3,000 FOR THE SEASON ...

Gin Total Expected To Reach 2000 Bales By End Of This Week

With a solid month of dry weather behind us and no immediate rain in sight, farmers are taking advantage of it by steadily rolling their cotton to the gin, and if weather continues favorable some estimate that two-thirds of this year's yield will be in the bale by end of this week.

On Saturday, October 31st, Mikeska Gin had processed bale No. 1,000. One week later, on Saturday, Nov. 7, the total had reached 1,600. That would average out at 100 bales a day with the gin running every night until mid-

The yard continues to be full of cotton tarilers waiting to gin, and if the present rate continues they should reach 2,000 by the end of the week

A number of growers have already finished their crop. Clemens Sauer said Monday that nearly all of his neighbors in Reynolds were already finished. A call to Bob Faught in Bailey Ranch Monday night brought the information that he, too, had finished his and that it had averaged a bale and a half to the acre. But Mr. Faught added that between his place and town there was still a lot of good cotton yet to be stripped.

He gave the same opinion several others had expressed, that the county total will reach 3,000 this

Mikeska Gin is operating under the management of Kenith Homer, and they seem to be fortunate this year in having a steady crew. Several of the young men there cashed checks Saturday for well over

\$120 for a week' work. When asked if he had any trouble with labor absenteeism, Kenith said, "No, they like these overtime hours!"

Monday morning the gin lost about half a day. It seems a load of wet bolls clogged up the works. ater they were back in operation again and ran until midnight.

They will be Charles Adams and Jerry Baty at offensive ends; Roy Jones and Dobbie Lively both ways at tackles; Bob Whitten at guard along with Gary Danford, a junior, at guards; Jimbo Overstreet at center; and halfbacks Keith Williams and Victor Belman. Billy Doc Hubble, a junior, at fullback. Archie Nixon, also a junior will man the QB post.

Other Eagles seniors who start defensively or act as back-up men are Steve Sykes; Robert Hibbitts, a starting defensive tackle; Rennond Kuykendall who never could overcome eligibility rules due to changes of residence; Defensive starter Walter Speck; and Billy Tampke, an end.



The general abundance of underground water strong enough for windmills--plus a few wells large enough for city water or irrigation-might cause us to become complacent regarding our underground water supply. Few people really consider the importance of underground water to our economy and well being. Fewer people stop to consider the source of underground water, and how misuse of the land can reduce the supply.

Practically all of the underground water in the Edwards Plateau area of Texas comes from rainfall in the same area. The broad, nearly level divides are dotted with shallow lakes, many of which recharge water lower levels. Geologists generally are of the opinion and agree that excess water from these divide areas flows out in springs in the San Saba, Devil's, Conchos, and Llano rivers. Many normally-dry stream beds have known caverns which divert millions of gallons of water into underground channels

A great deal of our underground water is recharged from the land surface through millions of minute cracks in the underlying rock stra-A striking example is the "sink holes" found on ranches scattered throughout the area.

Underground recharge depends directly on management of the land surface. Rainfall must be detained or slowed down to allow saturation of the topsoil and subsequent release of surplus water. Range management practices which | proc insure a good cover of grass facikeep the minute water channels from clogging with moving silt.

Rainfall received in Schleicher county has never consistently been enough for good crop yields. Rainfall exceeding the need of crops for maximum yields has not been received many times in the history of Schleicher county. Therefore, it s very important that all rainfall received be held on the land where it falls for crop use.

Terrace construction to conserve oil and water is one of the important conservation practices applied on most of the dry cropland in the District. Since the District began some 29 years ago there has been 3,385,771 feet of conventional level erraces constructed. Since level ners, pinto beans, potato salad, parallel terraces came into use a few years ago, 57,417 feet of parallel terraces have been constructed. to crop yields from the time they were first constructed. There are very few years if any, that level closed end terraces fail to benefit crops in this area.

Farmers throughout the District year, things can be done that will litates moisture intake and helps hold the rainfall on the land where it falls. Fields with level terraces are not properly prepared for the next crop if the needed terrace beds have long since been sealed maintenance is not completed. Without the needed maintenance on terraces, they can cause damage to fields rather than being beneficial. Water lost through breaks in terraces or around improperly closed ends can start gullies and remove valuable from the field.

tenance to be sure the needed height is maintained through the entire length of the terrace. The first few years following construction of terraces maintenance work can maintain or increase terrace widths needed for type of equipment being used.

Terrace maintenance and repair can usually be done with farm equipment that is already on the farm. Fills can be made with a tractor drawn scraper. Also, a grader blade bolted on the bedder foot pieces with a board bolted above grader blade, can be used to make needed fills and add more height and width to terraces. The one way plow is probably used more than any other implement in doing terrace maintenance work. By starting at the top of the terrace and back-furrowing out past the terrace furrow pit more height and width is added to the terrace. This operation can be repeated until needed height and width is obtained

Assistance is available from technicians of the Soil Conservation Service in checking terraces for needed height and end-closures. Assistance in planning and apply ing all the needed conservation practices is also available from the Cost-share assistance in applying enduring type conservation pract icesis available through the Great Plains Conservation Program administered by the S. 


