Seniors To Receive Diplomas Here Monday Night

The 1972 grads of Eldorado High School have Baccalaureate services set for Sunday night at 8:00 in the school auditorium, and will receive their diplomas Monday night in Commencement exercises, also starting at 8:00. The Eagle Band under direction of Wayne McDonald will play the processional and recessional, for both events.

Through this week, the Seniors have had the traditional round of parties and other get-togethers which bring to a close their local school careers. Local churches will dispense with their own services Sunday night in order for their congregations to attend Baccalaureate.

Band Home From Event In Tennessee

That "Goin' Band From Eagle Land" gave Eldorado's civic pride another boost when they marched down Memphis, Tenn., Main street last Friday playing "Everything's Coming Up Roses" in a shower that turned into a torrential downpour. With rain pouring off their hats, down their necks (those wearing glasses needing windshield wipers to see where they were going) their pride and good humor won the approval of the rain soaked crowds and rounds of applause marked with shouts of "Go Eagles!" and waves of "Hook 'em Horns."

Saturday in lovely weather they played a concert in beautiful Court Plaza band stand in the downtown area at 1:15, then at 6:30 they were swinging back into Main st., in the huge Cotton Carnival Parade similar to Cotton Bowl Parade in Dallas, Orange Bowl or Sugar Bowl, made up of cars carrying state and national dignitaries, scores of beautiful floats—one carrying the new Miss Teenage America, and 80 bands from over the nation; 100 bands were to march but the number was cut because of rain soaked uniforms.

The Eagle Band was the 13th band to appear in the televised parade which wound down the street, for 15 blocks, sidewalks and the wide street jammed with spectators held back by police to give the bands room to march.

The announcer on the loud speakers located at the three different intersections boomed out, "Next the Eldorado Eagle Marching Band from Eldorado in far West Texas, under the direction of Wayne McDonald. This Sweepstakes winning band has participated in the Lions Club International Parade, Buccaneer Days in Corpus Christi, Tex., HemisFair in San Antonio, Tex., and the Blossom Festival in Colorado."

Oil News

Schleicher Confirmer

Third producer and 3/8 mile southeast extension to the W. J. B. (Canyon gas) field of Schleicher county was indicated with the flowing of gas at the estimated rate of 110,000 cubic feet per day on a drillstem test at Tucker Drilling Co., Inc., San Angelo, No. 1 James L. Powell et al. in 41-A-HE&WT, seven miles south of Eldorado.

Tool was open 65 minutes on the test taken at 5,888-936 feet on which gas surfaced in eight minutes flowing at the above rate, on a 3/8-inch surface choke. There was no fluid. Flowing pressure was 135-153 pounds; 30-minute initial shut-in pressure, 1,942 pounds; and one-hour final shut-in pressure, 1,804 pounds.

Operator was waiting on cement after setting 4 1/2-inch casing at 6,172 feet on total depth of 6,179 feet.

Home Demonstration Agent's Column

Foods And Dental Health

Most people don't give serious thought to the relationship of foods to dental health.

The National Institute of Health reports that a proper diet coupled with good oral hygiene and professional care helps you maintain healthy teeth for a lifetime—and avoid oral problems as well.

Specifically what does this mean? First, eat well balanced meals including adequate daily servings of the basic foods—milk and other dairy products, meats, fruits, vegetables, breads and cereals. Try to limit your eating of sweets and avoid in-between meal snacks of sweet fruits, candies, cookies and soft drinks since these were found to increase decay in teeth. If you must eat sweets, eat them during the day.

Third, drink flouridated water. According to the Texas Nutrition Survey of 4,497 individuals, the overall condition of teeth and gums of those surveyed was quite poor. This indicates that many Texans could benefit from good nutrition practices that help build good teeth and healthy gums in the first place, and then help keep them.

So remember to eat a well balanced diet and avoid too many exposures of the teeth to foods harmful to the teeth.

Listening To Children

Try listening to yourself and to your child.

Parents who stop now and then to listen to themselves understand why some ways don't work. If you find yourself saying, "If I've told you once, I've told you a dozen times," then this method isn't working. It may be wise to try something else.

Listening gives you an opportunity to check yourself and your actions. Paying attention to what children say gives clues about what they've been learning. Adults are often surprised to discover that children learn something different from what parents think they teach.

Try keeping a record for one day of the things you say to your child when it's time for bed or when you want him to do a good job. And write down what you say when you want him to turn off TV or change his behavior.

How many times do you say the words: no, don't, stop, or quit? You might be surprised. Write down the number of times you say these words.

If you find that you use such words often, why not try stating your requests in a more positive manner?

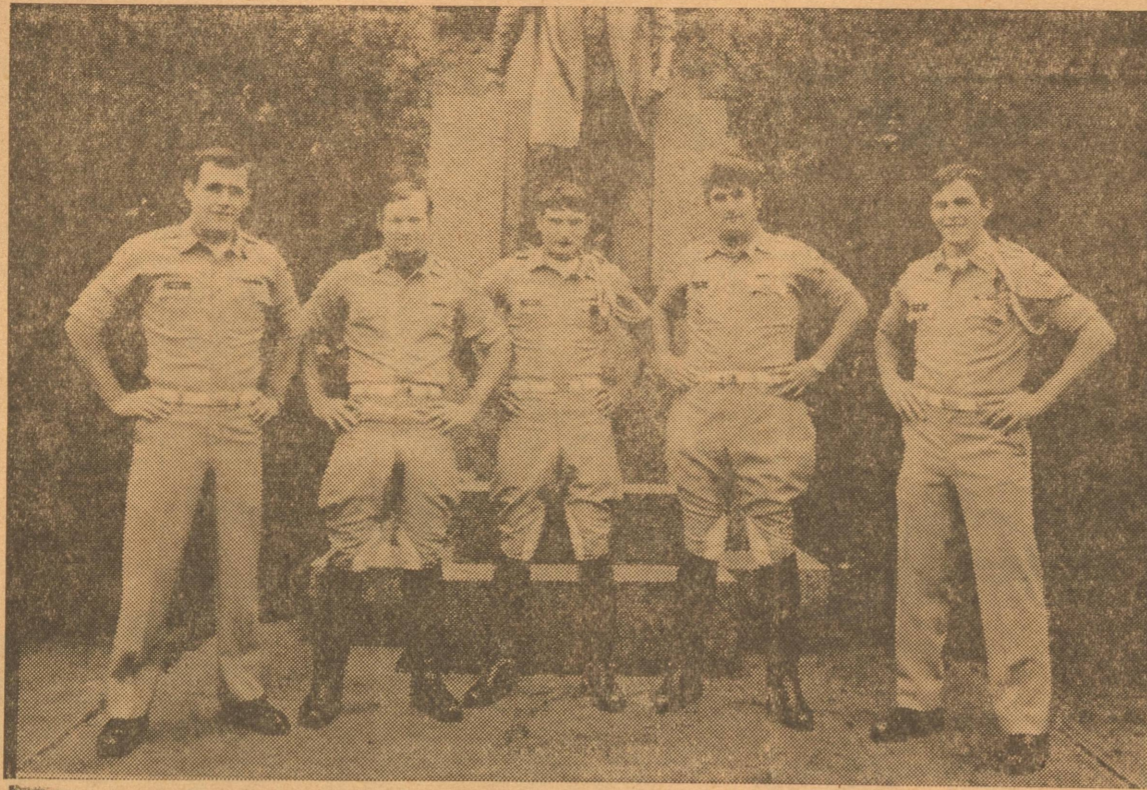

Eldorado-Divide District News

During the drouth of the fifties several farmers in the Eldorado-Divide Soil and Water Conservation District drilled wells for irrigation on their farms. Their first problem was to get wells with enough water to irrigate with. Their second problem was to install an adequate and efficient system to deliver the water to the fields to be irrigated. Most farmers saw the need for the right kind of delivery system. However, after irrigation had been carried on for a few years, it became evident to most farmers that the right kind of delivery system was about as important as having water for irrigation.

The first delivery systems put into use when irrigation first started were earthen ditches. While there are some advantages in using earthen ditches for delivery of irrigation water, they are exceeded by the disadvantages. About the only real advantage of an earthen ditch over an irrigation pipeline is the amount of water that can be transported in open earthen ditches. If earthen ditches are to transport more water per minute than pipelines, the cross section area of the ditch must be greater than the pipeline. Water loss by seepage, evaporation, and inefficiency of irrigation can be placed at the top of the list of the many disadvantages of an earthen ditch.

Getting all the water from the source of supply to the field and crop where needed has been one of the big reasons irrigation farmers have installed pipelines for delivery of their irrigation water. Portable pipelines above ground were not in use soon after the first irrigation from wells was started in Schleicher county. The loss of water before it reached the crops being grown was greatly reduced. The problem of wet land on turn rows was practically eliminated. However, pipelines above ground created a hazard similar to ditches in that lines could not be crossed with farm implements. Even though above ground pipeline is a big improvement over earthen ditches some of the same disadvantages are encountered in both.

Several farmers in the District have installed some underground pipeline to deliver the irrigation water to their fields. Numerous advantages and benefits are cited by farmers. In pointing out some of the main advantages and benefits to Lloyd B. Johnson of the Soil Conservation Service, one of the first benefits cited is all the irrigation water gets to the field where needed and more land can be irrigated. These two advantages are enough to justify the needs of installing underground pipelines. Getting the delivery system underground out of the way of farming

equipment is another advantage of underground pipelines. Being able to start irrigation at any outlet on the pipeline without moving any pipe, except the swing line, is an advantage liked by every one with underground lines.

Without any doubt, all the water from each irrigation well now being used in the District, is needed on the farm for crops being irrigated. Where portable above-the-ground pipelines are being used the 30% to 50% of water loss in earthen ditches is all but eliminated. Water loss is reduced to the very minimum where underground irrigation pipelines are used. The loss of any water from the source of supply to crops being grown should be avoided. Not only is the best use made from irrigation water available, the most important element in the world is not wasted.

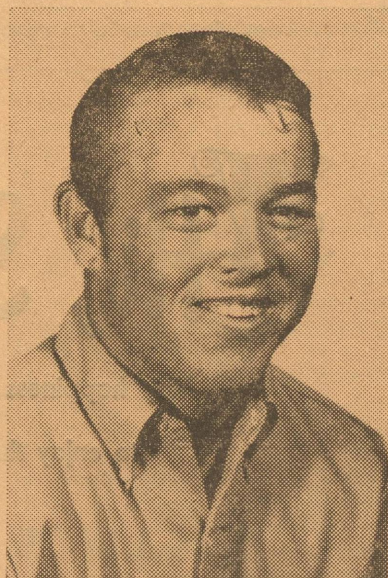


GARY DANFORD

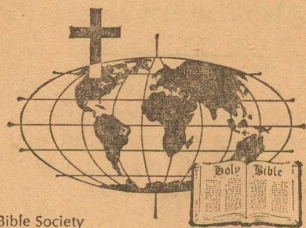

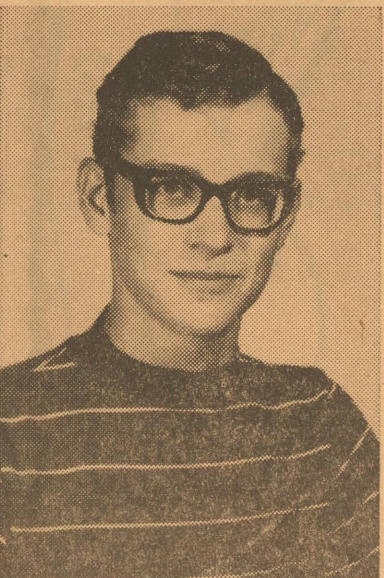

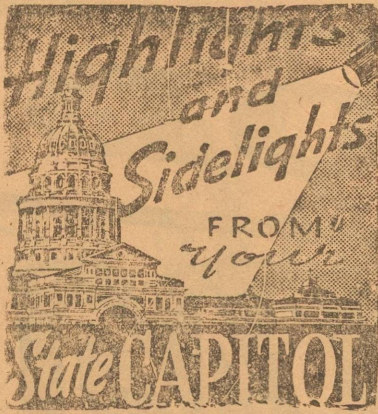

Austin, Tex.—Texans displayed at May 6 primaries a strong enough desire for new state governmental leadership to assure a change in top offices and a major legislative turnover as well.

Reform candidates Dolph Briscoe of Uvalde and State Rep. Frances (Sissy) Farenthold of Corpus Christi charged into the Democratic gubernatorial runoff. Mrs. Farenthold scored a stunning upset over Lt. Gov. Ben Barnes. Gov. Preston finished a distant third. Republican gubernatorial runoff candidates are State Sen. Henry Grover and Albert B. Fay, both of Houston.

Houston newspaper executive Bill Hobby led State Sen. Wayne Connally of Floresville in the lieutenant governor's race and both already are campaigning hard for the June 3 runoff.

John Hill of Houston squeaked through without a runoff over Atty. Gen. Crawford Martin and Bill Pate of El Paso.

From there on, the statewide incumbents managed to stay on top. One, Comptroller Robert S. Calvert, led widely but was forced into a runoff with a former employee Jim Wallace of Austin.

Former U. S. Sen. Ralph Yarborough has a runoff with Barefoot Sanders for the Democratic nomination to face GOP Sen. John G. Tower.

There will be at least 14 new faces in the Texas State Senate, and all observers concede the body will be more conservative than the present Senate. Six senate seats will be decided by runoffs. Republicans will oppose Democrats in 12 general election races. One Republican Senator is unopposed.

In the House, a total of 64 incumbents did not seek re-election or were defeated. (Actually, 14 were defeated.) Sixteen more incumbents were forced into House runoffs, including Speaker Rayford Price of Palestine. More than 65 incumbent representatives were re-nominated. Republicans were nominated in 76 of the 150 districts.

Cane Acreage Allocated

The U. S. Department of Agriculture has allocated 25,700 acres in the Lower Rio Grande Valley for sugar cane harvest.

The allotment includes counties of Hidalgo, Cameron, Willcox, and Starr. Allocation is the first in almost 50 years for Texas and, according to U. S. Sen. John Tower, is expected to return a cash crop worth more than \$50 million to Texas growers.

Cotton, citrus and vegetables already are produced in the area.

Waco, Tex.—Kathy Ann Robinson, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. T. P. Robinson Jr. of Eldorado, has added another honor to her growing list of achievements at Baylor University.

She was one of 16 women extended membership in the Laurel chapter of Mortar Board, national senior women's honor society, at Baylor. Membership is based on leadership, scholarship and service.

Miss Robinson was "tapped" for membership at a recent awards banquet that highlighted Women's Day, an observance honoring Baylor women. Woman's Day activities are sponsored annually by Baylor's Laurel chapter.

A 1969 graduate of Eldorado High School, Miss Robinson is a junior journalism and oral communication major. but Tower said growers need an additional crop with a stable economic base. Mainland sugar cane production in the U. S. has been concentrated in Louisiana and Florida. The allocation goes to Rio Grande Valley Sugar Growers Inc., a cooperative which already has 2,500 acres in cane which will be used for seed in the scheduled September 1973 processing.

Mission Seeks Business

A 10-member Texas trade mission team in Moscow and Bucharest may return with more than \$60 million in business for oil drilling and petrochemical manufacturers.

Texas Industrial Commission said the mission which began last month offers an opportunity for Texas to take the first step toward capturing a portion of a virtually untapped \$22 billion market in Eastern Europe.

The tour, organized by the petrochemical industry, is the first of its kind behind the iron curtain. It is designed to promote sales of oilfield equipment, refinery and chemical production equipment and instrumentation, controls and services of these operations.

Stamp Program Planned

The State Department of Public Welfare has been called on by the governor to develop a pilot food stamp program in preparation for a statewide plan.

A state-funded program will be proposed in the special session of the Legislature next month. Federal courts have ordered all counties to have either a food stamp or a food commodity program for the needy. The stamp program is expected to generate \$285 million in economic activity.

Courts Speak

The American Party once more was unsuccessful in trying to have the new law providing state financing for primary elections declared unconstitutional by the State Supreme Court.

The High Court, in another case, held the owner of a factory in Hemphill was not liable for damages in an accident caused by an independent contractor hauling logs to the plant.

Third Court of Civil Appeals upheld a Hays County district court decision on preventing a contractor from bringing a second suit over the same paving contract transaction against Holiday Inns.

W. E. (Buck) Tinsley of Austin has been re-appointed to a new six-year term on the Texas Water Development Board of which he has been chairman for the last year.

Governor Smith appointed Jefferson Kerney Brim Jr. of Sulphur Springs eighth district judge.

Smith picked W. L. Kinley of Houston, Mrs. Ida L. Kenney of San Antonio, Mrs. Printis E. Ellis of Paris and Dr. John T. King of Austin for membership on the Governor's Committee on Aging.

"Billion Dollar" Boundary Victory

Attorney General Martin hailed a favorable decision for Texas in a boundary dispute with Louisiana as "a billion dollar victory" for the state and the cities of Orange and Port Arthur.

A special master appointed by the U. S. Supreme Court decided Texas is entitled to the western half of Sabine River, Sabine Lake and Sabine Pass. Louisiana's claim to the entire stream was denied. Martin filed the suit in 1969. Louisiana will have an opportunity to file an objection to the master's decision in the court.

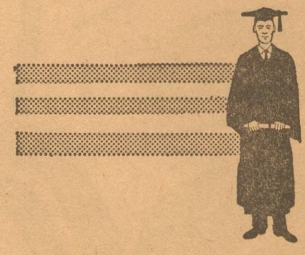

New Welfare Guidelines Adopted

New guidelines have been adopted by the State Board of Public Welfare to eliminate abuse by medical assistance recipients.

One purpose is to eliminate unnecessary medication and unnecessary doctor's office visits. Guidelines will limit prescriptions to three a month and limit cost per prescription to a maximum of \$15, with a \$33 monthly maximum. Drugs used to treat chronic illnesses will be exempt.

A second rule would limit visits to a doctor's office to five per month per recipient, not to exceed 10 a year. Some exceptions are possible.
