Absentee Voting To Start October 14th

Wednesday, Oct. 14 to Friday, Oct. 30, inclusive, is the period for absentee voting by personal appearance in the Nov. 3 general election.

Any qualified voter in Texas who expects to be absent from the county of his residence, on Nov. may cast an absentee ballot. To do so, he should take his voter's registration certificate to the 'county clerk's office during its hours of operation in the Oct. 14 to Oct. 30 period.

Students and servicemen may request ballots by mail.

In addition to state, district and local races, the Nov. 3 ballot will include 7 proposed amendments to the Texas Constitution.

By subject, the proposed amendments relate to: (1) censure and removal of judges; (2) authority for mixed beverage law; (3) assessment of farm, ranch and forest increase value of homestead exemp-tion from forced sale; and (7) auth- Thornton and his family moved government.





Rural Housing Loans Aided 21,000 Texans

Austin, Tex.-Rural housing loans hade through the Farmers Home Administration during the past fiscal year provided better housing for an estimated 21,000 people in the rural and smaller communities of Texas. The 4,604 loans, totaling \$37,173,160, covered the purchase or improvement of individual famly homes, plus \$1,322,910 for rental housing units.

Nearly 650 Texas retail lumber dealers, Farmers Home Administration personnel and other interested parties attended a series of 17 one-day workshops designed to instruct the lumber dealers how to process applications for rural housing loans. 



Cotton left on the ground, resulting from improper adjustment of picking machinery, can mean the difference between a loss or profit on the crop.

A properly adjusted and operatoperator is a mighty important factor in this operation of harvest-

Approaching the row so the plants enter the center of the picking unit, entering and leaving the sult in up to 400 pounds of lost eed cotton per acre.

Adjustment of the machine to fit conditions of the individual field is the responsibility of the operator, and if he knows his job and machine, very little cotton will be left on the ground or plant.

Suggestions for making the machine picking job more efficient and profitable:

Check the machine completely before the harvest and replace orn parts, lubricate it and make

Proper machine adjustment and operation, provided the machine is in first class condition, can put the cotton in the trailer which otherwise will be left on the ground.

Snip dates with scissors or chop them with a sharp knife dipped frequently in cold water.

Date and Walnut Loaf

21/2 cups sifted flour

- ³/₄ cup sugar
- 1/2 cup corn starch.
- 1 teaspoon salt

 $\frac{1}{2}$ cup chopped walnuts

- 1 cup chopped dates
- 2 tablespoons corn oil
- 1 egg

- 2 teaspoons baking soda
- 1 cup boiling water

Grease 1 (9x5x3-inch) loaf pan. Sift flour, sugar, corn starch and salt together. Stir in walnuts and dates until dates are separated and coated. Beat corn oil and egg un-til blended; stir into dry ingredients. Dissolve baking soda in water; stir into flour mixture. Beat well. Pour into prepared pan. Set in warm place free from draft 10 minutes to rise slightly. Bake in 350 F. (moderate) oven about 1 hour or until cake tester inserted in center comes out clean.
