

Rod Bordelon, of the Public Insurance Council, argued that there was not sufficient data to increase rates on the basis of mold claims.

The final decision will be up to Commissioner Montemayor.



Researchers can be dispatched quickly from the Uvalde area to the location of the carcass to collect samples. Ranchers will not be expected to handle the samples but are responsible under state regulations to burn the carcasses after the samples are taken.

> Dr. Tull said sample collection efforts will continue through August 3, and reports can be taken from ranchers from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. weekdays.

> "The CDC and state human and animal health agencies, including the Texas Animal Health Commission, Texas Department of Health, and Texas Veterinary Medical Diagnostic Laboratory have an interest in learning more about the occurrence of anthrax and the use of field diagnostic tests," commented Dr. Terry Conger, state epidemiologist for the Texas Animal Health Commission, the state's livestock health regulatory agency.

In the outbreak area, clinical confirmation is still pending on two suspected human cases of cutaneous (skin) anthrax after two ranchers developed skin lesions characteristic of anthrax after handling livestock. She encouraged ranchers in the area to wear latex or work gloves and long sleeves when handling livestock, carcasses or anthrax vaccine. Dr. Tull said ranchers should seek immediate medical attention if they develop unusual sores on their arms or hands.

Anthrax is caused by a sporeforming bacteria that remains dormant in the soil until activated by periods of cool, wet weather, followed by several weeks of hot, dry conditions. The bacteria rises to the surface, where it contaminates soil and grass. Animals, including cattle, sheep, goats, exotic and domestic deer, and horses can ingest the bacteria as they graze. By the time an animal displays signs of the disease, which may involve staggering, trembling, convulsions, or bleeding from the body openings, death usually follows.
