#### The Subscription Rate Increase

We are sure our readers were not surprised last week when we announced that subscription rates to the Success were being advanced an extra dollar. Everything else has been going up.

Although we failed to mention it last week, the overriding reason for the increase was our loss in newspaper advertising. In the last few years we have lost the advertising of a Ford dealership, a Chevrolet and Olds dealership and also a principal dry goods business. Advertising is, and always has been, the major source of a newspaper's revenue, and its loss is keenly felt among publishers of the smaller weekly papers.

For some time we have had to absorb increased cost of print paper and supplies and the inflationary costs of everything we have to buy.

The new postal rates were just the final straw to break the camel's back.

In order for Eldorado to have a newspaper it must provide its operators with enough revenue to remain solvent. It's as simple as that. If we don't get the money from our meagre advertisers we will have to get it from our subscribers.

However we failed to announce that the newsstand price for single copies will still remain at 10 cents. They will continue to be sold at the Success on press day and also at McCormick's grocery.



#### Special 'Disabled Vet' License Plates To Be Available For 1972

Austin, Tex.-Little noticed during the 62nd Legislature was the passage and signing into law on May 19, 1971, by Governor Preston Smith of House Bill 615, which amends the Texas Motor Vehicle Registration Law to provide free license plates for certain disabled veterans according to Gil Moody, Commander, The American Legion,

1. Be a Texas resident. 2. Be a veteran of the Armed Forces of the United States.
