Wounded in Viet Nam on May 4th, Sergeant Wayne McGinnes early Saturday was back in a Texas hospital where his parents could visit him.

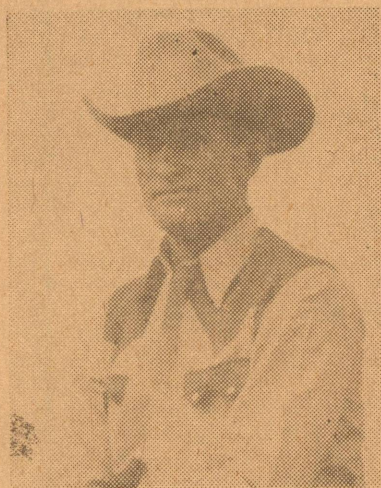

College Station, Tex.—Top Texas A&M University officials will participate in the dedication of the Earl Rudder Memorial Park at 11 a.m. Saturday in Eden, the late A&M president's birth place.

Acting A&M President Alvin R. Luedcke will give the dedication address. Clyde H. Wells of Granbury, president of the Texas A&M University System Board of Directors, will unveil the memorial marker, located in the downtown square.

General Rudder was named president of Texas A&M in July, 1959. He was named president of the Texas A&M University System in September, 1965, when the office of chancellor was consolidated with the office of university president.

Rudder died March 23, 1970, in a Houston hospital following an extended illness.

Named Outstanding Senior Band Students

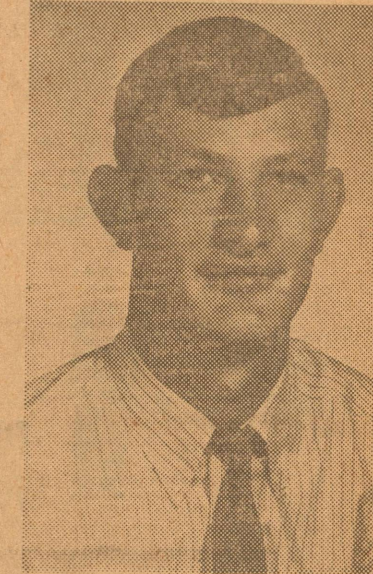

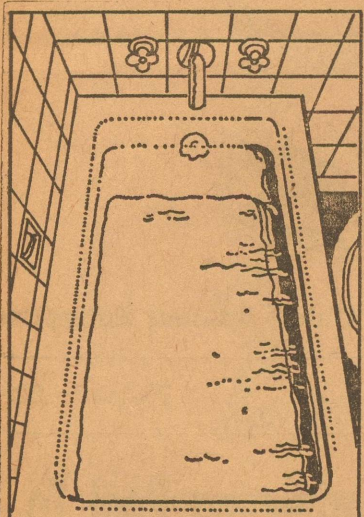
Awards for two outstanding Senior band students were given, to ragle Band members this year. Each award is a wall plaque, retained by the band, with winners names to be added each year.

TUCKER, MACPET ET AL DRILL SCHLEICHER COUNTY WILDCAT

Tucker Drilling Co., San Angelo, MACPET, Houston, et al have begun drilling a proposed 7400-foot Strawn limestone test southeast of Tankersley Field, Schleicher County, Texas. A five-foot oil sand has already been cored in the San Angelo limestone at 1178-1183 feet. The semi-wildcat, No. 1 Myrtle Williams, located on Section 42, H.E. & W.T. Railroad Co. Survey, is approximately 2500 feet ssw from a recently completed small oil well, Lively Exploration Co. No. 1 Myrtle Williams, and approximately 2550 feet nne from Atlantic Refining Co. No. 1 W. H. Williams, a 7779-foot dry-hole with good oil and gas shows in Strawn Limestone.

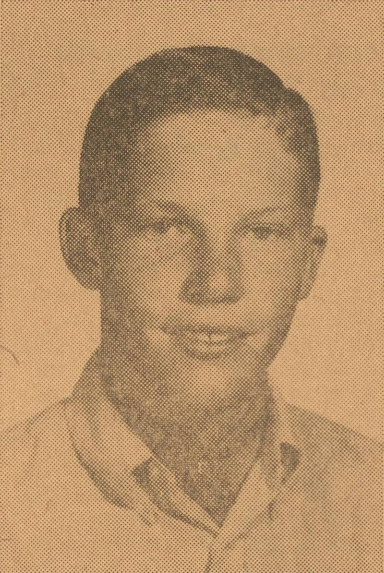
She was in Future Homemakers three years, serving this past year as secretary. She was class secretary as a junior and senior.

Janet Oglesby found a place in track this season and placed in every meet in which she ran the 880 run. Janet improved steadily and will be seen in state meets to come. She scored 48 points this year and is a freshman.

Rosellen has run on three relays most of the year but could be outstanding in the 220 or 440. She has scored 65 points and been a basic ingredient to her team's success.

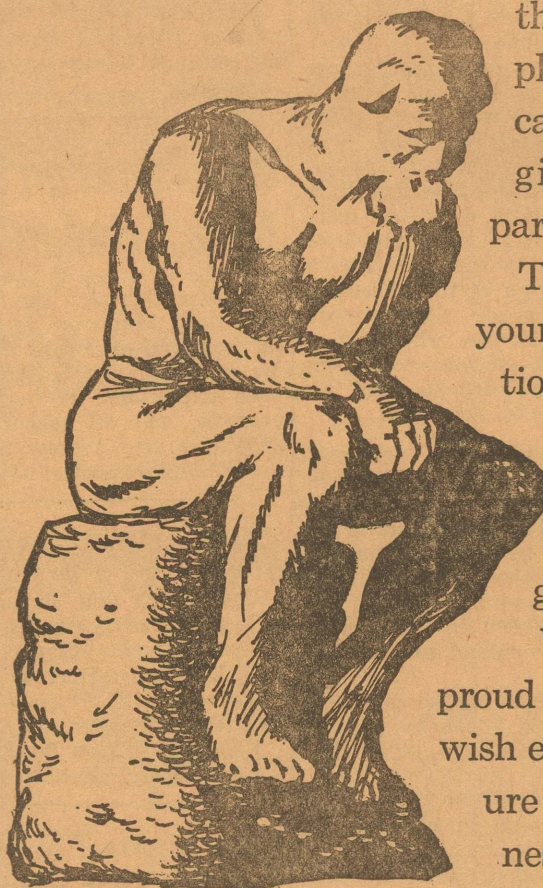

For some there were to be first places, a ribbon, or a medal to show for their efforts, sweat and a few tears and for others there were no first places, no medals, no moments of glory to show for their work but there was a sense of pride for having given to their team when it was needed. These girls can be proud of themselves. Eldorado took district championship honors, regional runner-up, and placed about 12th in state of the 225 schools competing.

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Girls Mile Relay Cops Third In State at Meet

The Eldorado girls track team participated in the State Track and Field Meet last week end and every girl finished in the top 10 in the state in their event. Twenty-four qualified for state in each event and Eldorado had Kathleen O'Harrow who finished 9th in both shot and discus, Janet Oglesby was 9th in the 880 run with a 2:39.3, her best this season. The 880 relay finished 8th with a 1:51 and the mile relay team took home third place medals with a time of 4:11.8, their best ever. It was an exciting race with Eldorado, Somerset, and Gruver battling for second. 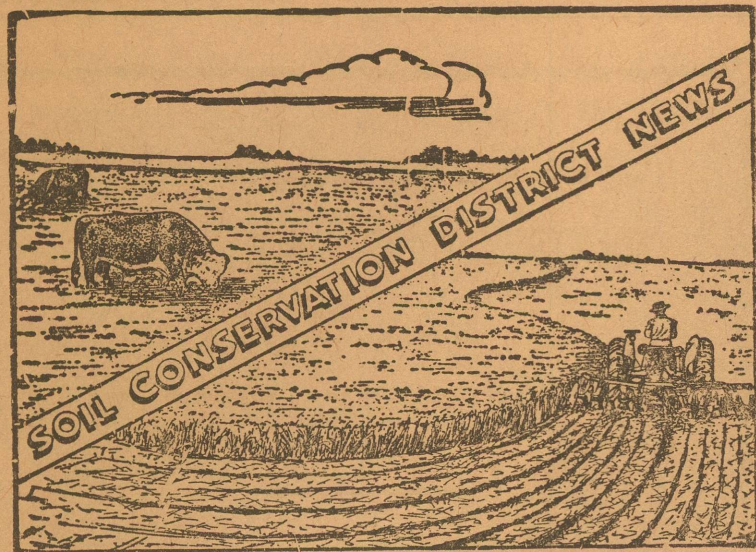
Each girl involved in the track program has made a contribution this year and with only one senior, the team should be able to set their sights high for next year.

The leveling of 33 acres of irrigated land was checked for completion on J. P. Enochs' place, 3 miles north of Eldorado, the last of January. The work was started the latter part of 1969 and was delayed by rain received in the area.

The purpose of the land leveling was to alter the topography of the land whereby efficient use of irrigation water can be achieved; to make efficient use of rainfall, prevent erosion, and facilitate proper soil and water management.

The field leveling was done on width of a hundred and five feet. All permanent borders are straight and parallel, except for borders on about three acres which are parallel, but have one slight angle. All border lengths are almost equal and only one odd or point row area exists in the entire field of 33 acres. The side fall within each hundred and five feet is 0.10 of a foot or less. End fall, in the direction of irrigation is three inches or less in the total length of about 700 feet.

Land leveling eliminates the side movement of water permitting the water to be applied to the same depth across the area being irrigated. This eliminates the waste of water that occurs when the lower side of each area being watered gets too much water and the upper side doesn't get enough water. With little or no difference in the elevations in land leveled fields, water depth will be nearly the same throughout the entire

width and length. A more efficient application of irrigation water can be obtained on level land. Also, any rainfall that is received is held and distributed evenly over the field. Thus, better use is made of rainfall.

"Probably the most important factor effected by land leveling is the opportunity time of irrigation water as well as rainfall," states Lloyd B. Johnson of the Soil Conservation Service. The opportunity time is the time water has to go into the soil at each point along the area being irrigated. To get a given amount of water in the soil, water must be held on the area for the time required to get the water into the soil. Soils that take water slowly and are not leveled, need more time to apply the water needed to reach field capacity. Most soils in the Eldorado Divide S. C. D. require a long opportunity time to get the needed water into the soil.

By managing irrigation water and water received from rainfall whereby it is held on the land for crop use, maximum potential yields can be attained. However, to attain maximum potential yields, all needed conservation practices must be applied and maintained.

Enochs received assistance from Soil Conservation Service technicians in the planning, layout and checking the land leveled field. Cost share assistance was received through the Great Plains Conservation Program.

ison of Midland and the bride's brothers, Kenneth Phelps of Pensacola, Fla. and Dennis Phelps.

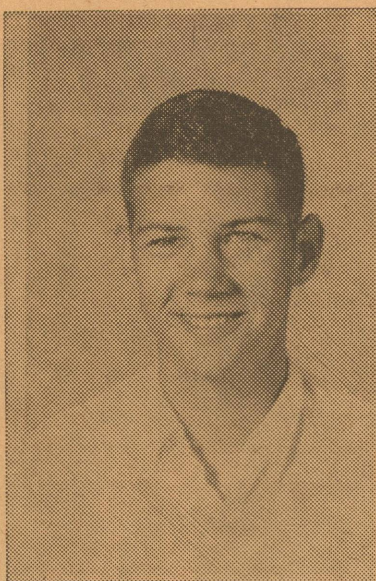

Give Sauce a Brazilian Flair
Sauces seem to be popular with vegetables; so many come packaged together. Borrow an idea from the Brazilians and make your own vegetable sauce with coconut.
Coconut Sauce for Vegetables
1 cup milk 1 tablespoon corn starch
2 cup flaked coconut 1/4 teaspoon sugar
2 tablespoons margarine 1/4 teaspoon ginger
1 teaspoon lemon juice
Heat milk to boiling. Add coconut. Remove mixture from heat. Let stand 15 to 20 minutes. Strain. Melt margarine in saucepan. Stir in corn starch, salt and ginger. Remove from heat. Gradually stir in coconut milk. Bring to a boil over medium heat, stirring constantly. Cook and stir for one minute. Remove from heat and blend in lemon juice. Serve hot over vegetables. Makes 1 cup coconut sauce.

BRUSHING UP ON OUTDOOR PAINTING

COUNTY AGENT'S COLUMN

The Schleicher County adult leaders association is calling a meeting with all 4-H and FFA members and parents, and with those youths who want to be in 4-H or FFA and their parents. The association so states Ronnie Mittel, president of the association in a letter to all parents and other individuals welcome this chance to present the youth programs livestock, fun days, horse club activities and achievement days.

Leaders know that you want to become a part of this endeavor of planned programs for youth.

The pecan nut case borer is present in the county and pecans should be sprayed this week. The eggs are found on the tips of the nutlet and are pearl gray in color. Use malathion which is a good, safe spray to use, or sevin is also considered good.

The development of agricultural chemicals which can be safely used and with telling effect on our insect pests and dread-d diseases is one of the marvels of our age.

Without agricultural chemicals, food quality would certainly drop and prices would rise. Many everyday foods such as fruits and many vegetables could become luxury items.

Agricultural chemicals are a necessity for maintaining high crop production. But, they must be used with care and in accordance with proved recommendations.

With the arrival of warmer weather, insect populations will build up and disease organisms will attack plants and control measures will become more important.

With the aid of pesticides, one American farmer is now producing enough food and fiber for 45 people. Back in 1957-59, he was supplying the needs of only 23 persons.

Most of the concern over the use of agricultural chemicals has resulted from their improper use.

If pesticides must be used around the home, in the garden or on the farm, use them safely and wisely. Read the container label and follow directions to the letter. There should be no hesitancy in using pesticides when they are needed. They are safe and effective when used for the purpose so stated on the label.

Statistics can be used to support anything—mostly statisticians.

The federal minimum wage for farm workers in 1970 is the same as 1969. The Federal Minimum Wage Law for farm workers started on February 1, 1967 at \$1 per hour. It increased to \$1.15 in 1968 and to \$1.30 per hour in 1969.

Most farm workers in Schleicher county and even the State of Texas will not come under the "Minimum Wage" provisions because most farmers do not have 500 or more man-days of qualified farm labor in any calendar quarter. But competition from those farmers under the minimum wage law and from non-farm jobs has forced wages above the minimum level.

Keeping good reliable farm workers requires good labor relations, good working conditions and benefits comparable with other job opportunities. Farmers who want to attract and keep good qualified workers may need to review what is being offered.

The relationship between workers and employers may be improved by keeping the worker informed on matters that concern him by providing good buildings and equipment to work with and by assigning jobs they are best qualified to do.

Vacations and time off are important to the workers. Advance planning can reduce much of the need for irregular hours in farming. Adequate and comfortable housing, a pay scale competitive for the area and incentive payment plans will contribute much to maintaining a productive and stable farm work force.

Would you like to add years of useful life to your wooden outdoor furniture? You can by treating it with a wood preservative and a water repellent.

The best material available for brush on preservative treatment is pentachlorophenol with a water repellent, often called "penta-WR." The preservative should be mixed with mineral spirits and be of the "paintable" type. It can be obtained in either concentrated or ready-to-use form from local building supply stores.

Sold under a variety of trade names, the label should be checked to make certain that both penta and the water repellent are included. Penta safeguards wood against decay and the water repellent provides resistance to moisture absorption.

All types of wooden outdoor furniture, including that made from cedar, redwood and cypress should be protected with penta-WR. The preservative may be applied on the dry, clean wood with a brush. Three or four applications are best with two or three days drying time between each application.

All wood exposed to the weather or in contact with the soil is subject to rot. The heartwood of some species such as cedar, cypress, catalpa, bois-d'arc and redwood will resist decay for a longer period than other woods. The outer, lighter colored woods of these species, called sapwood, readily decays like other woods under outdoor conditions.

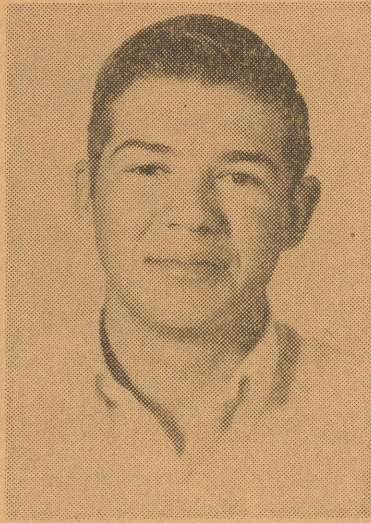
Methodist Notes

SIX FLAGS Over Texas Open 7 Days A Week

I Did Co-Sponsor Anti-Obscenity Bill

To Eldorado Success Eldorado, Tex.

I normally do not take note of irresponsible statements made by political candidates. I find the public is quite capable of evaluating such publicity for what it is. I am, however, taking note of a news story in the May 14 issue of the Eldorado Success. I am doing so simply because it is false and unfounded—not a word of truth in it. In the story a candidate opposing me is quoted as saying that I falsified in saying I had been a co-sponsor of an anti-obscenity bill (H. R. 15693) which passed the House on April 28.

The facts; I WAS a co-sponsor. Had I not been a co-sponsor I would not have said so in my weekly Newsletter.

The anti-obscenity bill (H. R. 15693) which was approved in the House on April 28, was, according to the Chairman of the Committee, Mr. Thaddeus Dulski, a re-write of a number of anti-obscenity measures pending before his Committee, and he added that H. R. 13477—of which I am a joint author—was the principal basis for the drafting of H. R. 15693.

While I am writing this I will enclose a copy of a letter dated April 24, signed by Mr. Dulski, Chairman of the Committee which authored the anti-obscenity bill, notifying me as "a sponsor of legislation to control obscene matter sent through the mails, . . ." that the bill (H. R. 15693) was to be considered in the House on April 28.

Incidentally, this measure, of which I was co-sponsor, was virtually uncontested. Because of that I was able to be in Abilene, Texas on April 28 to speak to an annual banquet of 4-H Clubs, which included delegates from many of the counties in my district.

Surely the candidate running against me does not intend to imply criticism of me because of my fight against obscenity and smut. I would prefer to think he has been the innocent victim of over-zealous advisors. Frankly, the motivation for this obviously false release is obscure.

In my judgment the smut peddler is one of our worst public enemies, and regardless of what others may think I shall continue my battle against this form of filth.

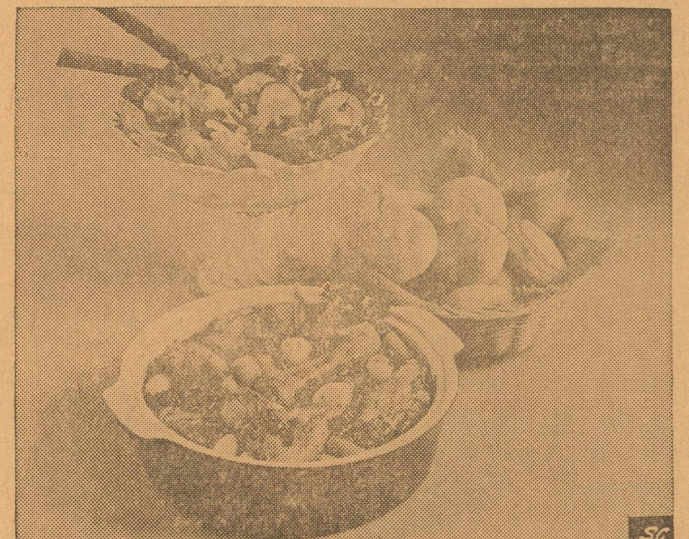

Mince Meat Spices Chicken



If this savory casserole looks good enough to eat, it's not an accident. The Borden Kitchen developed Spicy Chicken to be as good as it looks. - 1/4 cup sifted all-purpose flour
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1 (3-lb.) broiler-fryer chicken, cut up
- 2 tablespoons vegetable oil
- 1 lb. small white pearl onions, peeled
- 5 medium carrots, pared, cut into 1-inch pieces
- 2 tablespoons dehydrated parsley flakes
- 1 cup red wine
- 2 1/2 cups (one 28-oz. jar) None Such Ready-to-Use Mince Meat
- 2 teaspoons salt

Combine flour and salt; coat chicken pieces with flour mixture. In Dutch oven or large skillet, heat oil. Brown chicken pieces on both sides over high heat. Remove chicken from skillet. In same oil, saute onions, carrots and parsley, about 1 minute. Pour in wine and mince meat. Add the 2 teaspoons salt. Return chicken to sauce; bring to boil. Cook over low heat, about 1 hour or until chicken is tender. Serve with buttered noodles.

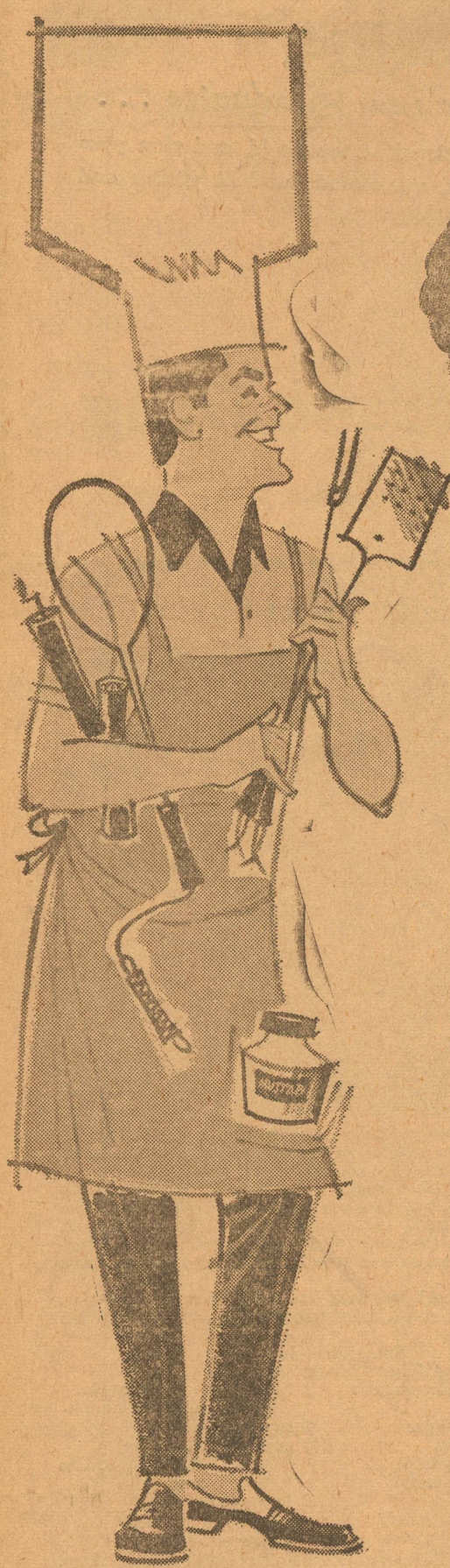
