"This route is an investment in our future," Transportation Commission Chairman John Johnson said after the vote. "It has a regional impact to the state's infrastructure and has the potential to serve as a crucial trade corridor for Tex-

However, the route designation stopped short of making it out of the Texas panhandle. Instead, it stopped in Dumas. From there, the Transportation Departments in Texas, New Mexico, Oklahoma and Colorado will work out the final portion to connect with Denver. That portion of the roadway must be designated by Sept. 30 or the Federal Highway Administration will select a route.

As work progresses, Ports-to-Plains will connect several existing roads, develop intersections and construct a few new portions. The total cost, at least 10 years away, is estimated to exceed \$1.2





Game Warden **Field Notes**

Trailer Troubles...In early June, two wardens assisted a novice boater at Buffalo Springs Lake. The boater was under the impression that boats are launched by unhooking the trailer from the vehicle while on the ramp. The wardens retrieved the boat with the trailer dangling below.

That's Against the Law? In May, a Lampasas warden responded to a call about someone shooting road signs. He found a man with a handgun blasting away at a county road sign. The shooter was flabbergasted when the warden told him he was violating state law. He said no one in his concealed handgun class had informed him

that this was illegal. Second Time's the Charm... An individual approached the same Lamar County warden to ask about driving his all-terrain vehicle on the local wildlife management area and was advised that it was against the law. About two hours later, the warden observed the lights of what appeared to be an ATV on the WMA. When apprehended, the operator of the ATV said, "I thought you went home."

At Least He Had the Equipment... In late April, two wardens arrested a boater for boating-whileintoxicated on Lake Colorado City. When asked to show proof of water safety equipment, the subject literally crawled on his hands and knees trying to locate the equipment, eventually falling on the deck of the boat. The subject blew 0.13 percent on the blood alcohol content test. In Texas, the threshold for intoxication is 0.08 percent.

Close to Home...In April, a Cherokee County warden assisted the Cherokee County Search and Rescue Team in a search for a 4year-old Dialville boy. The father of the boy reported him missing to the Cherokee County Sheriff's Department. After a short search, the boy was found hiding under the family's mobile home.


