

Register Cars Properly

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

Treatment at March of Dimes Center Enables Girl to Throw Away Crutches

Patty Bruce, 7, of Pontiac, Mich., crippled since birth by a severe spinal birth defect, learned by happy accident when she was little more than three years old that she could walk without

It was a hot summer day and her mother had set aside Patty's crutches, removed the braces from her legs and stood the pretty little blonde in a neighbor's backyard wading pool. "It was like a miracle," Mrs. Bruce recalls, "She began to walk right through the water."

After that day, Patty, who

After that day, Patty, who was born with leg-paralyzing open spine and deformities of both feet, practiced and exercised until she needed neither braces nor crutches on dry land. Sullivan, director of the March of Dimesfinanced Birth Defects Center at the University of Michigan, Ann Arbor, explained, "With proper physical therapy and other treatment over a period of time, children like Patty often develop enough muscle

Bean soup is standard fare in many parts of the country and hush pupes go well with it.


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
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
