AUSTIN - The state's crime rate dropped last year, but data of Public Safety shows the number of reported crimes actually increased.
In real numbers, $1,032,670$ senous crimes were reported in the $1,009,953$ in 1999. That amounts 22,717 more $m$

## Fort Hood man blames tardiness on mystery gunman

Terry Simien, 19, of Fort Hood, told Sheriff's Deputy David Olian Monday evening that an unidentified gunman had forced him at gunpoint to surrender his automobile in Crockett County. Simien said he had caught a ride into Eldorado where he called for help from a pay phone at Shot's convenience store.
The story quickly unraveled owever, when Simien's car was found wrecked about 30 miles west of Eldorado on U.S. 290. After questioning by Texas Ranger Brooks Long, Simien reportedly told officers that he had fabricated the story in hopes of avoiding an AWOL charge.
Simien called the Schleicher County Sheriff's office from the pay phone at Shot's convenience store at 7:29 p.m. Monday, saying that an unidentified man had stolen his car. When Deputy Olivan arrived at the scene, Simien's story became more elaborate
Simien told Olivan that he had stopped his car to read a map somewhere west of Eldorado when a tall white man with a shaggy

Texas tax law limits the exemption. Tax is still due on sales of athletic and protective clothing and footwear that are not normally worn except for their intended use. For example, since basketball shoes are worn for many activities other than basketball, they may be sold tax-free during the tax holiday. On the other hand, spiked golf shoes are rarely worn except when playing golf and thus will not receive a tax exemption.

Additionally, tax is still due on sales of accessories, jewelry, handbags, luggage, umbrellas, wall
watches, and similar items

Althour, District 25 elemarketing calls are simply an noying invasions of privacy, oth ers may have more serious consequences. Unscrupulous telemarketers annually bilk an estimated $\$ 40$ billion from consumers, many of whom are senior citizens.
Because 78 percent of telemarketing fraud targets people who are 55 years of age and older, the American Association of Retired Persons and the Silver-haired Legislature made a no-call bill a legislative priority. Thousands of Senate District 25 constituents also indicated that they wanted the Texas Legislature to disconnect telemarketers.

During the recent legislative session, we passed the Texas Telemarketing Disclosure and Privacy Act, which establishes a "Do Not Call" list for Texas. The act, which becomes effective January 1,2002, also prohibits telemarketers from blocking their numbers or interfering with caller ID. The Public Utility Commis sion (PUC) is adopting no-call-list guidelines. They will include a toll-free number, mailing address and Internet web site which consumers may contact for information about the list and where to send a $\$ 3$ fee.
A listing will be good for three years and may be renewed for $\$ 3$. Telemarketers may not contact people on the list beginning 60 days after their numbers are pub-

Anyone who engages i tain a copy of the do-not-call list and honor customers' requests not o be called. Violators could be fined up to $\$ 1,000$ per violation and have their licenses suspend ed or revoked for repeated viol tions
A subsequent violation could cause for a civil action if the consumer had notified the appropriate agency of the violation and the agency failed to act. The cour could award damages up to $\$ 500$ per violation.
Provisions of House Bill 472 which created the privacy act, also require fax transmissions to follow federal standards, which include a cover sheet stating the solicitor's name, address and oll-free number. The telephone must be answered during busiess hours by someone capable responding to inquiries or by leleting a device capable of number.
If requested, customers' num bers must be deleted from a fax list within 24 hours. Customer could bring a private suit for the actual monetary loss or $\$ 500$ for each violation.
HB 472 protects both legitimate businesses and consumer who have been harassed and defrauded by unscrupulous telemarketers. The bill makes exceptions or calls regarding securities, to collect a debt, in answer to solictations or advertisements or in ionship.
Until the bill becomes effecive, Texans must ask telemarketers not to call again. HB 472 puts the burden of stopping calls on telemarketers.

Even after the bill becomes effective, consumers should ex ercise a healthy dose of skepticism when the telephone rings and someone at the other end asks for a charitable contribution If you have any doubt about the caller's legitimacy, please get the charity or company name, ad dress and phone number, and cal the Office of the Attorney Gen eral toll-free at (800) 252-8011 or the PUC toll-free at (888) 782 8477.
