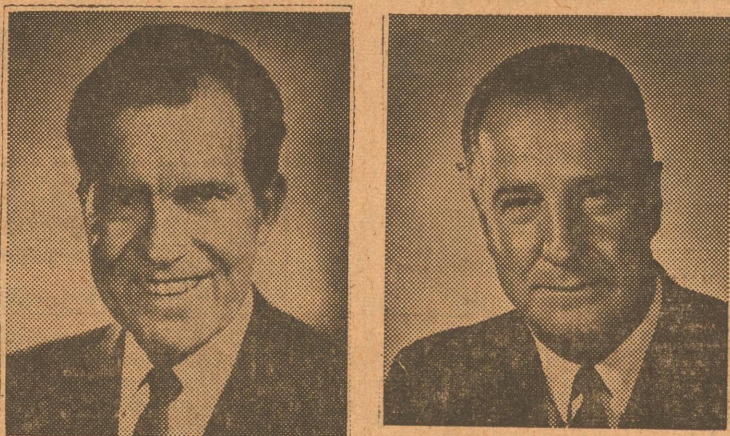

Top Republicans Re-Elected To 4-Year Terms

American voters went to the polls Tuesday to elect governing officials from the White House down, and as the pollsters predicted, President Richard M. Nixon and his running mate, Vice-President Spiro Agnew were re-elected. In recent days, Democrats George McGovern and Sargent Shriver campaigned actively but failed to overcome the incumbents' lead.

President Nixon swept the state of Texas, along with the rest of the nation. Nixon's Texas victory was the first state-wide in 16 years.

Senator John Tower took a coat-tails victory over Barefoot Sanders to win a new six-year term to the U. S. Senate.

Still Congressman Following Election

Voters of the 21st Congressional District elected O. C. Fisher of San Angelo to a new two-year term in Tuesday's election.

The 30-year veteran of the House where he is a high ranking member of the Armed Services committee, will thus remain in office through 1974.

Schleicher County voters gave Fisher 619 votes to 247 for Harlan. As expected, Fisher carried this and other counties which comprised the nucleus of his original district. Harlan fared better in northern Bexar county, his home county, which now has about half the 21st district's votes.

She was born July 10, 1911 in Lockhart. She was married to Hubert V. Graves June 11, 1946 at Crystal City. They moved to Eldorado Dec. 12, 1966.

Survivors include her husband; two brothers, Buck Turman and James H. Turman, both of Fowler; a niece, Dorothy Bolton of Santa Rosa, Texas.

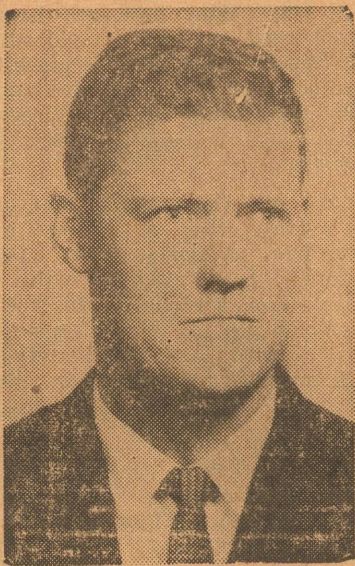

Legion To Honor WW1 Vets Saturday

The dozen or so veterans of World War 1 who live here in Schleicher county will be special guests of honor at a breakfast Saturday morning, Nov. 11th, to be served at 7:30 in the Memorial Building.

A similar breakfast was held a year ago on Nov. 11th and was so well received and attended that the Bev McCormick Post of The American Legion decided to have one again this year.

The breakfast will be served to the World War 1 vets and to any other Legionnaires who would like to attend. The post members will do the planning and preparation of the meal.

Nov. 11th, which was formerly known as Armistice Day, will mark the 54th anniversary of the cessation of hostilities of World War 1.

Gas Discovery Indicated

An Ellenburger gas discovery was indicated in Schleicher county with the flowing of gas at the rate of 1 million cubic feet daily when drilling reached 7,787 feet at Shenandoah Oil Corp., Midland, No. 1 Iverson-Jurecek, in 32-A-GC&SF, 12 miles west of Eldorado, two miles west of the Klatt (Canyon gas) field and 3 3/4 miles south east of the depleted University 101 (Ellenburger oil) field.

Operator set 4 1/2-inch casing at 7,950 feet. The project was shut down for weather.

The Ellenburger was topped at 7,776 feet, elevation unreported. Only drilling depths were released after drilling reached 8,270 feet and it went "tight" when the drilling reached 8,515 feet Oct. 17.

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**Eggs Are Wholesome
Texas Product**

College Station, Tex.—What better way to usher in November as Food and Fiber Abundance Month in Texas than by looking at a wholesome Texas product—eggs.

Texas is one of the leading egg producing states in the nation, says Dr. David B. Mellor, poultry marketing specialist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

During the past 18-24 months, eggs have been in over supply in the United States and prices have been low. Many producers have consolidated, cut back or sold out. The consumer has been the biggest benefactor of this abundance and problems facing the producers, notes the Texas A&M University specialist.

"Any way you calculate it, eggs are a great value. Each dozen of large eggs weighs at least 1 1/2 pounds. At 59 cents a dozen, that's only 39 cents a pound. At this price the cost per serving—2 eggs—is only 10 cents. Can you beat that with any other food high in protein?"

Protein is probably the most expensive nutrient in our diet, considering the fact that we need much more protein daily than either vitamins or minerals. Eggs are one

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of our most economical sources of high quality protein, contends Mellor. In addition, eggs contain the most nearly perfect, naturally occurring protein. "The egg protein is so perfect that it is used as the yardstick of perfection in measuring other proteins," points out the specialist.

**Bacon & Pork Prices
Are Somewhat Lower**

College Station, Tex.—Bacon prices took a plunge from levels of a few weeks ago and signal a general decline on pork tags for the first weeks of November.

Mrs. Gwendolyn Clyatt, consumer marketing specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University, explained the shift.

"Retail pork prices keep going down gradually as supply increases seasonally.

"Best pork values are found on hams, picnics, bacon, shoulder roasts and steaks, and pork liver."

In other sections of the market this week, the specialist reported the following:

Fryer chickens remain one of the most economical values in most meat departments.

Frozen turkeys come in a wide range of sizes in most markets, and turkey parts generally offer very good value.

Large size eggs are in greatest

supply with Grade A large offering greatest economy and quality for the money.

Fruit and vegetables in good supply at the most economical prices include apples, oranges, bananas, Tokay grapes, cranberries, potatoes and celery.

Also cabbage, sweet potatoes, carrots, dry yellow onions, tomatoes, mustard, collard and turnip greens.

At mostly moderate price levels are eggplant broccoli, cauliflower and green beans.

County Ag. Agent's Column

Cure, Store Caladium Tubers For Spring

To insure success with Caladiums, treat them as annuals and use new tubers each spring. Caladiums are difficult to successfully carry over from season to season because fall rains prevent proper curing. To save Caladium tubers for next spring follow this procedure. As the leaves begin to dry up after the night temperature drops to 50 degrees F. and below, lift the individual clumps and place in a warm, dry, well-ventilated shed or garage with food light for 10 days to two weeks. Remove as much of the soil as possible when lifting the tubers to hasten drying and curing.

After the drying period, remove the dead leaves and inspect the tubers to be sure they are free of disease and insects. Dust the tubers thoroughly with a combination of Captan and Sevin for protection against insects and fungus disease in storage. Using dry peat moss or vermiculite, pack the tubers in a container so they do not touch each other and store the container in a warm, dry closet at 60 degrees F. Colder temperatures will promote rotting while warmer temperatures will cause premature sprouting. Caladium tubers should not be set out in the spring until the soil temperature reaches 70 degrees F. This is usually about May 1, in Schleicher County. Select a warm protected spot in the garden with at least partial shade for best results. A well prepared bed with ample organic matter and good drainage is also important. Inspect the stored tubers before planting and discard those that have rotted areas or appear damaged in any way.

Garden Check List For November

1. Don't forget to wet down the compost pile occasionally. Those leaves and other organic matter won't decompose if allowed to remain dry.
2. If you are planning a rose bed, prepare the beds now so you will be ready to plant when the dormant roses become available in late December and January.
3. Clean up, oil, sharpen and store garden tools so they will be ready to use when needed. Any repairs needed on power tools should be done before storing.
4. Force spring flowering bulbs for indoor flowering. (See Landscape Notes for October).
5. Plant pansies and sweet peas in those beds you prepared last month.
6. Dahlia roots should be dug and stored after frost kills back the foliage.
7. Clean up dead plants, leaves and other debris to reduce insect population next spring.
8. There is still time for that fall application of fertilizer for the lawn area. It will also benefit the trees in the lawn area.

Rural Development Act Passed In Texas

Rural Texas areas, subject of much concern over their loss of population in recent years, have a chance to reverse this alarming trend through the new Texas Rural Development Act, passed by the 62nd Legislature.

The Texas Rural Development Act is designed to help with up to 40% of the cost of financing new or expanding industry in rural areas for qualifying nonprofit foundations.

The Legislature passed this act strictly to help the ailing economy of rural Texas.

The Texas Industrial Commission, charged with administration of the new law, has set regional public hearings in four cities during the month of November to determine just who is eligible for this aid.

Officially, rural areas are defined in the act as those losing population during the last two federal censuses, or, those areas gaining less population or less manufacturing employment than the average for the state's Standard Metropolitan Areas.

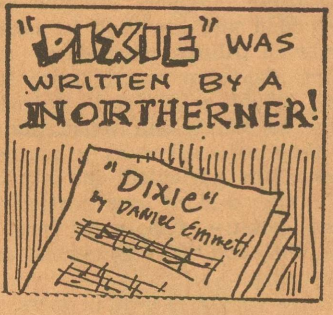

Proper Storage Protects Clothing

College Station, Tex.— Fall is here—so out come appropriate sweaters, jackets and coats.

With the cooler weather, summer clothes are put away—with expectations of a nice, fresh wardrobe next spring, Marilyn Brown observed.

The consumer education-clothing specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University, said the homemaker should take certain steps prior to storage to keep clothes fresh and undamaged.

Unless stored clean or unsoiled under good conditions, clothes can come out of storage in poor shape.

"Store clothes in cool, dry areas. Warm, moist or humid areas are ideal environments for mildew—especially if any starch is left in the fabric," she explained.

"Once mildew is established, it's impossible to remove unless the fabric and dye can withstand bleaching."

Miss Brown offered another tip: "Never put away soiled clothing. Stains will draw moth larvae, which can quickly damage garments in dark closets."

In addition, the stain may set during the time in storage—whereas it might have been easily removed if promptly treated.

"A few extra minutes of care now can result in a better conditioned wardrobe later," she concluded.

Cutting Meat Costs

Some homemakers are spending "more than ever" for meat, they complain. Part of the problem begins when the family starts eating more meat.

A recent U. S. Department of Agriculture study on food consumption reported an increase from 3.37 pounds to 3.60 pounds in meat consumed per person each week over a 10-day period. That totals about eight or nine ounces per day for many people. In most cases we only need four or five ounces each day, so it's obvious many of us are getting more than we need.

Cutting meat costs starts with cutting amounts. Also, buying more of the less expensive foods from the meat group can cut costs while providing nutrition. Examples are ground beef, poultry and fish. Another cost-cutting technique happens in the kitchen. Try buying and cooking large cuts of meat such as ham or roast, which will yield leftovers, and turn them

into delicious casseroles, stews and homemade soups.

Looking at meat as a protein source and searching for some substitutes, homemakers also can turn to cereal and milk occasionally. Four servings of enriched or whole grain cereals and two servings of milk daily will meet about half the body's protein needs.
