



Earlier the regulatory body committed itself to a new rate-making formula taking into account investment income of companies and guaranteeing profit on underwriting after taxes.

Staff recommendations would build into the rate base a 4.7% profit on policy writing and an 8.7% allowance for state and federal taxes.

Industry representatives, still not satisfied, argued their case for a 27.7% average statewide increase and removal of the arbitrary limitation of 25% for any line. They claimed serious underwriting losses of \$45.7 million over the last decade.

Proposals brought angry rumbles from legislators. Sen. Oscar Mauzy of Dallas predicted that lawmakers "will not allow this economic miscarriage of justice to stand unchallenged." Rep. Joe Allen of Baytown also called the proposed rate increases "tragic abuse of government regulation and free enterprise system.

Texas AFL-CIO has called on drivers to appeal to the Legislature for a change in the rate system, and reportedly is studying possible legal action.

Welfare Changes Urged

A raise in welfare benefits, removal of the constitutional ceiling on payments, reorganization of the Department of Public Welfare and a new approach to problems of needy families with dependent children were recommended by the blue-ribbon Senate Welfare Study Committee

Committee said the state must aim at development of children rather than simply maintaining them on aid rolls to break the poverty cycle.



Baking Fruitcakes College Station, Tex.-Fruitcakes will spark the holiday with flavor

excitement when spiced with just the right assortment of fruits, says Gwendolyne Clyatt, Extension con-

sumer marketing specialist. The fixin's for fruitcake include citron, lemon peel, orange peel, cherries and pineapple.

Citron, lemon and orange peel are available diced in glace form, covered with a light coat of sugar or drained with all the surplus sugar removed. They are also available in mixed fruit combinations.

Cherries are packed whole in glace form, and are colored red and green.

Pineapple is packed in glace form as slices, fingers or diced. They are colored red, green and yellow. Candied fruits, in 4- and 8-ounce containers, are available in bulk displays, cello-packs and vacuum jars. Most stores stock candied fruits to last only through the holiday season because of limited demand the rest of the year. If planning to buy an excess supply for later use, purchase vacuum jars; they have better keeping qualities.

Nutmeats are important ingredients in fruitcakes. Two pounds of unshelled nuts make about one pound (3 or 4 cups, depending on variety) of nutmeats. When unshelled nuts are priced at half the cost of shelled nuts, they are equally good buys.

Bake fruitcakes in differentsized containers for variety. A 6ounce fruit juice can is ideal for a small loaf. Fruitcakes baked in one-pound coffee cans may be put back into the can for safe traveling through the mail. Ring molds and various sizes of loaf pans also add variety.

For large fruitcakes, line the pans with brown paper and grease with shortening. Grease smaller pans, afncy molds and juice cans well. Put a round of greased wax paper in the bottom of the juice

Fill pans with batter to within one-half inc hof the top, juice cans to within one inch. Set a pan of hot water on the bottom of the oven during baking to prevent a heavy crust from forming.

Bake fruitcakes in a slow oven, 250 to 300 degrees. A 9x5x3 pan needs about 21/2 hours; one-pound coffee can, about 2 hours; 8-inch ring mold, about 1½ hours; and a juice can about 45 minutes. Cool cakes thoroughly before wropping in heavy foil, or plastic.

Store in a cool place 3 to 4 weeks to ripen. Decorate or frost cakes after aging.



sent problems as you try to choose just the right tree for your home, advises Everett Janne, Extension landscape horticulturist at Texas A&M University.

Proper selection and treatment enhance the long-lasting beauty of a Christmas tree, he reminds.

The first rule in selecting the freshest tree is to shop early. To determine how fresh a tree is, first check the needles. They should be resilient and not brittle when bent. The needles should adhere when you rub your fingers down the branch. Shake or bounce the tree on the ground lightly to see the needles are firmly attached. If only a few drop, the tree is undoutedly fresh and is more likey to retain its needles throughout the holiday season.

Trees on the lot always appear smaller than they actually are. Since Christmas trees are sold acording to height, it is economically unwise to buy one several feet taller than the ceiling at home.

Look for a tree with a uniform triangular taper. Check to see that it is free of weak, broken or unduly long branches. Also, it should have a well-filled-out look.

Once home, make a diagonal cut at the base of the tree, removing one to two inches of the base. Stand the tree in water and keep the base immersed. The tree should be stored in a cool, shady spot, indoors or outdoors, until time for decorating.

A Christmas tree with its base immersed in water will remain safe from ignition from a point source, such as a match flame, for at least three weeks, if installed reasonably fresh.

Add water to the base container daily to replace amounts absorbed by the tree. A five or six foot tree may use as much as a gallon of water a day. Low humidity found n most heated homes increases the lifficulty of keeping the foliage resh.

Locate the tree so that it is not in the air stream of heating vents or near other sources of heat. Use a fire screen before a fireplace to

Words on America

Ring Clearly 100 Years After English Protester's Gone

Wrote an English tourist in America: "See what is passing now. Look at the exhausted Treasury, the paralyzed gov-ernment . . . the desperate contests between North and South? The iron curb and brazen muzzle fastened upon every man who speaks his . . . The stabbings and mind shootings . . . the intrusion of the most pitiful, mean, malicious, creeping, crawling, sneaking party spirit into all transactions of life. . . . The nation is a body without a head, and arms and legs are occupied in quarreling with the trunk and each other, and exchanging bruises at random."

That letter was written 128 years ago, by Charles Dickens, during the tour that resulted in his "American Notes". Until recently, the letter was hardly known, and its first publication will be in a book of Dickens' letters to be brought out later this year.

Although Mr. Dickens has been dead exactly one hundred years, it is a good time to remind today's young pro-testers they are not the first to complain about the ills of industrialized society

It would be well for present generations — young and old—to read and reread some of Dickens' classics for the ring of his words still, a century later, could shatter glass. His observations, descriptions and evocations are like hammer on steel. The young people of today who honor some of the current writers of protest literature, would do themselves a favor to look upon Dickens, for he still ranks as the master.

Dickens came to America, as he had told his publisher, convinced that he could un-derstand "a democratic kingless country freed from the shackles of class rule." Per-haps he understood it, but he was disappointed. In his let-ter he wrote of "his secret opinion of this country; its. follies, vices, grievous disap-pointments.... I believe the heaviest blow ever dealt at

Dickens was more moderate in his "American Notes," however, and he concluded his letter with a postscript: "I need not say that I have many pleasant things to say of Amer-ica. God forbid that it should be otherwise. I speak to you (Americans) as I would to Freedom, disappointed- that's

His later trip to the U.S. was more rewarding and one of the characters of a Dickens novel said Americans have "Such a passion for liberty they can't help taking liberties with her."

And this seems to be the same love-hate relationship modern Americans have with their beloved democracy.

It appears, however, that Dickens had a healthy respect for Benjamin Franklin, the American statesman and scientist and concurred with him wholeheartedly in his proposal that the Wild Turkey be adop-ted as our national symbol, in-

genous to America. He wrote:

"The Wild Turkey is a fabulous bird." It can outrun a galloping horse for a distance long enough to get out of gunshot. Despite its weight, it is agile and swift in flight as well as afoot. It was almost extinct not too many years ago. Its survival and propagation in our country is a tribute to American conservation.

The fact remains that whether or not Ben Franklin's wild turkey became the offi-cial symbol of America is of no significance now. This intelligent, freedom loving bird has earned an honored niche of its own in modern Ameri-cana as well as in early American history.


It might be of interest, too, that during a Wild Turkey shoot in South Carolina another honored American pro-duct was born-the Wild Turkey bourbon, which was de-veloped as a tribute to that party. Its proof, 101, just happened that way.

In retrospect, John Tyler was President 128 years ago at the time Dickens wrote on America. Slavery still had two more decades remaining. There were only 26 states in the Union. The population was 17 million, and Wild Turkey Bourbon had not yet made its debut. Perhaps if it had, Dickens would have written on a happier note.



New Legislation To Protect Consumer

College Station, Tex.-Each year up to a million credit cards are lost and three hundred thousand are stolen. To protect a consumer plagued to disappearing credit cards, Congress has passed a new law that will be effective Jan. 23, reports Doris Myers, Extension specialist in home management.

The new law states that an individual will not be liable for any loss from unauthorized use of his card after he has reported its disappearance to the issuer. Notice may be by telephone or by letter.

Most companies will cancel use of the card once they have been notified. If the notice is by letter, cancellation is effective the day the letter is postmarked. For losses occurring before notification liability is limited to \$50.

The \$50 liability applies separ-ately to each card that is lost. So, if a billfold or purse containing five credit cards is misplaced, the potential maximum liability is a total of \$250. If a husband and wife lose their cards on a joint account, however, the total liability is limited to \$50.

The new law also prohibits banks and other firms from mailing out unrequested credit cards. Companies must inform the user of his rights and potential liabilities, plus they must assume the legal burden of paying for liabilities the card holder may suffer.


