Questionnaires for the 1970 Census of Population and Housing will be distributed by the Post Office beginning March 28 to all households in this area, District Manager Jim Farr announced last week

Distribution of this form before the start of the house-to-house canvass gives the family a chance to assemble information about each member and about the house in advance of the census taker's visit. The District Manager urges all residents to fill out the forms and have them ready for the census takers when they start their rounds

The form contains 7 questions bout every person in the household and 13 questions about the dwelling. The personal information asked for is: name, address, sex, color or race, month and year of birth, whether married or single, and relationship to head of the household. The information required about the dwelling is: number of rooms, cooking facilities, plumbng, if rented or owned.

Noting that his opponent, Ovi Clark Fisher, had recently defended the seniority system and gone or record as opposing its change, Gil said, "Mr. Fisher says he would like to know of a better system for electing committee chairmen. doubt that my suggestion will appeal to Mr. Fisher, but personally I would like to see a system based competence and ability.

"Just because a congressman has been repeatedly re-elected—'surviv ed year after year' is the way Mr. Fisher puts it-does not necessarily mean he is the most qualified man to head an important congressional committee. Any seniority system that does not take into consideration accomplishments, effectiveness and ability will tend to keep in power good politiciansmen with a great deal of ability to 'survive'—but not necessarily good statesmen.

Construction crews this week finished repairs which included extensive work on the tower's outer wall and lobby floor. The lighthouse, which was a key

military point in both the Civil War and the War with Mexico, was made a State historic park in its centennial year. Stewart Lambert, asssitant direc-

tor for planning for the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department, said work began Oct. 6 on the building. Lambert said part of the tower's stairway was replaced, a new roof

was installed on the upper lighthouse and the entire upper area was re-veneered with cypress. The lighthouse is located on a

key navigation site overlooking the mouth of the Rio Grande and the southern tip if Padre Island. Nearby Palmito Ranch was the

site of the last pitched battle of the Civil War-having occurred three weeks after General Lee's surrender. News of the surrender had not reached Texas. Federal troops wrested control

of Brownsville, while the Confederates held Port Isabel. Control of the lighthouse changed hands several times between the sides. The light was in operation until

1888, when it was closed. tower was reinstated in 1895. It was built at a cost of \$7,000,

and restored at a cost of \$23,500 during its Centennial year. The lighthouse remains virtually the same as when constructed, with only minor modifications in the

interest of preserving the historic building. The present tower still appears on navigation charts as an approved aid to navigation.

For a second stack of pancakes try a hot apple sauce. Heat canned apple sauce with corn syrup, either dark or light, and spice it with nutmeg and cinnamon. Spread the pancakes lightly with soft margarine and top with the hot spicy apple sauce syrup. **Hot Apple Sauce**

1 cup Karo light or dark

1/4 teaspoon nutmeg
1/2 teaspoon cinnamon 2 cups canned apple sauce corn syrup 2 tablespoons margarine

Mix together apple sauce, corn syrup, nutmeg, cinnamon and margarine in saucepan. Bring to boil and continue boiling about 5 minutes, stirring occasionally. Serve hot on pancakes, French toast, or waffles. Any leftover sauce may be served over plain cake or gingerbread. Makes about 2½ cups.

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

Comment from the Capital -

CONFESSIONS OF A COLUMNIST by Vant Neff



Lesson in Kremlinology; Communists support and subsidize expressions of "freedom" in other countries but consider it a punishable offense in their own land. This duplicity of opinion was displayed when a young Scandinavian law student was sentenced to a one-year term in a forced labor camp as punishment for his one-man demonstration in the streets of Leningrad demanding freedom of expression for Soviet intellectuals. Plainly, this well-meaning young man forgot what befell the intellectuals who dared to proffer their own views on that forbidden topic!

What price patriotism? Americans appear to be boycotting $\boldsymbol{\alpha}$ certain foreign airline whose country harbors some of our military deserters and whose premier favors our enemy. It's another indication that people are registering their indignation and disgust at such situations by refusing to patronize people or places that are anti-American. Wouldn't we be fools to continue proffering money and friendship (in typical altruistic American fashion!) to those who aid the very forces committed to our eventual downfall?

Japanese workers recently made substantial financial contributions to striking electrical workers in the United States. Their motive was not sympathy, kindness nor sheer generosity. Not at all. They are far too practical for anything like that. It was their primary intention to keep their American counterparts idle longer, by increasing their wages, to increase the price of the products they produce - so that foreigners would have a better opportunity of selling their own competitive goods on the world market, securing for themselves the former customers of the Americans, and in the long run, contributing to their economic destruction. It's a shame, in my viewpoint, that the American strikers didn't see through this money-coated ruse at once.

Time, I am glad to note, seems to have matured and enlightened the attitudes and judgment of Dean Acheson, former Secretary of State who was regarded by many as a "parlor pink". Ironically, he has recently become one of President Nixon's staunchest supporters in securing approval for our country's ABM defense system. It is always satisfying to see any individual awaken to the very real threat

that the Communists pose to our nation, but in the case of an influential public personage like Mr. Acheson, it is doubly rewarding. Incidentally, the Russians have an anti-ballistic missile system. If they can afford it, can we afford to be without one?

If we are to pay more than lip service to honoring the role of our President of the United States, we must make the most concentrated effort to assure his safety and well-being, in view of past murderous events. When the appointment of a railroad engineer who had not been accorded top Secret Service clearance to run the Presidential train was challenged and his replacement secured, a certain union official was so morally outraged that he wrote a searing letter to the people responsible for the switch, declaring that "the unions will not tolerate this sort of thing" Submission to this union demand could gravely affect our national



security, and although we are fully aware that many union officials are deft behind-the-scenes maneuverers in many affairs, it most assuredly should not be within their domain to meddle in

Perhaps we ought not underestimate the strength of the left wing. The left wing doesn't want us to have the Anti-Ballistic Missile (ABM) system. Russia has one, though. The left wing would rather that we discard our Minutemen long-range missile proect. But Russia keeps hers. Also, the left wing feels that we should discontinue the ROTC on American campuses, while Russian student officers are still expertly and thoroughly trained. The left wing debates adamantly against the use and stockpiling of chemical and germ weapons, defoiliants, toxins, major arms and radically effective bombs. But aren't all these defense preparations cherished objectives of the Communists themselves? Must we continue paying attention to the dupes of the Communists at the risk of our national security? It remains a mystery to me

why so many militant blacks are appropriating Arab dress, adhering to Arab religious beliefs and Centuries of Black African history have recorded the sordid tales of Arab slave dealers raiding native villages, murdering the weak and placing the strong in bondage. Is it a desire on the part of some black leaders to become latter-day slave masters or is it simply one more instance of the psychological blindness of the self-designated "Muhammed Alis" and others who are only leading their own people hopelessly astray?

Some cynical observers claim that the new 3R's in American education are Radicalism, Rampaging, and Rioting. Is the student then awarded a D.R. (Doctor of Revolution) degree?

If a plumber can now earn \$9 an hour and a bricklayer \$10, I think that a school teacher who spends many years acquiring extra education should be compensated in like manner. It is a matter of public record that union bigwigs are in such strato-spherically high wage brackets that some earn almost \$100,000 a year, reflecting pay boosts of as much as \$15,000, and \$20,000, in some cases. Isn't this a little incongruous? I am sure that the teachers find it a matter of grave concern. My point is not to encourage more and more fantas-tic salary increases all across the board, but to put things in proper perspective and pay peo-ple in relation to the value of the work they do.

Permissiveness breeds promiscuity. Laxity foments lawlessness. And while I do not wish to be my neighbor's keeper, I cannot condone contempt for law and order. While I cannot offer an exact remedy to correct disorder and violence in courtrooms, to ignore impropriety on a minor scale could lead to behavior like that of those notorious, wild-eyed California hippies who seem to think they can get away with anything in the name of "freedom", even, if it is alleged, wholesale murder. The minute we forgive drastic action by excusing culprits on the basis of their "underprivileged beginnings", we openly invite the disasters that are manifested by our drug-ridden, mayhem-maddened

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


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
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
