A last minute appeal for support of the Easter Seal Society Crippled Children and Adults and its program of services to the handicapped was issued today by Mr. Raymond Hall, who is the Easter Seal Representative in Schleicher

The Easter Seal Society provided treatment and services for over 21,000 physically handicapped adults and children in Texas last year, Mr. Hall said, and this program needs to be expanded. Many people are going without services that would increase the productiveness of their lives and make them happier. With increased growth of the Easter Seal Society, more and more of these people will be reached, he added.

The Society is carrying on a continuing program to seek out the disabled who are doing without services and see that they receive the help they need. As Easter Seal Representative he is the person to contact for services from the Easter Seal Society. The Easter Seal Society of Texas helps support treatment facilities in Texas where crippled children and adults are treated, regardless of their ability to pay. Physical, occupational and speech therapy are offered to help the handicapped overcome their disabilities. A complete referral program to ensure equal rehabilitation services to every person in Texas is included in Easter Seal Society services.

The Easter Seal Appeal will close Easter Sunday, April 11, and full support should be given the Easter Seal Society by every citizen of Schleicher County, he added.

Calk Re-Elected Mayor For Another Two - Year Term

In a spirited city election here Saturday in which 402 votes were cast, incumbent Mayor Eldon Calk retained his seat with 229 votes to defeat his opponent R. V. Sheppard who received 169.

A rush of voters in the last two hours of balloting, prevented the election crew from counting ballots until after 7:00 p. m., voting deadline and this delayed the final results being published until 9:00 p. m. Large crowds waited for two hours on the streets for the final

In the city aldermans race there were three candidates for two places on the board. Granvil Hext, an incumbent, received 275 votes, and Alvin Farris, a former alderman, drew 286—giving these two a 2-year term. Trailing was John Edward Meador who received a respectable vote of 206, which makes him a prime candidate for a place on this board one year hence.







A deficiency of nitrogen causes stunted plant growth and the condition often referred to as "firing." Slow growth results from the lack of phosphorus and a shortage of potessium causes the entire plant Information on home gardening to "dry up" and take on a brown-

The lack of water can cause nutrients, the stand of lawn grass may be lost. Don't mow too short. A longer turf is insulation against heat and gives protection against possible damage from the sun.

In the battle of existence, talent is the punch; tact is the clever footwork.

A good set of posches or plums from the trees which are now in full bloom is not a certainty. For insects can damage the fruit or even "wipe-out" the crop if not

Insect control on fruit trees is argely a preventive program. Once the insects begin to cause damage little can be done to rid the fruit of the pests and prevent further damage. Most of the common fruit lamaging insects begin their actiity and reproduction during the first 30-45 days after the trees begin to bloom. Therefore, insectiides applied during this early period will control the insects which damage the fruit later in the sea-

Homeowners with a few trees are dvised to follow a preventive spray orogram. Malathion or methoxyhlor, either in the wettable powler or emulsifiable concentrate ns, are effective. They are not hazardous when used as directed and will not leave a residue.

Four spray applications are recommended, timed to coincide with oloom and fruit formation. The first or petal fall spray should be applied when about three-fourths of the blossom petals have fallen. 'he second or shuck split spray should be made in about 10 days. The third or cover spray should follow the second spray in 10 to 14 days and the fourth or second cover spray should follow the third application in 14 to 21 days.

Should later infestations become damaging, a spray containing carharvl (Sevin) will give good control. It can be safely used on peaches and plums up to the day before

Other details on fruit spray schedules are available from my office.
