It was 5:00 o'clock Monday and quitting time for all office workers, but up in the court house in the sheriff's office there was no pause for the two clerks, Fenna Whitten and Dorothy Evans.

They were manning the two-way short wave system as well as two or three telephones, receiving calls for help and then relaying them to possible volunteers.

It was a big fire up in the Toenail Trail area, in northeast part of the county. When the alarm sounded here at noon three Eldorado trucks were directed to the Harkey place operated by C. L. McMillan, but by 5:00 o'clock short-wave was reporting fires at the Walter Duff and Thomerson ranches as well as Vanderstucken.

Appeals were coming in for farm sprayers as well as bulldozers for throwing up fire breaks. In most cases the girls were able to report back in 20 minutes that equipment was on the way.

Eldorado firemen responded to the call shortly after noon with three county trucks, each manned by at least three men. As the fire spread they were joined by units from Wall, Sonora, Menard, Ozona, San Angelo, Christoval, and the Emergency Corps from Angelo.

Along about 5:00 word came in that Eldorado trucks were about to run out of gas, and a phone call brought out Jack Hext who soon reported a truck load of gasoline was on its way. There were three possible ways to get to the fires: (1) Go to Christoval and go out on the Toenail Trail, (2) Go east on the Menard road until you come to Toenail intersection, and (3) Go down through Little Mexico and follow road to Harkey place.

#### **One Truck Left**

With the three county fire trucks gone, Eldorado was left with but one city fire truck, and Lum Burk and Palmer West were left with it to be responsible in case a fire broke out here in town. With most of our active firemen already out on duty, Mr. West notified a number of ex-firemen to be prepared to come in case of a city fire. Luckily none occurred.

Incidentally the city truck is the kind that can operate only if it is connected to a fire plug. Wouldn't be too effective on a grass fire.

Up around 6:30 Sonora broke in on the short wave to report that they had a ranch fire of their own, some 15 or 20 miles east of Sonora. No doubt they were anxious to get their truck back home.

By 8:30 the sheriff's office reported the fire pretty well under control. Sonora units had already returned home and some of the others were being released. All three Eldorado units were still on the job at 9:00 p.m.

The Electric Co-Op in Eldorado sent several men out to the fire along with their communication equipment. As the afternoon wore on Mary McGinnes contacted firemen's wives who prepared and carried out lunches.

It is estimated that over 2,200 acres were burned over.

# HEALTH & SAFETY-Mainly for Mothers by Carol Hart

#### Family Health and Safety Concern of Brides

More than two million brides will be starting new households in 1969. Among their first chores as homemakers will be planning home safety and family health.

Certainly a new bride and bridegroom should select as soon as possible a family doctor who can become familiar with their medical history and keep tabs on their .

growing family. Keep your physician's phone number on the telephone together with any others you need in an emergency - your pharmacist, your fire and police departments,

and your local hospital. The Council on Family Health, a non-profit organization sponsored as a public service by leading members of the drug industry to promote home safety and family health, suggests that the new bride establish good safety habits on the storage, care and use of medicines.

Following are some safety rules for every homemaker: 1. Plan the contents of your medicine chest. Keep medicines and toiletries in separate cabinets, or, if they must be kept in one cabinet, store medicines on the upper shelves and toiletries

on lower shelves. 2. Divide the medicine section into two parts - one for medicines that are to be taken internally, and the other for those medicines that are applied externally.

3. Take inventory of the contents of the cabinet at least once every six months. Discard medi-cines with damaged or unread-icines to your family.



#### Topic: Refund Record for 1968


When the tax surcharge was passed there was a small gap in what most taxpayers had withheld and what they would owe. It appeared that many taxpayers would end up 1968 owing the government money. Based on this difference, IRS predicted slightly fewer funds, and certainly a reduction in the amount of the average refund check. However, it didn't work out that way, in the Dallas District at least. By June 30, 1969, Internal Revenue had issued 1,008,650 refund checks to North Texans, for a probably record amount of \$170,-206,756.04.

The best guess on the cause of an increase in the number and amount of refunds rather than a decrease—North Texas taxpayers don't like to end up the year owing Uncle Sam. As a matter of fact, a good part of the North Texans filing tax returns carefully arrange their withholding payments make sure that they have a refund coming rather than owing taxes. In general, the idea of a water plan is good. We have needed a plan for a long time. We know that there is little chance of water conservation without a plan, and that we will soon be in mortal trouble without water planning. But the need for a plan is not a good argumet for a bad and dangerous plan. Mere existence of a plan does not conserve anything, and planned collective destruction of natural resources can eliminate them faster than individuals ever could. Rather than following today's argument which goes: We must have a water plan, so vote for the Texas Water Plan! we must take time to ask: Is this particular plan good or bad in what it will do to our natural resources and our environment? Only by answering this question can we evaluate this aspect of the Water Plan properly, and this is exactly what has been avoided so far.

Texas may someday have a plan for intrastate water transfer and utilization, but THE TEXAS WATER PLAN IS NOT IT!
