Hundreds of young cowboys and cowgirls, dressed in their Sunday-best rodeo attire and riding Texas' fanciest and highly trained horses, will parade down Main Street in Eldorado at 6:00 Friday as the opening spectacular of the Third Annual Junior Rodeo scheduled for Friday and Saturday evenings.

The parade will assemble on the street behind the Courthouse and will proceed through the main business district before winding its way to the rodeo grounds.
