
A. R. Parker Buried Here Last Saturday

Oil News

HTC Corp., Abilene, acidized the Canyon reef lime with 500 gallons through perforations at 5,410 to 5,420 feet, swabbed the section dry, reacidized with 1,500 gallons and recovered a show of oil on the swab at No. 1 Tisdale Estate, section 30, block M, GH&SA survey, a former 5,900-foot Schleicher county failure eight miles northeast of Eldorado, and one mile south, southeast of the Hulldale Pennsylvanian oil and gas area, but separated from it by a failure. It then was shut down for orders.

It originally was drilled by Sinclair Oil & Gas Co. as its No. 1 Willie Tisdale and plugged July 18, 1956.

Cvrus Frost, et al, Eastland, staked a 5/8-mile outpost to the Cheaney Strawn lime pool of Schleicher county, 24 miles northeast of Eldorado, as No. 1 Fortune-Cheaney, 660 feet from south and west lines of section 38, block 8, TW&NG survey, A-831, a 4,800foot test.

There's a powerful lesson on every dollar bill. Take a look at the back of one-the green sidei. e., the "greenback." The two circles represent both sides of the Great Seal of the United States.

Origin of Symbols

The founders of our country thought it so important to express the basic truths of our Nation in the great seal that the matter was brought before Congrss on the very afternoon of the signing of the Declaration of Independence, July 4, 1776.

Three great leaders, Thomas Jefferson, Benjamin Franklin, and John Adams wre appointed as a committee of three to prepare the seal. Six years later, on June 20. 1782, after exhaustive study and largely through the efforts of William Barton and Charles Thomson, Congress passed a resolution approving the final design of the great seal.

Details With a Meaning

Here are some of the significant details we found through our research:

1. Pyramid: First of all, note the pyramid in the left hand circle. It represents the material strength of our country. In the words of William Barton, who played such an important part in designing it, it stands for strength and duration.





James Logan Brought El Dorado Woolen Mills Home From Hospital


James Logan was brought home last Thursday from Albuquerque, New Mexico, where he was a patient for a number of weeks in the veterans hospital.




