Thirty-Seven Seniors to Receive Diplomas Monday



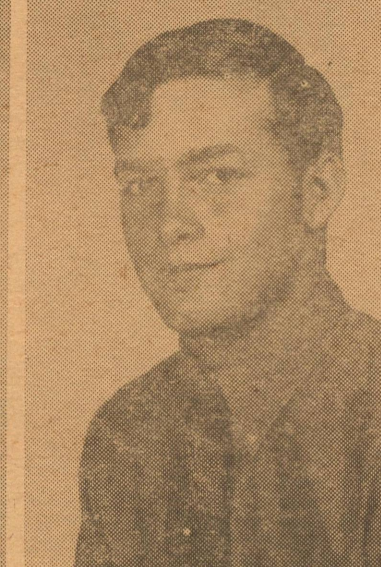
LINDA DERRICK

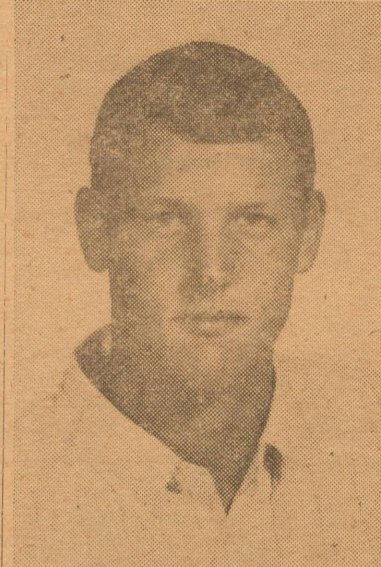
MONA WAGONER

Local Voters Reject All Four Amendments

Texas voters went to the polls Tuesday and rejected three of the four proposed amendments to the State Constitution. Only No. 4 on the ballot, allowing issuance of \$100 million in Water Quality Bonds, passed state-wide.

Here in Schleicher county, about 200 voters went to the polls and rejected all four proposals. The local vote was as follows:

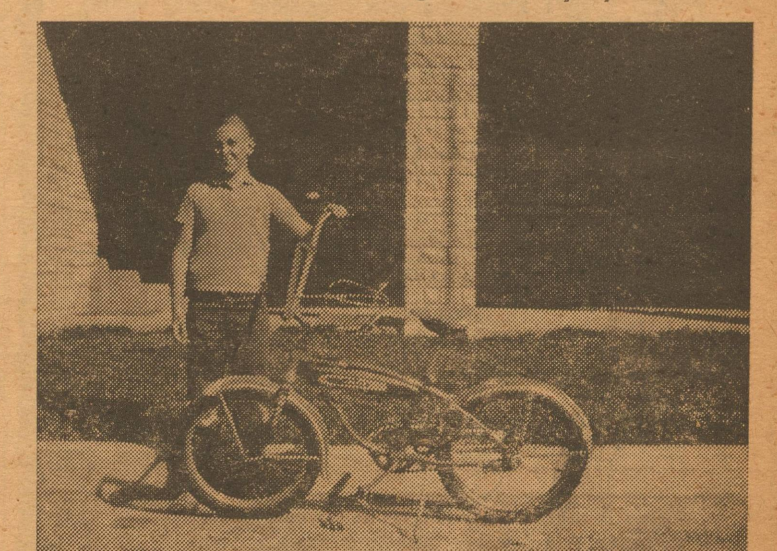

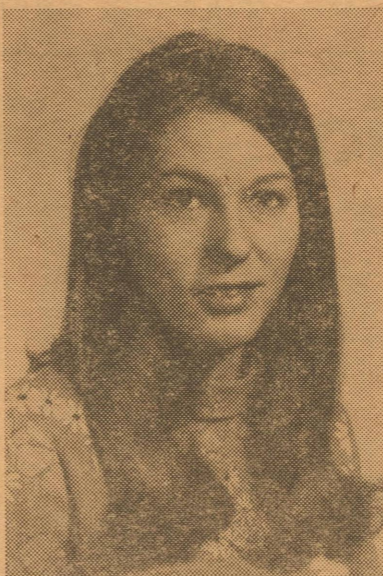
He was a member of the E Club during his sophomore, junior, and senior years. He was a member of the Science club during his junior year. He served as the Junior class president.

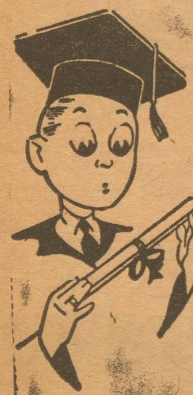
Piano Recital Set For May 27th

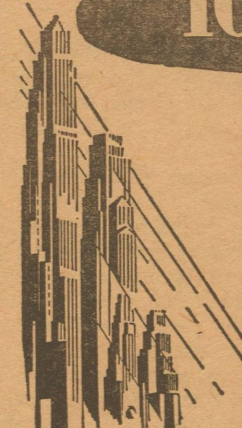

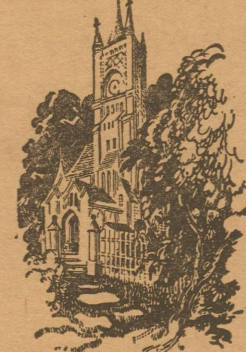

**COUNTY AGENT'S
COLUMN**

Schleicher County Agricultural Agent

There are five things essential to man for a complete life and he will work a life-time to achieve but with only a degree of success. These five essentials for a happy or complete life are (1) recognition, (2) acceptance, (3) approval, (4) something new and (5) security in the older stated. You and I are constantly seeking recognition—recognition of a job well done or recognition from a social point of view. To be accepted by all in our life's journey on the job or by our group and when you reach that sublime height of approval by all you have achieved a goal that Jesus Christ did not achieve—now just who are you—only a man. Maybe in God's image. Full of hope and faith. Something new. Something to look forward to or a goal to work for is as essential in life almost as breathing. It keeps us alert and from growing stale. The least of what you and I are looking forward to is security. Security is essential only to the fact that needs are taken care of while we are searching for other things, namely, the first four essentials so necessary to a large degree for happiness.

Now reverse these essentials: (1) security, (2) something new, (3) approval, (4) acceptance, and (5) recognition and you have how a city government, county, state or federal government works or how the church or corporation works with varying degrees of success. And fortunately most all Americans believe in the capitalistic or democratic system. All institutions and government goals are economic, this being a priority goal, for economic survival and growth. Economic growth is both money and non-money and measured in human satisfaction. Human satisfaction can be measured in goods, services and satisfaction. Goods and services are money income measured in wages, salaries, interest, and profits. Satisfaction of non-money income is leisure, character of work and and all unpaid work.

All of the goals are measured by GNP (gross national product) and are adjusted to per capita income or per family, or per man hour for an economic measure. The only way that GNP or CP (county product) can be increased is by (1) more resources and (2) more productivity of resources.

The regular or economic growth is management.

Management is the process of shifting resources to highest valued use.

The years teach much which the days never know.

Now is the time to control the elm leaf beetle in Schleicher county. The elm leaf beetle is very destructive to Chinese elms. The larvae feed on the leaves and cause a lacelike or "hot hole" appearance to the leaves.

If you had holes in your Chinese elms last year, now would be the time to examine the leaves to see if there are small, 1/4 to 1/2 inch larvae feeding on the underside of the leaves.

Spraying the trees with Malathion, Sevin, Toxaphene or general purpose preparations may be used to control this insect.

Thorough coverage with the insecticide is necessary to prevent heavy leaf damage. To secure additional height and better coverage of the tree, tie the hose on sprayer to a fishing pole or other sturdy object and raise it up in the air and spray the tree.

Treatment of the trunk of the tree and at the base of the tree will also reduce the population. The larvae, when fullgrown, will crawl down the trunk and will change from the larvae to the adult stage at the base of the tree.

Those people who don't like to use insecticides may reduce this beetle by daily mashing or mechanically destroying the larvae as they come down out of the trees to the base of the tree.

Faith is seeing light with your heart when all you see with your eyes is darkness.

Sheep infested with keds (ticks) are unthrifty and should be treated this spring. Keds are most effectively controlled by treating soon after shearing due to the absence of wool.

The pests reproduce during the winter months and are easily transferred from one animal to another. Infested animals appear unthrifty and anemic. At shearing time keds migrate from ewes to lambs, causing lambs to make slow gains and more susceptible to disease.

Sheep producers should suspect infestations when they notice tufts of wool hanging on wire fences, posts and other places sheep can rub.

Inspection should begin on the sheep's belly, thighs, neck, breast and shoulders. Keds can be found on nearly any part of the animal's body if heavy infestations are present.

Keds vary in size, mature females being about a quarter-inch long. The adult is brown, wingless and has a leathery, sac-like abdomen with legs spreading widely and appearing moderately thick.

These pests spend their entire life on sheep and the female may live for three or four months, producing 12 to 20 young. All sheep in a flock should be treated at the same time in order to control reinfestation.

Details on sprays, dusts and dips for controlling keds are contained in the 1970 Texas Guide for Controlling External Parasites of Livestock and Poultry. Copies are available at my office.

Austin, Tex.—Gov. Preston Smith surprised Texas lawmakers by announcing he would veto the \$900 million tax bill passed by the House and Senate unless they "cut out the fat."

He contended that this measure provided \$300 million more than was needed.

After an anxious 24 hours, a compromise began to emerge; and the House and Senate satisfied the Governor by knocking out a \$287 million gasoline tax raise (two cents on the gallon). Smith found that feature the "most repulsive" in the giant revenue-raising measure.

Governor said he would sign the bill without the gasoline tax increase.

With this problem once more hopefully resolved lawmakers turned to a hurry-up job of completing major mandatory duties and hundreds of minor ones before the May 31 adjournment date.

Li Gov. Ben Barnes expressed confidence that the tough congressional and legislative redistricting job can be accomplished in two weeks.

Other pending business, given high priority by federal court action invalidating state laws, includes passage of a new voter registration act and lowering political filing fees.

Legislators plan to add other revenue with a \$40 million mixed drink tax, \$22 million additional gallonage levy on liquor and wine and a \$3 million increase in out-of-state college tuition.

Lawmakers already have started a quick-time march to meet the adjournment deadline. Most of the bills introduced since the opening day last January will clear during the next 10 days.

U. S. To Help Make Rain

Federal aid through weather modification experiments aimed at bringing rain for bone dry areas of Texas has been promised, Governor Smith announced.

Operational details of a cloud-seeding project will be coordinated with the U. S. Department of Defense, the Bureau of Reclamation of the Interior Department and the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration.

Smith said he is hopeful that this step may bring President Nixon to realize the "tragic extent of the drought disaster in Texas." He pointed out that half of the wheat crop already has been lost to drought and that agricultural production income loss would be more than half a billion dollars if the drought were broken immediately.

Land Bonds Sold

Veterans Land Board sold \$23.5 million in bonds to continue financing the veterans land program of low-interest, long-term farm-ranch loans.

Land Commissioner Bob Armstrong said the sale will enable another 3,000 Texas veterans to get loans under the revived program.

Bonds were sold just under the constitutional rate ceiling — at 4.4992%. Ceiling is 4.5%. Buyers included the Harris Trust and Savings Bank, Bankers Trust Company, Northern Trust Company, Chase Manhattan Bank N. S., Continental

Mayo Letterman At East Texas State

Illinois National Bank and Trust Company, First National Bank in Dallas and 41 others.

Armstrong said that there were three other bids of \$30 million in bonds offered for sale. Buyers represented all areas of the country.

Airport Grant Received

Federal Aviation Administration approved a \$419,974 grant to Texas for a comprehensive study of future airport development needs.

Funds, together with \$209,987 in state money, will be used to develop an airport systems plan for Texas. Grant seeks development of a plan that can be used to forecast regional and statewide demands for air transportation.

Courts Speak

State Supreme Court in a Potter County case held that signing by an injured person of a release settling a damage claim is valid only for that person and no other involved in the dispute.

High Court told four contractors for San Antonio's HemisFair '68 that they couldn't collect on deferred payment certificates and unsold tickets which they received for partial payment of their services. Firms sued City of San Antonio, San Antonio Fair Inc., and San Antonio Urban Renewal Agency.

Austin District Judge Herman Jones enjoined the sale of historical (1755-1846) documents, "The Laredo Archives," to which the state lays claim. Value is estimated at from \$350,000 to \$1 million.

One who kills with a weapon not generally classed as deadly must be permitted to testify as to intent, Court of Criminal Appeals ruled.

Third Court of Civil Appeals upheld the 1968 Railroad Commission turn-down of an application by Southern Pacific Transportation Company to transfer the company railroad agency from Elsa to Edinburg.

Attorney General's Opinions

Atty. Gen. Crawford C. Martin has held that the Parks and Wildlife Commission and similar state agencies can be increased in size by adding new members without abolishing present boards.

In other recent opinions, Martin concluded that:

—A school board may contract with a teacher whose first cousin has been elected to the board but has not taken oath. Contract remains valid after the relative qualifies for office.

—A pupil promoted to a high school grade not taught in the home district can transfer to any other accredited high school, and the resident district must pay the receiving district's legally-imposed high school tuition fee.

—Houston Independent School District has the option of selecting procedures available to it in establishing a junior college district.

—A bill to permit an individual to petition for leave to file quo warranto proceedings without the suit being brought by the state attorney general, district or county attorney is unconstitutional.

—Monthly salary of state employ-

ees whose salary is budgeted on an annual basis is determined by dividing the annual figure by 12. Opinion also sets a standard method of determining weekly or hourly pay for such employees.

—Money collected as admission fees and concessions profits at state properties may be spent for maintenance and repair of property.

—A notary public can legally use a rubber stamp seal and India ink.

—County employees are entitled to retain jury fees for jury service.

Appointments, Resignations

Governor Smith named 18th District Judge John A. James Jr. of Cleburne to the 19th Court of Civil Appeals. He succeeds the late Judge Frank Wilson.

Smith picked Ralph F. Block of Houston to serve on the Battleship Texas Commission, replacing C. H. Coffield of Houston who resigned.

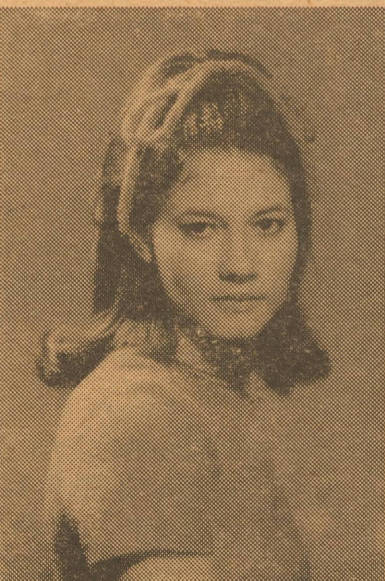
Governor accepted the resignation of Dr. Almer Baum of Austin from the State Banking Board.

Bank Bills Proposed

A series of bills to prevent recurrence of such failures as that experienced by the Sharpstown State Bank and to strengthen the state's powers over the banking industry were introduced in the Senate by the General Investigating Committee.

One of the key measures gives the banking commissioner expanded authority to order "problem banks" to correct shortcomings without actually closing them. An-

An increase in state unemployment benefits from \$45 to about \$77 a week has been approved by the Senate, but the proposal is heading for conference committee. House approved a \$60 figure.

Both House and Senate committees have advanced a bill to provide for 100% state financing of the minimum foundation school program.

Texas Aeronautics Commission turned down requests by Braniff and Texas International Airways to reopen a case against the Southwest Airlines' authority to fly between San Antonio, Houston and Dallas/Fort Worth.

Governor Smith has signed a bill to provide for more flexibility in student loan programs.

President Nixon and Vice President Agnew will attend the dedication of the Lyndon B. Johnson Library here May 22.

ASPC Maps All-Out Drive To Help Relieve Current Wool Slump

Every route is being explored by the American Sheep Producers Council to help give some relief to the current wool situation that finds itself woven into a general textile recession that reaches into many countries.

In a special session called by President Henry Hibbard of Helena, Mont., the Council's Executive and Wool Advisory Committees along with staff members met to study the present condition of wool and to intensify action in the area of promotion to help relieve the situation.

Robert Thurman of Tipp City, Ohio, chairman of the wool committee, said the world wool situation is in many cases in serious straits, with the United States being particularly hard hit in the textile industry. He cited three reasons for the stagnant condition of the wool market: (1) a general business recession, (2) the uncertainty of the fashion picture the past year and a switch to knits, and (3) the policy of the mills to avoid high inventory of goods at high interest rates.

A slight easing of the situation is expected within the next few months. The most critical area is the high inventory of wool in warehouses in the U. S.

The Council is launching immediately a trade promotion to encourage mills and manufacturers to purchase wool from current stocks for the fall of 1972. Designers and clothing manufacturers will be buying shortly for the next year's fall market, working well in advance of actual fashion seasons. In addition, representatives of the executive and wool advisory committees, and a staff member, will make calls on all the key mills that use wool. Thurman said, "Sheep producers themselves must be first-rate promoters of their products."

10% Hike Set For Social Security Benefits

Although the recently enacted social security increase is effective January 1, 1971, necessary processing of the increase will delay actual payment of it until June. Mr. Talbot explained. The June payment will reflect the increased benefit due for May, and a separate check later that month will cover the increase due for January thru April, he said.
