Robert L. McWhorter Elected County Judge Without Run-Off

Some people may say they knew it all the time, but the race for County Judge last Saturday provided a distinct upset when Robert McWhorter won the Democratic primary with 501 votes without a run-off against Draper with 125 votes and incumbent Tom Ratliff with 276 votes—a total of 401 votes. McWhorter won with 100 votes over his two opponents.

For County and District Clerk—There is no run-off here since Jerry Jones accumulated a respectable 385 votes against incumbent Patton Enochs with 507 votes.

For Justice of the Peace, Blake-way came in with 477 against his opponent Walter Powell with 171 so there is no further contest here, either.

Commissioner, Precinct 2—Pat Joiner with 31 votes, Leray Hanusch with 31, and George Williams with 44, were all eliminated. But incumbent Gene McCalla came up with 78 votes, and Viola Henderson with 48 votes. That puts Viola and Gene in a run-off four weeks from now to see who will represent Precinct No. 2 as commissioner next year.

Precinct 4 Commissioner—With four in the race, incumbent Lawrence Dannheim with 68, and Buddy White with 49, both were eliminated, leaving Alvin Farris with 77 votes and Dee Love with 78, to battle it out for Commissioner No. 4 next month.

These are the only two local races to be contested in the run-off to be voted on Saturday, June 6th.

The Legion members voted to give you another year on the signs and re-sell them next year," stated L. D. Mund of the Legion post in a letter to the Little League sponsors. Bobby Palmos will serve as master of ceremonies and will also have charge of program for evening. The event gets under way with the barbecue at 7:00 p.m., and over 100 people are expected.

Ralph Yarborough Loses To Benisen

Incumbent U. S. Senator Ralph Yarborough lost to Lloyd Benisen of Houston in the Democratic Primary.

Benisen will face Republican nominee George Bush in the General Election in November. While in the past winning of the Democratic nomination in Texas was "tantamount to election" the Republicans are expected to spend considerable funds in this state in the race six months from now. This county gave Benisen 545 votes to 316 for Yarborough.

Post Script

We wish to express our appreciation to the election judges in each of the four voting boxes for the cooperation shown the Success in enabling us to post election results promptly in last Saturday's Democratic primary.

The polls closed at 7:00 and by 8:15 we were able to post totals in each of the five local races.

This year we tried out a new idea by printing tally sheets and leaving them at each voting box, to be delivered directly to the Success instead of the court house.

We were fortunate in having the services of Ann Doyle who volunteered to act as messenger and bring the sheets to the shop. No one can put more enthusiasm and efficiency into a job than Ann, and she hit the shop in 40 minutes with no less than three tally sheets from separate voting boxes.

This was where we got confused. Several times we were about to credit a figure to the wrong precinct. We agreed that next time our tally sheets will have the name and number of each respective box printed at the top. With these improvements we expect to render better service another time.

Then we goofed briefly in posting some totals until Bob Page came in and helped us get it straightened out. We are grateful for his assistance and we would like to have him as a permanent member of our election staff.

When it was reported that 202 had voted absentee, it was generally predicted that this county would have a total vote of at least 1,000.

What we came up with was a total of just over 900—maybe 902 or 905.

The total vote polled never agrees exactly with the total votes cast. There were only two county-wide races—the one for Judge and the race for Clerk. Check the accompanying table and you'll see that 902 votes were cast in the Judge's race, but only 892 in the Clerk's race ???

Sometimes you are lucky when you fail to take advantage of an opportunity.

About one year ago it was re-painted and re-decorated. By opening the extra dining room it can seat and serve no less than 60 customers at a time. It deserves experienced management to make it an

Wayne McGinnes Wounded In Viet Nam

Following telegram delivered to Elton McGinnes Tuesday P.M.—

"The Secretary of the Army has asked me to inform you that your son Sgt. Garland W. McGinnes was wounded in action in Viet Nam on May 4, 1970 by fragments while on a combat operation, when a booby trap detonated. He received wounds to the left eye with resultant enucleation in the left eye, and wounds to the chest, right hand and both legs with fractures of the right tibia and fibula and right metacarpal.

"Please be assured that the best medical facilities and doctors have been made available and everything is being taken to aid him. He is hospitalized in Viet Nam. Address mail to him at the Hospital Mail Section, APO San Francisco 96347. You will be provided progress reports and kept informed of any significant changes in his condition.—Kenneth G. Wickham, Maj. Gen."

The bride-elect is a 1965 graduate of Sonora High School and is presently attending Angelo State University.

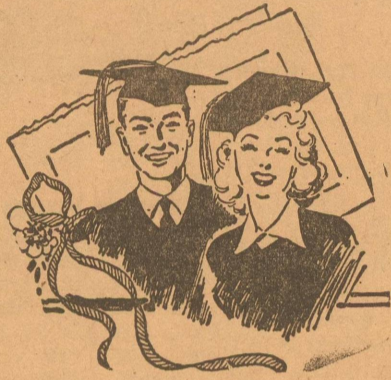

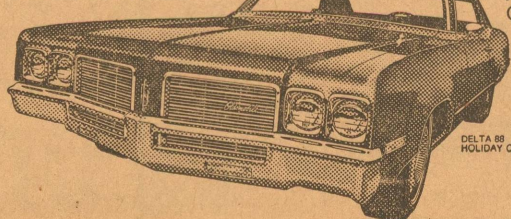

COUNTY AGENT'S COLUMN

Local 4-H and FFA boys and girls are busy studying range plants and conditions getting ready for the annual Eldorado Divide Soil Conservation Supervisors Day on Saturday, May 9th. Mr. and Mrs. Walter Pope will host 4-H and FFA teams from Sutton, Schleicher, Menard, Crockett, Kimble, and Irion and other counties beginning at 9:00 a.m. A barbecue lunch will be served to the team at noon. This contest is open to all 4-Hers or FFA teams in this area.

The awarding of the annual Forrest Runge trophy to the high individual will be made following the lunch.

Members of the Eldorado Divide Soil Conservation District are Walter Pope, Otis Deal, George Humphrey, Voy Lee Butts, and Clay F. Atkins.

Don't forget to include in the Spring clean up, empty, unlabeled bottles, cans, bags, aerosols and boxes which were used for insecticide containers and may still contain deadly residues.

These containers should be removed from the home since they are a potential source of trouble. A curious child in a few unguarded moments with these containers could become the victim of a tragic accident.

During the spring clean-up, make it a first order of business to inventory all of insecticides used around the home and garden. Remove the containers which are empty and those with missing labels. Unlabeled containers are a threat to family members and pets. Don't try to guess the contents. And, don't reuse chemical containers for any other purpose.

All containers should be disposed of in accordance with the rules of safety and local regulations. Bottles and cans should be rinsed with water and the residue buried. Glass bottles should be broken and cans punctured and then buried to a depth of 18 inches in an isolated spot away from water supplies.

Paper and paper bags may be burned but make sure that the wind doesn't blow the smoke onto grazing areas or into the home or onto plants which might be damaged.

Cleaning up after agricultural chemicals have been applied is an important part of safe use. When chemicals are used according to label instructions, they will do the job and are safe to use.

Character is like the foundation of a house. It lies below the surface yet strengthens the entire structure.

Trees damaged by violent weather during spring and early sum-

mer should get immediate attention. Storm damaged limbs or branches should be removed immediately.

When a limb or branch must be removed in its entirety make the cut flush with the tree trunk or limb from which it is growing. Also paint all wounds with a good tree wound dressing to prevent the entrance of disease or insects into the freshly made cut.

The job of removing large limbs can be simplified and damage to the bark can be prevented if care is exercised. Make a cut from the underside of the limb about eight inches from the main trunk. Make this cut at least one-third of the way through the limb or until the saw binds. Then make the second cut from above and several inches farther out on the limb and continue cutting until it can be removed. Make the final cut, flush and parallel to the main trunk. Then apply tree wound dressing to the exposed surface.

If trees around the home do not get immediate attention, they may fall victim to insects and diseases which can enter through the damaged areas.

An "ounce of prevention" now will pay dividends in later years in the construction or repairing of farm buildings.

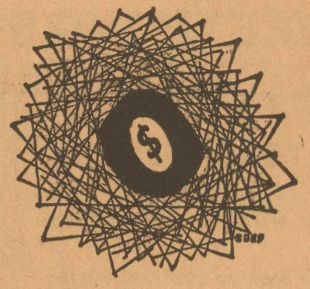
Wooden buildings are damaged by decay when the wood contains moisture. Decay is actually caused by fungi which grow and carry on their destructive life process when sufficient moisture is present.

Decayed parts should be replaced with wood that has been treated with a preservative. Brushing, spraying or soaking wood with a preservative is suggested even if the wood is subjected to only an occasional wetting. Where constant moisture is present, lumber, pressure treated with an approved preservative should be used.

To replace damaged wood, remove the material for a distance of at least two feet beyond any evidence of decay. This is necessary because wood is usually infected beyond the point where rot is apparent. If the source of moisture can be completely eliminated, then only the unserviceable wood needs to be removed and replaced. Decay damage can be prevented by building with properly treated lumber and using designed to keep the wood dry. Building plans are available from my office which are designed for specific purposes and to give long and useful lives.

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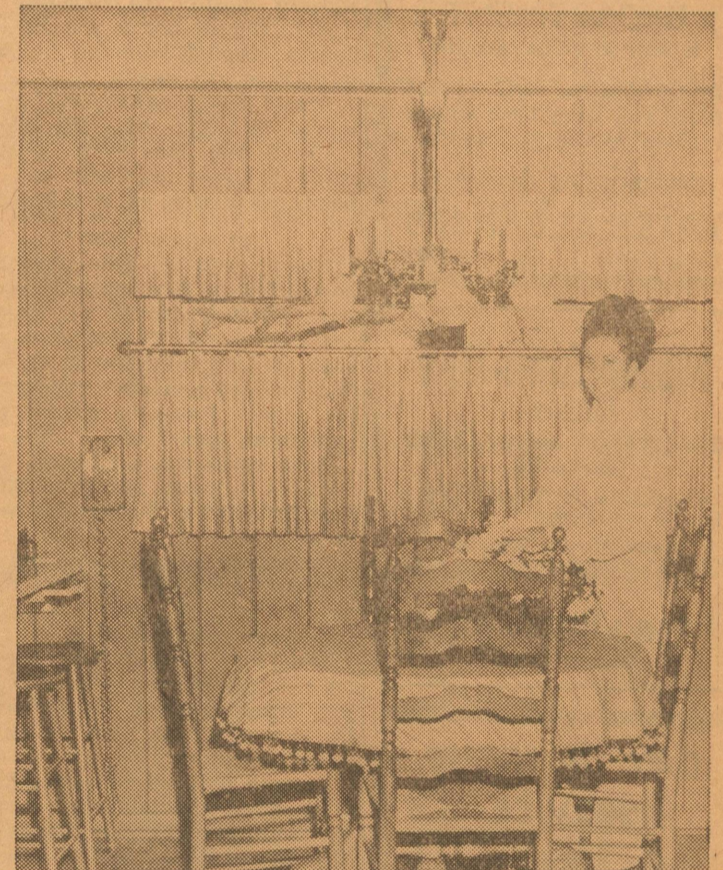

4 Eggs 2 Tsp. Cinnamon
1/2 c. Vegetable Oil 1/2 c. Soda
2 1/2 c. Granulated Sugar 1/2 tsp. Salt
2 c. Cake Flour 1/2 c. Carrots shredded (approx. 1 lb.)

1 pkg. (3 oz.) lemon gelatin	1/2 cup sliced celery
2 cups boiling water	1/2 cup sliced radishes
1/4 cup vinegar	1/2 cup chopped cucumber
1 pint (2 cups) chive cottage cheese	1/2 cup sliced avocado
	1 cup chopped lettuce

Mix lime and lemon gelatine in large bowl. Add boiling water and stir until dissolved. Add vinegar. Cool 3/4 cup of gelatin mixture until it mounds on spoon. Stir in chive cottage cheese. Place in 6 cup mold. Add cold water to remaining gelatin mixture. Cool until mixture mounds on spoon. Stir in celery, radishes, cucumber, avocado and lettuce. Place in mold over cottage cheese layer. Chill until firm. Unmold on lettuce lined plate. Serves eight. Makes 6 cups. Vegetables can be varied but must equal 2 cups.

Dr. E. S. Cox, USDA Animal Health Division Regional Director, announced the lifting of federal hog cholera quarantines from Bosque-McLennan, Falls, Lavaca, and Lee counties.

Texas Association of Sigma Delta Chi, the professional journalism society, named Rep. Russell Cummings of Houston "Friend of Journalism for 1969" in recognition of his sponsorship of the 1969 Open Meetings Law.

Mrs. Patti Lynn Glenn of Corpus Christi and Mrs. Vicki Jean McArthur of Houston were highest scorers in the Texas Board of Vocational Nurse Examiners' examination. They scored 718 when only 350 was required for passing. A total of 785 persons took the exam.

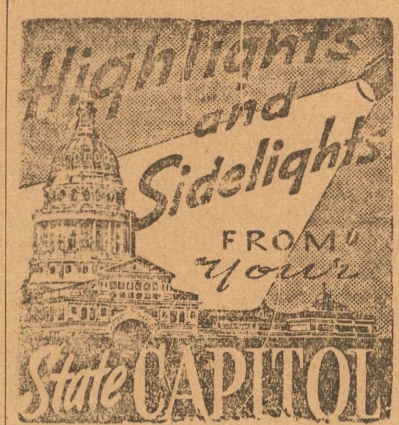

Austin, Tex.—State Board of Mental Health-Mental Retardation accepted the resignation of State MH-MR Commissioner John Kinross Wright and appointed a committee to look for a new commissioner.

Committee consists of MH-MR Chairman Ward Burke of Lufkin; Dr. Charles H. Brown, a Wichita Falls psychiatrist; Dr. Robert S. Tate Jr., pastor of the First Methodist Church of Austin, and Edwin R. Van Zandt, Beaumont newspaper executive.

First three appointees were among the six board members who had requested Kinross-Wright's resignation. Van Zandt was one of three board members who wanted the commissioner to continue heading the massive (27,000 patients, 13,000 employees) state MH-MR care and treatment system.

Finding a new commissioner will not be an easy task. When the old Texas Board for State Hospitals and Special Schools was converted into the Board for Mental Health-Mental Retardation in 1963—and the new law charged that a commissioner should dictate everything but basic policy—it took many months to find a commissioner. Law also says the commissioner must be a physician.

Finally, Dr. Shervert Frazier of Baylor University Medical College was persuaded to take the job on a part-time basis. That didn't work out well for Frazier, or the system, and Kinross-Wright was lured from the Texas Research Institute for Mental Sciences in Houston three years ago.

His tenure was ridden with strife, as a segment of board members led by Dr. Tate charged that the commissioner neglected the community health center program. Controversy flared into a firing when Kinross-Wright asked for the resignation of Deputy MH Commissioner Dr. Gary Miller, and Kinross-Wright ultimately bowed out.

Miller literally was writing in the wings this week (having refused to accept his firing) as a hopeful for the vacancy. Gov. Preston Smith's comprehensive health planning director, Dr. David Wade of Austin, a psychiatrist who formerly headed the Texas Medical Association, was being mentioned as a possibility. But Wade insists he is committed to his present health planning pursuit. Whatever the committee does will be subject to state mental health and state mental retardation organizations.

Attorney General's Opinions

Attorney General Crawford Martin ruled that Hidalgo County voters who signed a petition to nominate Raza Unida Party candidates for county and precinct offices signed a valid document, but could invalidate it if they participated in any other party primary. So, the candidates may not have a clear path until the primary lists are checked against the petition signatures.

Martin also held that: —An independent school district may deduct union dues from the wages of its custodial and maintenance employees with their authorization.

—New Texas Commission for Rehabilitation is the legal successor to all functions of the Texas Education Agency's divisions of vocational rehabilitation and vocational determination.

—In Harris County, probate instruments must be filed under the direction of the county clerk.

—Funds subject to escheat and held in trust by a district or county clerk are subject to being reported to the state as abandoned personal property.

Parks & Wildlife
State Director of Wildlife Services E. A. Walker informed the Parks & Wildlife Commission that U.S. State Park will be completed by June 15. Only the National Park exhibits and amphitheater in the state park remain to be completed.

Walker said the federal service is making exhibits and taping former Pres. and Mrs. Lyndon B. Johnson for "accents" for exhibits.

Commission approved construction of a \$3-million Corpus Christi water exchange pass across Mustang Island, and estimated that construction will begin in August.

"Talking License"
Texas Public Safety Commission is considering possible future use of a "talking driver's license." Project is under development by DEK Processes Division, the firm that makes pictorial licenses for the state.

Proposed "talking" license would resemble a credit card, and provide DPS officers with an instantaneous method of checking on drivers. Card would have a magnetic number on the back (in computer code) which could be fed to a computer center over police radio.

Computer would send a print back to the apprehending officer within 30 seconds, indicating whether a person is wanted, the number of previous traffic violations, and so forth.

Judges' Views On Marijuana Sought
While other politicians and state officials argue about what penalties should be applied to persons possessing marijuana, Gov. Smith decided to ask the men who mete out the punishment.

So, he had Harold K. Dudley, director of the Governor's State Program on Narcotics and Drug Abuse, send a six-part questionnaire to every district judge in Texas. Query asks if the penalty for possession should remain a felony or be changed to a misdemeanor. And—if a change is advocated—should it be changed on the

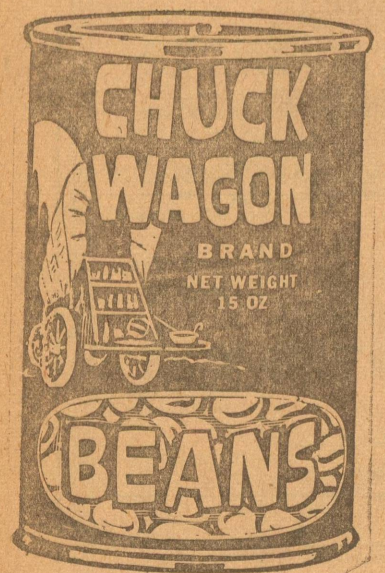

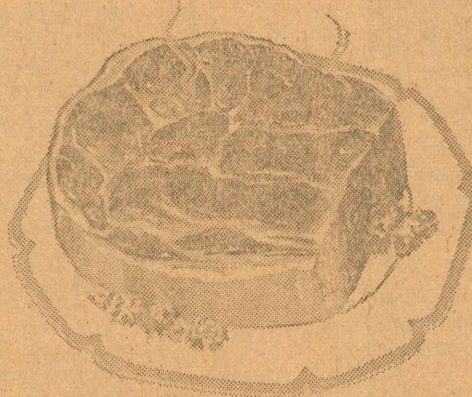

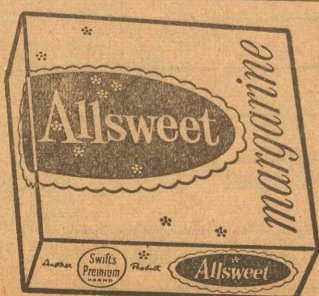
