Prussic Acid Can Kill Livestock

College Station, Tex.—Although recent summer-like weather tends to indicate that winter is still a long way off, it's just a matter of time before the season's first freezing temperatures arrive. Such a killing frost can spell danger for livestock producers that have cattle grazing on sorghum stubble or any of the sorghum-sudan hybrid pastures.

"The reason is prussic acid poisoning of the animals," points out Dr. James Armstrong, veterinarian with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M Univer-

"The danger of prussic acid poisoning exists mainly in pastures and fields where sorghum stubble is making regrowth and where there is vigorous, young growth of johnsongrass, sorghum-sudan hybrids and related plants. growth generally has a high content of prussic acid, especially if produced under stress of dry or cool weather.'

According to Armstrong, the main danger to livestock is grazing such pastures and fields immediately after a killing frost.

He advises livestock producers to wait a week to 10 days following a killing frost before allowing cattle to graze suspect pastures and fields. If only a light frost occurs, the veterinarian recommends removing the cattle until plant growth is killed by a heavy freeze.







There are some things, however, that you should do to help insure tha ta private business or vocational school that you are planning

to enter is legitimate. Ask to see the salesman's permit. If you're doubtful about the school and you're still in high school, check with your counselor. The staff at the Texas Education Agency can also be called on for information. Never sign up for a course in haste. Inspect the school yourself if it is located where you live, and talk with some of the students. Read carefully any papers before signing. Enrollment "applications" are usually contracts which call for the payment of tuition. Even if you never enter, you may be obligated to pay a "registration fee" if you signed a con-

But if you have a complaint about a school in spite of these precautions, check your contract and review school policies to be sure your complaint is legitimate. check with the school director or counselor to see if your problem can be resolved. 

Skylab Chow . . .

To Taste Like Mom's Cooking

BENTON HARBOR, MICH.-When it's chow time on Skylab, astronauts who will be spending four to eight weeks in earth orbit, will have a menu which is as close to "home cooking" as modern

food technology can make it.

Whirlpool Corporation, under contract to the National Aeronautics and Space Administration, has developed a food system which will compensate as nearly as possible for the astronauts long absence from the warmth and de-

light of home cooked meals. Dr. Norman Roth, director of Whirlpool's Life Support Systems Division, said, "For the first time, a diet will be provided (for astronauts) which is conventional in appearance, superb in taste and, yet, satisfies the rigor-ous nutritional requirements of space flight.

The food system is so designed that the Skylab crews will have a relatively wide range of selection from a set of conventional food items, while still rigidly adhering to the 'experimental requirements'."

For the first time, astronauts will prepare their meals from an assortment of frozen as well as conventional space foods similar to those carried on manned Gemini and Apollo missions.

Astronauts will prepare their own meals on a special food tray with heated compartments

which conform to the food containers. The tray also keeps the containers from floating around in zero gravity. Frozen foods will be stored in

a freezer in the Skylab orbital workshop.
In addition to being the tastiest menu carried into space thus far, the Skylab food system is

designed to meet the requirements and objectives of an important series of medical investigations food nutrition at the NASA Manned Spacecraft Center, ex-

plained that the medical investi-

gations are profoundly influenced by the nature and amount of food that the astronauts con-The Skylab food system will maintain a caloric level between 2,000 to 2,800 calories per day. More than 70 different food items are now under consideration for use during Skylab missions. The final menu selection
