Coconut Sauce for Vegetables 1 tablespoon corn starch un flaked coconut 1/4 teaspoon sugar 1/4 teaspoon ginger 2 tablospoons margarine

1 teaspoon lemon juice Heat milk to boiling. Add coconut. Remove mixture from heat. Let stand 15 to 20 minutes. Strain. Melt margarine in saucepan. Stir in corn starch, salt and ginger. Remove from heat. Gradually stir in coconut milk. Bring to a boil over medium heat, stirring constantly. Cook and stir for one minute. Remove from heat and blend in lemon juice. Serve hot over vegetables.

The best seasons for such a job are late spring, late summer and early fall, Try for a windless day that is clear and dry, with a temperature of 50 to 80 degrees. Begin as early as possible after the morning dew has evaporated and quit in midafternoon, giving the paint a few hours to set before the evening dew condenses.

To prepare the surface for good adhesion, it must be clean and firm. Scrape off peeling paint, fill holes and cracks with proper patching material, and sand smooth. Seal knots and sap streaks with shellac. Don't galvanized metal and hose off any loose dirt.



BE CAUTIOUS WITH OVERHEATED ENGINE

Unless a driver knows what to do when he has an overheating problem, he risks serious personal injury and aggravated damage to the engine. Even the simple act of removing the radiator cap when overheating occurs requires a special tech-

1. When the overheating becomes evident, stop the car as soon and as safely as possible. Then turn off the ignition.

2. Wait for the engine to cool down. The wait may be several minutes long but it is vital. A fine mist of water will help cool the radiator but do not put a stream of cold water on the engine or radiator.

3. When removing the radiator cap, protect your hands with a thick glove or a heavy wadding of rags. Keep your

Open 7 Days A Week

Arlington, Tex.——SIX FLAGS Over Texas began its summer sea-son, with daily operation last week end.

Beginning Saturday, May 23, the popular theme park located midway between Dallas and Ft. Worth will be open from 10 a.m. until 10 p.m. seven days a week thru Labor Day.

I Did Co-Sponsor Anti-Obscenity Bill

By Congressman O. C. Fisher To Eldorado Success Eldorado, Tex.

I normally do not take note of irresponsible statements made by political candidates. I find the public is quite capable of evaluating such publicity for what it is. I am. however, taking note of a news story in the May 14 issue of the Eldorado Success. I am doing so simply because it is false and unfounded-not a word of truth in it. In the story a candidate prosing me is quoted as saving that I falsified in saying I had been a co-sponsor of an anti-obscenity bill (H. R. 15693) which passed the

House on April 28. The facts: I WAS a co-sponsor. Had I not been a co-sponsor I would not have said so in my weekly Newsletter.

The anti-obscenity bill (H. R. 15693) which was approved in the House on April 28 was, according to the Chairman of the Committee, Mr. Thaddeus Dulski, a re-write of a number of anti-obscenity measures pending before his Committee, and he added that H. R. 13477 of which I am a joint authorwas the principal basis for the drafting of H. R. 15693.

While I am writing this I will enclose a copy of a letter dated April 24, signed by Mr. Dulski, Chairman of the Committee which authored the anti-obscenity bill, notifying me as "a sponsor of legislation to control obscene matter sent through the mails, . that the bill (H. R. 15693) was to be considered in the House on

April 28. Incidentally, this mesure, which I was co-sponsor, was virtually uncontested. Because of that I was able to be in Abilene, Texas on April 28 to speak to an annual banquet of 4-H Clubs, which included delegates from many of the counties in my district.

Surely the candidate running against me does not intend to imply criticism of me because of my fight against obscenity and smut. I would prefer to think he has been the innocent victim of over-zealous advisors. Frankly, the motivation for this obviously false release is ob-

In my judgment the smut peddler is one of our worst public enemies, and regardless of what others may think I shall continue my battle against this form of filth.



Mince Meat Spices Chicken


