## Eagles Heading For Iraan For 4th Non-District Game

The Eldorado Eagles journey to Iraan tomorrow night for next to the last "Phase one" football game: i.e., Iraan and one more nonconference game remain on the schedule as of now. It might be fanciful to say that "The settlers have noted with uneasiness the Indian activities out west and have decided an attack on the Indian headquarter camping area right now might prevent future depredations by the savages."

It isn't quite that way. The Iraan Braves defeated 17-0 last year by the Eldorado Eagles will field a team made up of the biggest boys in this area. Eagle coaches class Iraan's five-man defensive front as "enormous" and they say that the Braves' offensive team is only slightly less enormous — say like only "huge."

Eagle Coach Ronnie Stephens has listed this as the prime objective for Eldorado's outfall Eagles: "Be quicker than Iraan." Coach Stephens said Monday that the Braves are the largest team in the area but are fairly slow; obviously he hopes to capitalize on Eagle speed and agility against the more ponderous Braves.

Coach Stephens remarked that the Braves favor a so-called "proset" offensive stance. This means that one end termed a "split end" will be spread as much as 10 yards out from his tackle while the other

end termed a "tight end" will play shoulder-to-shoulder with the tackle on that side. One halfback called a "wingback" will play in the gap between the "split end" and his tackle and the other backs, the fullback and one half back, will position themselves behind the quarterback as potential ball carriers. But the Braves have another offensive formation which they sometimes employ also. It is a variation of "T" formation, the variation being that the halfbacks play as little as a yard behind the offensive line while the fullback remains in his usual distance behind the quarterback. Outline of this formation resembles a diamond and Coach Stephens said it was usually called "Diamond T."

Coach Stephens continued that scouts reported that J. D. Mirike, No. 42, probably 190-200 pounds, was a potent running back as is No. 32, Dale Easley at 202 pounds. The Brave QB, No. 11, Don Hall, probably 180, is a good passer whose favorite targets are No. 28, Keith McKelvy, 145, a split end, or No. 40, Bill Rees, 140 pounds as another split end. The "tight end" is No. 82, Sandy Brooks, 220, who is the third choice target.

Coach Stephens termed the Iraan defensive posture as a "five-man front with four deep secondary." It is a similar defensive positioning to that employed by Eldorado.

The starting Iraan offensive lineup probably will be as follows:

Eagle playing assignments for the Iraan contest will probably remain unchanged. Coach Stephens remarked that Billy Doc Hubble had a sore ankle and Mort Mertz had a hurt hand but that he hoped that both would be able to perform against the Braves. He said that the return of Hunter Henderson had strengthened the secondary defenses, and he commented that at least one Eagle had been blocked out of the Llano contest via the text book route but that he hoped that the deficiency could be corrected by tomorrow night. He noted that Ken Peters had performed exceptionally well with his first defensive assignment against Llano.

Coach Stephens concluded by saying that the Eldorado defense ver understandingly was developing more rapidly than the offense but that special attention was being given this aspect of the game. He said that he hoped the Eagles would attain the following objectives in the Iraan contest: 1. Be quicker than Iraan. 2. Make the offense go. 3. Play sound defense.

The director and organizer of the 14-year-old organization is B.

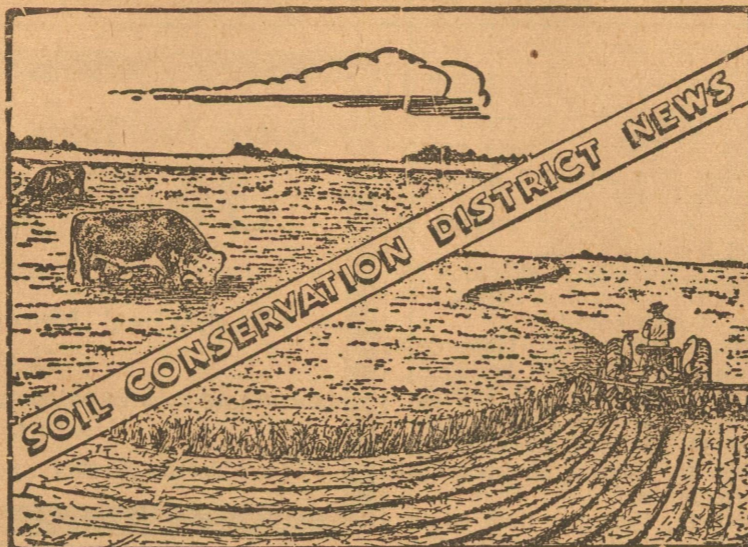

Range Seeding in Disturbed Areas



This picture taken on Ed Meador ranch southwest of Eldorado in March, 1968. Brush control by 'dozing mesquite and mixed brush. Range seeding in disturbed areas done by land broadcast. Grass mixture included Sideoats grama, Green sprangletop, K R bluestem and Sorghum Almun filler. Low rainfall. Good stand grass.

These two pictures taken as one above at exactly the same location September 23, 1968. According to Meador, rainfall received on ranch that year was about 8 inches. Good stand of grasses that were planted making good seed crop. Following brush control and range seeding pastures are completely deferred two full grazing seasons. Deferment permits seeded grasses to make seed crops for two years, thereby increasing the amount of high forage producing grasses. Also, all native grasses growing in the pasture are permitted to increase in vigor, and amount while making seed crop to help fill in

bare spots in pastures. Meador has completed brush control and range seeding on 2566 acres of the 3297 acres scheduled in his Great Plains Conservation Program contract. The 731 acres remaining will be done in 1972. In addition to the 3297 acres for which he is receiving cost share assistance, Meador is doing brush control on approximately 1853 acres that is not cost shared by the GPCP. **PUBLIC NOTICE RECORDING LIVESTOCK BRANDS AND MARKS**

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:  
Section 1. (a) This Act shall apply to every county in this State. In all the counties each owner of any livestock mentioned in Chapter 1 of Title 121 of the Revised Civil Statutes of 1925 shall within six months after this Act takes effect have his mark and brand for such stock recorded in the office of the county clerk of the county. These owners shall record the marks and brands whether the brands and marks have been previously recorded or not.  
(b) The owner shall have the right to have his mark and brand recorded in his name who according to the present records of the county first recorded the brand and mark in the county, then the person who has been using such mark and brand the longest shall have the right to have the brand and mark recorded in his name.  
(c) After the expiration of six months from the taking effect of this Act all records of marks and brands now in existence in the county shall no longer have any force or effect and after the expiration of six months only the records made after this Act takes effect shall be examined or considered in recording marks and brands in the county.  
Section 2. All brands and marks registered under the provisions of this Act shall be re-registered every 10 years in the manner prescribed in Section 1 of this Act.

**County Ag. Agent's Column**

By Jerry Swift

**Big Headed Ants**

This ant is a native of the area. Colonies of these ants are extremely large and contain many thousands of individuals. The ants feed on insects, and arthropods, small mammals and birds. Nuts and other foods of higher protein content also make up the diet of these ants. The ants may invade houses in search of foods or meat. They can kill chickens and small pets and also bits and sting fiercely. This species has been known to short circuit telephone wires by removing the lead sheathing. The ants are predacious on many injurious insects.

**Control:**

Kepone pellets or Mirex 150 or Sevin, as a dust or spray (wetttable powders are more useful than dust for treating individual mounds.)

**Hog Cholera Quarantine**

There seems to be some confusion within the state concerning the current status of the hog cholera eradication program. Texas is in Phase III and is not quarantined state-wide. Producers of breeding hogs, feeder pigs and market hogs can move animals "freely" without an "on-the-farm inspection" over the state, except in Federally and State Quarantined Areas. Currently the ONLY quarantined areas are in Tom Green, Lubbock, Hockley and Lamb counties. Only producers in these counties are limited as to movement of hogs. Purchasers, however, must not sell hogs except for slaughter unless 30 days has elapsed from the time of purchase. At the end of 30 days, release is automatic. In reality, only traders are affected by this restriction on the purchases.

**Mulches**

Homeowners can have better vegetable gardens and flower beds with mulches.

Mulches help keep the soil moist, reduce soil erosion, add organic matter to the soil, retard weed growth and furnish food for earthworms that loosen and aerate the soil.

Grass clippings, sawdust, straw and compost make good mulches and are easy to apply. Compost is probably best. It can be made from leaves, grass clippings, stems and stalks of harvested vegetables, corn husks, pea hulls and fine twigs.

**Screwworms**

Rains and warm temperatures are favorable for continued increases of these livestock pest cases. In order to reduce case outbreaks and prevent a fall build-up, producers are urged to double their vigilance. Counties that have reported screwworm cases near Schleicher are: Irion, Crockett and Menard. So check your livestock carefully.

Early fall historically is one of the worst seasons for screwworm outbreaks, and producers are urged to check their livestock regularly, treat wounds and collect samples of all worms found. Mail the larvae samples to the Mission Lab for identification. Prompt anti-screwworm treatment will start as soon as cases are confirmed.

Llano's touchdown came just 11 seconds before the end of the first half and was accomplished by one of the two passes the Yellowjackets were able to complete. No. 10, Jerry Hopf, hit deep in the middle of Eldorado's defense to No. 42, Steve Turner, who converted the pass-run combination for 75 yards to score. Eagle defenders were trying for an interception. But the tr for extra point was no good and that was all for Llano's scoring.

Eldorado, scoreless for the first three quarters, tallied midway in the final period after recovering a fumble and slogging some 30 yards through the mud and Yellowjackets until Ricky Griffin scooted over for the touchdown. A slippery ball played completely impartial and refused to cooperate for Eldorado just as it had refused for Llano and the try for extra point was no good. But the score was tied 6-6

and staded that way the remaining five minutes of play.

Mike Manning led defensive play for the night with 18 solo tackles. Gary Danford came next with nine while Manuel Martinez and Ken Peters came next with 8 and 5 respectively.

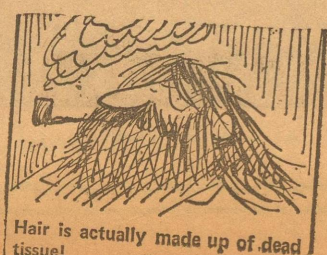
Manuel Martinez, Roy Lloyd, and Ricky Griffin distinguished themselves by capturing a Llano fumble each. Their collective efforts probably donated as much as 100 yards in savings to the Eagle cause. Not only did these fumble recoveries give the Eagles the ball but prevented enemy punts as well as nipping potential Yellowjacket plays in the bud.

Eldorado coaches complimented Eagle defensive efforts in holding a "2A" school as well as the youthful Eldorado team did this past game. They were particularly pleased with the defensive secondary and happy with Billy Doc Hubble's interception of a Llano pass which nearly brought about an Eagle score as Hubble ran some 30 yards after the interception in mid-field.

The Eagle passing attack was greatly hindered by the hard charging Llano line and by the slippery ball which skidded out of receiver's arms on several occasions. A fact is that Eldorado's Archie Nixon is on nearly every opponent's "most wanted" list and is the target of too many ambitious enemy linemen whose desperate ambition is to blunt the Eagle air attack by "blasting" it at its origin.

Whether Eldorado meets Llano again in 1972 and 1973 will depend to great degree on the biennial equalization and reassignment of schools by enrollment as directed by Interscholastic League authority.
