9. Don't wait any longer to-broadcast the wildflower seeds you collected. Winter rains and cool weather are needed for good germination of many of these interesting plants. Bluebonnet seeds should be planted by this time.





appetizing. When cocking sweet peppers, allow 15 minutes to bake at 350 degrees after boiling them for five minutes. But when using them in stews or chowders, wait until shortly before the rest of the dish is completely cooked before adding the cut-up peppers. A quick way of preparing these vegetables is to pan-fry them-it takes only five minutes. However, many people remove the seeds and membranes completely because they are sharper in flavor than the green flesh. Broiled or fried peppers break up easily after they are cooked, SO handle them with care. Many families freeze or can peppers for yeararound use. Although they may or may not be blanched before freezing, blanched ones lose more crispness but have better flavor when stored longer than six to eight months. Treat canned pimentos, peppers and pepper relish as any other canned foods and pickles.
