Texas ice storms are born from a very special kind of weather when temperatures repair work at Colorado City, had such as the U. S. Eaglettes Lose To R'springs Saturday





sources for the same practice on the same acres. This program will not cost-share on all good practices. For instance, it will not make payments on a practice like deferred grazing. But even though you might not be paid for it, you will have to agree to a deferred grazing program in your contract. All agreedon practices to receive cost share must meet specifications.

A good feature about this program is its flexibility. If a producer has a practice planned for a particular year and something comes up beyond his control, the contract can be modified to move the practice up a year.

The producer can also speed up his contract by doing work faster than he originally planned.

Federal cost-share is based on a fixed percentage of the average cost of doing a job. The percentage is different for different jobs, varying from 50% to 80% as the Government's share. Each county within the Great Plains Conservation Program area has a Great Plains county committee that prepares a list of practices in which they want the Federal Government to participate. This list is used in preparing Great Plains contracts for the county, listing the work to be done and when. In working with the farmer or rancher, all the practices to be done are listed. Then a schedule of when the work is to be done is made—this year, next year, the year after, or whenever the producer thinks he can do the

The contract is based on a long range conservation plan designed by the producer himself, with help of trained conservation personnel. Contracts are flexible to take care of changing conditions and in no case will landowner be bound to anything other than what is in the original contract.

Within the Great Plains area 665 Great Plains contracts were signed in July-September, bringing a total to 35,335. At present there are 5,687 unserviced applications.






