Report meetings will be held at Java Junction the mornings of Oct. 24, 28 and 31st.



The main problem in control is early detection. Control is easier and less expensive when the worms are small. Since the worms leave only the midribs of the leaves, the infested spots take, on a silvery appearance. If spots are noted where plants have lost their green color, better make a close check

for the small worms. Since residue problems may be encountered, control measures can be obtained from this or another

county agent's office. Sevin used two pounds to the acre is a very effective control, if small area is being grazed.

High moisture in farm-stored grain can be very expensive since much of the grain can be lost. But high moisture can be removed from

the grain by aeration.

Once the grain is in the bin, it should be checked at regular intervals. If the moisture content reaches a questionable level, the bin should be probed, a representacounty agent's office or your lea- tive sample collected and tested at an elevator. If the test shows moisture content above 12.5%, prep arations should be made to aerate

> A fan that will produce as much as 1/10 cubic feet of air per minute per bushel of grain should be used. Aeration should be done during relatively dry weather conditions, avoiding periods of rainfall and high humidity.

Move wet grain if it is possible to aerate it. This will help dry the grain but is usually an expensive method of drying; however, it could prevent a heavy loss.
