

He pointed out that a good crop of perennial grasses on a piece of land would protect the soil against erosion and usually improve its fertility and structure. As a matter of fact, grass crops, properly treated, are one of the most effective tools available for conserving and improving the soil. A large percentage of our present grassland is not producing nearly so much as it could. The grass cover on many pastures and ranges is not even adequate to control erosion, he said.
