Rural Housing Loans Aided 21,000 Texans
Austin, Tex--Rural housing loans
made through the Farmers Home Administration during the past fiscal year provided better housing
for an estimated 21,000 people in for an estimated 21,000 people ii1
tiie rural and smaller communities of Texas. The 4,604 loans, totaling
$\$ 37,173,160$, covered the purchase or improvement of individual fam-
ily homes, plus $\$ 1,322,910$ for rental housing units.
Nearly 650 Texas retail lumber
dealers, Farmers Home Administration personnel and other inter-
ested parties attended a series ested parties attended a series of
17 one-day workshops designed to 17 one-day workshops designed to
instruct the lumber dealers how to
lo process applications for rural housing loans. Tom Yager, president of
