TO THE SUCCESS.

Vermont Ranch Jan, 24 1909.

Thinking it might be of interest to your many readers to hear from our part of country, and to hear what we was doing and what we intended doing.

There is some cotton to pick yet as quite a lot of cotton has opened that was thought to be intirely ruined by the earley frost, the crop was a good one and we are proud of the showing we made.

Our Brothers out on the divide did not do so well as their cotton did not mature as quickly as ours did, then allowing the early frost to catch them hard, for at least half their crop of cotton. Farmers here in the Vermont raised

206 bales of cotton divided among 12 men T. G. Chaney 37, O. K. Enoch 27, Dr. W. D. Patton 23, Charley Rice 10, A. K. Bailey 12, Wm. Wooten 18, Jack Wooten 9, George Cobb 9, Mr. Ellis 5, Green Farrington 4, Mr. Foster 24, J. E. Estes 28. This cotton brought an average of 84 cents at Eldorado, most all of this cotton was put up in heavy bales, that of O. K. Enoch averaged 550lb per bale, we also got a fair price for what seed we had for sale, and now comes the report in the papers that cotton will soon reach 10c, but we find it has all passed from the farmers hands into the speculators.

We think this is a fair showing for a new country, we have an abundance of feed stored away, sufficient to last us two years and it begins to look like we could live at home with such a mild winter, so for our stock is doing fine.

The young folks enjoyed a sociable at the hospitable home of Mr and Mrs. T. G. Chaney.

Mrs. McGonigal returned from Hext, Mason county, where she had been visting relatives.

The great amount of railroad talk and also real work that is being done, makes one feel that we should at least try to divert some of those railroad men to come our way, every body don't know what a good county there is South of San Angelo, miles and miles of as good land as ever a crow flew over, lies awaiting the man with the hoe, and also awaits a railroad to haul what we produce. When one goes East and sees so much poor land it seems a wonder that some road doesn't build here, this country would soon develope into one of the finest stock raising counties in the State of Texas, Our soil is all rich and the ranch land produces the most luxuriant grass and stock of all kinds do fine the year round. It was 20 degrees colder in Kansas than here during our last cold spell.

El. News, Giddings, Texas.

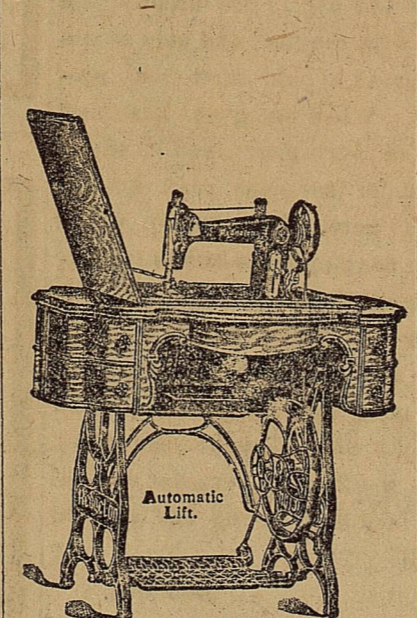

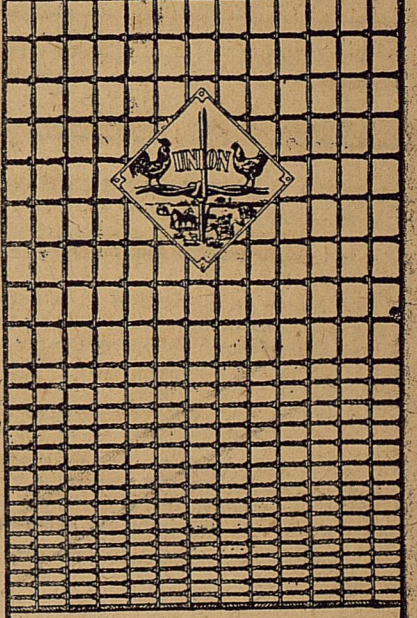

RAIL ROAD NEWS FROM NEW YORK

New York, Jan. 20.—Wall street hears that the several Texas lines of the Colorado and Southern system are to be merged and operated by one set of general officers instead of a separate organization for each road, as at present. There are now the subsidiary corporations of the Colorado and Southern in Texas. These are the Fort Worth and Denver City, the Wichita Valley, the Abilene and Northwestern, the Abilene and Southern and the Stamford and Northwestern.

The construction of the Abilene and Southern and the Stamford and Northwestern is now under way. The former is building south from Abilene, Tex., to Sonora, Sutton County, a distance of 168 miles, with a branch line to San Angelo 40 miles. The Stamford and Northwestern is being built west from Stamford to Plainview, a distance of about 150 miles. The law requires that each of these separate companies maintain its own set of general officers and that the respective lines be operated independently of each other.

Wall Street hears News.
It is announced on Wall street that a bill will be introduced at the present session of the Legislature providing for the consolidation of these several properties into one system, which will be operated by one company and a single set of general officers. Gov. Campbell is said to be opposed to all kinds and forms of railroad mergers and it is expected that the proposed measure will meet with his antagonism. It is understood that the Trinity and Brazos Valley, in which the Colorado and Southern owns a one-half interest, will not be included in the merger measure.—Dallas News.

"PUT'IN ON AIR'S."

The San Angelo Dailey Standard and one of the best dailies published in Texas, has done wonders, and is still doing wonders for the Concho Country, and is now going to install a lot more new machinery. The Standard has always been in the onward march of San Angelo, and still endeavors to lead the progressive citizens of the west on down the procession of time. The Standard has just bought another lino type machine, curved and flat stereotyping outfit and a high speed perfecting press. She will now look back to the progressive people and say, follow me.

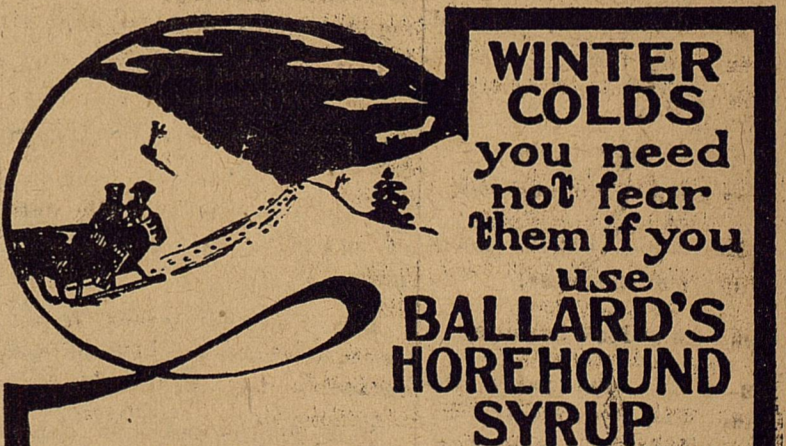
