Heavy populations of fall armyworms are causing extensive damage to wheat and oats as well as to recently planted small grains in Eden Scoreless the county.

Where infestations persist, stand reduction or loss is not uncommon. After a field is cleaned out fall armyworms invade adjoining fields.

The larval stage lasts about 20 days during which time the fall armyworm reaches a length of 1½ Robert Lee and Eden 0. inches. The full grown larvae vary n color from tan or green to nearly black. The most prominent character for identifying the fall armyworm is the inverted Y on the from egg to adult requires 28 to 52 days depending on weather conditions.

Most effective control is obtaind when fall armyworms are small. President Nixon, who by the onstitution is our Commander-inthief, has announced a plan of gradual disengagement, as

placements of South Vietnamese are trained and equipped to take over the burden of the war. That being our nation's policy, it should in my judgment have the full support of all Americans.

There is a right way and wrong way to express legitimate dissent. But, as I see it, in time of war when our troops are being killed and our flag attacked, no American has a moral right to voice dissent in a manner calcuated to give aid and comfort to

the enemy. Progress is being made in pursu ance of the President's plans. Already more than 97% of South Vietnamese troops have been equ pped with our superior M-16 rifles More than half of the Mekong Delta area is now under military control of the South, and their air force is taking over much of the air support, and will do more as pilots are trained.

Indeed, there are very knowledgeable military people who believe we are, in a sense, winning the war against Communist aggressors.

Their losses have been astronomical. During the war more than 550,000 Communists have been killed—by actual head count. And there must have been many more. Despite these heavy losses the enmy, apparently inspired greatly by the anti-war clamor in this country, keep pouring more troops into the fray

Now, of all times, we need to close ranks and give full support to the American withdrawal-replacement plan.

But nothing will ever be able to take the place of that first edible package—the good ice cream

It's a fact—rice is as good when reheated as when it was first prepared. Rice can be refrigerated about a week or frozen up to 8 months either separately or with any other food that freezes well.

When storing cooked rice, cover the container so that the grains will not dry out or absorb the flavors of other foods.

To reheat, add rice to enough hot liquid in pan to prevent scorching. Cover pan tightly, reduce heat to simmer and steam about 5 min-

The recipe which follows is my favorite way of using cooked rice, either fresh or left over. It is quick and simple to make and tastes good. I use left over fried chicken usually. Since the meat is chopped the wings and back work out well.

Fried Rice and Meat

2 tablespoons fat or oil 1 cup (about) cut up cooked ham, pork, chicken, turkey or canned

luncheon meat. 1/2 small onion, chopped

4 cups cooked rice 2 tablespoons soy sauce

Measure fat or oil. Place in a large frying pan and put over medium heat. Add chopped meat and onion. Cook until onion is tender. Add cooked rice, reduce heat and cook 10 minutes. Break egg into small bowl. Beat well. Add to rice mixture. Cook and stir 5 minutes. The egg coats the other ingredients and is not visible when cooked. Add soy sauce and mix well. Makes

6 servings about 3/4 cup each. Teamed with a green salad and fruit for dessert this dish offers a well balanced meal from a nutritional standpoint and is as inexpensive as good food comes today.
