New Tax Form To Be In Use On January 1, 1970

If you don't know about the new income tax form, you will shortly and milk.) after January 1. Internal Revenue Service has issued a fact sheet on the new form 1040. Here are some

The new 1040 not only replaces the card form 1040A, but also the old 1040 form. The new form is a one page basic form to which schedules can be added to cover any tax situation. IRS says that 77 million returns will be filed for this year-1969. An estimated 31million will use only one page. Another 22 million returns will consist of the new one-page form and one additional attachment.

Thus, about 75% of all the 1969 income tax returns will require only one or two pages. IRS assures taxpayers who formerly filed the little card form 1040A that the new form will not complicate filing nor require additional information of them. The new form simply provides a different place for the information that should actually be easier to use.

The tax folks feel that the new form will help 1040A filers take advantage of all the deductions available to them, especially those who overpaid their income taxes because they were not aware of, or could not take advantage of, the various tax benefits available to them. Internal Revenue gave the problem long and thorough study before they changed the tax form. Let's all hope it will make the job easier and save us a few bucks.





Ramsey says that the hunter's success depends on the movement of the deer rather than the deer density. This movement is in turn dependent on the available food supply. If the food supply is good, the animals will not go to the feed pens and expose themselves to the hunter's deer blind.

An exception to this movement might be the early morning. "rutting", or breeding, season for certain bucks. The excellent food supply has resulted in an earlier rutting season than usual. Ramsey explained that during this time, the buck will go off proposal to decorate the hospital feed and begin wandering, thus exposing himself to the hunter.
