Tom had a \$26 life jacket in the boat, but the Ranger said it didn't come up to national standards and besides the boat did not carry an oar. The boat could not be launched until corrections were made. Tom drove back several miles where he bought an oar and a \$2.00 (!) life jacket. With that he was permitted to launch his boat. (You also have to show title to your boat.)

In less time than it takes to tell there were the two boards stapled together with 6 staples and he challenged anyone to pull them apart



The bagworm, the larval stage of a moth, attacks many trees and shrubs but is especially destructive to arborvitae, juniper and cedar The insect will also infest will ows, apple, maple, oak, sycamore, abelia and other plants when populations are high. The worm gets its name from the bag in which it lives

Chemical sprays are very effective if applied before the young vorms begin to construct bags round thomselves. Treatment is ecommended as soon as the worms begin hatching and their presence noted.

For the spray application, malathion, carbary (Sevin), lead arsenate or toxaphene insecticides are effective. These chemicals are available from nurseries, garden upply stores and supermarkets unler several trade names.

Mix the selected insecticide with vator as directed on the container label and spray the infested plant from top to bottom and from the bottom to the top and from the ides to insure complete coverage. Stop spraying when the plant thoroughly wet and the material







The Nixon Administration, after a four-month "shake-down cruise, is rapidly moving into deeper and more turbulent waters. A real blockbuster was the President's approval of a revamped Great Society plan to add 4.5 million workers to the nation's unemployment insurance system, and an endorsement of federal minimum standards as a floor under unem ployment benefits. This could cost Texas employers, alone, more than \$100 million additional per year in increased payments to the unemployment fund.

2. An Administration endorse ment of legislation designed to authorize unionization of agricultural workers under supervision of a federal board.

3. A Great Society proposal to give the Equal Employment Opportunity Commission (EEOC) en forcement powers, with authority to issue cease-and-desist orders against employers whose employ ment practices happen not to jibe with whims and ideas of the agency. No jury trial would be allowed, and the resulting harassment of employers could become unbearable to many.

4. Another move, also a hang over from the Great Society's basket of goodies, gives Administration support for an increase by \$1billion a year for more food stamps to the lowest income brack ets and a further provision that no food stamp recipients be required to pay more than 30 per cent of its income for stamps. In addition, free food would be distributed in food-stamp counties, which is now prohibited.

This grandiose welfare plan would be extremely difficult administer without abuse in trying to apply the aid to legitimate recipients. The Administration plan is to allow \$100 in food stamp payments to a family of four each month, plus an undetermined amount of free food. There would be little incentive for many such families to seek employment. Moreover, the more children they have the more food they would get, and so on and on it would go.

Another creature of the Great Society, the compulsory busing of hildron in order to get : better racial mix, is now being enforced by the new Administration, with no indication thus far that this practice will be scrapped, although the President, during his campaign, has admitted the law does not require it.
