



Nurses in the special care unit of a hospital's newborn nursery are being provided with old fashioned rocking chairs. Infants left alone for weeks in a hospital incubator can become socially retarded, it has been found. To prevent this, the nurses hold, fondle, pet and pat the babies during feeding periods.

At a recent medical meeting, a California pro-fessor of pediatrics reported that bacterial infection in newborn nurseries is spread primarily by hands that have not been adequately washed. He confirmed the studies of other reserachers that skin infections can be largely or wholly prevented through careful handwashing before and after handling the infants, and by bathing them with the antibacterial skin cleanser, pHisoHex.

(pHisoHex has been selected as the antibacterial wash to be used by members of the official U.S. teams in the 1971 Pan-American Games and the 1972 Olympic Games. It is recommended for showering and for total

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
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
