

Scientists have made considerable progress during the past few years in controlling bloat in cattle. It can be successfully controlled by the use of products now available provided they are used in accordance with the manufacturer's recommendations.

Although present day knowledge pertaining to bloat is important, some facts remain unknown. Clinical coses of bloat may vary in severity. Treatment is not always satisfactory and surgery may be required for severe cases.

Frothy bloat which is usually present in cattle pastured on legumes is more difficult to treat than the dry bloat more commonly seen in cattle on dry feed. Present day products are effec-

tive but good maangement and

common sense prevention are always in order. These suggestions are given as aids to starting cattle on pasture. 1. Start bloat prevention medication several days in advance. Follow the manufacturer's directions and make sure that each animal has a daily intake of the medication equal to the recom-

mended dose. 2. Check all cattle at frequent intervals and be prepared treatment

3. Call a veterinarian at the first sign of trouble.

Teach the children to obey the person in charge, and emphasize to the sitter that she should never leave the children alone at home. To avoid accidental poisoning,

be sure to store all medicines and cleaning agents safely out of the sight and reach of children. When you use medicines at home, remember to return them to the cabinet immediately after use.

To help prevent burns and scalds, teach the sitter to keep pot handles turned toward the rear of the kitchen stove, to test the children's bath water before letting them enter the tub and to keep all matches out of children's

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#### Less Populous Areas New Industry Target

Austin, Tex.—Jim Harwell, executive director of the Texas Industrial Commission, has called for a concentrated industrial expansion program to repopulate smaller cities and stop the threat of overpopulation of metropolitan areas.

In a Texas Industrial Week statement, Harwell outlined a threepronged proposal to help 166 Texas counties that lost population in the last decade, and close the growing gap between the average Texan's income and the national average Harwell pointed out that although Texas is a leader in industrial growth, the state is still facing problems. He said Texas lost 52,000 manufacturing jobs last year due to tight money and federal cut-backs, and the trend toward concentrating industries in alreadylarge cities threatens to overburden the areas' resources.

"We must stop the flow of people from our smaller towns and cities into the already overpopulated areas," he said. "We must secure better, higher-paying jobs for Texans.'

As an answer to the problem, the state industrial chief proposed a comprehensive planning program for the state's 21 industrial regions. He pointed out that the Commission is now able to match the needs of an industry with the assets of a city through a computerized program established within the TIC.

He also called for an incentive program to attract new industry to the less-populous regions of the state. "For all Texans to receive the benefits of industry, plants must locate not just in the big cities, but in all areas of the state," he said.

Harwell said all states but Texas already offer financing incentives to new industry and carrying out such a program would allow the state to remain competitive. said Texas should institute a preemployment training program to enable Texans to move from the vanishing farms into profitable industrial positions.

The third step would be continuation and more emphasis on the export market. He noted that exports have increased 64% since division within the Industrial Com-


