To reconstruct the story Byron Cox was one of a group of "bow-and-arrow" hunters from Fort Worth who entered the Figure 3 Ranch early Sunday morning. Cox was driving his own car, a Volkswagon. Others in the group were in another vehicle.

Local residents recall there were several severe thunderbolts Sunday morning between 9:00 and 11:00.

When Cox did not return to Fort Worth late Sunday with the other group, his relatives began making inquiries of Mr. and Mrs. Wm. Ray who reside on the ranch. Searchers Monday found his car and a coat. As darkness was falling Monday evening the Sheriff's office in Eldorado was notified and a call for help was issued.

Sheriff Orval Edmiston and his deputy Jack Jones were joined by Hwy. patrolmen, game wardens, volunteer firemen, and men and vehicles from Southwest Texas Electric Co-Op.

Searching in darkness in rough terrain was extremely difficult, but was carried on with flashlights until after midnight. The search was resumed in daylight Tuesday morning, and the body was quickly found.

Since the brief but very severe electric storm occurred about 9:30 a.m., Sunday, officers at the scene estimated the body had been dead for about 44 hours when found Tuesday.

The body was taken to Ratliff-Kerbow Funeral Home and then transferred to Fort Worth.

Among the victim's relatives here was his stepfather, T. C. Carll, also a brother and an uncle.



the easiest do-it-yourself proj-ects. Only a minimum of mechability and ordinary hand tools are needed to install acoustical tile.

The condition of the present ceiling determines which of three basic application methods is best suited to a specific room.

1. Adhesive requires a clean, dry, firm and even surface. Large holes, cracks, crumbling or sagging plaster can be covered by the following alternatives.

2. Furring strips of 1 x 2 or 3-inch softwood. Nail at each joist crossing with 8 penny nails. Tile should be applied with 3 penny box nails or 9/16-inch coated staples spaced six inches apart.

3. Suspended ceilings of metal grid hung from wire or straps. There should be a *minimum* drop of three inches, particu-

larly between exposed pipes or ducts. This method can also be used to lower the high ceilings

common in many older houses and apartment buildings. When remodeling, the space between the old and new ceilings can conceal new electric wires, pipes and heating-cooling ducts

Acoustical ceiling tile may be distinguished by fissures or tiny holes. They trap sound waves which are absored in the in-

sulation board by air cells.



In peanut production, for example, deep burial of crop residue will reduce the amount of southern blight and Cereospora leaf spot in succeeding peanut crops. Both of these diseases are common in the peanut growing areas of Texas. Plowing under large amounts of organic matter has substantially reduced losses from cotton root rot Many cotton growers have found this practice works well where a three-year rotation is used. cotton-grain sorgum-small grain rotation gives the grower the opportunity to deep plow after the sorghum or small grain crops are harvested, or both.

Many disease-causing organisms which affect cotton can also be carried over from year to year in the soil. These include the bacterium which causes angular leaf pot or bacterial blight and fungi which cause seedling disease. Disases from both these organism types will be lessened by burying the organic matter as deep in the soil as is practical.





Labels on medicines are recipes for safety

Medicines you store in your medicine chest have more in common with the food you store in your kitchen cabinet than you may think. When a cook follows a favorite recipe to the letter, the result is a smiling happy family at the dinner table.

The labels on your medicines are recipes, too, and like any good

recipe, should be read carefully for maximum benefit. Accidents are separated from safety by the thinnest of margins, and that margin can be a label.

The Council On Family Health, a non-profit organization sponsored by leading medicine manufacturers to promote health and safety, says there is a lot more to a label than paper and ink. The labels on medicine bottles show the name of the medicine, its active ingredients, and the exact dosage recommended for good reasons: to help a sick person back to health.

A medicine should be given to a patient exactly as it is spelled out on the label. Too little can do no good. Too much can prove to be harmful. This is especially true in the case of a very young child who cannot explain how he feels when the medicine takes effect.

Did you know that nurses are professionally trained to always read labels or instructions three times? A nurse will check the medication when she takes it out of the medicine chest, when she is about to give it to her patient and when she returns it to its proper place in the cabinet.

Such precautions are particularly necessary at night. A mother should turn on a light so she can read the label and be sure she has the right medicine. It is absolutely necessary that she be



wide awake so that she fully understands the instructions.


Medicines should always be properly stored and never given if the label cannot be read clearly and accurately. Keeping a container of medicine with a badly smudged label, a torn label or no label at all can be extremely hazardous. Relying on your memory of the contents of a container and instructions for its use is simply too risky for good health. Medicine labels, like the directions in a treasured recipe, work most successfully when they are strictly followed.
