

City Water Well Tests 830 Gallons Per Min.

The new city water well drilled in the south part of town was pumping water at the rate of 830 gallons per minute at 2:00 p.m., Tuesday, and already is regarded as the best well in town.

On a first test the well produced 270 gallons per minute. Then it was acidized with 1,000 gallons of acid, and immediately thereafter began delivering at 830 GPM, which was the capacity of the pump. Several observers are confident the well could go to 1,000 GPM if larger pump were used.

Roses For Indoor And Outdoor Beauty

roses provides indoor beauty for the home and also encourages new growth and more flowers.

Remove flower stems only as long as you actually need for the vase into the grass root zone. you'll place them in. If you take Skeletonized Chinese Elm Leaves too many food producing leaves with a cut rose, you may weaken the plant.

On roses that were set out as recently as last fall or this spring, it is suggested to cut the bloom stems above the first leaf that has five leaflets. On vigorous growing plants that are well established, flower stems may be cut longer without harming the plant. However, at least two good five-leaflet leaves should be left below the cut. The less vigorous the plant, the more foliage should be left.

To remove faded blooms, groom bushes once or twice a week during the bloom season. This improves their appearance and prevents fruit development which takes food material away from new growth. Always use sharp cutting tools for cutting rose stems. Tearing or twisting off flowers injures the remaining wood

Infested trees should be sprayed thoroughly including the trunk. Application of insecticides to the trunk will control the mature larvae that move down the tree to complete the pupa stage and become adults.

Control measures should be applied as infestations appear during late-April and May and again in mid-summer when increased numbers of the elm leaf beetle larvae are again found on the tree.




