# **Hospital Story**

The newly elected Hospital District directors met in reguluar session Monday night, April 3, and elected Ed Meador as chairman and Guy Whitaker as secretary. It was announced that hereafter regular meetings will be held on the 3rd Monday of each month instead of the first Monday.

According to Secretary Whitaker a called meeting had been held in March, in which Dr. Brame appeared before the board and stated that he and Dr. Peterson preferred to practice medicine and be relieved of the business of operating the hospital.

Dr. Brame has operated the institution since it opened under a lease agreement under the name of Medica Diversified. The lease still has about three years

At the March meeting Dr. Brame offered to voluntarily cancel remainder of the lease and turn operation over to the seven Hospital District directors, while the two doctors would continue to practice in the Clinic.

After lengthy discussion Directors voted unanimously to accept the proposed offer and legal details are now in the process of being worked out.

Lillian Kroeger, administrator of the hospital under Dr. Brame, has consented to remain as hospital administrator for the Board.

In spite of many contrary street rumors, Mr. Whitaker emphasized that all negotiations have been carried on in a congenial and friendly manner.

Whatever changes will be made in the new set-up they will be chiefly in bookkeeping. The average patient will never notice the difference—the busy clinic will still be operating with two doctors.

Have a cold, the flu, indigestion, arthritis, or maybe you just don't have the pep and energy you used to have. If so, then you are probably familiar with the infinite i

You may also be aware of the cure-alls and pseudo-medicines do and buy drugs and medicines only

Billions of dollars are spent each year in the United States on quack medicines and secret potions by today's modern consumer.

The elderly are particularly victimized because with old age come many minor aches and pains and a few major ones. Many older folks hesitate to consult a competent physician and choose to prescribe for themselves, instead, through mail-order cures or door-to-door health consultants. The result is that they are bilked out of their money and disappointed when their problems are not solved by the

"wonder" medicines they purchase. Whether quackery is intended or not is beside the point-incorrect medical advice and cure-alls that don't cure are deceptive to the public and often dangerous as well.

Assuming that the cure or therapeutic device is harmless, it can still destroy one's faith in legitimate treatment by a doctor.

Frauds in the health field are almost too numerous to mention, but the Food and Drug Administration has compiled a list of items which should be noted. Fertile grounds for health hucksters include vitamins and pep pills, impotency cures, alcoholism treatments, air purifiers, mail-order eye glasses, hair restorers, and tiredblood tonics, to name only a few. Most of these items simply do not provide any relief or satisfaction

to the hopeful individual seeking The best advice to remember is that a physician should be consulted before being tempted to try any of these "sure-cure" remedies.



Lawn Management Is Important

Lawn management chores such as fertilization, mowing and watering are again beginning to occupy considerable spare time of homeowners. With temperatures beginning to climb and a shortage of soil moisture, maintenance of the home lawn can be a perplexing job. However, by following certain basic maintenance practices, and doing them on time, an attractive lawn can be maintained with a

First, adequate amounts of plant food are important to keep a lawn green and to maintain growth and health of the grass. Start by applying a complete fertilizer in the Spring as the grass begins to grow. Then follow with another application in the fall about a month

Nitrogen is a key fertilizer ele ment in turf production. If deficient, plant growth will become stunted and a condition often called "firing" will develop. Lack of phosphorus will retard growth, and shortage of potassium will likewise inhibit plant growth and vigor. There must be a balance of these





# Young Men Must Still Register Draft Board

Austin, Tex.—Colonel Melvin N. Glantz, State Director of Selective Service for Texas, has reminded young men of their requirement under Federal Law to register with

Selective Service. Some young men believe that because future military manpower requirements may be met by volunteers that the requirement to register is past; however, the Law does require registration by all native born young men and all resident-aliens within 30 days of their 18th birthday. Legal registration may be completed 30 days before, or 30 days after the young

man reaches age 18. If a young man fails to register with Selective Service, he is subject to a fine or imprisonment, or both, under provisions of the Mili-

tary Selective Service Act. In most Texas counties young men may register at the office of their local draft board, or with voluntary registrars located convenient locations in their county. Mrs. Helen Carlman is the registrar representing Schleicher



# Predator Referendum Falls Short Of Majority

Austin, Tex.—A proposed predator control program in a 73-county sheep and goat-raising area of West Texas failed to get the two-thirds majority necessary for approval in recent mail balloting, Texas Agriculture Commissioner John C White has announced.

A total of 1,240, or 54.3%, approved the proposal and 1,040 voted against it in the balloting that ended March 28. The Texas Sheep and Goat Raisers Association held the referendum under authority granted by Commissioner White under provisions of the Texas Commodity Referendum Law.

The proposal included a deduction of 20 cents a head for sheep and 10 cents a head for goats to be used in a predator control pro-
