A King is Born

Hundreds of years ago, in a country far across the sea, there were shepherds who lived on the hills, day and night, tending flocks of sheep. Their faces were brown and tanned by the sun and wind, but they were strong men, brave and kind. They wore coarse clothes made of goat's hair and carried long crooks in their hands.

When the sun shone warm and bright, a shepherd would lead his sheep far away until they reached green fields and quiet streams, where they would graze and rest.

The shepherds hastened to the stable where the star pointed the way. It was strewn with hay and dusty cobwebs. Behold, in a manger lay the beautiful baby—The Infant King—wrapped warm in swaddling clothes.

A fragrant pine wreath festooned with a big red bow encircles the door knocker, a symbol of hospitality. Inside, the tree blazes with rainbow lights, and there is a tiny creche on the mantel. You light the red candles on the table and serve coffee and sandwiches and cake. The atmosphere is rich with warmth and friendliness.

This is Christ's birthday and we are celebrating, and, in a magical way, it seems to instill in all of us a special feeling of friendship and love for our fellowman. What a wonderful thing it would be if we could keep this Christmas spirit in our hearts all year long!

To do so would be perfection—and that is something none of us can quite attain. But through the Church we CAN keep faith and truth within us from one Christmas to the next. Try it, and see.

in the hands of the State Banking Commission.

Vera Wade and Hazel Bruton were attending Sul Ross College at Alpine.

Carl G. Cromwell, 42, was killed in an automobile accident at Sheffield, Pa. He was an oil promoter and president of Apollo Oil Company in San Angelo.

Lewis T. Wilson Jr. and Miss Jonnye Deaton were married.

Dr. H. Z. Penninton announced plans to move here Nov. 1st from Floydada and set up his practice.

Dr. Fred E. Baker, San Angelo optometrist, advertised that he was cutting prices in half on glasses on account of his funds being tied up in the San Angelo National Bank that had closed. This was in order to raise working cash.

S. L. Stanford's sheep and feed barn burned. The loss was around \$1,000.

Bill Mittel, proprietor of Eldorado Coal Yard, advertised Deep Shaft McAlester Coal at \$15 a ton.

Lee King, 29, dropped dead while at work on a fence on the A. A. Bush farm 6 miles west of Eldorado.

Hubert and Dell Smith moved back here from Houston and leased the service station near the school from Mrs. Shipp.

F. C. Bates Sr., for 30 years a resident here, died at the home of his son, F. C. Bates Jr., near Sheffield. The elder Mr. Bates was nearly 100 at the time of his death.

On October 18, 1931, famed inventor Thomas A. Edison died in his sleep. His accomplishments included the electric light, the phonograph, the stock ticker and a number of other lesser inventions. His closest friends were Harvey Firestone and Henry Ford.

November, 1931—Ray Jones and his brother, John R. Jones of Melvin, bought out the stock of the Evans Motor Co. and took over operation of the business.

Roy Andrews moved his meat market from the Joe Williams building to his grocery store.

D. C. Roberts, 39, of Dallas and formerly of San Angelo, was found dead in the Ogden pasture near Fort McKavett. Sheriff O. E. Conner and Judge C. C. Doty ruled that he died of natural causes.

Luke Robinson and Sam E. Jones shipped four cars of fat calves to Fort Worth.

Buddie Bound, 7, son of Mr. and Mrs. Hardy Bound, died and was buried in Bailey Ranch cemetery.

A daughter was born Nov. 13 to Mr. and Mrs. H. T. Finley.

Seven of 10 West Texas banks that had closed were being reorganized and were to re-open. These included the Security Bank of Balingier, the Big Lake State Bank, the San Angelo National Bank, the First National Bank of El Paso, Security National of Brownwood, and the banks at Del Rio and Fort Stockton. Also three banks remained closed at Coleman.

In a special election, the 14th Congressional district of Texas elected Richard M. Kleburg to succeed the late Harry Wurzbach of Seguin, a Republican. Kleburg's administrative assistant would be 23-year-old Lyndon B. Johnson.

Miss John Alexander, worthy matron of the O.E.S. chapter, attended Grand Chapter in Houston.

Wealthy men's yachts were gradually disappearing from the scene. Still in use in 1931 were E. F. Hutton's barkentine Husar, Vincent Astor's 265-foot yacht Alca, J. P. Morgan's luxurious yacht Corsair later turned over to the Coast Guard, and W. K. Vanderbilt's yacht Neutrality.

Before the year was out New Yorkers were getting a stiff neck staring upward at the huge, silver, cigar-shaped Graf Zeppelin, which was making its first trip to the United States. . . Japan invaded Manchuria.

December, 1931—Total number of cotton bales ginned in the county reached 6360.

Eldorado Bakery advertised fruit cakes, 60c a pound.

Two pounds of T-bone steak cost 29c, home made sausage was two pounds for 25c, and 4 lbs. of dried fruit were priced at 43c, at the Self Serve Grocery.

Mrs. G. S. Cathey died and her funeral was held here.

The Methodist women placed a charity barrel in the business district for old clothing, toys, etc.

A son was born Dec. 15th to Mr. and Mrs. Pat Martin.

Buck Bailey was here from Pullman, Washington, where he was coaching football at Washington University. He and his team had been in Louisiana.

The First National Bank advertised Capital, Surplus and Profits, \$155,000.

Miss Carrie Wilson died at the age of 71 at the home of her niece, Mrs. Will Doyle.

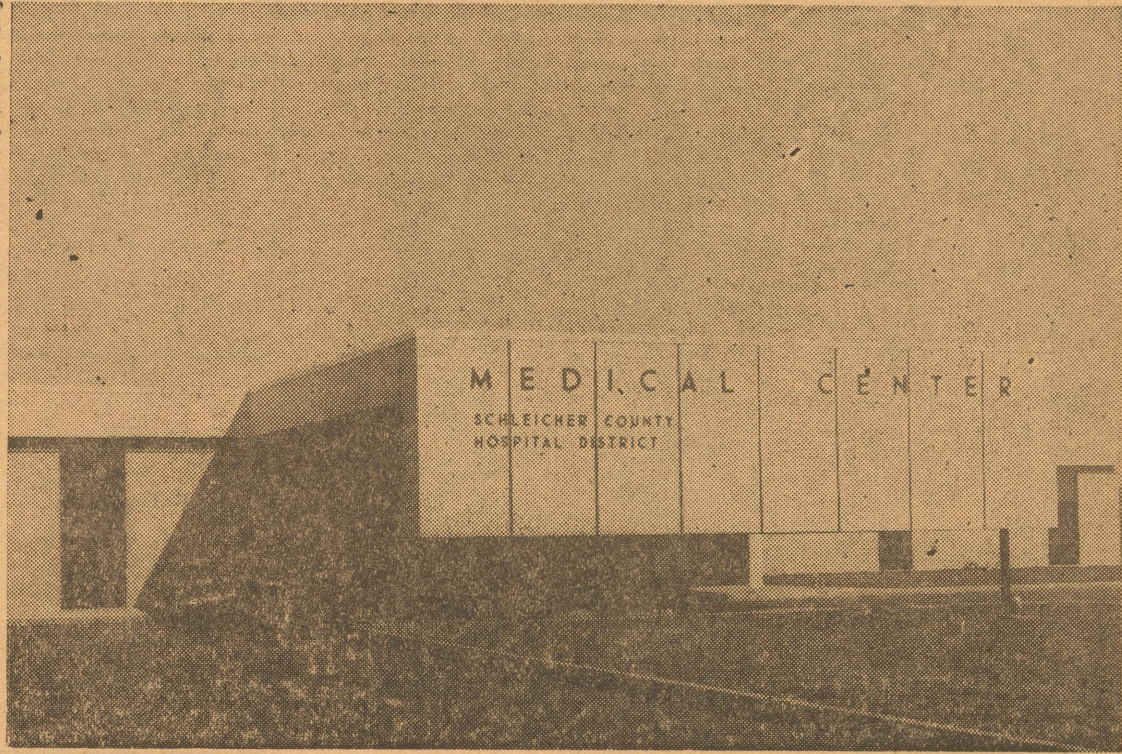
J. C. Bullion, who was attending San Angelo Junior College, passed through Eldorado on his way to Ozona.
