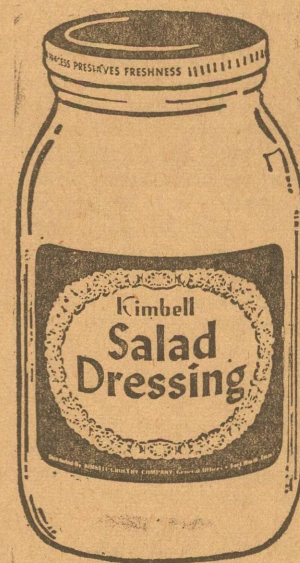
