Tax Booklets For Sale By Gov't Printing Office

Washington.----The government has just released its 1971 tax guides for individuals and small businesses containing up-to-date in-formation on federal income taxes.

Both booklets, Your Federal Income Tax and Tax Guide for Small Business, are available from the Superintendent of Documents for 75c each.

Officials describe the booklets as "supplementing" pamphlets each taxpayer receives from the Internal Revenue Service, usually in January, along with his machine-readable tax form. The Guides contain more detailed information and aid taxpayers, in most cases, to complete their own returns accurately and quickly.

The Guides can be obtained from a number of government book stores throughout the country and by writing the Superintendent of Documents, Government Printing Office, Washington, D. C. 20402. Remittance by check or money order should be included with orders.



BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF STATE OF TEXAS: "The Legislature shall have

STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Article III, Section 51-a, of the Texas Constitution, be amended to read as follows: "Section 51-a. The Legisla-ture shall have the power, by General Laws, to provide, sub-ject to limitations herein con-tained and sub other limita-tained and sub other limitaject to limitations herein con-tained, and such other limita-tions, restrictions and regula-tions as may by the Legisla-ture be deemed expedient, for assistance grants to and/or medical care for, and for re-habilitation and any other services included in the federal laws making matching funds available to help such families and individuals attain or retain capability for inde-pendence or self-care, to accept and expend funds from the Government of the United States for such purposes in accordance with the laws of the United States as they now yiduals attain or retain capaviduals attain or retain capa-bility for independence or self-be amended, and to make apcare, and for the payment of propriations out of State funds care, and for the payment of assistance grants to and/or medical care for, and for re-habilitation and other services to or on behalf of: "(1) Needy aged persons who are citizens of the United States or noncitizens who shall have resided within the bound-aries of the United States for



Legislature is specifically authorized and empowered to prescribe such limitations and restrictions and enact such laws as may be necessary in order that such federal matchng money will be available for assistance and/or medical care for or on behalf of needy persons,

> "Nothing in this section shall be construed to amend, modify or repeal Section 31 of Article XVI of this Con-stitution; provided further, however, that such medical services or assistance care, shall also include the employ-ment of objective or subjec-tive means, without the use of drugs, for the purpose of ascertaining and measuring the powers of vision of the human eye, and fitting lenses or prisms to correct or remedy any defect or abnormal condition of vision. Nothing here-in shall be construed to permit optometrists to treat the eyes for any defect whatsoever in any manner nor to administer any manner hor to administer nor to prescribe any drug or physical treatment whatsoever, unless such optometrist is a regularly licensed physician or surgeon under the laws of this State."

Sec. 2.
