

Arlington, Texas.—Six Flags Over Texas has ended its 1972 season with all attendance records broken. Final figures put the season's attendance at 2,062,000. The old record, 2,037,000 was set in 1967.

Six Flags General Manager Robert W. Freeman said, "We are already making preparations for the 1973 season which will begin early in the spring."

He continued, "We discovered in 1972 that new attractions in the area and the changes which have been made in the Park itself made Six Flags more popular than ever. The sharp increase in attendance meant one thing to us-expansion. ### HERE ARE SOME ANSWERS TO SOME OF THE MOST OFTEN **ASKED QUESTIONS:**

- Q. What items are subject to the 1% sales tax?
- A. The 1% city sales tax is applicable only to those sales now taxed under the the State Sales & Use Tax Act.
- There is a 2% State tax on automobiles. Would the city sales tax also apply
- A. No. The 2% tax on automobiles is an excise tax: the municipal sales tax would not apply to automobile sales.
- Q. Does the city sales tax apply to sales at wholesale?
- A. No only to retail sales. Goods sold for resales are not taxable.
- Does a person residing outside of the city limits pay the 1% sales tax?
- A. Yes, when he makes a purchase of personal property subject to the tax in city which has adoped the local sales tax. In return, he enjoys the city's streets facilities, police protection and other advantages of the city for which city residents pay the major share.
- Q. Is the local sales tax regressive—that is will it cause a particular hardship for lower-income families?
- A. A sales tax has more elements of equity than any other type of tax, and this is particularly true in Texas, since so many essential items are exempt from the sales tax.
- Q. Why should a city dweller who rents his residence favor the local sales tax?
- A. For one matter, the person who rents enjoys the same services avaiable to the property owner. For another, if it is necessary for the city to raise property taxes, the increased cost of this tax will be passed along in the form of higher rent charges.
- Are city sales tax payments deductible from our Federal income tax reports?
- A. Yes.
- Who can vote on the 1% local sales tax?
- A. Any registered voter in the city. A simple majority is required to put the sales tax into effect.
